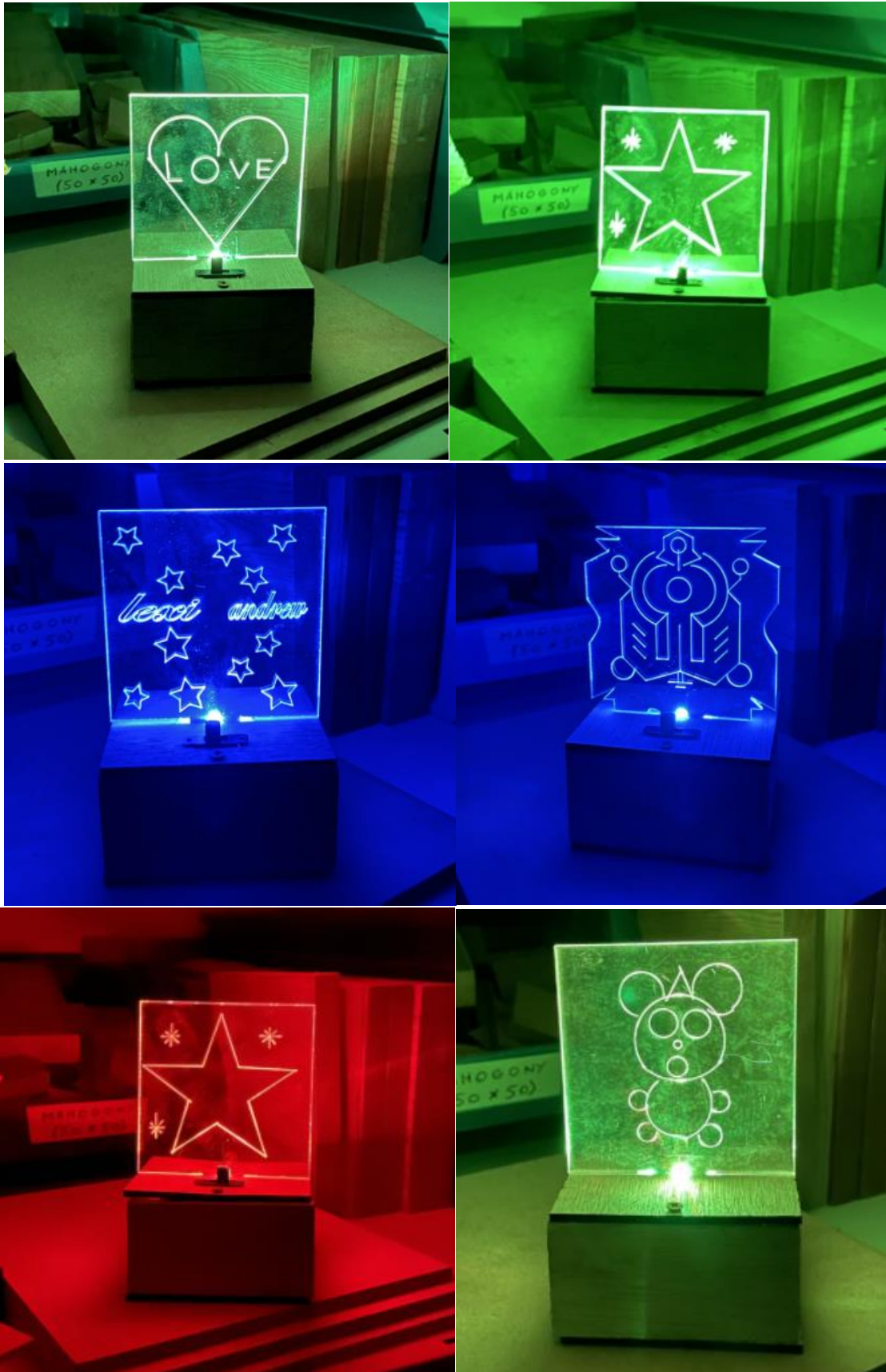

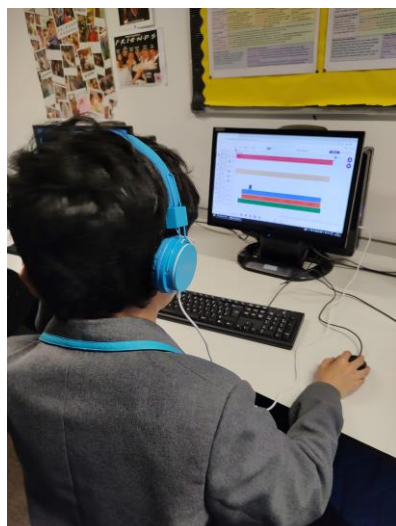
Spotlight on...

YEAR 7

The year 7s have been exploring the elements of melody and rhythm through the performance of two songs, New Order - Blue Monday and the Soundtrack to Stranger Things. In pairs they worked on their performance skills learning the many melodic layers within Blue Monday and creating their own arrangement of the piece. Alongside this they also worked on their production skills using DAW software to record the kids theme from Stranger Things. All the melodies learnt have been through basic western notation which prepares them for some exciting composition tasks after Christmas.



YEAR 8

Year 8 have been developing their knowledge of harmony through working in their bands this term. They have learnt some basic chord progressions and composed some of their own, which they performed and created their own grooves to. This was followed by an exploration of texture through Hip Hop and Grime in the music technology suite, the students have recorded a mini portfolio of some very iconic tracks. This will help support the start of a very creative term after Christmas, when we will be learning some more sophisticated compositional devices through some popular Western Classical Traditions.

YEAR 9

Year 9 were chunked in the deep end with a musical futures scheme of work this term, using their chosen instrument they have been aurally working out chord progressions to some popular songs which they have then performed together as bands, duets and soloists. They have impressed us with their independence and focus, we can already see some bands forming, watch out for them at our next gig! The year 9s are also further developing their sequencing skills through recording 'Black Eyed Peas - I Gotta Feeling', focusing on their accuracy or rhythm, melody and style we have some very high-quality production work. Next term the students will be performing, composing and further developing their listening skills through western styles of classical music alongside some classic rock n roll from the 1960s/70s.



YEAR 10

The year 10s have been busy preparing for the gig at The Brass, we have an abundance of very talented musicians who have bought together a very exciting and eclectic repertoire which we can't wait to hear on stage. Although the gig has been postponed all their hard work won't go to waste, a new date will be booked for the New Year. Alongside performance, the GCSE students have been developing a more sophisticated knowledge of music theory. We have been exploring the theory behind scales and chords, providing them a rich palette of harmonic and melodic devices which can be applied to some exciting composition activities we will be doing after Christmas based around the music of Beethoven, Handel and Chopin. Our BTEC class have been using GarageBand to sequence a chosen piece of music for Unit 7, once completed they will explore a variety of mixing and editing techniques, giving them an insight into the many recording careers available within the music industry.



YEAR 11

The year 11 GCSE class have been working very hard on their coursework this term, the students have been freely composing to their strengths and have made an impressive start, we can't wait to hear the finished pieces. As well as composition the students have been making their final song choices for their performance, with some being recorded before Christmas. Alongside the performance and composition components we have been preparing for Section B of the exam, this is critically appraising the music from two areas of study. The traditional set works for this part of the exam are Diamonds, Call me Al and Graceland from Paul Simon's Album Graceland and the Western Classical Tradition set work is Mozart's Clarinet Concerto in Amaj. We have enjoyed analysing the interrelated dimensions of music in all the set works and will be prepared to showcase our knowledge of this in our mock exam after Christmas.

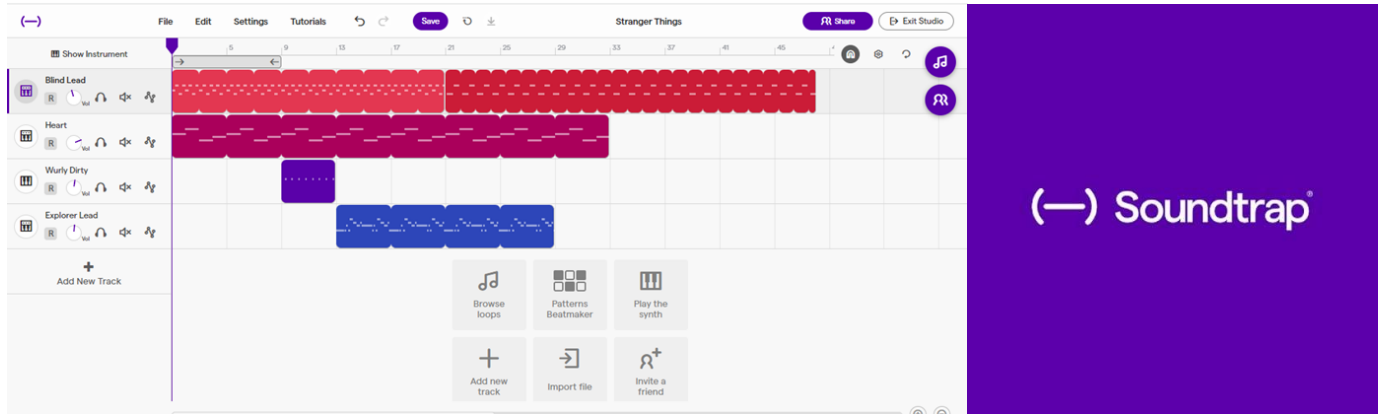
The year 11 BTEC class have been learning about mixing and editing techniques in GarageBand, they have been applying these to their recorded tracks, their production work has been of a really high standard. As part of this unit of work the students have needed to create a 'how to' guide for new GarageBand users. Their approach to this has been very innovative and creative with a variety of different presentation mediums being created. As well as completing this part of their coursework the students have been continuing to explore the different types of organisations that make up the music industry including the abundance of job roles within them. After their exam in January the students will be making a start to a new piece of coursework which explores the roles of the music promoter and performer.




Composition Workshops 2022

GCSE MEDIA STUDIES



What is Media?

Media is about communication, particularly mass communication with lots of people. The media creates products that are designed to entertain and inform, created for lots of people to hear, watch or read, often at roughly the same time. Whenever you are watching television, streaming films, scrolling through social media or listening to a podcast, you are consuming media.



Exploring Media

The power that the media has is huge. On average people consume media for almost 8 hours a day, and within that time, they are being bombarded by other people's ideas and opinions and images of the world and its people. How someone responds to that will affect their ideas about people, places and society, of politics and culture, of themselves and of their place in the world.



What do we study in GCSE Media?

Students analyse how media products like TV and music videos use images, sounds, language, and representations to create meaning. They learn about the media industry and how the industry affects how media products are made. They investigate media audiences, exploring who are the people who watch, read and consume the products, and considering how different people might be affected by media products differently, and why. They study lots of different media forms:

Media can support learning in other areas such as Film, English, Humanities and Social Sciences.



Looking further ahead

Over one hundred universities offer courses in Media, Communications and Cultural Studies in the UK. An A Level qualification in Media Studies, informed by study at GCSE level, helps to move towards these courses, as well as to those in a range of other areas. There are many career opportunities in the media, and it's an industry that is growing. Careers in media can include; TV and film production, advertising, journalism, interactive media, and digital marketing, technical production, special effects, web design and post-production.



Face Coverings

As we move into another period where we are all being advised to take more care due to the rise in infection rates related to the Covid variant known as Omicron, the academy has found itself to have run out of the 1000s of face coverings we had in stock.

Whilst we are more than happy to provide students with a face covering, when issuing 100s each day and thereafter, throughout the day, the stock runs low very swiftly. The students had a presentation shared with them by their tutors about the importance of taking these protective measures seriously. These include maintaining some form of social distance, if possible, washing hands and using hand cleansing gel and most importantly, wearing a face covering, preferably one hardy enough to last more than a few minutes! Therefore, can I please ask our parents and carers who have not yet provided their children with a stock of face coverings to do so, over the Christmas break, in order to help protect the community. Thank you for those who have clearly already done so, it does make a difference. Due to our constant requests being ignored by our students, from now on when students do not wear the face coverings provided and repeatedly refuse to wear them, parents and carers will be made aware via a message through Class Charts. If we all work together, we can help to stop the spread within the academy and beyond.

Should your child have a known medical condition which is impacted by wearing a face covering, do let your pastoral team know, for your child will be issued with an exempt card, which will need to be presented when rightly asked by staff, regarding the lack of a face covering. Thank you.

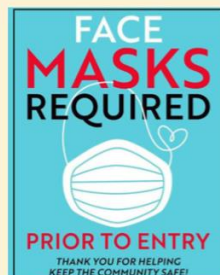

He has reached out to us to help create this sculpture as it will be made from forged scrap metal. On Friday 10 Dec. he introduced the project to our Year 10 Three Dimensional Design students. Students took important body dimensions of each other and they modelled Kizzy's hair from modelling clay. In the New Year, students will create the strands of hair from steel using Mr Bower's forge. We are very much looking forward to this opportunity.

Students have also been asked to collect 'scrap' metal objects from around the house and garden so that they can be used to shape the sculpture. The sculpture represents a lively mixed heritage young girl, the character of Kizzy Lovell from Rumer Godden's 1972 novel, "The Diddakoi".

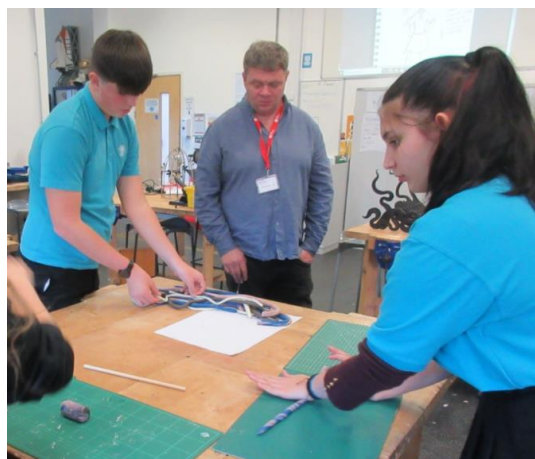

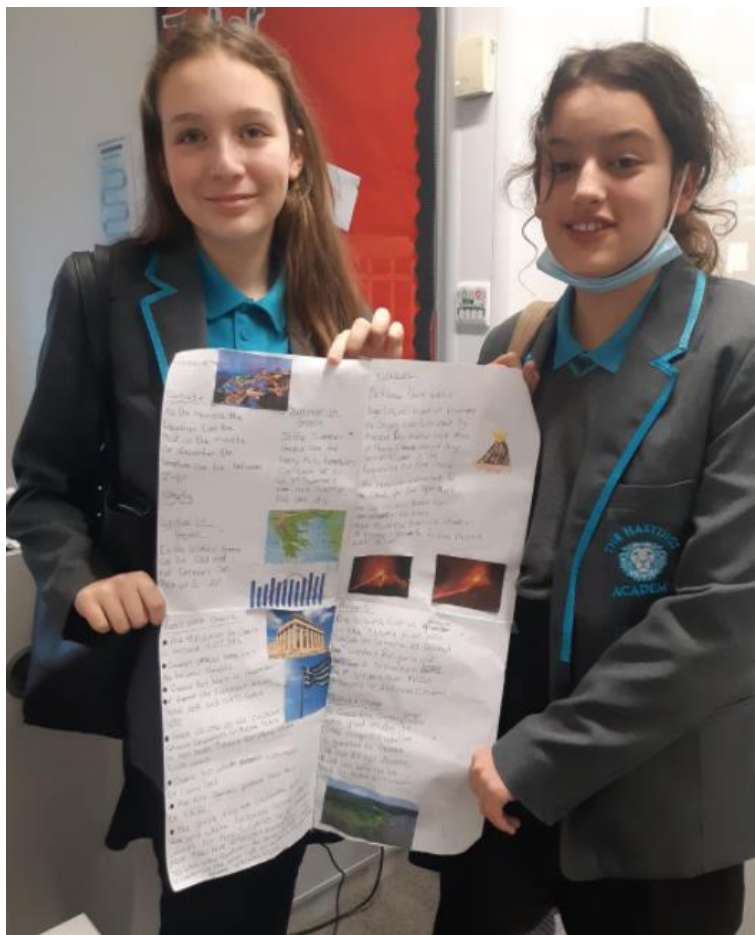
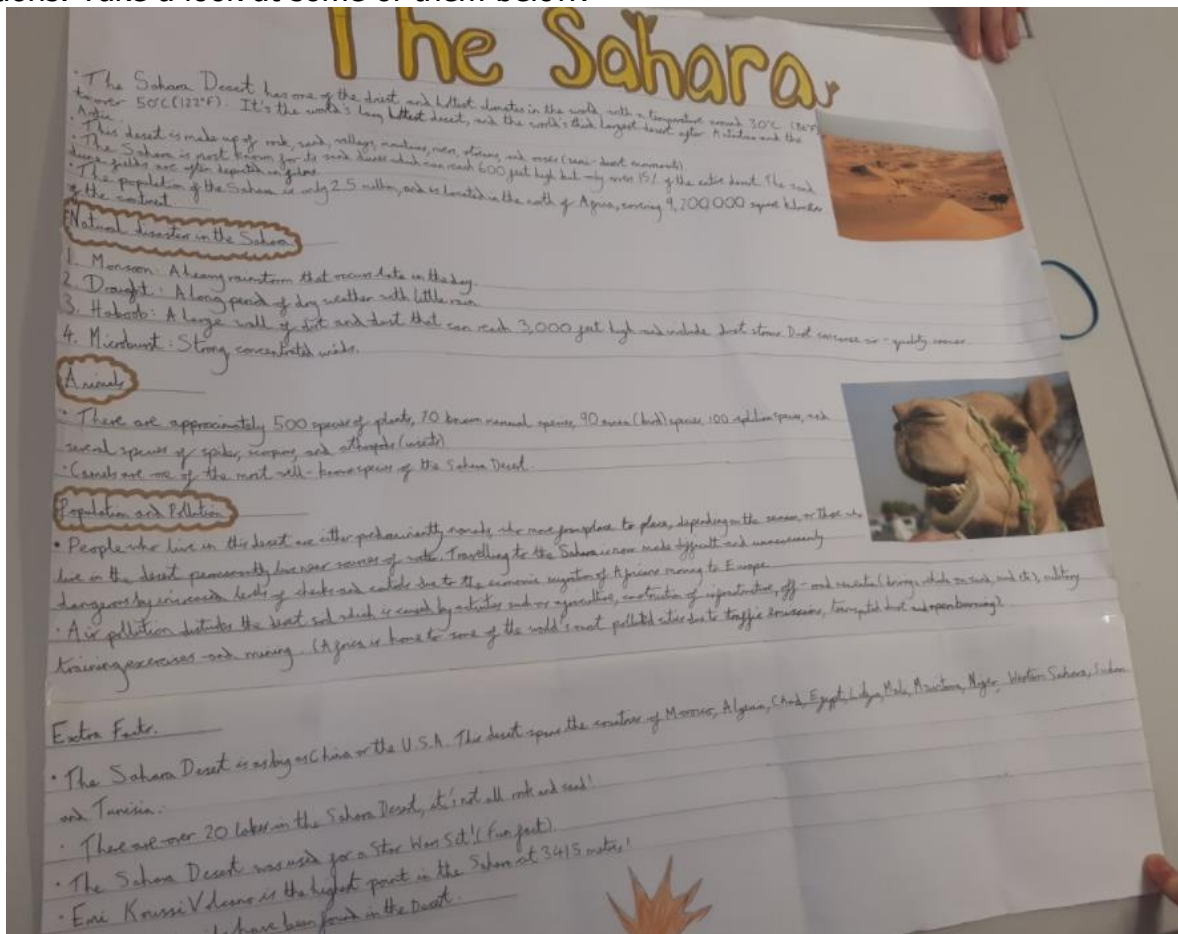


Artist's impression of the proposed "Kizzy" sculpture

Update on COVID-19 vaccinations

The Health and Social Care Secretary announced on Monday 29 November that young people aged 12 to 15 in England will be offered a second dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine, following advice from JCVI.

Parents and carers of children aged 12-15 that have not yet had their first vaccine can book their child's first vaccination slot over the winter break via the [national booking system](#).

We have been asked to direct parents and carers to the out-of-school route as your child breaks up for the winter holidays. In some cases, parents and carers will be able to get their booster at the same time as their child getting their first vaccine.

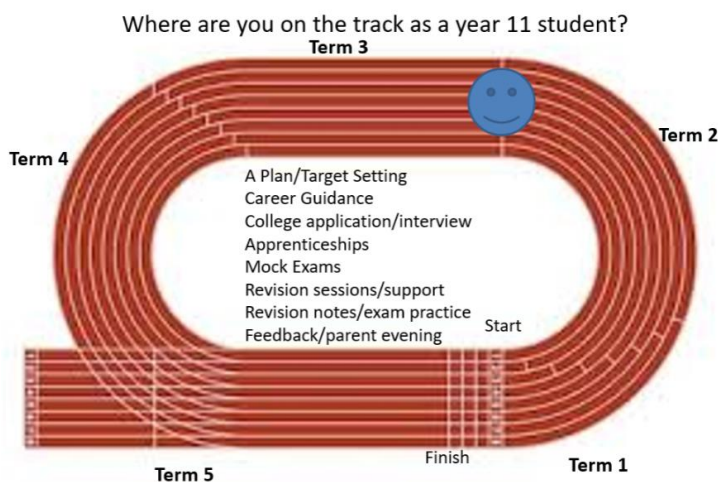

Daily testing for contacts of COVID-19

From Tuesday 14 December, a new national approach to daily testing for contacts of COVID-19 is being introduced (including until the end of this term). All adults who are fully vaccinated and children aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 – whether Omicron or not – should take a lateral flow device (LFD) test every day for 7 days instead of self-isolating. Daily testing by close contacts will help to slow the spread of COVID-19.

Daily testing for contacts of COVID-19 will help protect education settings by reducing transmission and will also help keep students in face-to-face education.

Once notified by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact, all students should take an LFD each day for 7 days and report the results through the [Online Reporting System](#) and to their setting. If your child tests negative, they can continue to attend their education setting.

Outside of the education setting, they should continue to follow the advice set out in the [Sunday 12 December press release](#). This approach should also be adopted over the winter break and on return in January.

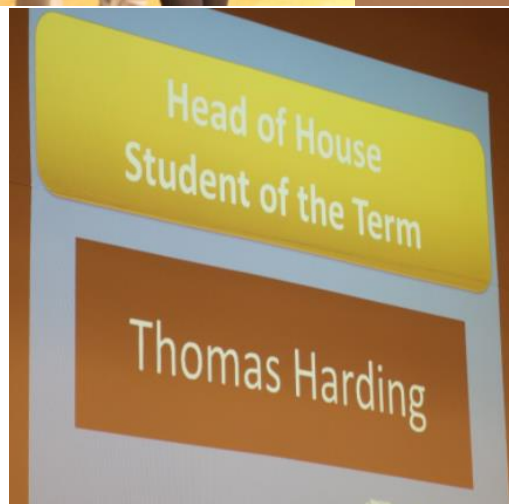
If your child tests positive, they should self-isolate and [order a PCR test](#) to confirm the result. If the PCR is positive, they must self-isolate for 10 days. If the PCR test is negative, they no longer need to self-isolate but should continue to carry out the remainder of the daily tests, and only need to isolate if it is positive.

All secondary aged pupils and students should have access to a box of 7 LFD tests from their education setting.
