Strengths:

Despite being in the middle of a pandemic, Prairie Point's Year to Date Attendance Percentage was 91% which was higher than the district's 89% average. We are very proud of our attendance data as we have had to have more strict guidelines this year.

Weaknesses:

This year, over 33% of our regular in-person population chose to be online. This has been difficult to maintain proper communication with this cohort of students and make them feel like apart of our in-person school community.

If indicated, state need(s) identified pertaining to **student demographics**:

Students and families were unable to attend Prairie Point functions this year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As mentioned above, about 1/3 of our students chose to be online during the 2020-2021 school year, and then at semester, half of the students were move to a new school. One thing we need to continue to work on is welcoming students back to in-person learning.

Strengths:

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, MAP assessments were not given during the 2019-2020 school year. Data on student achievement was analyzed from previous NWEA Data. Prairie Point had many strengths; 73% of our students were proficient in reading and 52% of students met their growth goals. 70% of our students were proficient in math and 50% met their growth goals. In the area of achievement gap, we stretched our goal and continue to shrink the achievement gap.

Weaknesses:

An area of weakness on student achievement was meeting our growth goals from the fall to winter windows. We had a large population on online students that did not perform as well when they came back to in-person learning. These major drops impacted student data in a few grade levels. Prairie Point staff spent a lot of time analyzing winter data and are making corrections to address spring achievement.

If indicated, state need(s) identified pertaining to **student achievement**:

This year we have spent a lot of time with grade level teams analyzing our NWEA data. During the winter NWEA window we specifically make math intervention plans that would address the gaps. On April 14, 2021, PPE staff will look at our spring NWEA data to see if we have addressed the concerns noted in previous assessments.

Strengths:



District approved curricula can be found on our Park Hill Website. The district provides strong curriculum for all subject areas as well as instructional frameworks. Our staff ensures that the curriculum is implemented with fidelity within the instructional frameworks. This year the focus has been on math achievement and meeting our growth goals. Our building goal is 55% of students meeting their growth goals in the area of mathematics.

**Weaknesses:**

Providing consistent math interventions is an area of weakness. We have procedures in place for reading interventions, but math interventions are an area where growth is recommended.

**If indicated, state need(s) identified pertaining to curriculum and instruction:**

Grade level meetings will continue to focus on the learning continuum and address gaps in student achievement in the area of mathematics.

More than 70% of certified staff members have advanced degrees in education; Our district provides monthly early release time for professional development. Our building PD has been focused on BSIP goals related to Math Instruction and AVID.

**Weaknesses:**

A continued weakness for Prairie Point Elementary is our staff's diversity does not mirror the student population. We have begun doing some equity work, but this is a continued weakness.

Throughout the upcoming school year another large focus of our professional development equity, inclusion, and access.

Weaknesses:

One of the things that dropped this school year was parent-family support. Families noted 20% involvement with Prairie Point this year. While this was anticipated, due to all activities and events with families canceled this year due to COVID, this is an area we would like to address.

Prairie Point Staff has continued to work with Prairie Point PTA to work on our family and community engagement during COVID. We have begun planning for 2021-2022 school year and have created a virtual contest to increase family support from home.

Strengths:

Prairie Point's Mission and Vision are posted throughout the building and are always reviewed at the beginning of all staff meetings. On our building score card, there was a lot of success - According to the Panorama Ed Staff Feedback Survey, 90% of the staff responded favorably regarding school climate, on educating all students, and support staff rated our climate in the 99%.

Weaknesses:

One weakness that noted was student survey response on safety. 30% of students responded that they felt the school was meeting their safety needs.

The Reading Interventionist will provide professional development every quarter to general education teachers on the topics of phonemic awareness and phonics. The students in these subgroups are generally the students who struggle with these foundational skills. The Reading Interventionist will be teaching from Pathways to Reading which will include vowel practice which will cover Vowel Town which is pneumatic to learn the vowel sounds. We will also review rivers, ladders, spot the vowel flashcards, as well as word reading lists which will put their phonics learning Vowel Town into practice. Dr. Kilpatrick's One Minute phonemic awareness lessons will be an area of focus as well along with Heggerty.
