

#### **Motivating Children to Be Active**





When children are active, their bodies can do the things they want and need them to do. Regular exercise helps children to have strong muscles and bones, controls weight, allows them to sleep better and decreases the risk of developing type 2 diabetes. Not only that, healthy and physically active children are more likely to be academically motivated, alert and successful, which leads to a strong self-esteem.

With school-age children spending more time on sedentary pursuits like watching TV and playing computer and video games, the challenge for

parents is to help children find physical activities they enjoy and feel successful doing. Activities can range from traditional sports like baseball and basketball to scouting, camping, hiking and other outdoor pursuits. Children with a great deal of athletic ability may want to be on a sports team, while those with interest but not as much ability may just enjoy shooting hoops on the driveway. Children who are not athletic are likely to need a parent's help and encouragement to remain active even though they aren't top athletic performers. A great way to see what they like is to enroll them in outdoor activities as the weather gets warmer through organizations like the Boys and Girls club or other youth groups.

No matter what your child's level of athletic ability is, remember that all children can be physically fit. Your positive attitude will help a child who is reluctant to exercise. Be active yourself and support your child's interests. As schedules start getting busy during these years, don't forget to set aside some time for free play.



#### **Recipe of the Month - Fruit Pizza**



Serves: 1

**Cups of Fruits and Vegetables per Serving:** \(\frac{1}{2}\)

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 English muffin
- 2 tablespoons whipped, fat-free strawberry cream cheese
- 1/3 cup strawberries, sliced
- 1/4 cup red grapes, quartered
- 1/4 cup canned mandarin oranges, drained

#### **Preparation\*:**

Toast the English muffin until golden brown. Spread cream cheese on toasted muffin. Arrange sliced



strawberries, grapes, and orange slices on top of the cream cheese. Slice into quarters and you'll have "yummy fruit pizza"!



Autism is a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first three years of life and affects a person's ability to communicate and interact with others. Autism is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is a "spectrum disorder" that affects individuals differently and to varying degrees. There is no known single cause of autism, but increased awareness and funding can help families today.

In March 2012, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued their ADDM autism prevalence report. The report concluded that the prevalence of autism had risen to 1 in every 88 births in the United States and to almost 1 in 54 boys. The spotlight shown on autism, as a result of the prevalence of it, has resulted in additional opportunities for the nation to consider how to serve these families facing a lifetime of supports for their children.

Currently, the Autism Society estimates that the lifetime cost of caring for a child with autism ranges from \$3.5 million to \$5 million, and that the United States is facing almost \$90 billion annually in costs for autism (this figure includes research, insurance costs and non-covered expenses, Medicaid waivers for autism, educational spending, housing, transportation, employment, in addition to related therapeutic services and caregiver costs).

#### **Know the Signs: Early Identification Can Change Lives**

Autism is treatable. Children do not "outgrow" autism, but studies show that early diagnosis and intervention lead to significantly improved outcomes.

#### Here are some signs to look for in the children in your life:

- Lack of or delay in spoken language
- Repetitive use of language and/or motor mannerisms (e.g., hand-flapping, twirling objects)
- Little or no eye contact
- Lack of interest in peer relationships
- Lack of spontaneous or make-believe play
- Persistent fixation on parts of objects





El autismo es una discapacidad de desarrollo compleja que suele aparecer durante los tres primeros años de vida y afecta la capacidad de una persona para comunicarse e interactuar con los demás. El autismo se define por un cierto conjunto de comportamientos y es un "trastorno del espectro" que afecta a los individuos de manera diferente y en grados variables. No existe una causa única conocida de autismo, pero una mayor conciencia y financiación puede ayudar a las familias de hoy. En marzo de 2012, los Centros para el Control y la Prevención de Enfermedades emitieron su informe de prevalencia de autismo ADDM. El informe concluyó que la prevalencia del autismo había aumentado a 1 en cada 88 nacimientos en los Estados Unidos ya casi 1 en 54 muchachos. El foco de atención en el autismo, como resultado de la prevalencia de la misma, ha dado lugar a oportunidades adicionales para la nación a considerar cómo servir a estas familias que enfrentan una vida de apoyo para sus hijos.

En la actualidad, la Sociedad de Autismo estima que el costo de por vida de un niño con autismo oscila entre \$ 3.5 millones y \$ 5 millones y que Estados Unidos enfrenta casi \$ 90 mil millones anualmente en costos de autismo (esta cifra incluye investigación, Gastos cubiertos, exenciones de Medicaid para autismo, gastos educativos, vivienda, transporte, empleo, además de servicios terapéuticos relacionados y costos de cuidadores).

Conozca los signos: la identificación temprana puede cambiar vidas

El autismo es tratable. Los niños no "superan" el autismo, pero los estudios demuestran que el diagnóstico y la intervención tempranos conducen a resultados significativamente mejorados. Aquí están algunas muestras a buscar en los niños en su vida:

- Falta o retraso en el lenguaje hablado
- Uso repetitivo del lenguaje y / o de los manierismos motores (por ejemplo, aleteo de manos, giros de obietos)
- Poco o ningún contacto visual
- Falta de interés en las relaciones entre compañeros
- Falta de juego espontáneo o de hacer creer
- Fijación persistente en partes de objetos

#### WHAT IS MY CHILD LEARNING IN THEIR CHARACTER EDUCATION LESSONS?

Your child is learning the Problem-Solving Steps, including how to say the problem and then think of solutions for that problem.

#### Why Is This Important?

Being able to solve problems helps children get along better with other children. Children who can solve problems are less aggressive and have fewer conflicts.

#### Ask your child:

What should you do if you are having a strong feeling before you try to solve a problem? Second Step answer: Calm down.

What are some ways you can calm down? Possible answers: Belly breathe. Count. Tell myself to calm down.

What's the **S** Problem-Solving Step? Second Step answer: S: Say the problem.

What's the **T** Problem-Solving Step, and what does it mean? Second Step answer: T: Think of solutions. Come up with safe and respectful ideas to solve the problem.

What's the **E** Problem-Solving Step, and what does it mean? Second Step answer: E: Explore consequences. Think about what could happen if you make a certain choice.

What's the **P** Problem-Solving Step? Second Step answer: P: Pick the best solution.

How has what you've learned in your Second Step lessons helped you at school?

How can you practice the skills at home so you keep getting better?

What's up next for Character Education? Careers! . . . . . .

#### 4th Grade News.....

Fourth Grade is Springing Forward!

It has been a busy Spring in fourth grade! We have been working hard on our SMARTER Reading tests and showing all the things we have learned this year. As we wrap up the third marking period it is hard to believe we only have 9 more weeks as fourth graders! The fourth grade students have been busy learning all about fractions and decimals in Math and are headed on to geometry. In Reading we are getting to be very good at summarizing and at finding the theme of the story. We are also working very hard on understanding figurative language and using context clues to help us understand what we read. In Science we have had a wonderful time learning about magnets and electricity and have done some really neat experiments. In Social Studies we have learned about the way our government is set up and how each branch works. We are moving on to understanding economics! Spring is a busy time, please make sure your student continues to read and do homework, and as the days stay light for longer, bedtimes are really important for success!

#### 5th Grade News.....

Hello families! The 5<sup>th</sup> grade students and teachers are happy Spring has arrived! Though we are approaching the end of the year, there is still a lot to accomplish to prepare our students for 6<sup>th</sup> grade.

In Language Arts, we will continue to read a variety of texts, focusing on the skills of main ideas and details, cause and effect, theme, point of view and figurative language. AR reading each night is still a requirement for all 5<sup>th</sup> graders. To help ease the students into 6<sup>th</sup> grade, encourage your child to read more chapter books. Have them share with you a quick summary of what each chapter is about after they have read it. Talking about the content will help them remember the plot and lead to great discussion about characters and new vocabulary. We will be doing some writing pieces that tie in with the reading skill, point of view, and will have some fun writing about memorable 5<sup>th</sup> grade moments.

In Math we will be preparing for the SMARTER test by working on geometry, fractions, algebraic equations, reviewing decimals and how decimals are related to fractions, measurement, multi-step word problems, and conversions. We will also be introducing some 6<sup>th</sup> grade concepts to expose our students to the skills they will be seeing next year. Continue to encourage your child to practice their math facts, and discuss with them what they are learning. Having them teach you skills and concepts is a great way to reinforce their knowledge.

In science, all classes will be experimenting with Motion and Design. This unit focuses on the basic concepts of how the design of a vehicle effects it motion. We will be talking about force, friction, push, pull, air resistance, and energy. In Social Studies we will continue talking about history. Specifically, Westward Expansion, and the Civil War.

As the weather gets warmer and "Spring Fever" begins to set in, please encourage your student to continue working hard and doing his B.E.S.T. We still have a lot of work ahead us, and together, we can ensure our students enter the 6<sup>th</sup> grade prepared, and knowledgeable. Also, healthy habits such as eating right, getting enough sleep, and proper hygiene help our students work to their fullest potential. We look forward to seeing you at our upcoming events. 
#### RTI.....

### **Smarter Testing News**



We started our Smarter testing this month. Students in grades 3, 4, and 5 participated in the ELA; Reading/Language Arts on-line assessment. Make-up testing will continue throughout the month of April. Fifth grade students will be taking DCAS Science assessment when we return from Spring Break and then Smarter Math assessment will begin in May for grades 3, 4, and 5. As you are aware, these tests are designed to provide the state with information about how proficient our students perform on this assessment and scores are compared to their peers across the state. Individual teacher accountability is tied to student growth in grades four and five. School accountability and ratings are also based on the performance of students in grades four and five. We always encourage our students to have a growth mind-set and to work their hardest when taking these assessments.

Here are some pointers to keep in mind for your child's testing days:

- Be sure your child is receiving adequate sleep. Studies show children in elementary school require 10 hours of sleep per evening.
- Make sure your child begins the day with a full tummy, if he/she does not eat at home remind them to get breakfast at school.
- Avoid confrontation. Before your child climbs on the bus, give them a big hug and a say a positive comment such as, "I know you can do it!" or "Do your best".
- Continue to work with your child on his/her academics at home. Children are expected to know a great deal and often it takes the collaboration of all of the school staff and parents to be sure that adequate learning is taking place.

### First Grade News!

First grade is currently wrapping up our science unit on Solids and Liquids. During this unit, students learned about many physical properties of solids and liquids, as well as similarities and differences between solids and liquids. Students engaged in experiments to observe whether solids roll or stack, and whether they float or sink. Students also used magnets on solids to determine whether they were magnetic. The physical properties of liquids that were observed and studied included viscosity, flow, and opaqueness. At the close of the Solids and Liquids unit, first graders will begin the final science unit of the year - Organisms. This is an exciting unit during which students learn the difference between living and nonliving, as well as what living things need to survive. Students will have the opportunity to learn this first hand by making observations on terrariums and aquariums that are kept in the classroom. Some of the living organisms that will be kept and taken care of include moss, millipedes, and pill bugs, as well as pond snails and guppies. This is an exciting unit that is sure to spark some lively conversations at home. Be sure to ask your first grader about it. ©

# Second Grade News

Spring has sprung! The temperatures are warming up and we are still hard at work! This month we are beginning three digit subtraction with regrouping in math. This can be a difficult concept for students to grasp, so be sure to look for opportunities to practice this skill at home. In Science, we will begin exploring soils and learning about what is contained in different types of soils. On April 28<sup>th</sup>, second grade will be going on a field trip to see the play, "Beauty and the Beast". Finally, spring break is right around the corner. The students have considerable time off from school and it's a wonderful time for family activities. Please remind your child to read 30 minutes a day!

# Third Grade News

Third Graders have completed their first round of Smarter Balanced Testing. Math Smarter Balanced testing is scheduled for the week of May 1<sup>st</sup>. Teachers will continue to prepare students for the math portion in both core instructional time and RTI Math time. Students are working hard on Fractions; naming unit fractions, understanding like numerators and denominators, comparing fractions and equivalent fractions. We continue to grow our knowledge of reading, writing and grammar skills during ELA instruction. In Social Studies, we are working on Geography. Students are learning about the continents and oceans that make up our world along with map skills, states, landforms and regions. Thank you for your continued support and encouragement!

# Fourth Grade News

The fourth grade will begin to explore Land & Water. We will create stream tables to analyze the effects of water on the land structures. In addition, we will analyze the process of sediments settling in water. The students will bulldoze the dirt after each experiment to observe all of the different aspects of the water erosion. During this unit we will review the water cycle as well as build on what students have learned previously.

# Fifth Grade PAW News

Hello Fifth Grade Families! Spring has begun to bloom! While we are excited about the sweet smell of flowers and fresh cut grass, we are also excited that our students' bright minds are continuing to grow in our classrooms. You can support that growth over spring break as well! Take your child on a nature walk to observe all of the different plants and animals in that ecosystem. While walking, discuss how the plants and animals are interdependent, what kinds of human activity may interrupt that ecosystem, and talk about how your child could design a solution to that potential problem. Another supportive activity would be to have some fun in the kitchen. Work together to make tea or lemonade solutions with different amounts of solute (powder). While you are stirring, chat about the powder dissolving and how you could separate it back out. Then, discuss which of the solutions is more concentrated. Create your own trail mix mixture, and discuss why that may be easier to separate than your tea or lemonade mixture. How about taking a picnic? You could discuss the different types of soils and sands in our area and how they would affect water drainage differently. On your way home from the picnic discuss the design of your car, and how different designs make things more or less aerodynamic. Finally, as you are putting your child to bed and turning off the light, have a quick discussion about open and closed circuits. What had to be true of the circuit to make the light go on, and how could it be turned off? Thanks again for all of your support at home, a true partnership is the best way to help our students reach their full potential.





### **Multiple Intellegences**

This past month, our students have been delving deeper into their art and music skills. Adding artistic details to their previous art pieces, honing their techniques (such as brush control, "loading " paint onto the brush correctly), working with various mediums (watercolor, tempera, cray-pas, etc.), creating tone and value in a musical performance, and playing longer pieces of music (as well as ostinatos) are a few of the skills our Ross students have been practicing. In M.I. art, our fifth graders began their pace car design entries for their submissions to the Dover Downs Monster Mile Pace Car design contest. Students were given the option of finishing the design and returning it to class so they could claim their reward – two free tickets to the June 3 NASCAR race in Dover. That's like being paid for your artwork! 56 Ross students will be "paid" once the tickets are mailed to our school. Meanwhile, keep your fingers crossed that one student will have his or her design chosen to adorn this year's pace car for the race. We had excellent submissions with some outstanding design features.

#### From the Nurse

Spring is here...IT's time to GO outside and MOVE...Make it a family thing and enjoy the fresh air and having family time...So get off that couch go play ball, ride a bike or do some walking. Not only will it help your heart, help you shed some unwanted pounds but it will also help your mood, improve your self-esteem, improve family bonding. When you are done remember to replenish your body with WATER, not soda.

Simple ways to help you get started on MOVING...

- Instead of riding to school, walk or ride your bike if you can and you
  as the parent or quardian walk or ride with your child
- Instead of the elevator, take the steps
- Instead of watching TV after dinner, take a walk or go out in the yard and toss a ball or Frisbee or walk the dog...

## These are a few suggestions, WHAT can you come up with that you can do yourself or with your family to get you MOVING...

Whether we ride the bus, walk to school, ride our bike we must think of **SAFETY** too!

#### When Walking Teach safe behaviors:

Look left, right and left again before crossing the street. Cross when the street is clear, and keep looking both ways while crossing. Walk, don't run. Cross at the crosswalk or stoplight.

- · Understand and obey traffic signals and signs.
- Walk facing traffic, on sidewalks or paths, so that you can see oncoming cars. If there are no sidewalks, walk as far to the left as possible.

#### Practice safe behaviors:

- Don't allow a child under age 10 to cross streets alone as he may not be able to fully appreciate the speed of cars on the road.
- Require children to carry a flashlight at night, dawn and dusk. Add
  retro reflective materials to children's clothing so that a child can be
  seen by motorists, even in the dark.
- Don't let kids play in driveways, unfenced yards, streets or parking lots. Drivers may not see or anticipate children playing.

#### Bicycle Safety TIPS:

#### Before riding:

- Properly fit your child's helmet and ensure he always wears it when riding, skating or scooting. THIS THE LAW.
- Inspect bicycles, scooters and skateboards to ensure that reflectors are secure, brakes work properly, gears shift smoothly, and tires are tightly secured and properly inflated.

#### During riding:

- Actively supervise children.
- Avoid riding bikes, skateboard or scooters in and around cars.
- Practice bike safety: learn the rules of the road, wear reflective clothes and stickers, and ride on sidewalks when possible.

- Shoe laces must be tied. They can become tangled in the wheels and pedals.
- Wide leg pants can get caught in wheels and pedals too. Use tape to hold pant legs snug around your ankles.

#### After riding:

Maintain equipment properly.

SPEAKING OF SAFETY, WHAT ABOUT THE BUS, REVIEW THESE SAFETY RULES WITH YOUR CHILD:

- DO NOT PUSH OR CROWD WHEN STANDING IN LINE FOR THE BUS-WHEN LINING UP STAY AT LEAST 10 FEET BACK FROM THE CURB
- DO NOT GOOF OFF OR HORSE PLAY WHILE AT THE BUS STOP
- DO NOT STAND ON THE EDGE OF CURB WHEN BUS IS COMING.
   WAIT FOR THE BUS TO COME TO COMPLETE STOP
- WHEN YOU GET ON THE BUS, STAY IN YOUR SEAT, BEHAVE, KEEP YOUR HANDS TO YOURSELF, TALK IN A QUIET SOFT VOICE
- WHEN YOU ARE GETTING OFF OF THE BUS, STAY IN YOUR SEAT UNTIL THE BUS COMES TO A COMPLETE STOP, NO PUSHING OR SHOVING
- WAIT FOR THE BUS DRIVER TO TELL YOU IT IS OK TO CROSS THE STREET

REMEMBER TO MOVE IT, MOVE IT...BUT REMEMBER SAFETY AND HAVE FUN.


