We are an independent, non-sectarian college preparatory school dedicated to providing a liberal arts education, enabling each student to develop inherent ability to the fullest extent with a balance of discipline and freedom.

HISTORY

Maclay School was founded in 1968 by a group of parents who wished to provide their children with educational resources that would enable each student to develop to the fullest-academically, morally, emotionally, and physically. Originally called Capital City Day School, the school was renamed in honor of Alfred Barmore Maclay, Jr., a World War II veteran who died of polio in 1953. Over the years, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Mettler, cousins of Alfred Maclay, generously donated the land upon which the school is situated, which was formally known as Andalusia Plantation. During Maclay's firstyear, a nine-member faculty taught grades 1-8. Each year following, one grade level was added until the first class graduated in 1973.

Due to the small size of Maclay's Senior class and the school's academic rigor, Maclay does not rank students numerically.


WEIGHTING

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
SAT AVERAGE BASED ON THE 1600 SCALE
