Our Teaching and Learning Team (T&L) supports and leads staff development. The team is composed of PreK-12 Instructional Leadership Teams from each building, instructional coaches, School Board members, administration and district office staff, and teacher-union representatives. The T&L team meets quarterly and throughout the summer to work towards creating and understanding SANB's common goal— success for all.



## Lt. Gov. Flanagan visits district's COVID-19 vaccination clinic

On Nov. 9, Lt. Governor Peggy Flanagan visited the district's first COVID-19 vaccination clinic for ages 5-11, at Wilshire Park Elementary School (WP).

Lt. Gov. Flanagan's team reached out with an interest in visiting our clinic due to the district's success with mitigation strategies that have allowed for in-person learning to continue without interruption or school closures.

"The district is aligned in its work to ensure in-person learning by doubling down on our mitigation strategies. This is because of the unwavering work and dedication by the combined effort of District Wellness Coordinator Lori Watzl-King, the Local Incident Team (LIT), and the School Board," said Superintendent Dr. Renee Corneille.

Because of Watzl-King, the district was able to administer 240 vaccines on Nov. 9. The clinic also had the support of 11 volunteers, made up of staff and community members, that assisted families through the entire vaccine process.

The feedback received from participants was that the clinic was a seamless and an overall friendly experience. Two volunteers, Stefan Gingerich and Mageen Caines, who also happen to be local epidemiologists, donned WP's beloved Panda mascot costumes to bring comfort to potentially nervous kids.

Watzl-King is currently working on adding additional clinics in the near future for families with children ages 5-11. Information will be shared with families once available.

Thank you to Lt. Gov. Flanagan and her staff, for taking the time to connect and support our local efforts to combat COVID-19. And, a big thank you to all of our volunteers, and to Watzl-King for making this clinic possible for our WP community.

## Staffing shortages impacting our district and K-12 education across the country

The COVID-19 pandemic and limits in workforce capacity have created a perfect storm for labor shortages. Three areas hit particularly hard are transportation, paraprofessional support, and nutrition services.

Our district has experienced significant transportation issues this school year, including late or canceled bus routes due to driver shortages. The driver shortage is also impacting our district's ability to transport students to athletics and activities events at other schools.

"A number of transportation issues related to the significant bus driver shortage has created difficulty and frustration for our families this fall," said Dr. Troy Urdahl, director of Athletics, Activities, Facilities & Transportation.

Addressing these problems remains a high priority. We appreciate the help and support of our families as we work to find viable solutions," explained Dr. Urdahl.

**How can you help?** As we navigate staffing shortages and transportation issues this fall, families can do the following:

- Verify children get on/off the bus.
- If possible, drive your kids to school.
- Encourage walking if practical.
- Consider neighborhood car pools.
- Become a bus driver for our district.

SANB is also facing significant paraprofessional staffing shortages. As a district, we recognize the importance of our support staff in helping some of our students navigate and access learning throughout their day. We want to ensure all of our students can participate and engage in school.

In addition, the Nutrition Services department is short-staffed and in need of substitutes. Full staffing is crucial for the production of high-quality meals, and to maximize time for students to eat. There is no experience needed, hours are between 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on school days, and training is provided while on the job. The district announced this past summer that Maria Roberts was named the new principal of Wilshire Park Elementary School. Maria began her new role in July 2021.

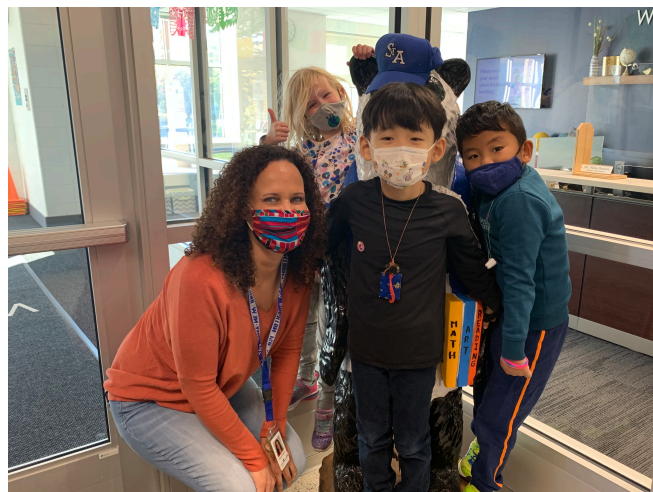

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## District receives Outstanding Financial Reporting Award

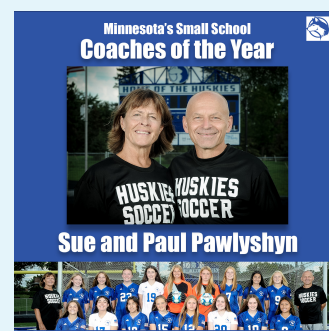

## Spring 2021 MN Safe Learning Survey state and SANB results

This past spring, The University of Minnesota (U of M), in partnership with the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE), conducted a second state-wide MN Safe Learning Survey to gather information regarding the experiences of educators, students (grades 6-12), and families during the entire 2020-21 academic year.

According to the U of M and the MDE, more than 10,500 individuals responded and shared their experiences, successes and challenges, support needed, learning, connectedness, and communication.

### The following is a high-level summary of the SANB survey results:

A total of 752 individuals from SANB (53% were parents/guardians, 31% were students and 16% were educators) responded to the survey.

Results from the survey indicated parents, students, and staff shared similar goals for the future of education:

- ✓ Social interactions and relationships, academic progress, and mental health of students and staff are important.
- ✓ Creating a school system that focuses on social emotional health and well-being.



### We utilized data to implement the following for the 2021-22 school year:

- ✓ SANB's ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund) money will be directed to support student mental/social emotional health and support students academically.
- ✓ SANB's school psychologists are hosting bimonthly staff development supporting social emotional learning for staff.
- ✓ SANB's Wellness Committee is focused on the health and well-being of students and staff.
- ✓ The schedule at St. Anthony Middle School and St. Anthony Village High School was created social emotional and academic support during the school day.

## St. Anthony Community Services

### Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE)

For parents and children (birth to age five), ECFE believes each family provides a child's first and most significant learning environment and supports parents in understanding their child's development. Small, in-person classes are held at St. Anthony Community Services. Parenting support and coaching are also available.

### Early Childhood Screening

For children three to five years of age to identify learning and/or health concerns so that children can get the help they need before starting preschool or kindergarten. In-person or virtual screenings are available and required before attending kindergarten.

### Half-Day and All-Day Preschool

Preschool offers an environment where children ages three to five can play, learn and develop skills for kindergarten. Children who were three, four, or five years of age by Sept. 1, 2021, can attend small, in-person half-day or all-day preschool classes at St. Anthony Community Services.

### Adult Enrichment and Recreation

A variety of online and small, in-person classes that focus on self-defense, dance, foreign language, DIY, Nordic walking, glass mosaic, cooking and baking, golf, pickleball, and weekly exercise classes.



### Youth Enrichment Classes

A variety of online and in-person classes are available, such as martial arts, music lessons, tennis, dance, horseback riding, online fitness, art, and coding/STEM classes.

### Aquatics

Morning and evening swim clubs and swimming lessons are now available in our renovated pool.

### Village Kids
