Still, a sense of normalcy on campus persisted. Senior portraits were taken.



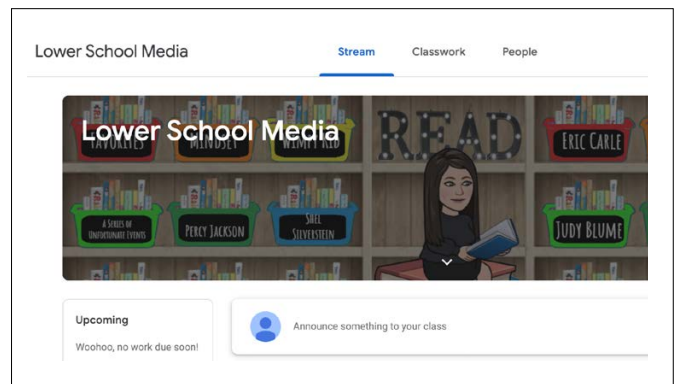

Google Classroom

As schools across the world slowly began to close due to COVID19 during the 2020–2021 school year, finding an avenue that would allow our students to continue learning, even if we found it necessary to pivot to online instruction, was a priority for Fuqua School’s curriculum and instruction team. One solution — Google Classroom. Google Classroom provides online tools that allow teachers to teach remotely in a paperless environment. Students can log in to their teacher’s Google Classroom and can complete and submit assignments, take tests, view videos, work in an online science lab, read online books and articles, and so much more.

Students were introduced to this virtual platform in August of 2020 and used it daily in the classroom in preparation for a possible pivot to remote learning. Fortunately, Fuqua School

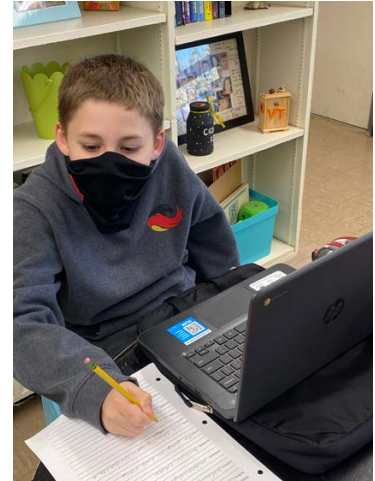
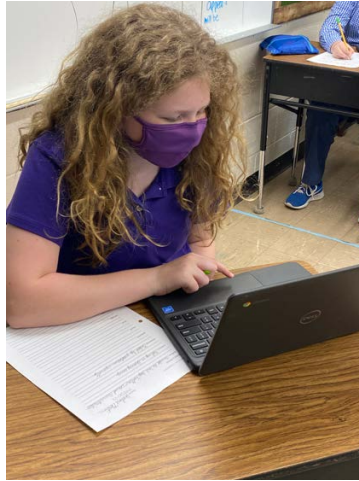


only had to move to off-campus learning for a short period during the school year, but our students never stopped learning. This was, in large part, due to our amazing faculty and the online accessibility provided by Google Classroom.

One-to-One Chrome Books

One-to-one computing offers many benefits to the modern-day classroom and learner. In an effort to better prepare Fuqua students for life in this everchanging world, Fuqua School moved to one-to-one devices for students in grades 6-12 during the 2020-2021 academic year. Chromebooks, funded by the REF Board, were supplied to each student in grades 6-12 for the school year. By moving to this one-to-one plan, students now had a world of information at their fingertips that enabled them to have more resources to further enhance their instruction in the classroom and at home.

“We were excited to offer this one-to-one initiative to our students,” commented Head of Upper School Jennings Custis. “The one-to-one student Chromebook program for both our middle and upper school students provided exciting learning opportunities that incorporated the use of technology in the classroom and at home.”



E-Sports Added

Fuqua School added E-Sports to its repertoire of sports offerings in February, and since then, Fuqua student athletes have played an array of video games such as League of Legends, Smash Ultimate, and Rocket League, advancing through competition after competition to earn a spot in the playoffs.

Fuqua’s team is coached by Head Coach Jamiel Jackson and alumni Assistant Coaches John Boswell '04 and Peyton Wiecking '18.

“We are extremely excited to offer E-Sports for our students,” commented Head Coach Jamiel Jackson.

Gaming has become extremely popular across the country, and now students can experience E-sports as a high school athletic activity competing for a championship title and college scholarships.

Using a program called Tynker, Jr., in STEAM class, students began learning and applying the beginning steps of coding. Tynker, Jr. is a fun, interactive way to spark our students’ interest in coding. By solving puzzles and games, using picture block coding to problem solve, sequencing and recognizing patterns, these students



actively learned fundamental coding concepts. We look forward to watching these Falcons grow and continue their journey as Fuqua Falcons.

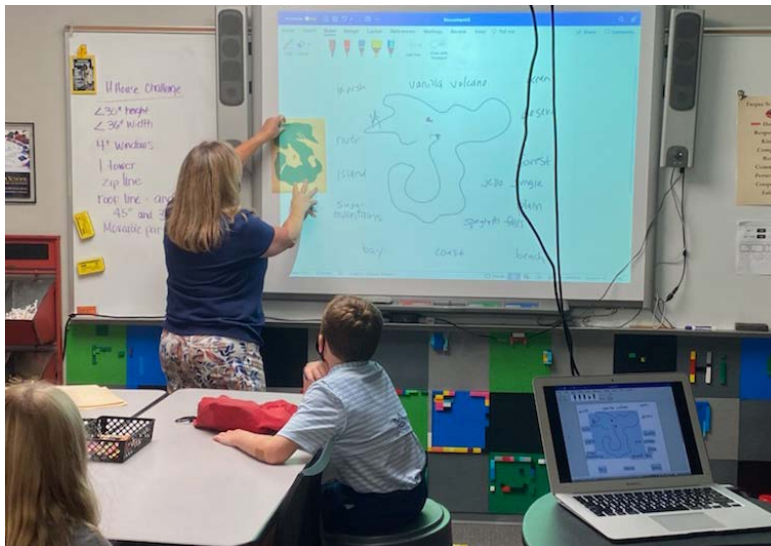
Donations Received from Holy Cross Regional Catholic School

Harwood's Legacy to Live On

“Susan believed strongly in education,” commented Scott Harwood, Sr. ’61 when referring to his late wife of 47 years. “I felt there was no better way to honor Susan than by creating a scholarship in her name.” After graduating from Michigan State University, Susan distinguished herself as the first woman to enter the Management Training Program at United Virginia Bank where she went on to become a Vice President and had a long successful banking career. After meeting new Head of School Chance Reynolds and learning more about the direction of Fuqua School, Scott felt strongly that this scholarship needed to be established at his alma mater.

“We are excited and humbled that Scott chose to honor Susan’s legacy by helping future Falcons reach their boundless, individual potential,” stated Head of School Chance Reynolds. Scott’s gift was

Kuhar Sisters Scholarship Established

As sisters and Fuqua School alumni, Dalton ’10 and Rives Kuhar ’11 established a scholarship to give back to a place that helped shaped them into the women they are today.

Fuqua School’s sidewalks, classrooms, gymnasiums, and cross-country track are the places where both Dalton and Rives hold some of their fondest memories from their youth. On Fuqua’s campus, they tucked in their shirts, ran to class, laughed with friends, made mistakes (and earned several tardy slips), studied hard, and learned valuable life lessons. Both sisters were student athletes. Rives was an instrumental member of the volleyball team for seven years straight. Dalton, an avid runner, won back-to-back state titles in cross country in the fall of 2008 and 2009; she is the only athlete in school history to have her running shoes bronzed, and her retired jersey still hangs in the gymnasium today. Dalton and Rives both perceive that their participation in various sports at Fuqua School is what taught them work-life balance, and is the reason why physical and mental fitness remain a priority in their lives today.

Dalton earned her Bachelor of Science in biology from the Virginia Military Institute. Rives graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in English from the University of Mary Washington and is

Though their paths have not been linear, it was the unique community at Fuqua School and the foundations built in their high school classrooms, that gave them the courage to chase their dreams and be who they want to be. An Eventful Year

Campus Improvements

One of the most important “firsts” that anyone in a new leadership position can do is to stop, look, and listen; and in doing so, one is usually able to ascertain if there are any issues that need addressing sooner rather than later. That is just what new Head of School, Chance Reynolds, did.

In doing this very thing, he learned within his first month at Fuqua that there were textbooks desperately in need of updating, restrooms vastly in need of renovation, and an old, dilapidated tennis court that would cost hundreds of thousands of dollars to resurface and was, unfortunately, positioned at the entrance of our school.

Soon after, two families came forward and were kind enough to contribute a cumulative gift of \$10,000, to be used as a match, with the goal in mind of us raising \$20,000 over the course of the year to be used solely for textbooks and instructional materials.



The transformation of our tennis courts into a beach volleyball complex was amazing to behold. Thanks to the many people and businesses that made it possible!



We successfully reached our goal of \$20,000 in generous donations from various families across all divisions, specifically for this purpose. Our curriculum team researched new lower school math textbooks and programs, reviewed new 4th grade Virginia history textbooks, and checked into new science and world history textbooks for the upper school for the 2021–2022 year! Around this same time, alumnus Kevin Dunn '86, of T & K Homes, met with our administrative team and offered to renovate the guest restrooms in Gilmer Gym and bring them into compliance with ADA standards. Unsurprisingly, it was not long before other local businesses such as Bug Busters, Wilson Electric, Merk's Place, and current and past Fuqua families such as W.C. Sprouse and family, Robert Atkinson and family, Joyce Eggleston, the Fuqua School PTSA, the Fuqua School Middle School SCA, and the PEA/FS Alumni Association sent in gifts to help with this project. We are happy to report that, as a school, we were able to pay for these much-needed and much-overdue renovations with the many gifts received from our supporters.

Lastly, several families asked if they might be able to bring together a large coalition of local businesses and interested families to convert the decaying tennis court complex into a beach volleyball complex to provide a unique opportunity for our many student athletes interested in volleyball, create an additional source of revenue for the school, and perhaps most importantly, change the first impression of visitors and guests to campus. Sadly, renovating the tennis courts was no longer financially prudent, especially when we have such wonderful partnerships with Hampden-Sydney and Longwood who are willing to share their courts.

After careful planning, the trucks began to roll, and local businesses such as J.R. Tharpe Trucking, Easter Design, Holman Masonry, Arbor Pro, Rockydale Appomattox Quarry, W.C. Newman, Co., Inc, Harold W. Collins Clearing & Grading, Lloyd Concrete Services, and the Town of Farmville Public Works Department spent countless hours volunteering their time. They cut back trees, designed drainage ditches, replaced the retaining wall, provided concrete, repaired asphalt

and curbing, and, of course, shipped and smoothed out endless tons of both sand and lime. In addition, gifts received by other local businesses such as Tucker Timber Products, Puckett Funeral Home, and Amelia Family Dentistry, as well as generous donations from Board of Trustee members, Hunter Watson and Joyce Eggleston, and current faculty and staff, parents, grandparents, and alumni, helped transform our entrance into a place where we can come together and share many sunny afternoons; **all without costing our school one dime!**

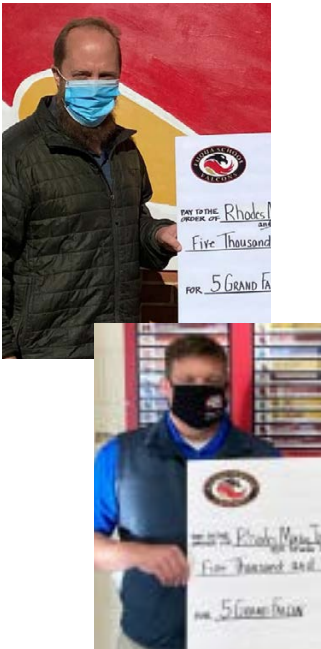


An Eventful Year

Once their opinions and votes are taken into consideration and compared with the thorough work completed by the team, the Director of Curriculum and Instruction moves forward with the purchasing of the new series. We are thrilled to have brand new 4th grade Virginia history, upper school world history, and K-5 math textbooks for the 2021–2022 school year.

Fuqua and Isle of Wight Academy joined as probationary members seeking full membership in the Spring of 2022.

“It is a great opportunity for both our boys and girls to compete with schools very similar to

ours,” commented Head of School Chance Reynolds. “It will give our fans and student body an opportunity to come out and support our teams on a consistent basis.”

There is a framed photo in the trophy case of Gilmer Gym which features Coach Bob Hazelwood, Coach Walter “Bozo” Addleman, and Coach Lewis “Skeeter” Fore. The recognition goes on to mention the dynastic run these three gentlemen had as our football coaches from 1968–1992, with an overall winning percentage of .725, 8 conference championships, and an overall record of 148 wins, 56 losses, and 2 ties. And yet, it is not the wins and losses, the conference championships, or the overall winning percentage that makes these men so special to us all.

In coaching our defense throughout those decades, Coach Hazelwood was teaching so much more than how to tackle properly and penetrate the line. He was teaching perseverance. In calling plays for our offense, Coach Addleman was teaching so much more than strategy and balanced attacks. He was teaching responsibility. In serving as our Head Coach, Coach Fore was teaching so much more than to put “we” before “me” and to win with class. He was teaching respect; all core values that remain at the heart of a Fuqua School education and can be seen in our students today.

On January 15, it will be our great honor to recognize these legends of fall as our newest members of our Athletics Hall of Fame. Please be on the lookout for information about this event. 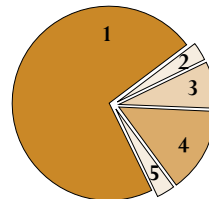

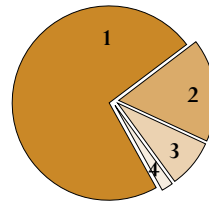
Why Give

Congratulations to the Class of 2021!!

Fuqua School's Class of 2021 had seven summa cum laude (GPA 4.0+) graduates, six magna cum laude (GPA 3.6-3.99) and three cum laude (GPA 3.2-3.59). Our 22 graduates were collectively offered over \$3.78 million in scholarships to various colleges and universities; they will use \$1.1 million in academic scholarships or an average of \$50,000 in financial assistance for each senior.
