

# **BOE** Adopts Budget That's Below Tax Levy Limit

Jericho's Board of Education unanimously adopted the proposed 2021-2022 school district budget at an open meeting on March 26, 2021. The \$127,997,101 budget represents a 1.95% tax levy increase, which is below the New York State Tax Cap.

Since January, the school district hosted a series of public workshops to review the financial status of the school district and create a budget for the coming year. The Board of Education and district administration requested input from members of the school community.

Voting on the budget will be on Tuesday, May 18. If the budget is not approved by residents with a simple majority, the district can resubmit the original budget or a revised budget in June.

#### **On the Ballot**

The District is continuing its District-wide Capital Improvement Plan, and voters will be asked to vote on an additional proposition that would authorize the Board to spend \$12,900,000 from the capital reserve funds and fund balance for various projects. These projects include upgrades to air conditioning, ceiling, lighting, flooring, electric, as well as athletic field reconstruction including installation of a synthetic turf field and stadium lighting. Additionally, plans for reconstruction of the technology and science classrooms at the middle and high school are included. Please see page 5 for details on the proposition.

#### **Maintaining Programs**

While preparing the budget, many strategies were considered, including keeping a multi-year, long-term perspective on the district's financial plans. All instructional programs will continue for next year, and there will also be enhancements to some of these programs.

When adopting the budget, the Board also took class size into consideration. At the elementary schools, the pre-Covid class size maximums were 25 students in K-3 and 27 students in grades 4-5 with an average class size of approximately 22 across the three elementary schools. Next year, class sizes at the elementary level will be reduced to a maximum of 23 in all K-5 classes, which will bring the average class size at the elementary level down to approximately 19 across the three elementary schools.

#### Technology

Included in the budget are

plans to expand the technology initiative throughout the district. This is part of the district's five-year technology plan. We have greatly expanded the software in use in Jericho as a response to the Covid pandemic and the need for students and teachers to be able to work more flexibly. We've increased district Internet speed, capacity, and stability by utilizing three ISPs and increasing our speeds. Additionally, the district's oneto-one program is now in full swing, with every student being assigned a device. Most students are using a Jericho-provided device every day.

#### **Board of Education Seats**

There are two seats open on the Board of Education this year. Four candidates are running for these seats. Listed in ballot order, the candidates are Thomas S. Taubes, Christopher M. Foresto, Samuel Perlman, and Jennifer Vartanov. Current Board members, Bill Ferro and Dab Lee, are not seeking reelection. There is a virtual Meet the Candidates Night, sponsored by the PTA and moderated by the League of Women Voters, scheduled for Tuesday, May 11, 2021 at 7:30 PM. # Jericho's Budget History & Nassau County

Over the last five years, Jericho's annual average budget increase was 0.79%. Jericho School District's tax levy has had an average increase of 0.18% between 2015/16 and 2019/20 as compared to the average increase on Long Island of 1.76% during that same period. Additionally, the district only controls the total tax levy. The County controls the assessments, adjusted base proportion, and the tax rate. In other words, the school district controls the tax levy, and the County controls each individual's tax bill calculation.

#### How Do I vote?

This year, the annual budget vote and school board election will take place **in person** on May 18, 2021 from 6 AM to 9 PM in the Sam Springer Gym. Information about absentee ballots is available on the district website under Announcements and also in this newsletter.

# **Voting Qualifications**

Only persons who are qualified voters as of May 18, 2021 shall be permitted to vote in the election held on May 18, 2021 on matters affecting the Jericho School District and the Jericho Public Library.

A qualified voter is defined as:

\*A citizen of the United States

\*At least eighteen years of age

\*A resident in the Jericho Union Free School District for thirty days or more preceding the budget vote at which he/she offers to vote.

Persons disqualified from voting under the provisions of Section 5-106 of the Election Law are not eligible to vote in school district elections.

New voters may register and vote on the day of the election. They will be asked to provide proof of residency and age.

# ON THE BALLOT: PROPOSITION #2

SHALL the Board of Education be authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$12,900,000 as follows: (1) \$6,677,000 from the capital reserve fund established on May 21, 2019 and (2) \$4,223,000 plus additional interest earned from the capital reserve fund established on May 16, 2017 and (3) \$1,300,000 from fund balance (unexpended funds from Proposition #2 authorized on May 15, 2018), and (4) \$700,000 from fund balance (unexpended funds from Proposition #2 authorized on May 16, 2017) for the purpose of completing capital improvements as follows: District-wide replacement/repairs of asphalt pavement, exterior masonry waterproofing, ceiling/lighting/flooring, air handling and ventilation; District-wide electrical upgrades and replacement; Installation of HVAC units at the Cantiague and Jackson Elementary Schools Gymnasiums; Hot water heater replacement at Jackson Elementary School; Roof replacement at the Jeffrey Ratner Robert Seaman Elementary School; Playground replacement at the Williams Elementary School; Athletic Field reconstruction including installation of a synthetic turf field and stadium lighting, reconstruction of the technology classrooms, and reconstruction of science rooms at the Jericho High/Middle School; all of the above to include all labor, materials, equipment, apparatus, and incidental costs associated therewith.

### **Capital Improvements**

Included in the proposed budget, funds are allocated (\$1,275,000) to provide partial funding toward the reconstruction of science and technology classrooms at the HS/MS.
