





STUDENT GROWTH & PROFICIENCY

Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCA)

Student proficiency is measured by the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA) tests, Minnesota's state requirement for testing under the Federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

Due to ongoing challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic, the participation rate for the MCA in spring 2021 was significantly lower than in previous years, when White Bear Lake Area Schools typically has seen more than a 95% participation rate for both assessments. Math had a 70% participation rate and Reading had a 76% participation rate. The state-level participation rate was similarly lower than it has been in the past.

Early Childhood

All of the District's preschools have a Parent Aware rating of four stars, the highest possible rating. Teachers assess the growth of children and take appropriate measures to ensure they are kindergarten-ready.

Elementary

Students in our elementary programs are assessed by teachers using a range of grade-appropriate assessments in reading, math and science to measure progress toward local and state standards. Student proficiency is measured using MCA assessments. Instructional support is personalized so students who test below grade level receive extra intervention and support, and students who already exceed standards are challenged through our comprehensive Gifted and Talented program.

Middle School

Our middle school students take the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA). Teachers and counselors use these assessments along with other data to help students select courses. Intervention support is provided for students who test below grade level. Accelerated and enriched class options ensure each student is challenged.

High School

High school teachers assess students through common assessments in each subject. Nationally-normed assessments include the PreACT offered to tenth graders in the fall and the PSAT and ACT offered to eleventh graders. Counselors and teachers use these data, along with an understanding of student motivation and goals, to help students select from more than 250 course offerings, including 50 college-level courses and seven career pathways areas.

Responding to student needs

Anticipating challenges and disruption to student learning being created by COVID-19, staff members had begun conversations and plans during the 2020-21 school year that focused on learning recovery and targeted support for each of our students. Throughout the year, building and district teams worked to adjust instruction and intervention to meet the needs of students who were learning at home and/or returning to in-person learning.

The district coordinated and implemented a robust set of summer programming for a wide variety of students in grades K-12. Over the summer of 2021, teams of teachers and administrators worked together to plan for content, credit, and grade recovery, particularly at the high school level.

The complete picture of each student has informed instruction in the 2021-2022 school year, which has been delivered in an in-person format with the option for those families who choose online learning to enroll in the district's Distance Learning Academy.

In addition to MCA data, White Bear Lake Area Schools has utilized local academic measures that include data such as academic and social-emotional screeners, Pre-ACT and ACT, academic grades and credits.

White Bear Lake Area Schools 4-year graduation rate for Class of 2020 was 90.1%, 6.3 percentage points above the state average.

Graduation rate calculations follow one year behind the current graduating year.

WBLAS continues to be a recognized leader for developing Career Pathways aligned to workforce needs.

Launched in 2015, our pathway programs allow students to take one or two courses, or a series of courses. They also allow students opportunities for job shadowing, industry site visits, and credentials or certifications recognized in the field.

Colleges and Universities on campus

During the 20-21 school year, 50 college level courses were offered at WBLAHS: 21 Advanced Placement (AP) classes, 25 College in the School (CIS/ CitHS) courses, and 4 Project Lead the Way (PLTW) courses. Students also took advantage of Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO).

More than half of the 10th-12th grade students at WBLAHS enrolled in potentially college credit-bearing courses in the 2020-21 academic year.

AVID offers rigorous instruction to students in the academic middle who have the individual determination to prepare for a four year college. In AVID classes, students collaborate, engage in inquiry, and learn college-level reading, writing and study strategies. Lakeaires Elementary also offers elementary AVID strategies to students.


White Bear Lake Area Schools continues to demonstrate strong stewardship to our communities.

- » The district refunded one outstanding debt issue during 2021, which will save district taxpayers a total of \$286,543 over the next three years. The outstanding debt was related to alternative facilities bonds that were issued in 2012 to finance several major HVAC renovation projects throughout the district.
- » Facilities across the district continue to be constructed and renovated, due to a \$326 million bond referendum approved by area residents in November of 2019.

BUILDING OUR FUTURE

The White Bear Lake Area Schools facilities projects to address building needs across the district are well underway, with construction crews digging in and making headway at sites across the district.

Our students, staff and community members are seeing first-hand the phases of construction we talked about at length with the community in the fall of 2019. We are grateful to district residents for seeing both the need and the vision, and for supporting the bond referendum. Much has been planned and built in the two years since that time, and we are excited to successfully complete all of the construction phases in the summer of 2025.

The first project to be completed in the fall of 2020 was the creation of a secure office and vestibule area at the district's Area Learning Center (ALC). The second phase of the ALC projects, which are scheduled to be completed during the summer of 2023, will include renovations to create a learning commons/flexible learning space, kitchen improvements and mechanical upgrades.

Elementary school projects that were constructed last year and completed before the school year began this fall included renovations to the media center, the addition of specialized learning spaces and upgrades to safety/security at Lincoln Elementary, Matoska International IB World School, Vadnais Heights Elementary and Willow Lane Elementary. A small classroom addition was added to Matoska International and a new full-size gymnasium addition was included in Lincoln's construction project.

Construction crews also completed the Transportation Department's new home, a facility that houses transportation staff and the district's fleet, just before the school year. District vehicles are maintained and managed at the new site, located in Hugo. Moving to this new location allows for expansion of the unified high school campus onto the former bus garage site.

Additionally, the WBLAHS - South Campus Phase 1 addition of a new gymnasium was completed before students came back in September. This gym, along with the one newly built at Lincoln, helps to address the need for community gymnasium space. The project also features a new entrance, vestibule, storage and walkin freezer in the kitchen. Additionally, the new space includes privacy restrooms that are open during home events at the WBLAHS Stadium.

We have been grateful to be able to continue work on projects despite the challenges of COVID-19 and employment shortages. Our construction crews have been terrific at staying on schedule and on budget. Even in these times of building supply shortages, their efforts and partnership have kept us on track.

Cranes and strategically placed piles of dirt adorn other district sites currently under construction, especially at projects that broke ground this summer. Preparatory work for the additions and renovations that will create a unified White Bear Lake Area High School at the current WBLAHS - North Campus site are going strong. The extensive excavations for the field house, the stadium and activities areas, and the classroom additions are impressive.

Groundbreaking also took place recently for the Phase II project at South Campus, which will be converted to a middle school when the new unified WBLAHS on the current North Campus site holds all students grades 9-12. The project includes new classrooms, renovations to some areas of the current building to include flexible learning spaces and mechanical and security upgrades. Additionally, a new front office space addition will accommodate a change to make the front entrance of the building open to McKnight Road rather than to the parking lot on the south side of the building.

Construction on the new elementary school, just north of the Hugo Post Office along Highway 61, has been moving along nicely as well. The building, which will have the capacity to house 720 students in grades K-5, broke ground in the spring of 2021 and is ontrack to be completed in time for students to attend in the fall of 2022. At that time, Oneka Elementary will also have a change in grading structure to serve students in grades K-5. The facility plan calls for Hugo Elementary to be converted to a northern Early Childhood Center in the future.

During the 2021-22 school year, projects will continue through the design and construction process and be finished before the fall of 2022 at Birch Lake, Lakeaires and Otter Lake Elementary Schools. Projects at the three elementary buildings include small additions, updated classrooms and media centers, and safety/security upgrades.

Knowing all of our students learn differently, we are being purposeful about building learning spaces that are versatile. We're able to create adaptable learning environments through both creative design and flexible furniture. That design principle of 'space adaptability and flexibility' is the catalyst to create a culture where students co-design their learning spaces supporting the district's vision of student agency.

When the facilities plan is complete, every elementary classroom in the district will have benefitted by the addition of new flexible furniture. Three elementary buildings were slated in Phase I of the furniture project and are currently experiencing the flexibility and choice it affords students in their learning. Phase II will include the remainder of elementary schools who will receive their new furniture next summer. Moving forward, flexible furniture will be added to classrooms in the district's early childhood, middle school and high school programs as items are needed.

The referendum projects that remain on the docket include classroom additions at Oneka Elementary and renovation of the current District Center to create additional classroom space for Central Middle School. Both school buildings will also see updated classrooms and media centers and safety/security upgrades.

The final piece of the comprehensive facilities plan will be completed in 2025 when the current Sunrise Park Middle School is renovated and converted for use as a home to the district's Early Childhood Center, District Office, Senior Center and Transition Education Center. This construction project will begin after the middle school has moved to the current South Campus site in 2024.

DISTRICT-WIDE INITIATIVES

School Start Time Change - Implementation of changed school start times began in the Fall of 2021 after being approved by the School Board in April of 2021. In the new schedule, elementary and early childhood students begin their school day first, followed by Transition Education Center (TEC) students, high school students and middle school students.

Key factors of the decision included:

- The change aligns with the District's Strategic Plan and with research on adolescent sleep.
- The change is consistent with a commitment the District made to the City of White Bear Lake and current WBLAHS North Campus neighborhood residents to prioritize the mitigation of traffic impact with the unified high school.
- The change allows the District to run a more efficient, three-tiered transportation system.

Attendance Boundaries Process - The District's Comprehensive Facilities Plan includes capacity additions to several elementary schools, a new elementary school in Hugo, and the conversion of the current White Bear Lake Area High School - South Campus to a middle school. These comprehensive changes necessitate the need for adjustments to attendance boundaries. A steering committee made up of district staff has been meeting since May of 2021 to develop a variety of proposals. Stakeholder committee meetings, with parents and staff serving as representatives from each district building, are taking place in December of 2021, with action expected at a Board meeting in early-2022.

2021 MN SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR HONORS



The Minnesota Association of School Administrators (MASA) named Dr. Wayne Kazmierczak, Superintendent of the White Bear Lake Area Schools (WBLAS), the 2021 Minnesota Superintendent of the Year. As the Minnesota honoree, Dr. Kazmierczak was a candidate among other state recipients for National Superintendent of the Year. Dr. Kazmierczak was selected for the state-level honor by a panel of representatives from a variety of Minnesota education organizations. Nominees were evaluated on how each candidate demonstrates leadership for learning, communication skills, professionalism, and community involvement.



He was named Superintendent of White Bear Lake Area Schools in 2017.

The honoree is active within his community. He is a member of the Rotary Club International, Vadnais Heights Economic Development Corporation, White Bear Lake Area Education Foundation, and the Minnesota School District Liquid Asset Fund Board of Trustees.

- » PARENT ALERT SYSTEM The District uses the SchoolMessenger parent alert system. The system allows for voicemail, email and text message alerts to be sent out instantaneously.
- » COMMUNITY E-NEWSLETTER The Community e-Newsletter, sent out weekly to families and community members who have subscribed, covers School Board proceedings, student and staff achievements as well as school and Community Education offerings in an every-other week text version. Videos are shared on the alternating weeks.
- » STAY SOCIAL Currently, almost 10,000 people follow the district on Facebook, Twitter or YouTube. 624 Facts are shared out through Facebook and Twitter.
- » WWW.ISD624.ORG The district launched a redesigned website in the spring of 2019 that responds to the device being used to view the informtion and is available in multiple languages.
- » VIDEOS A Community e-Newsletter Video Edition is sent twice a month. The Week in 62.4 Seconds videos highlight students learning each Friday. Individual videos are created and shared by the district as appropriate. District videos are closed captioned in both English and Spanish.
- » BEAR'S BULLETIN The district includes a community-focused bulletin that is a flip-book included in seasonal Community Services and Recreation catalogs mailed to all district residents. The piece covers District and school news, accomplishments, 624 Facts and notice of upcoming events.
- » BEAR'S UPDATE A large-format postcard is mailed to all district residents each summer. The piece covers pertinent District and school news.
- » SCHOOL BOARD COMMUNICATION The Communications Office makes School Board meeting video/audio files available to the public after each School Board meeting. The videos are closed captioned in English and Spanish. Regular White Bear Lake Area School Board meetings are also broadcast on Cable Channel 20 in the local viewing area the week of a regular business meeting.
- » COFFEE WITH DR. K Community members are invited to informal chat with Superintendent Kazmierczak over a cup of coffee at the Downtown White Bear Lake Caribou Coffee. The events are scheduled to happen periodically throughout the year.
- » DISTRICT BOOTH AT MARKETFEST Each summer, our school principals, district administrators and Board members look forward to having terrific conversations with community members at the district's summertime Marketfest booth.
- » FREE SENIOR ACTIVITIES PASS More than 300 Senior community members (those age 65+) who live in the District participate in the Senior Activities Pass program and enjoy complimentary admission to school activities.
