


# GEOGRAPHY

## PROGRAMME OF STUDY

The course is designed to bring an increased awareness of the natural environment and the issues and challenges that are facing the world today. You’ll study the natural world, including hydrology, fluvial geography, meteorology, rocks and weathering as well as coasts and hot desert environments, their problems and how to deal with them. You’ll also look at issues arising from our own use of the planet including population growth, settlements, migration, and options in economic and environmental geography.

These topics will be supported by a variety of fieldwork and secondary data collection. There are two mandatory field trips in the first year of study to York and Northumberland’s Coquet Valley. In the second year, there is an optional trip to study the Northumberland coast and (hopefully) an optional trip abroad which provides a unique opportunity to learn about the landscape and geography of another country.

## ASSESSMENT

- Four exams at the end of the course each of 90 minutes duration.
- There is no assessed coursework.
- Your knowledge of the subject, its principles, theories and processes, and your understanding about how these are applied in the real world are assessed.

## FUTURE PLANS

The skills you develop across the two years are highly regarded amongst employers and by all universities. A good number of students choose to continue Geography based courses at university.

## TO APPLY

Grade 7–9 at Geography GCSE/IGCSE is desirable.
