s you arrive on the Hill, you feel as if you are entering a collegiate university town.




The Harrow Diploma has revolutionised the School's Electives programme, which offers challenging academic options (outside exam syllabuses) in small groups. In addition, through habitual reading, extended project work, philosophical discussion and other enrichment in the curriculum, our pupils develop the freedom and confidence to think and speak independently, and to mature into precisely the candidates that admissions tutors at leading universities are seeking. Excellent grades are a given, but being an articulate, well-rounded individual with a wealth of experience both in and out of the form room sets our boys apart.

There are also seminars and society meetings on almost every night of the week. Thanks to the School's reputation and proximity to London, we are able to attract eminent speakers from all walks of life to enhance the boys' experience.

This eclectic academic diet is not just for the most academic students. We think that every Harrow boy, wherever he stands in our spectrum of ability, should be challenged, and should find education both enormously stimulating and great fun.

Virtually all our boys take up places at selective universities. Boys who are heading towards Oxbridge, Ivy League and other very competitive institutions are given specific guidance and preparation. Our Universities team works with the House Masters to ensure that each boy has the best preparation for this next step in his education.

Unique occasions like the annual cricket match against Eton at Lord's provide memorable highlights in the School year, when we take great pleasure in celebrating the success of our sportsmen.

At Harrow, we believe in the fundamental value and benefit of sport for all, and every boy is supported in gaining the maximum benefit from the sports programme, whether that is discovering new sports and learning new skills or honing and developing existing skill sets. 












arrow's list of alumni includes formidable talents in the creative and performing arts

e believe that young men who have a wide experience of co-curricular activities are better educated, better team players and more confident in expressing their talent. In short, they are more fulfilled, more employable and more interesting people.

Activities are happening all the time across every part of Harrow. We have over 80 clubs and societies for the commonest to the most niche of interests.

The Harrow Rifle Corps is one of the largest school Combined Cadet Forces in the country and has a proud record of preparing boys for scholarships in the armed services. Membership of the HRC is voluntary, but the majority of Harrovians choose to join and nearly all will compete in the Inter-House Drill Competition and the Endurance Event. Harrow's flourishing Duke of Edinburgh's Award programme enables boys to develop initiative, organisational skills and a greater sense of responsibility. Creating this busy, structured and purposeful environment ensures that young men never get bored.
















arrow's 840 boys each live in one of 12 Houses.

Every House has its unique character, with its own gardens and facilities, and they inspire fierce loyalty from the boys and from old boys who belong to them.

While appreciating the different characters of the Houses, we ensure that each has a diverse range of boys in terms of their talents, interests and backgrounds.

Common to every House is the priority and attention given to pastoral care – a major strength of the School. The House Master, Assistant House Master, Matron, House Tutors and House Visitor form a team to look after the 60 to 70 boys in the House. In addition, the Chaplaincy, the Medical Centre, a full-time Psychologist, a full-time Counsellor and a proactive Pastoral Support Committee, which includes three members of the School's Senior Management Team, provide further layers of nurturing and support.

We are, of course, an all-boys school too. We never pretend that single-sex schooling is the best way of educating everyone but, in the Harrow environment, we see certain important advantages. To some degree, in a boarding context, it helps to extend childhood in a very healthy way, enabling boys to be boys for longer. They can do boyish things and have the freedom to express themselves creatively and emotionally without feeling self-conscious or fearing how things will appear to the opposite sex.



t may seem rather daunting to arrive at a school that has produced so many Giants of Old.


But recalling how great men have walked the same streets, sat in the same form rooms and lived in the same Houses is both motivating and empowering for every boy at the School. Palmerston, Peel, Churchill, Nehru, Byron and 19 recipients of the Victoria Cross – you can only be inspired by the thought of these men maturing into adulthood at Harrow.

In the spirit of the great 19th-century reformer the 7th Earl of Shaftesbury, Harrow has a deep tradition of philanthropy and partnerships with the local community. We aim to ensure that all our boys gain an appreciation of generosity in its many forms. Knowing that leadership and service go hand in hand, we encourage Harrovians to be outward looking, to understand their privilege, and to be of good influence beyond the School.

Every boy participates in partnership or charity work, for example raising sponsorship money by running or swimming the annual Long Ducker, supporting young people in care and young carers in study groups, or working to help other young people into work or education as part of the Spear programme. This culture of caring for others is at the heart of a life well lived at Harrow.









arrow has a Christian foundation and ethos, which means that Chapel plays a significant part in the daily life of the School.

Every boy, unless he is of another world religion, attends at least one Chapel service during the week where we worship together and address the important questions of life. We have two Anglican Chaplains (one is part-time) and one Roman Catholic Chaplain. They support boys of all faiths. We continue to develop our provision for other world religions by employing part-time Chaplains for Judaism and Islam. We celebrate Diwali, enjoy regular Shabbat meals, and observe Eid for those boys who choose to do so. Roman Catholics attend a Catechism class each week.

On Sundays, boys attend either Chapel, Roman Catholic Mass, or Thought for the Day. This approach provides the boys with a secure basis from which they can embark upon, and make informed choices about, their own journeys into faith.

As well as this, the whole School gathers in Speech Room once a week; it is an important time for reflection, keeping abreast of news, lauding individual successes, and considering topical matters.

arrow is proud of its broad and varied intake. Around 80% of our boys are British, and they are come from across the UK.

The diversity of Harrow adds to the educational experience: boys with no private-school background stand side by side with those from long-established Harrow families; a boy from London or Yorkshire or the Scottish Highlands may become a close friend of someone who lives in the USA, South Africa or South Korea.

We are oversubscribed and selective, but we do not focus simply on academic performance. There are Harrovians with a range of academic ability, sporting, musical and cultural talent. Most importantly, we are looking for boys of good character, who show potential for leadership, a willingness to contribute and the ability to thrive in our full-boarding environment.



e believe that a school's success should be measured by much more than just examination grades. Many of the best parts of a Harrow education cannot be measured other than by meeting the young men themselves. Their confidence, leadership potential, ability to collaborate, desire to serve others, strength of character, creativity and imagination – these are things that really count in life and make a boy from Harrow stand out and ready to make his mark in the world.
