The event once again featured fanfavorite activities







Plans are already underway for 2022. Be sure to mark your calendars now!



REFLECTING ON THE PAST DECADE AS A **SPRINGBOARD** TO THE FUTURE

n planning for the future, it's important to assess where we've been, what we've learned from the past, and where we currently find ourselves. This is true for organizations as well as individuals. We are currently at that reflection point in the West Bloomfield School District (WBSD) in terms of both the school district status and the conclusion of my decade of leadership as superintendent of schools. We've come a long way, but there's so much more to accomplish.

Finance

When I was appointed superintendent in 2012, the Board of Education had one prevailing concern that overshadowed its governance role. I recall during my interview with the Board when I asked what their top priorities were, the financial health of the school district was the consensus response. Given a fund balance at that time of approximately 3 percent, combined with forecasts of declining enrollment, stabilizing the financial health of the district was paramount before progress on educational issues could be addressed. Over the course of several years of transparent budgeting that included tough staffing decisions and judicious reductions, the administration and Board of Education were successful. We now have a fund balance of 19 percent. Additionally, we've passed several ballot measures, including a \$120 million bond proposal in 2017, which garnered approximately 70 percent approval by the voters. Funds from this bond are being used to

refurbish our schools as well as design and construct a new state-of-the-art middle school, scheduled to open in the fall of 2022.

School District Governance

As alluded to above, school district leaders have important decisions to make related to finance, budgeting, accountability, and establishing the vision of a school district. I've been fortunate over the past 10 years to work with effective school boards. Even while experiencing

several changes (five of the seven current board members are new since 2012), we've continually improved board/superintendent relationships. Important to the continuity has been the development of board/superintendent operating principles to guide our work. I introduced a process where the Board keeps its policies regularly updated, which provides clear guidance to the administrative leaders of the District. Clear communication of the District's mission and vision is critical. Toward that end, the Board is currently updating its strategic plan, which will set the direction for the next three-to-five years. That plan will be finalized in the spring of 2022, with work commencing prior to the end of the 2021-22 school year.

Staff Relations

We've made significant progress in improving staff relations over the past

decade. Due to the past financial crisis, staff morale was negatively impacted.


Early on in my leadership, I recognized that we needed to be more appreciative of the work being done by our staff and more inclusive in our decision-making. Consequently, I've focused on building a collaborative culture where all voices are at the table, listened to, and acted upon. An important result of

and acted upon. An important result of these efforts is our current Interest Based Bargaining (IBB) process that is used with all bargaining groups. Simply put, IBB seeks to find common interests and collaboratively develops win/win solutions to issues facing the district and our employees. This process requires open, honest, and respectful regard to all perspectives and people in the process. Whereas we may begin with differing perspectives, we use a collaborative versus an adversarial process that not only solves problems



All of these initiatives lead to our primary responsibility of providing excellent teaching and learning opportunities for staff and, most importantly, students. Over the last 10 years, we've made great strides in this priority area. A few examples include:

but builds a cohesive spirit as well.





- Installing District-wide WI-FI and one-to-one technology, which has enabled greater communication, more powerful instructional platforms, and personalization of instruction
- Creating a forward-thinking and innovative Teaching and Learning services team, focused on updating curricular offerings as well as providing instructional professional development and coaching
- Developing a collaborative administrative organizational structure that explicitly focuses on teaching, learning, and reciprocal accountability
- Creating the District Learning Design Team, made up of teachers, school administrators, central office leaders, and school board members who foster innovation
- Creating and implementing the Portrait of a Graduate (PoG), developed by stakeholders (parents, students, community members, teachers, administrators, and school board members). The PoG is composed of our 4Cs − Communicators, Collaborators, Creative Problem Solvers, and Contributors. This work guides our current instructional focus and will be the basis of current strategic planning efforts.

There are many additional teaching and learning achievements, but the common thread is that we're all here to nurture, serve, challenge, guide, and excite our students about what they're currently learning and experiencing so their respective futures are both promising and fulfilling.

Community Relations

Lastly, it's important to put the above work into the context of the greater WBSD community. As superintendent, I have established positive relationships across all sectors of the community, including parents, local and state governmental agencies and representatives, the business community, faith leaders, and service clubs. Consequently, my wife and I have maintained a highprofile community presence through regular attendance at our schools' programs and events. I also am involved with the local Optimist Club, Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce, United We Walk/MLK 365 Committee, and the Oakland County Council for Diversity, Equity, and Social Justice, to name a few.

Concluding Thoughts

All of this work leads to a higher quality of life for our students and their families, making the greater West Bloomfield area a destination for families seeking an enriching place to raise children. As I contemplate the next phase of my life with retirement in June 2022, I will look back with pride. Over the years, both my wife, Cindy, and I have thoroughly enjoyed our numerous community engagements, particularly those projects and involvements serving youth. Developing young minds and leaders is gratifying work that impacts all our futures. Most importantly, we value the connections and relationships we've had with the many people in our community who are working to make lives better locally and globally. WBSD has a promising future!

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ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT



JESSICA NISKAR WBHS Class of 2012

Bloomfield always knowing she was meant to move to a big city, but unsure of what she wanted to do. When she asked herself what the one thing was she loved most, it was obvious – movies. Today, Jessica is working for New York City Film and Television. She is currently the assistant location manager for the show Billions on Showtime. Her resumé also includes work on STARZ Run the World, HBO Max Search Party, Sony Classics After the Wedding, Netflix The After Party, Twentieth Century Fox, Westside Story and more.

Niskar began her path toward her dream at Michigan State University, where she worked on sketch comedy shows, produced award shows and was a member of the in-house broadcasting department for Michigan State Athletics. She earned a degree in Media and Information from the College of Communication and Arts and Sciences.

While in college, she also sought out internships and participated in a study abroad program in India (Beyond Bollywood). She was willing and eager to go outside of her comfort zone and seek out opportunities to learn the industry from the ground up.

Not having any family or friends in

New York City, networking became vital.

She spent every day meeting people through LinkedIn connections. After three weeks of networking, Niskar ended up getting an email from someone she met in college asking if she was interested and available to interview as a production assistant for an ABC pilot. From that

moment on, she has continued to welcome new opportunities to learn and grow. By taking risks, sheer hard work and determination, Niskar has been able to move up in the film industry at a reasonably fast pace.

How has WBHS helped you on your current path?

In addition to providing a strong academic background, there were two teachers at WBHS who were monumental influences throughout my high school experience and who continue to provide support for me throughout these subsequent years.

Having struggled with issues outside of school, I came to school each morning anxious and distracted, not knowing how to fit in. At some point, I ended up in these two teachers' hallway, bouncing between their classrooms, finding solace. During the day, one would relentlessly beg me to start watching "happy" movies, rather than "sad" – always accompanied by her eye roll and infectious smile. After hours, the

other would let me sit on top of a desk while he recounted stories of his teaching career, my eyes always wandering, inspecting all of the art that he made and collected throughout the years. I remember these teachers being the two people who didn't flinch when I told them what I thought I wanted to do. They never indicated my dreams were crazy or unrealistic. They were just excited and proud

for what was and what was to come. That was all I needed.



Just know that high school is only one part of your life. There's so much more. Life is hard. There are highs and lows, and it's just learning how to embrace the highs while understanding that the lows will pass. I wish I wasn't so hard on myself back in high school, and it's still something that I'm working on.

Whatever you choose to do, the most important components are to do your best to have fun, surround yourself with humans you love and who love you, and make sure you are proud of your past, present and future self.







CLIFTON BOYD WBHS Class of 2010

lifton Boyd is a music theorist and scholar-activist based in New York City. He is currently a Ph.D. candidate in music theory at Yale University. In fall 2022, he will join the faculty of New York University's Department of Music.

Boyd is a staunch advocate for diversity in music academia: he is the founder of Project Spectrum, a graduate student-led coalition committed to increasing diversity, equity, and inclusion in music academia. As chair, he oversaw the organization of their inaugural national symposium, "Diversifying Music Academia: Strengthening the Pipeline". He has written about his experience of "Being a Black Ph.D. Student Following George Floyd's Murder" for Inside Higher Ed, and will contribute to the forthcoming edited collection Being #BlackintheIvory: Contending with Racism in the American University.

Prior to his doctoral studies at Yale, he earned a B.M. in viola performance and music theory from the University of Michigan, and an M.M. in music theory from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University.

How has WBHS helped you on your current path?

It wasn't until several years after graduating from high school that I realized how excellent of an education I got at WBHS. The drive to succeed that WBHS nurtured in me as a high school student is the same drive that has helped me work toward and achieve my professional goals today.

I am also very grateful for my musical education at WBHS. I started the viola in fifth grade at Doherty Elementary School with Mrs. Trotter and was able to have her as my orchestra teacher throughout my high school career. Looking back, it was e

career. Looking back, it was extremely important for me to have a Black orchestra teacher, given that professional orchestras are only about 1 percent Black. By working with Mrs. Trotter, and later Detroit's own Sphinx Organization, I learned that even if musical spaces were designed to make me feel like I didn't belong, I could defy the odds and work to support other Black musicians and scholars along the way.

What advice do you have for our current students?

Find out what you're passionate about and give it your all. It may take you a

while, but if you're fortunate enough to have some ideas, really push yourself to do the best that you can. While talent and natural ability can get you pretty far in life, it is often the people who work the hardest and are the most persistent who end up reaching their goals.

Be curious and take risks. At this stage of your life, you most likely don't know yourself very well, and that's OK. But in order to learn who you are, you need to be curious about the world around you and be willing to try new things. Getting yourself out of your comfort zone in all areas of your life is one of the best things you can do as a young person.

Ask for help and offer help. The world is, unfortunately, an unjust and inequitable place. People are constantly and structurally disadvantaged because of their race,

gender, sexual orientation, class, religion, nationality, and other identity markers. If you find you are not being given the same opportunities as your more privileged peers, don't be afraid to advocate for yourself and your future. If you are more privileged than most, do your part to work toward equity and social justice in your communities.

Be kind to yourself. Even if high school is a negative experience for you overall, or if you feel like you don't have things quite figured out yet, you still have your whole life ahead of you. Don't give up on yourself – the WBHS community hasn't.

The National Merit

Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) – a test that serves as an initial screen of more than 1.5 million entrants each year – and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements.

GENERAL FUND AUDIT RECAP FOR THE SCHOOL FISCAL YEAR, ENDED JUNE 30, 2021

Public school districts are required to have an independent audit of their annual financial statements each year. By independent, this means an outside firm that reports directly to the Board of Education conducts a thorough study of the District's financial statements, which have been prepared and presented by the school district's business office, and comments on the validity and accuracy of those financial statements.

This process provides an annual "check and balance" mechanism to ensure that school district resources have been properly classified and accounted for according to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), and that taxpayer funding is being utilized within the parameters allowed by law.

For the school fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2021, the school district retained Plante and Moran, which is one of the leading school audit firms in the state of Michigan. We are pleased to report that Plante and Moran has issued an "unqualified" audit, which means that the audit was clean and no material discrepancies were found in the dollar amounts or District budgeting, accounting, and reporting procedures that the school district presented.

An unqualified audit is the best report that can be achieved in the audit process. The school district's General Fund is the primary fund that encompasses daily instruction and operations. Here are a few highlights from the audit report for the District's General Fund:

REVENUE - \$69.9 million

The primary revenue source for the school district is the state-established Foundation Grant. This is an annual dollar amount per student that the state sets for each school district. Last year, the Foundation Grant for WBSD was \$9,156 per pupil, which ranks seventh of 28 public school districts in Oakland County. Therefore, the number of pupils the district attracts and retains is critical to our annual funding. No other revenue component comes close compared to the importance of the Foundation Grant each year.

EXPENDITURES - \$68 million

Over 82 percent of school district expenditures go toward personnel costs. To provide another layer of detail, 81 percent of the \$63 million in expenditures goes directly toward instruction and instructional support. Various resources are needed to operate the school district but the vast majority of resources are allocated where they should be - for teaching and learning.

An adequate fund balance promotes financial stability and helps preserve continuity in educational programming and outstanding opportunities for students.

Some additional benefits of maintaining an adequate fund balance are:

- Minimizes the need to borrow on a short-term basis to meet cash flow
- Prevents operating with a structural deficit
- · Provides flexibility in adjusting spending during the school year
- · Helps with maintaining bond credit ratings

GLEASON SELECTED FOR MSVMA RECOGNITION


STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN ON SITE ADMISSIONS DAY

hen children feel secure in their relationships and are able to get their needs met in a responsive and consistent way, they begin forming strong social and emotional foundations. While all areas of development are important in young children, West Bloomfield Preschool Academy teachers focus on supporting the social and emotional aspect of their students. This helps to ensure positive connections form between adults and peers in the classroom. In efforts to continue supporting our teachers and students in this area, WB Pre-K has created the "Social and Emotional Support Team."

The Social and **Emotional Support Team** consists of a group of our very own Pre-K and GSRP teachers who support their fellow colleagues by getting to the root of some social/emotional challenges they may be facing in the classroom. Teachers use consistent

strategies and a calming environment to help embrace their



students' emotions using positive reinforcement, problem solving, and conflict resolution.

"Emotional" activities, social stories, sensory items, and more are all planned according to the individual child and as the class as a whole to ensure all of our students' developmental needs are met socially and emotionally.

The goal for our students is to help children develop relationships, regulate their behavior and emotions, and talk about their feelings. When the adults in children's lives have appropriate expectations of children's development at a preschool age, they will see greater achievements and overcome challenges in the classroom and at home.

"When parents, informal community programs, and professionally staffed early childhood services pay attention to young children's emotional and social needs, as well as to their mastery of literacy and cognitive skills, they have maximum impact on the development of sturdy brain architecture and preparation for success in school."
