Eastview High School: Class of 2026 Freshman Registration Worksheet



The school year at Eastview is divided into four nine-week quarters, with seven periods per day. Students have the opportunity to **select up to 28 quarter courses** during the registration process (4 quarters x 7 periods per quarter = 28 courses). Each quarter course earns .75 credit (so successful completion of a year-long course earns .75 x 4 = 3 credits toward graduation). Ninth grade students must select a minimum of 24 courses; study halls will be assigned for remaining open periods. Actual placement of courses (including study halls) will be determined during the scheduling process.

What courses should I take?

Use this worksheet to guide your selection process. Full-year required core courses (English, Social Studies, Mathematics and Science) are listed first on page 2; choose one sequence in each category and select all four quarter courses (A/B/C/D) to meet the full-year requirement. Required PE/Wellness/Safety Ed courses are listed next. Elective choices follow, with full-year courses first (World Languages, Choir and Band), and quarter electives at the end. Some elective courses can be found in multiple departments. Courses with pre-requisites and other recommendations are identified with an "*"; complete descriptions and additional details can be found online at <u>evhs.district196.org/academics/registration</u>.
