Loss of focus and failure to prioritise Taliban to blame for Afghan debacle says US policy adviser

India's Hindu nationalists begin new phase of crippling Muslim livelihoods

The lynching of Muslims using allegations of "illegal cow slaughter" has become a common occurrence in Narendra Modi's Hindu nationalist India. However, a new trend of attacks on the livelihoods of Muslims has emerged over the past few months.

A multi-million-dollar company selling packaged food across India, West Asia, the Far East and the US has become the latest target of an Islamophobic campaign. "Every single Hindu" is urged to boycott vegetarian snicker ID Fresh Food Ltd because Hindu organisations allege their products contain horse manure, calf digestion enzymes, and various bones and calves. Handmade in Bangladesh, the multi-brand snack packs ID Fresh Food Ltd offers a wide range of vegetarian ready-to-eat products such as laddu and Dosa Bites, Malabar parotta, candy, panace, vada and filter coffee decoration.

Far-right and self-proclaimed "proud Hindu leader" Srinivas SJI launched the campaign on Twitter. Referring to the religious identity of the company's owners and employees, which is the real motive for his campaign, Srinivas asks, "How many really know that this company employs only Muslims, and it is Hindu certified?"

A group of Muslim consumers founded ID Fresh Food in 2005 with only Rs 15,000 (£250). By 2015, they had reached revenue of Rs 1 billion (£10 million).

ID Fresh Food called the allegations "baseless and fake propaganda" aimed at undermining the trust of millions of customers. "We would like to clearly specify that ID uses only vegetarian ingredients to make its products. ID laddu-Dosa Bites is made from rice, maida (flour), sun-dried and water only, which are 100% natural and vegetarian ingredients. There are no animal extracts used in any of our products," the firm said in a Facebook message.

With the campaign against ID Fresh Foods, a disturbing trend of attacks based on religious identity has extended to the most basic of services. While the few wealthy Muslims in India had their businesses under attack, poorer Muslims bear the brunt of the attack on their bodies and livelihoods.

Last month Abdul Rashid, a middle-aged snuff dealer, was attacked in a village in the central Indian state of Madhya Pradesh simply for being a Muslim who dared to enter the area to collect scrap. Rashid was not new to Sitali village and had been doing business there for a long time. When Rashid arrived to answer a snuff contact scrap, he was surrounded by men who attacked him. "How can do business in our village?" They attacked, a thing he was a Muslim predominantly Hindu village.

His livelihood was considered he was made to chant "Jai Shri (Hindu Lord Hanu)," a religious group now politically supported by nationalists, including the Bharatiya Party (BJP). Having looted Rashid's scrap, he was ordered to return to the village again.

Similarly, earlier in August, a 13-year-old boy was assaulted in a Prayagraj capital city (Allahabad) group of men associated with the Hindu right. The boy's father was and school has been. When he returned to school, the boy was taken up, into his village, all of his things and sent back off, warning never to return to the school.

A few days later, Laxmi Ail, a Hindu seller, was beaten up in another city of Madhya Pradesh allegedly using a fake name, of arresting the people who are, the police arrested, allegedly touching a 13-year-old boy inappropriately while selling. The police claimed that two cards with different names were from his bag.

Aadhaar cards have been used to track people below the poverty line, and some of the people who are not allowed to carry them around, under the Modi regime, the card has become a de facto identity card.

Washington's shift in focus and its failure to prioritise a revived Taliban is, largely, to blame for the Afghan debacle said a US policy adviser on South Asia and the Middle East.

The withdrawal after 20 years pushes the American counter-terrorism "back to square one," says Distinguished Professor of International Relations at the National Defense University in Washington, Hassan Ahmed.

On future policy, the Pakistani-American scholar said that the West needs to "rethink the possibilities and accept at least giving the Taliban a chance to be a bit more pragmatic."

"If they show a little, such possibilities, let's give them a chance so that after another series of crises, we should be able to say yes, there were some signs. And we gave them enough, he told *The Muslim News*.

"We give enough chance to Kabul (but) 20 years that we know you are corrupt. We know you are incompetent, but we are willing to support you for two more years."

"The professor suggests the US-led invasion of Afghanistan failed because US interest was diverted to al-Qa'ida blamed for the 9/11 attacks in the US, but that it was the Taliban that was running the country and has come back again for the 20th anniversary.

"It is a fact that if the US attention had not been diverted to Iraq in 2001, things would have been different. The US lost its focus in terms of analysis and deep understanding very quickly within two years because we thought the Taliban were out of power."

"The number one issue here was the diversion of attention to Iraq, which was, as we know, a huge thing. Iraq was in some ways the civilisation, the

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
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Restaurant Theme Days


Margam Discovery Centre Trip

It was great to see how enthusiastically the students threw themselves into the work and how beneficial they found it. They are looking forward to the next session.





Seniores


Summer School 2021
