Principal's Letter

Virtual for Fall Conferences, Halloween, and Safety While Walking Home

Dear Rockwell Families,

Good morning from Rockwell, and happy Friday! October is here, and that means it's time for a variety of events, including Fall conferences and Halloween. Here is some information from the Chief Beagle on these two events, as well as a reminder about safety when walking to and from school:

Fall Conferences: October 11th, 12th, and 14th

We look forward to seeing you virtually on the week of October 11-14 (a quick reminder that the 15th is a full in-service/professional learning day for our staff, so there is no school). During conference week, school will be dismissed at 11:50 AM (1:50 PM on Wednesday), so please review with your child their plan for these unique dismissals. Fall conferences are a time to check-in and share/set goals for the year, and you and your child's teacher will have the opportunity to discuss how to support your Beagle in reaching these goals. Thank you for arriving promptly for your student's conference, as our teachers will have many meetings on these

days, and please reach out to your child's teacher if you have any questions about your conference, such as how to access the Teams meeting link.

Plans for Halloween, 2021

Many of our longtime families will know that there are several Halloween traditions at our school, including an annual parade. Alas, with our current Covid and safety realities we will need to forego this event, however we will still work to provide some fun experiences for our students on the 29th. Here are a few important details about that Friday:

- Students may wear their costumes throughout the day on the 29th. As a reminder, all costumes must be school appropriate (no weapons, etc.), and students must wear their masks at all times.
- In lieu of the parade, we will create a PowerPoint for families featuring
 pictures of our students and classes. More details to come as we get closer
 to the event.
- While we appreciate the hard work of our room parents and other
 volunteers, in order to minimize the number of people in our building, we
 will not be having parents onsite during the day. Teachers may reach out to
 ask for assistance in planning pre-packaged materials, activities, treats,
 etc. (thank you in advance for your help!).
- For our friends who will not be participating in Halloween, we will have a fun movie playing in the library (our students will be seated at a socially distanced 6' apart).

Safety While Walking To and From School / Cell Phones

Families: I have had a few neighbors on 162nd and 116th say that they have seen students looking down at their phones while walking to and from school and inadvertently walking out into the street (one neighbor on 116th said he had to slam on his breaks). If your child carries a cell phone with them, this would be a good time to reminder our students to be aware of their environments, and to put phones away while walking along busy streets (I shared this reminder during


Virtual Coffee with the Principal

<u>Highly Capable Universal Screening Update for 1st Grade</u>

In order to decrease the number of assessments students are given, LWSD first grade students in LWSD will be universally screened using FastBridge for reading and math. Students that meet the screening criteria (85th percentile NPR in each area) will be invited to continue in the highly capable eligibility process. The CoGAT screener will not be administered during the 2021-22 school year.

Too Sick for School

One of the best ways to avoid community transmission of COVID-19, and other infectious illness, is to stay home when you are sick. Students and school employees who have symptoms of infectious illness, such as influeza (flu) or COVID-19 should stay home and seek medical evaluation, which may include testing for COVID-19 and other respiratory infections.

While the school will no longer require an attestation form at the start of each day, we ask families to please answer the following questions at home before deciding to send your child to school. If you answer "YES" to any of the following questions, keep your student home and contact your school.

- 1. Has your student been in close contact with anyone with confirmed COVID-19?
- Does anyone in your household have COVID-19 like symptoms and/or is anyone in your household being tested for COVID-19?
- 3. Has your student or anyone in your household had a positive COVID-19 test for active virus in the past 10 days?
- 4. Within the past 14 days, has a public health or medical professional told your student to self-monitor, self-isolate or self-quarantine because of concerns about COVID-19?




Snapshots of Rockwell Learning

Fall State Testing Starts Soon for our 4th and 5th Graders

Each spring, all Washington public school students in grades 3-8 and 10 are assessed in English Language Arts (ELA) and math using Smarter Balanced Assessments (SBA). Students in grades 5, 8 and 11 are also assessed in science using the Washington Comprehensive Assessment of Science (WCAS). Results from these assessments provide meaningful feedback and data that teachers and other educators can use to help students succeed. The results provide data to help evaluate school-level and district-wide instructional strategies, initiatives, and other programs.

Last spring, these tests were postponed until the fall by the Washington Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI). This was due to the number of students attending school remotely. The fall tests will be based on the content from the previous grade level and have also been shortened in length. For example, 4th grade students will be taking a shorter 3rd grade test.

Our current 4th and 5th grade students at Rockwell will be taking the fall test on October 19th and 20th. Learn more about the state assessments on the district website. Next spring, we will be back to the regular schedule of state testing for grades 3, 4 and 5.

We are looking at these assessments as a data point to help us plan instruction. If you child is K-3 remind them to be extra quiet in the hallways on the morning of

the 19th and 20th. If your child is in 4th or 5th grade, ensure they get a good night's sleep and breakfast the morning of testing. We are excited for our students to share what they have learned.

Hello From The Rockwell Equity Team!

This week we will talk about stereotype threat – what is it and what impact does it have?

Stereotype threat, what is it?

• Stereotype threat refers to the risk of confirming negative stereotypes about an individual's racial, ethnic, gender, or cultural group

What impact does this have?

 People may experience stereotype threat many times a day because we have multiple identities – stereotypes stemming from race, age, gender etc. Stereotype threat can affect an individual's life, ambitions performance or confidence in their own abilities

What is an example of this?

- The model minority myth is a practical example of this. This is commonly a
 stereotype of an ethnic, racial, or religious minority group that is assumed
 to have achieved a high level of educational, economical, and professional
 success. One common reference to this is with Asian Americans and
 having a high aptitude in math or other academics.
- You might ask what is wrong with this? This myth ignores the diversity amongst individuals and various Asian cultures as well as the history behind where this started and how it was used to highlight the value of assimilation.
- Consider how this myth might impact the way a child might be held to a
 higher standard in a classroom or alternately not receive extra help if they
 are struggling. How might this impact a child's perception of self-worth?
