

Immunization for School Year 2021-2022

As a reminder, if you haven't already, please reach out to your medical provider to update your child's Immunizations for the 2021-2022 school year. 6th grader students must receive a Tdap shot while 7th grader students must receive their meningitis immunization from their medical provider. Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) Food Benefits

The Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) has communicated the following information for the **Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) Food Benefits**.

The Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) is part of the U.S. government response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Through P-EBT, eligible school children receive temporary emergency nutrition benefits loaded on EBT cards that are used to purchase food. Children who would have received free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Act if their schools were not closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance for at least 5 consecutive days are eligible to receive P-EBT benefits. P-EBT also provides benefits to younger children in households participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) whose covered child care facility is closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance, or who live in the area of schools that are closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance.

HEALTHY SMILES DENTAL PROGRAM

Healthy Smiles is an innovative leader in children's dental care that visits schools throughout New York State.

Healthy Smiles, in collaboration with the NYC Dept. of Health and the NYC Dept. of Education, provides preventative dental care by highly trained dental staff. The services provided include a screening, gentle cleaning, fluoride treatment and sealants. Healthy Smile also provides an interactive educational workshop teaching children how to maintain proper oral hygiene. All treatments are noninvasive and done in the school under the direct supervision of the school staff. A follow up report will be sent home explaining whether the child has any cavities and if they need to visit their primary dentist for further care.

All students are welcomed to participate in the onsite dental program happening on January 10th, 2022. Permission slips for this event were passed out to students on December 2nd, 2021. Please return this permission slip back by January 4th, 2022 to secure your child's spot.

This test will help students prepare for the 8th Grade State Science Test, by showing what they know well and what they need to improve upon.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Over the past few weeks , the 6th Grade Social Explorers have investigated African Ingenious Traditional Religions, Family Structure, and Foods. Next week, we will be starting a project where they will write a **creative recipe** about a food, meal, or something else food-related that's part of their food culture. Students will explore their own culture through picking a food or meal that's important to them . They might want to write a recipe that is special to your heart, is a favorite food, a traditional meal etc.

On December 10th (6.2 and 6.3) and December 17th (6.1), we will be embarking on our first field trip of the year to the Brooklyn Museum. Students will experience the collections and special exhibitions through close looking and conversation, and build connections between works of art. These intimate tours are limited in size for comfort and safety, with each tour lasting approximately one hour and fifteen minutes. Students will leave Launch by 8:45am and arrive by 1:00pm for lunch. Students will take the 3 train to and from the Brooklyn Museum.

High School by the numbers

High School/College Awareness

At Launch our goal in the high school process is to make sure that each 8th grader and their family gets the individualized support needed to go to one of New york city's best high schools. There are more than 400 public high schools in New York City. Realistically, you will not be able to research them all. Our advice: Since students may rank up to 12 schools on the high school application, use our schools <u>search tool</u> to compile a list of at least 12 schools. Try to visit each school on your list. To help you identify schools that are a good fit, consider the following questions:

How is the commute?

Take a subway or bus ride to the school to see if the commute is doable. Think about what it will be like in the rain and snow, or coming home late in the evening after a sports event or a school performance.

Small school or large?

Small schools tend to offer more personal attention and a sense of community; their college offices may also provide better support than a large school because there are fewer students to serve. Large schools tend to have more sports teams, arts, clubs and choice in courses. There are also some mid size schools with enrollments that run roughly 700 to 1400 that may offer the perks of a large school but are not so large as to be overwhelming.

Fast-track or laid-back?

Some schools are intense. They pile on the homework beginning in 9th grade. Other schools are less intense. They may have a more manageable work-load and encourage kids to relax a bit, especially in the 9th and 10th grade. Think about what's best for you. Will you thrive in an intense or competitive environment? Or, are you more likely to learn and excel when the pressure's off? Regardless, make sure the school offers a true college prep curriculum. Some schools only offer three years of math and science, for example, which may put you at a disadvantage when applying to college and pursuing your studies once in college. Less intense should not mean less rigor.

New school or well-established?

It's nice to go to a school with a proven track record. Most new schools take a few years to develop high level coursework and relationships with college admissions officers, so it can be a gamble to be in the first few graduating classes. However, if you're faced with the choice between an overcrowded, failing school or a new, untested small school, you might be better off going with the small one, if you feel comfortable with the theme and the leadership.

Message from the Grade Level Chair

Our 7th graders have had a successful start to Quarter 2! We finished November by participating in gratitude activities in our classes designed to show our appreciation for those in our community. As we begin a new month, we welcome our new class changes! Our 7th grade crews and classes have shifted to encourage improved academic focus and new classmate bonds. The month of December is sure to fly by! We encourage our 7th graders to continue bringing their refillable water bottles to school and be mindful to use the restroom only when necessary to avoid missing class time. We know that our 7th graders are going to finish the month strong and we look forward to seeing all that they accomplish in the next few weeks!

ELA

Our 7th graders are starting their new unit on plastic pollution. In this unit, our readers are learning about plastic pollution and its negative effects on our environment. We are learning about plastic pollution by watching the documentary *A Plastic Ocean* and reading the book, *Trash Vortex*. Students will develop their evaluation skills as they practice analyzing the effects of the film techniques used in the documentary and by comparing and contrasting written and visual formats. We encourage our readers to independently read at 20-30 minutes a night. We have many different book options that our students can check out of our class library. Keep up the good work, readers!

SOCIAL STUDIES

Student historians are in the middle of a REVOLUTION. Students have been examining many secondary and primary sources on the issues that led British colonists to revolt. **Before winter break they will investigate the perspectives of many different groups on the American Revolution** and consider who "liberty and justice for all" truly applied to.

Current product in production>>>Two/Three Voice poem For the next few weeks, historians will write, revise, and perform a short narrative in two voices around the Revolutionary War. Historians have already begun researching their role and will be able to explain what life was like for people with different identities, the struggles that they went through, as well as the way they resisted or reacted to conflicts. Historians will pick a topic to focus on and develop the theme of their poem around loyalty, liberty, rights, revolution, power, oppression, or independence. Stay tuned to see our historians in action.

Expectations: Work not completed in class must be finished as homework. Please reinforce with your scholars that Social Studies is a reading and writing based class. They are encouraged to transfer their ELA skills into our classroom, in order to produce high quality writing!

ART

In Class: In December we will be working on Unit 4 on proportions and percent. These are two very important skills in 7th grade math that will set students up for 8th grade math and beyond. 
SCIENCE

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8TH GRADE UPDATES

Message from the Grade Level Chair

We have seen a strong start to Quarter 2 in the 8th grade. Across all content areas, students have been engaging in rigorous content that allow them to demonstrate their growth and knowledge. We are celebrating the hard work and dedication that was displayed by our seniors during their Student Led Conferences. It was wonderful to hear students reflect on their progress and In partnership with Asase Yaa, students are beginning their new culturally enriched classes, including Drumming, Hip Hop Dance and African Dance. Asase Yaa class

MATH

We are starting our Algebra content with Linear equations and Slope. Linear Equations and Slope help our 8th graders to develop and understand the ideas of real world concepts such as wages and hourly rate, cost per unit, budgeting, and age problems. We will be working on these topics as we go into break and when we arrive back in January.

We are giving students a choice of homework assignments where they will be completing 2 Edpuzzles or 2-4 pages in their Extra Practice Homework workbook. Homework is given on Mondays and to be completed by the next Monday (1 week).

Please continue to encourage students to study each day for 10-15 minutes by reading over their notes or completing 4-5 practice problems each day.

SCIENCE

Science just wrapped up a huge project on how organisms evolve with their environment. Students worked hard researching an organism from our ecosystem and then using scientific reasoning and prediction to imagine how it might adapt to future changes in the environment. **Check in with your child to see what they drew and ask them about their organism's changes. They are ecological experts!** Currently we are doing a brief case study on climate change and its impacts on our local ecosystem. In our next unit we will be studying Human Anatomy! All work is posted on Google classroom!

Students also just got their results from our first Science MAP Test! This year students will be taking two more MAP test to help prepare for the final Science State Exam in June. They will be held in February and May.

ART

Our master photoshop artists are about to wrap up their texture studies (Fire, water, dirt, shading a sphere and metal) and about to begin their BHM community hero stained glass portraits. **Students are going to be doing a deep dive into Afro Futurism and an artist study of Kehnide Wiley. ELA

For our third unit, 8th graders at Launch have been learning all about food. We started the unit with a week-long mini-project that examined food culture-the beliefs and customs about food held by a particular society, group, place, or time. In our discussions, we realized that our cultural backgrounds influence the foods we eat, but the reverse is also true. Food influences culture when it connects to our values, stories, language, rituals, art, and tools, which happens all the time. We examined our own food cultures and wrote recipes for foods and meals that are meaningful to our lives. The final recipes are being compiled onto a website and will be shared in the coming weeks so you can cook some of the delicious recipes at home. Our next challenge will be to understand and analyze our food system so we can make recommendations about what food choice factors to prioritize to become more conscious consumers. Please continue to support your student with their independent reading homework--they should read a book of choice for 20-30 minutes each night and add it to their log!

SOCIAL STUDIES

We are currently in the middle of our Westward expansion unit. Students are currently learning about the influence westward expansion and manifest destiny had on the country during the 19th century while also examining the impact Westward expansion has had on American Society and politics today. We have been making connections between the contributions and mindsets of different leaders throughout the 19th century by taking a deeper look into Andrew Jackson's presidency and his impact on democracy. In addition, we will start to analyze the effects of Westward expansion on different groups of people such as Native Americans, Black people, and Hispanic/Latinx people. We will be having a Mid-Quarter Assessment to test students' knowledge before we leave for break. When we return in January, we will begin learning about the Second Great Awakening and other major events during that time as we work to gather information for our narrative projects.

Meet Our Partner: Asase Yaa Cultural Arts Foundation


Academic and Enrichment partners run programs after school and during the summer that Launch students attend. These programs provide high quality academic and extracurricular enrichment that help our students achieve more than they thought possible. One of these partners is Asase Yaa Cultural Arts Foundation.

Our students conducted an interview with, K. Osei Williams, the Executive Director of the Asase Yaa Cultural Arts Foundation (video is available on the Launch website's homepage in the highlight section). **His big message to our community is, "Asase Yaa is not just about teaching dance, drumming or theater but also teaching how important you are...because when you understand that you are important then you can do whatever you want to do in life... I want all students to have the confidence to know that you can do WHATEVER you want." We are grateful for his leadership and the opportunity for our students to learn about their culture and history through djembe drumming and dance.**

As we often say "parents are our partners". Parents spoke up and said they wanted their children to have more access to enrichment programming at Launch. The Launch PA quickly hosted a meeting featuring a wide range of enrichment organizations to support families. Launch formally partnered with several of those organizations to provide summer scholarships for about 75 students to attend programs ranging from academic preparation to art and dance and basketball.

At this time, we listened to our families and decided to grow our partnership with the Asase Yaa Cultural Arts Foundation. In the past Launch has partnered with Asase Yaa around specific events, now Asase Yaa instructors teach at Launch 3 days a week to serve 100% of our students.


STEM


HUMANITIES

Combatting the Winter Blues

What is it?

Seasonal Affect Disorder (SAD) is an acute form of depression that occurs during the winter months. With less sunlight and chilling weather, changes in behavior and increased negative emotions are more likely to persist.

Strategies to Overcome Winter Blues:

- 1. Lighten up your space
- Open Curtains
- Incorporate additional light decor
- Use a light therapy lamp first thing in the AM

2. Get Moving

- Daily Exercise
- Taking a walk outside
- Dance

3. Talk to Someone

- Connect with a Friend over the Phone
- Reach out to a Therapist
- · Join a community support group

4. Nutrition

- Drink 1/2 your body weight in water daily
- · Include a vegetable with every meal
- Eat foods high in Vitamin B

5. Aromatherapy

- Use a diffuser with Essential Oils
- Boil water with fruits, spices and Herbs
- Use calming candle scents like Eucalyptus, Lavender, and Mint
