REMINDER! In Most Cases, Snow Days will be Virtual Learning Days



Winter is here and that means we may need to implement Virtual Learning Days if there's inclement weather like a snowstorm or dangerously cold temperatures. If and when a Virtual Learning Day needs to be implemented, you will be notified as soon as possible by phone and email, on our District website and social media pages, as well as, on local TV and radio stations.

What are the benefits of a Virtual Learning Day?

The biggest benefit of Virtual Learning Days is the continuation of learning and student achievement. This type of instructional delivery provides students the ability to interact with instructional content to develop and deepen

understanding. A Virtual Learning Day also provides students needed exposure to a critical aspect of being considered College and Career Ready, the ability to independently complete activities while leveraging available

technologies. Additionally, Virtual Learning Days allow for a predictable school calendar as the need for added minutes or days is greatly decreased as inclement weather days will be counted as instructional days.

How does a Virtual Learning Day work?

Students will follow a flexible schedule as directed by their teachers. This will include a combination of live instruction via Google Meet and independent/self-paced learning activities throughout the day. Staff will ensure students understand learning objectives, supporting activities, and the requirements for completion.

What if a student does not have access to a device at home?

All Wausau School District students (K-12) are issued either an iPad or Chromebook as

a tool to use when interacting with instruction. In preparation for a virtual learning day, all students will be expected to bring their District issued device home for the purpose of completing work assigned.

What if a student does not have access to the internet at home?

If a family does not have internet access at home, a district-issued hot spot can be issued from your school librarian. Please contact your child's teacher for more information.

NEW! Possible April 2022 Referendum

Following a months-long community engagement process, Wausau School District Administration has shared with the Board of Education a proposal for an April 2022 referendum.

As you are probably aware a referendum earlier this year failed. However, our urgent facility needs are not going away. In fact, not only are they not going away; costs are increasing the longer we wait. So, doing nothing costs not just taxpayers, but our students and staff too.

Recognizing that, we started from scratch in our efforts to find a solution for our urgent facility needs the community would support. To make sure no stone was left unturned and to hear from as many voices as possible, the Wausau School District made available online surveys for parents/guardians, staff, and community members. Expanding on that, we held 3-in person community engagement sessions and created a facility needs webpage with an instant feedback form, among other things.

During that process, we just listened. When you asked for more information; we responded, even going as far as creating scenarios for consideration and feedback. At the end of that process, here's what we heard loud and clear: Address your urgent facility needs now, but do not close or merge any schools in the process.

What this proposal does is address our District-wide outdated facility systems/deferred maintenance, safety and security needs, outdated instructional environment needs, outdated fine arts facilities, and outdated co-curricular facilities, but it does not close or merge any of our schools in the process.

If approved as is, the proposal would allow the District to borrow \$181,900,000. For the taxpayer, this means a \$12 annual increase for every \$100,000 of property value or \$1 per month. (It's also worth noting that while the District does have a maintenance budget to cover some of these costs, under the Wisconsin school finance system, most districts are not able to set aside enough money to cover big-ticket items like those we described above.)

This proposal not only aligns with our mission to 'Advance student learning, achievement, and success;' it's responsible to taxpayers and ensures equality Districtwide. Not to mention, it's a proposal that the community helped create.

So, what's next? The Wausau Board of Education will look over this proposal again at their next meeting on January 10th to decide whether to approve it as is or make any adjustments.

NEW! Rapid Antigen COVID-19 Test Results Now Accepted in the Wausau School District

The Wausau School District now accepts rapid antigen COVID-19 test results. That's in addition to the PCR test results.

Don't forget the District has two mobile COVID-19 testing units available should you need a test. Those units offer both PCR and rapid antigen tests. All District students, their immediate family members, District staff, along with their immediate family members can be tested for the virus free of charge.


*Note: The COVID-19 Mobile Testing Units will not be available during Winter Break. They will be back on campuses Monday, January 3.

Longtime Franklin Elementary Crossing Guard to Retire




Longtime Franklin Elementary Crossing Guard Eugene Hauer has crossed into retirement this week. He kept students and staff safe for the last 14 years!
