

#### CARTER G. WOODSON – "THE FATHER OF BLACK HISTORY"

Black History Month began as "Negro History Week" which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard-educated historian.

Woodson lobbied schools and organizations to participate in a special program to encourage the study of African American history, which began in February 1926 with Negro History Week.

The month of February was selected to coincide with the birthday of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history.

Thursday, February 18, 2021


4:00 PM - 5:00 PM EST
