FREEDOM AND THE BROAD MIDDLE

"The middle of the road is all of the usable surface. The extremes, right and left, are in the gutters."

—Dwight D. Eisenhower (Republican)

I'm writing to you a few days before election day wondering to myself if we as a nation will be more divided than ever after November 3. Our country has found ways to point fingers back and forth many times before, but lately it feels personal. Just the other day a friend hurled a question at me that's haunted me. Her question, "Is the Episcopal Church more liberal than other Christian Churches?", as if we were picking sides for a collegiate football game.

My rapid answer would be that the Church is not part of a political organization, but we are very interested in right and wrong, social justice, the care and wellbeing of the marginalized, the sick, the poor and the oppressed. Etc., etc. As far as I know, we are intentional in being unique, neither liberal nor conservative, fish nor fowl. The truth is that the answer for one particular parish, will never speak for the whole Church.

On the end of a pier at twilight, a good while ago, some friends and I began walking the treacherous path of discussing church and politics. It's a slippery slope to discuss this sort of thing, even among friends, because people seem to cling pretty tightly to their own particular views of right and wrong. But there we were, free to be open and honest; some very conservative views, some very progressive views and no one irreparably damaged from the conversation because we were intentional about finding common ground in the middle. Through our willingness and vulnerability to have open dialogue, my relationship with all of them has become strengthened, and that has been a wonderful gift through the years.

I often wonder what that evening would have been like if it had occurred during our current polarized state of church and political "pande-mania", where people seem to reside in the "gutters" of the right and left that Eisenhower described. I have hope that my group of friends would still be able to conduct ourselves with the same manner of grace where we found common ground, in the middle of our differing and

heated opinions, simply because of one Latin phrase—via media. It's an ancient phrase from Greek philosophy that means the mean between extremes, the middle way, or the middle of the road, but you will find its roots deep within the teachings of Jesus and tied to the very heart of our Church.

When our Church was being birthed in 1534, Thomas Cranmer saw us as the middle way between Protestantism, Roman Catholicism, Lutheranism, and Reformed Christianity. He also saw this middle way as a means to ensure political stability, because our extremes would be brought together in a common space under God. Since then, many of our greatest thinkers have continued to emphasize the importance of our Church remaining the mean between extremes, a place where traditionalists and liberals can have respectful conversations and even agree to disagree. This is one of the reasons I am so very thankful to be a part of the Episcopal Church, because we seek to find common ground so that we can be better as a whole.

As a Church we believe that God speaks to us and guides us through Scripture, Tradition, and Reason. So in a sense, we can't really understand God on our own. We can get pieces and parts, but it requires conversation and discernment to adequately listen to the Holy Spirit. The same is true with authority, we don't believe that any one individual has complete authority, nor do we believe that only clergy can teach us about God. It takes all of us.

We do believe the Church has authority and the responsibility to teach people what is true and right, but not the authority to tell people how to live their lives. We teach and encourage, but freedom and freewill is one of the greatest gifts God has given human beings. Human beings are given the freedom to apply the teachings of the Church in their own daily lives. The Book of Ecclesiasticus says "It was He who created humankind in the beginning, and He left them in the power of their own free choice. If you choose, you can keep the

commandments, and to act faithfully is a matter of your own choice.(15:14-15)"

Choice, then, or responsible freedom is imperative to who we are as a church. Without the right and left extremes, there can be no middle way. We as a Church emphasize an incarnational theology, which is a funny way of saying we take humanity and free will very seriously.

Think of how God operates: God does not violate or take away the gift of choice. God does not give us freedom to choose and then take it away based on how badly freewill is misused or abused. The willing service God wants from us would not be possible if God used force or threats or punishment. God makes his will known, and then leaves it to us to follow through. Even the incarnation came about the way it did so as not to violate the freedom of humanity. But how many times in the course of history has the Christian Church been more arrogant than God himself and forced people into a mold against their will? What a horrible insult when we think we know better than God!

If I were to return to the original question, we are neither fish nor foul, but maybe we're more like a duckbilled platypussomething rare and unique, ugly to some and beautiful to others, a combination of other denominations, and a necessity in the kingdom of God. I do not believe we are a liberal church, nor are we conservative but perhaps a hybrid, because we wanted to be unique. At times the so-called "national" church seems to be extremely liberal, but remember we are part of a global Church, the Anglican Communion. Our local church, St. James, is how we connect with the voices of our communion, where voices far more conservative or liberal than our own come together to worship God as one community with one Lord.
