

Biography of St. Thomas Aguinas

St. Thomas Aquinas, Priest, Angelic Doctor of the Church, Patron Saint of all universities and of students.

From age five and in the care of the Benedictines of Monte Casino, St. Thomas showed a unique capacity for knowledge and insight, surpassing his fellow pupils in learning as well as in the practice of virtue. In 1239, at age 13, he was sent to Naples to continue his studies and it was here he was first attracted to Aristotle's philosophy.

When the time came for him to choose his state of life, St. Thomas renounced the things of this world and resolved to enter the Order of St. Dominic joining the Dominicans of Naples. The Dominican Order is famed for its intellectual tradition, both active in preaching and reflective in study, prayer, and meditation.

St. Thomas studied at Cologne under Albert the Great where he earned the nickname "dumb ox" because of his huge and silent ways- but he was truly a brilliant student.

At age twenty-two, he was asked to teach in Cologne and began publishing his first works. Four years later, he was sent to Paris, where, as a priest, he received his doctorate. He held two professorships in Paris, lived at the court of Pope Urban IV, and directed the Dominican schools at Rome and Viterbo.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, pervades his writings. One might expect Thomas, as a man of the gospel, to be an ardent defender of revealed truth; but he was broad enough, deep enough, to see the whole natural order as coming from God the Creator, and to see reason as a divine gift to be highly cherished.

The Summa Theologiae, his last and unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after celebrating Mass of December 6, 1273, and died March 7, 1274. St. Thomas was canonized in 1323 and declared Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius V.

We look to Thomas Aquinas as our shining example of Catholicism in the sense of the broadness, universality, and inclusiveness he exemplified. We seek to exercise the divine gift of reason within us, our power to know, learn, and understand all while giving thanks to God for the gift of His revelation, especially in Jesus Christ.

Catholic Identity

Putting our Catholic faith at the center of all teachings not only fosters a closer relationship with God for our children but helps them develop an appreciation of Catholic values and traditions, an understanding of our history, and respect and compassion for all life.

St. Thomas Aquinas balances academic reasoning with a deep understanding of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ and the formation of His Church. The St. Thomas Aquinas student at graduation has embodied the ideals of service and achieved knowledge of the needs of local and wider communities and is preparing for the day when he or she will take a place in these communities as a competent, concerned, and responsible member.

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Facilities

Facilities must be maintained and improved to support and enhance the learning environment. A "best use" strategy should consider safety, functionality, anticipated growth, and all associated costs. Although we have older facilities that were constructed in different phases, we have updated and upgraded over the last few years to take advantage of more current technologies in HVAC, lighting, control systems, and communication infrastructure in phased implementation as funding allowed. Current ongoing upgrades include lighting, HVAC controls, carpet tile systems in classrooms and ceiling return air systems.
