Special Spotlight

We at Silver Oak are a diverse bunch! Our diversity is one of the many things that make us so special. We thought it would be fun to learn about different celebrations that are practiced by families at Silver Oak.

Christmas- Christmas is celebrated on December 25th. It is a **holiday to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ**, who, according to the Christian religion, is the Son of God. The name is a joining of "Christ" and "mass" which means the holy mass of Christ. Many people celebrate Christmas by buying gifts for their loved ones and awaiting the arrival of Santa Claus!

Hanukah- Hanukkah (also spelled Chanukah) is a Jewish holiday that lasts for eight nights, usually in November or December. The rich history and tradition that goes along with the Jewish festival is also known as the Festival of Lights or the Feast of Dedication. The holiday celebrates the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem following the Maccabean revolt against the Syrian-Greek army. One of the most sacred rituals during Hanukah is lighting the menorah every night for 8 nights.

Kwanzaa- Beginning December 26 and lasting for seven days, Kwanzaa is a celebration of community, family and culture, established as a means to help African Americans reconnect with their African roots and heritage. There are 7 principles of Kwanzaa which are unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibity, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.

Diwali- Diwali is one of India's biggest festivals. The word 'Deepawali' means rows of lighted lamps. It is a **Festival of Lights** and Hindus celebrate it with joy. During this festival, people light up their houses and shops with Diyas, small cup-shaped oil lamps made of baked clay.

Ramadan- Ramadan is the most important month in the Islamic calendar. It serves as a reminder of the month when the Qur'an (the Muslim holy book) was first revealed to the Prophet Muhammed "Peace Be Upon Him". During this month, Muslims are not allowed to eat or drink from sunrise to sunset. This is called fasting.

Lunar New Year- For many Asian communities around the world, Lunar New Year is the most important and most festive holiday of the year. Today, all over the world, streets are filled with the sounds of firecrackers and seasonal greetings. The celebration is also believed to be significant to ensure good fortune for the coming year.
