Incorporating Principles of Universal Design to the OLGC Library

One of the goals of the OLGC Library is to apply as many of the seven principles of Universal Design (UD) to Library decisions from cataloging to course material. The Principles of UD are as follows:

1. Equitable use – making sure the program can appeal to a variety of ages and groups
2. Flexibility in use – making sure the program can offer options
3. Simple and intuitive use
4. Perceptible information – clear directions and instructions
5. Tolerance for error – uses mistakes as a teaching moment
6. Low physical effort – minimal effort needed in acquiring resources
7. Size and Space for Approach and Use – makes best use of physical space

The OLGC Library is the ideal space to enact these guidelines which emphasize free and easy access since libraries are spaces intended to meet the community’s needs.
