



When weather is frightful



The decision to close schools occurs early in the morning when district snowplows go out to clear parking lots. Scattered around the district, drivers gauge the conditions and advise the superintendent of the extent of the storm.

The superintendent determines by 6 a.m. whether to call a snow day.



If schools remain open, buses — like other vehicles — may be delayed due to road conditions. Parents transporting students may also deal with slow-moving traffic. Principals will be cognizant of challenging conditions and understanding of delays. Be safe out there.



If a snow day is called, parents are informed through multiple channels. The district will send an emergency call-out to all phone numbers and emails listed on a student's ID card. Closures will also be posted on the school and district websites, Facebook and Twitter. News media will also be informed.



School closures due to weather are rare and many rely on schools being open. Parents are reminded that they may keep their student home anytime they feel it is unsafe to travel to school. Arrangements will then need to be made for work missed.
