Regular Meeting November 17, 2021

MINUTES

A. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency Board of Education was called to order by President Funderburg on November 17, 2021 at 8:32 a.m.

Member Beri, supported by Member Petrie, moved to approve the agenda as presented. On voice vote, the motion carried 3-0.

E. Public Participation – Pastor Overman of Christ Temple Church in Inkster asked how their Operation Refuge/SOOAR program could help support students before expulsion. Deputy Superintendent Steven Ezikian took her contact information for further discussion.

G. President's Remarks and Board Comments

Member Petrie:

Shared that he attended the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) conference in Grand Rapids, November 11-14, 2021. He attended a Critical Thinking for Critical Times session with speaker Brandon P. Fleming who spoke on empathy and equity. Member Petrie also received information from MASB's County Area School Board Associations (CASBAs) that he believes will help

energize the Wayne County Association of School Boards (WCASB). He brought back material from the conference to share with RESA board members. President Funderburg:

• Shared highlights from Wayne County Schools:

Dearborn – Congratulations to Lisa Younce, a first-grade teacher at Oakman Elementary School in Dearborn, who received an Excellence in Education award from the Michigan Lottery.

Allen Park – Donald Liveoak a senior at Allen Park High School is among 16,000 semifinalists in the 67th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. The Board looks forward to hearing more about Donald Liveoak and wish him well as he advances from the semifinalist round.

Congratulations to Allen Park Elementary teacher, Mrs. McCall, for being named 100.3 WNIC Teacher of the Week and Allen Park High School cheer coach, Julie Goodwin, who was inducted into the Competitive Cheer Hall of Fame.

Congratulations to Allen Park's Strong Middle School for receiving sponsorship and support from the Allen Park Lowe's. Lowe's donated all the material to build a Gaga ball pit for the middle school to include as part of their physical education programming. **Ecorse** – Congratulations to Ecorse Superintendent, Dr. Josha L. Talison, on receiving the Western Wayne County NAACP's Lifetime Achievement Award.

Northville – Northville High School was selected as a 2021 National Banner Unified Champion School by the Special Olympics for the school's continued commitment to bringing inclusion for all students. Northville High school is among 49 other schools nationwide to receive this honor this year.

Wayne County Schools Football – Congratulations to Belleville, Livonia Franklin, and Detroit King high school football teams for advancing to the state semifinals to be played Saturday, November 20, 2021.

H. Communications - None.

I. Special Presentations –

- Livonia Public Schools Superintendent Andrea Oquist and the following members of the Livonia Team: Alison Smith, Phil Francis, Theresa O'Brien, and Jennifer Taiariol presented An Enhanced Trajectory for Learning & Leading in Livonia Public Schools to the board providing information on the positive impact the enhancement millage has had on the district's 13,400 students and 1,900 staff members. The presentation highlighted the various academic and wellness programs and supports they have been able to provide.
- Wayne RESA/Inkster Audit Report from Plante Moran Tamara Dust, Director of Finance and Compliance introduced members of the audit team from Plante Moran, Audit Partner Laura Claeys and Senior Audit Manager Chris Kassab. They each presented highlights from the audits of Wayne RESA and School District of the City of Inkster including:
 - o A clean audit opinion was issued for both Wayne RESA and Inkster Schools
 - WRESA's Balance Sheet, Operating Funds Revenues and Expenditures, Act 18 Revenues and Expenditures, Funded Projects Revenues and Expenditures for year end June 30, 2021.
 - o Inkster's Statement of Net Position for year end June 30, 2021 and June 30, 2020.

o Compliments to the WRESA Finance Team for always being well prepared.

J. Superintendent's Report

Executive Director of Legislative Affairs Mike Latvis:

Mr. Latvis provided legislative updates including:

- The Federal Infrastructure Bill has passed. Michigan is expected to receive funds for bridges, roads, and public transportation.
- Michigan legislature is still working on the American Rescue Plan (ARP) supplemental appropriations.
- The School Voucher/School Opportunity Scholarships Bill passed through Senate and House but was vetoed by the Governor.
- Current Bills being reviewed:
 - Dyslexia Package
 - o Prohibition on schools paying dues on behalf of employees to professional organizations
- Recent Bills Introduced:
 - o Full funding of IDEA
 - o Teacher/Workforce Shortage Initiatives (2)
 - Launch Michigan
 - State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice

Associate Superintendent - Educational Services - Beth Gonzalez

Ms. Gonzalez informed the Board that the Michigan A-F School Grades that measure student growth will be released Friday, November 19, 2021.

Assistant Superintendent - Human Resources - Kelly Bohl

Ms. Bohl provided an update on the OSHA Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS) regarding employee vaccination mandates. She noted that the ETS was released on November 4 stating that employers had to adopt policy or procedures to determine employee vaccination statuses by December 6 and provide plans for weekly testing for unvaccinated staff and reporting and recordkeeping.

On November 6, the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit issued an emergency stay of OSHA's ETS regarding vaccinations pending further legal briefing from the Court. Ms. Bohl advised the Board that RESA plans to move forward to be prepared for implementation if necessary. She informed the Board that policy may need to be adopted and a special meeting may be required.

RESA will continue to monitor this and respond accordingly.

Deputy Superintendent Steve Ezikian:

Mr. Ezikian provided updates including:

• OSHA ETS – This mandate will be a burden for Wayne County Districts to monitor. RESA's Information Technology (IT) department is working to update

- the SMART system for employees to upload vaccination status documentation or weekly testing results to assist districts and RESA with this task. They are also working on HR's ability to validate employee responses.
- Vaccination Clinics RESA is working with the Wayne County Health
 Department to get vaccination clinics in schools that would include vaccinations
 for ages 5 and up.
- GSRP Federal funds are new for GSRP and are required to be used to fund new and expanding programs. It was mentioned that this will be an issue for providers and their reporting, but the issues and concerns are being presented to Michigan Department of Education and the State Budget Office.
- Board Recommendation 113-21-22 Clarification was provided on the proposed board recommendation regarding the installation of a new Building Automated System (BAS) primary operator interface system for central monitoring of all WRESA BAS equipment including the Educational Center, Annex and Berger. The contract was not offered to the lowest bidder due its lack of experience with the current control system at Wayne RESA.

Superintendent Dr. Daveda Colbert:

Dr. Colbert provided the following updates:

- Congratulations to four Wayne County School Districts for Passing Proposals and Renewals. Based on election results from Tuesday, November 2, 2021, Allen Park Public Schools Millage Renewal, Dearborn Heights School District No. 7 Millage Proposal, Huron School District Millage Renewal, and Taylor School District Bond Proposal all passed. This is exciting news for students, families, staff, and their communities.
- Dearborn Heights School District #7 selected their next superintendent on Wednesday, November 10, 2021. Dr. Tyrone Weeks Jr., who currently serves as a central office administrator with Farmington Public Schools has shared that he is excited about the opportunity. Dr. Colbert has offered mentorship and support from RESA as he transitions into his new role.
 - Current Interim Superintendent Dr. Mary Ann Cyr will transition to Melvindale-North Allen Park as their interim superintendent following the December 31, 2021 retirement of Dr. Kim. Sorrano.
- In the spirit of keeping the RESA's November Staff Appreciation tradition alive and well, a replacement for the annual pancake breakfast has been offered for this year's celebration. Wednesday, November 24, 2021 will be Self-Care Staff Appreciation Day for all Wayne RESA staff and the Wayne RESA building will be closed.
- National Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE) Conference focus was on closing achievement gaps, labor shortages, grow your own programs, and mental health and wellness for staff.
- Thank you to Tamara Dust, Director of Finance and Compliance, and the entire Finance team for the work that led to a successful Wayne RESA audit with no findings or recommendations.
