

## ACADEMIC Sheep Brain Dissection



Year 13 psychology students are studying brain structure and function with Dr Jolliffe, and to help them understand this amazing organ we dissected sheep brains. Students were able to relate models and diagrams to the real thing, and spot structures such as the cerebellum, cerebral cortex, brainstem and corpus callosum. All students got totally absorbed in this hands-on lesson, and this experience makes a great link to psychological studies of hemispheric lateralisation and 'split-brain' patients.

The Psychology Society (Years 12-13) created a murder mystery for the Psychology Club (Years 9-11) to solve. They were given forensic reports and questioned the 'suspects', then had to solve the murder using forensic profiling.

## Personality Testing in Psychology



Lola Milton-Jenkins, a first year French and German undergraduate at Brasenose College, Oxford, gave a fascinating presentation to our Year 11 modern linguists. She talked them through a typical week, with lectures, seminars and tutorials, as well as giving them a glimpse into the variety of co-curricular activities on offer. The students asked lots of interesting questions, ranging from the transition from school to university, the advantages of the collegiate system, whether single or dual-honours courses are better, to the year abroad experience.

## Raban Society hosts fascinating Talks



Raban Society, our academic society, enjoyed two outstanding talks this half term. The first from Catherine Rayson was a fascinating and insightful talk about language families and the factors influencing language change. Her talk provoked great interest and debate amongst the audience, which included students and staff. Recently Joe Woodward spoke about Caesar, asking us to consider whether he was a tyrant or populist. A large and supportive audience enjoyed both the talk and the ensuing discussion, where topics discussed included the depiction of Caesar in literature and whether we can draw parallels with any modern-day politicians.

Musicians performed a glorious array of James Bond themed music at our Autumn Concert. It is truly wonderful to enjoy live performance once again and see the great talent within our School.






### Wellington Young Musician



#### **COP 26**





Year 10 and 11 extended their knowledge of the UK Energy Sector in a lecture entitled The Challenge for Renewables




