

Get to know our School Nurse, Jennifer Jadlot, RN

From the onset of Covid-19, TWCA school nurse Jennifer Jadlot stepped in to fill a critical role. We checked in with Mrs. Jadlot to reflect on life as a school nurse

Take us back to late summer 2020 — how was the decision for school to

The mental health aspect of kids being off campus is profound. Our goal was to keep kids in school. No matter what, they need to stay in school, and in order to do so, every leader had to step up. We immediately built a team for re-opening

What did you do to ensure we could re-open safely?

We followed guidance of local physicians and medical research. You start to realize even officials and professionals are figuring things out as we go so we ultimately had to determine a plan that was best for our school environment based on the science. The biggest thing I realized was that so much of this was out of our control and I had to hand everything over to God.

What was it like managing the health of our school community this year?

It was all about balance. Things were changing almost daily so I was constantly monitoring what was happening in the local community, what was trending nationwide, and what was happening on campus. I have to say, support from parents and school administration was there! Our parents know that we love their kids so having that support and open communication was huge.

Of the many challenges, what was the biggest one?

Implementing so many changes that no one wanted but were crucial to keep our kids in school. Enforcing things like mask wearing, temperature checks and guarantines when necessary. None of it was fun, but looking back, knowing we were back together made it all worth it.

Any final thoughts?

I can't even put into words how much my whole life changed but I never questioned it, I knew God was walking with me. Sure, I'm a nurse but I'm also a parent and member of this community, and I love this place and I love these kids and wanted to do my best for them. The Lord protected us — did we have all of the plans and precautions in place from best to worst case scenarios, yes - but ultimately, we stayed safe because of Him.



Our desire is for students at Woodlands Christian to grow in their faith and transform spiritually. From biblical concepts woven into lesson plans, sports and fine arts, to the many opportunities to serve others, our students are able to worship God all day, every day.

Members gathered donations — everyday essentials like toothpaste and soap as well as toys and games — wrote personal messages of encouragement to recipients, and prayed over every package they sealed.

To offset the \$9 shipping cost for each box, NHS held a car wash with all funds raised going toward this effort. In the end, 607 boxes were distributed to children in need throughout the world.

FRESHMEN PARTICIPATE IN WORLD VISION'S IGNITE PROGRAM

In line with our commitment to raise global leaders with a biblical worldview, TWCA 9th graders had the special opportunity to participate in the World Vision Ignite program.

Traditionally in child sponsorship programs, the sponsor chooses a child from a gallery of photos. The Ignite program however, employs a counterintuitive approach that gives the sponsored child the opportunity to choose.

Our students' photos were sent halfway around the world to Zambia where the children there viewed them and made their selections. On Reveal Day, students were called up one by one and given an

envelope. Inside was a photo of his or her child and a letter explaining why they were chosen. The duos kept in touch throughout the year with lessons and checkins designed to offer a mutual transformation and a deeper understanding of the world.

We are proud to do our part to help alleviate child poverty and look forward to continuing this partnership for years to come.

Ellen Watt and Avery Fleenor were in search of an organization dedicated to serving the homeless. When they heard about Hope Beyond Bridges and the work they were doing to minister to the homeless community, they had to do something. Both members of the National Honor Society, they got the green light from club director Stacy Shilling to hold an Easter egg hunt fundraiser.

The overwhelming response from lower school families required additional support from NJHS who helped fill eggs. The high school students were in charge of driving to the houses and hiding the eggs. Ellen and Avery split everyone into groups, mapped out all of the houses, and created routes for each car, serving 3-4 houses each.

The project had several unanticipated challenges and tasks that the girls overcame. They determined logistics, advertised, successfully communicated with

In some moments it felt like we had no idea what to do, but with the help of Mrs. Shilling we were able to overcome our obstacles. While leading the project was stressful at times, it was extremely rewarding serving others."

In total, NHS raised \$2,066 for Hope Beyond Bridges. The money raised helped provide meals and hygiene kits for people who are homeless, living under highway bridges in Houston.



Volunteers Pack Gym & Meals for Mission of Hope

When choosing his Eagle Scout badge project, TWCA senior Leafe Sanders was determined to find something that would make a significant impact. Through a family friend, he learned about Mission of Hope, a Christian mission organization that started in Haiti in 1998 and now operates

"I wanted to do something that would really help," Sanders said. He had done a meal packing event before so he knew a little bit about how they work and what they entail. Sanders started planning in March and originally was going to host the event at his church. But COVID-19 restrictions on church occupancy made that complicated. So eventually he settled on

Before the October 28 meal packing event, Sanders had to raise \$12,000 to purchase the food. He managed to raise it all in a little over two weeks. He approached fellow students, people at his church, family friends, and even his troop members to raise the funds.

On the day of the event, the food was delivered and unloaded at the school. Over 100 volunteers, fully geared up in masks and gloves manned dozens of tables spaced out in the David Gym for several hours. By the end of the day, there were 41,040 meals prepared. They were loaded back on the truck and sent off to Mission of Hope For Haiti.

When looking for volunteers, Sanders turned to Tom Earle, the faculty sponsor for the Interact Club at TWCA. The Interact Club has 120 members, so finding volunteers wasn't hard.

"I loved the idea, I knew it was going to be a challenge," Earle said, but he also knew that Sanders would be up to that challenge.

under construction new STEAM space



Augmented Reality

7th grade Texas History students piloted augmented reality software that placed them at the center of the Battle of the Alamo. Augmented reality (AR) is an enhanced version of the real physical world that involves overlaying visual, auditory, or other sensory information onto the world in order to enhance one's experience.

In this case, students used their iPad cameras to hover over different map locations of famous battlefields or photos of notable individuals. The iPad would recognize the image and then display the AR, allowing students to interact with the scene by sharing significant details of each location or character. This lesson offered a next-level learning opportunity that brought history to life.

National Merit Scholarship Program

TWCA seniors Merritt Ruffner and Joshua Mueck were named National Merit Finalists by The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). Ruffner and Mueck stand in the company of 15,000 Finalists, representing less than one percent of all U.S. high school seniors.

Catherine Berger, Tucker Carson, Preston Culberson and Aubrey Hollas were named Commended Students in the 2021 National Merit Scholarship Program. Commended Students placed among the top 50,000 scorers. Over 1.5 million juniors across the country took the Preliminary SAT (PSAT), which is the exam used to screen for the National Merit Scholarship.

Launched in the spring of 2021, the Woodlands Christian Student Ambassador Program introduced its first class of ambassadors. These 11 high school students have been part of the TWCA community ranging from three to 11 years. Celebrating Black History

Lacy Goedeke's Art Integration students combined a variety of mediums to learn about Martin Luther King Jr. They first listened to the book *Martin's Big Words* and were tasked with identifying positive words Dr. King used often. They then created word art using chalk. Finally, each student posed with their artwork and using green screen technology, reenacted a famous photo of Dr. King reaching out his hand.

Entrepreneur Expo

Third and fourth graders learned what it meant to take a big idea to market through the Entrepreneur Expo. Recognizing that we have a lot of future business owners, lower school faculty members Lacy Goedeke and Tanya Sharron, wanted to create a way for students to tackle real world problems and come up with a business solution. As part of this process, students had to come up with an idea, create a prototype, present the product, receive feedback, make modifications, and market the product.

Students even had to create their own commercials with a slogan, elevator pitch and logo branding their product. First and second graders were included in the project too. They created art displays in the style of Henri Matisse, and as Expo attendees, they had the responsibility of voting for their favorite businesses.

Graduation is a special moment in each school year and 2021 was no different. This class achieved incredible success after having to navigate through the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic. We were thrilled to celebrate them, and grateful to do so in-person. 






ADVANCED PLACEMENT





The SAT is a standardized test that measures a student's skills in three core areas: Math, Evidence-Based Reading, and Writing as well as an optional 50-minute essay. Each section of the SAT is scored on a 200 to 800 point scale. The highest possible composite SAT score is 1600.







TAPPS State Championships go hand in hand with The Woodlands Christian Academy. This past season, the Warriors brought home three state titles — boys cross country, boys basketball and boys golf — to add to an already impressive trophy case.

Head coach Tom Earle and his cross country squad brought home their 4th straight championship (3 in Class 4A) led by seniors Ben Shearer, Caleb Bigler and Josh Mueck. This was Earle's 10th state championship with TWCA. The boys basketball team also repeated as state champions. Head coach Tanner Field and the Warriors weren't phased by the jump to 5A competition, and played their best basketball in the playoffs. This year's title was the 7th in school history.

After missing a chance to win a state championship in 2020 due to Covid, the boys golf team was raring for an opportunity to get back on the course and it showed in their play. The Warriors were dominant all season, and won the 5A State Championship tournament by a whopping 33 strokes, the first state championship for head coach Jonathan McNeese and in school history. With several key players returning, the Warriors will be in full swing trying to repeat as champions in 2022.



Transilion to TAPPS 5A

The 2020-2021 athletic season saw a major shift in competition for the Warriors. Moving classifications from 4A to 5A meant tougher, more mature opponents would stand in the way of success. TWCA, though, rose to the challenge.

In their first year of 5A competition, the Warriors racked up an impressive number of achievements that include three state championships (boys cross country, boys basketball and boys golf), eight district championships (boys and girls cross country, volleyball, boys basketball, girls soccer, boys golf, boys and girls track) and playoff appearances from every program at TWCA. The Warrior athletics staff believes that investing in their students is the best way to build a successful program. Over the past several years, TWCA has added a dedicated athletic period, brought in strength and conditioning coach Tim Walker and built a new weight room in order to instill a "culture of training" among Warrior athletes.

Now, the challenge for TWCA is to build on the success it has enjoyed, something that athletic director Randy Hollas doesn't take lightly.

The entire Warrior athletic program knows that the days of easy competition are over. Every game in district and in the playoffs will feature an opponent that is talented, organized and ready to compete.

While that may be true, the Mighty Warriors will be ready for battle, and will be striving to achieve new heights in the coming season.



Then, came a huge decision for the graduate — enter the MLB Draft? Or head to Ft. Worth for school?


Parker was projected by many to be a first or second round pick, but on the eve of the draft, he chose to withdraw, and further his education and baseball career at TCU.



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



Providence

God works in some pretty incredible ways. In 1997, TWCA was growing and looking for a permanent campus. Gulf States Utilities (now Entergy) owned the land we now know as home, however, they were unable to develop the property as anticipated when the forested land was classified as a protected habitat of the endangered redcockaded woodpecker (a.k.a. red-headed pileated woodpecker). As a result, Gulf States offered this 40-acre parcel of land once valued at more than \$2 million, to TWCA for a mere \$250,000, enabling the school to grow and thrive.

Years later, Crossroads Baptist Church was able to purchase the property directly in front of our school making the corner of Academy Way and SH 242 truly "kingdom land".

A small number of these woodpeckers, which nest in holes made in mature living pine trees, reside in W. G. Jones State Forest directly behind our campus. The woodpeckers live in family groups, comprised of a mated pair and their juvenile male chicks, which help their parents raise the next brood. Each bird has its own home, or cavity, which all the family members help to excavate.


The birds are black and white with a dotted pattern on their backs. They are sometimes called the "Yankee Doodle Bird," because of the red feathers on each side of the male bird's head. The term "cockade" refers to the types of ornaments worn on a hat or military beret.
