State Representative Tami Zawistowski Visits 5th Grade Students at McAlister Intermediate School

On Friday, October 16th, Fifth Graders at McAlister Intermediate School had the opportunity to talk to our State Representative, Tami Zawistowski. This presentation was prompted by Suffield's participation in the Connecticut's Kid Governor program. Here, 5th grade students write up and present a platform to their classmates. Students then vote for the candidate that they think should move onto the state finalist.



During her presentation, Representative Zawistowski shared her experiences serving in the state legislature and the basic procedures of how a bill becomes a law. She used an imaginary example of how to make chocolate-peanut butter ice cream the state ice cream flavor.

After her explanation, Tami allowed the students to ask her questions about her job. Here are some of our favorites:

- Student: Do you like your job?
 Representative Zawistowski: I love what I do. The best thing about my job is I get to fix problems and help people.
- Student: Why does it have to go through so many people to become a law?
 Representative Zawistowski: All of the people in the legislature represent different groups of people. We have to make sure everyone is heard.
- Student: How long does a law stay in place?
 Representative Zawistowski: Most laws pretty much last forever so that's why we have to be very careful about what we pass.
- Student: Is your job hard?
 Representative Zawistowski: It can be. You have to get along with people even if you don't agree with them. I really enjoy that part of it though.
- Student: What's the favorite part of your job?
 Representative Zawistowski: Helping constituents that ask for assistance when they have a problem.
- Student: How old do you have to be to have a job like yours?
 Representative Zawistowski: You have to be 18 which is the voting age

- Student: Are there any bills for schools?
 Representative Zawistowski: There are always education bills. One bill I introduced a few years ago was guaranteeing that kids can have recess.
- Student: Do you have any advice for someone that is running for an election? Representative Zawistowski: One piece of advice I have is you need to have a platform; What will you do as kid governor? You also need to have a reputation for getting along with other people. Meet as many people as you can. If they aren't in your class, talk to them in the hall. Next, bring your purpose to fruition. Finally, don't be afraid to ask for votes.

We look forward to seeing what our newly elected Kid Governor, **Nathan Deenihan**, will do for our school and community! Stay tuned for more details about his platform.

A. Ward Spaulding News:

Preschool:

Our preschoolers are beginning the unit: Family & Community. We have been reading lots of family and friendship books and look forward to talking about our great community of Suffield & some of its community helpers. Our Math curriculum is focused all about shapes and how to identify them. We are looking at the different characteristics of simple shapes, comparing shapes, sorting shapes, and finding shapes in our world. Students will even combine shapes to create new ones. For Halloween, students created cards for a local nursing home to spread some spooky cheer for the holiday. Also, Fall Fun Day was a blast! Students "picked" pumpkins from a patch, decorated them, practiced trick-or-treating, and made real scarecrows. For Veteran's Day, we participated in a school-wide assembly, examined our American Flag (then each created one of our own!), and Ms. S invited a Naval Nuclear Electrician who read The Very Hungry Caterpillar to her class while the other classes virtually joined. It has been a busy fall full of fun and learning!

Phonemic Awareness:

What is Phonemic Awareness?

Phonemic awareness is the ability to understand that spoken words are made up of individual sounds (these sounds are called phonemes). Phonemic awareness is one of the best early predictors of reading success.

Why is Phonemic Awareness Important?

Phonemic awareness is one of the first skills your child will need in their toolbelt for reading, which, of course, is an important part of learning. It's also one of the first steps to building their confidence with sounds (and, later, words!).

Phonemic awareness is an effective tool for helping your child become an engaged, self-motivated reader in the future. A child with a healthy foundation of phonemic awareness stands the best chance to read with fluency and for fun!

Here are some activities to support phonemic awareness development outside of school:

★ Rhyming:

- o look around the house or on a car ride for objects that rhyme (cat, mat, etc.)
- read books that contain rhyming words (such as Dr. Seuss) and ask your child to notice illustrations that rhyme (Ex: I see a bat and a cat- those words rhyme)
- sing songs that contain rhymes
- o Rhyming Memory Game from FCRR
- o "Rhyme Time" Game from FCRR
- ★ Creating and Associating Sounds:
 - Play I Spy with sounds (i.e. "I spy with my little eye something that starts with an /r/ sound.")
 - Go on a scavenger hunt for words that have the same beginning, middle, or ending sound of a given word (Ex: find objects that have the same ending sound as cat /t/ so they may find a mat or pot)
- ★ Blending & Segmenting Sounds: Blending sounds is putting individual sounds together to make a word (Ex: the sounds /c/ /a/ /t/ are blended, or put together, to make the word cat) & Segmenting sounds is when you provide the word and ask the student to separate the word into its individual sounds (Ex: say "cat" and the student repeats the word, then breaks it into the individual sounds /c/ /a/ /t/).
 - Use "robot talk" to segment sounds of words
 - Sound Segmenting & Blending Activity from FCRR
- ★ Syllables: Identifying the number of syllables in a word
 - Have your child locate items around the room that contain the same number of syllables as a given word (Ex: find objects that have the same number of syllables as the word friendship, which is 2 syllables. The child might locate a bucket or table, which are both 2 syllables)
 - Have your child clap the number of syllables in a few favorite words (Ex: Sponge-bob, tur-tle, can-dy, fan-tas-tic)
 - o "Feed the Animals" Syllable Counting Game from FCRR

Second Grade Shoutout:


Second grade is working hard to build math fact fluency through number talks and games. They are given weekly assessments to monitor their progress as they build their fluency. In addition to building fact fluency, 3 Act Math tasks will be used to help students make sense of story problems. 3 Act Math tasks are real world problems that help students see math in everyday life. They build critical thinking skills by naming what they notice, asking questions and deciding on a strategy to use as they solve the problem.
