

Honoring the family and Mexican tradition

Return of in-person "Day of the Dead" event in Cicero brings back live entertainment, arts, community engagement

Cicero, III. — **Oct. 21, 2021** — Following last year's move to an entirely virtual program honoring Day of the Dead, Cicero District 99 is proud to announce the in-person return of its popular, in-person "Dia de los Muertos" event, celebrating all things community, Mexican culture and history, entertainment and education.

The event, which will be held from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 30 at Unity Junior High School (2115 S. 54th Ave., Cicero), will feature Mexican history food, classic songs from youth singers, mariachi and folkloric dancers, and an exhibition of nearly 150 xoloitzcuintli (xolos, or Mexican hairless dogs) handmade by dozens of District 99 families using wire, air dry clay and paint, in tribute to the animal's reverence as a spirit guide to the kingdom of the dead.

Attendees of Dia de los Muertos will vote for fan favorite artwork, and a special judges panel, including Chicago's Consul General of Mexico Reyna Torres Mendivil and representatives from the Cicero Mexican Cultural Committee, will select 10 semifinalists and top three winners.

"We are very happy that guidelines and the proper health and safety protocols have allowed for our district to bring back this coveted community program in-person," said Dr. Aldo Calderin, superintendent for District 99. "As always, our goal with this event is to honor children and childhood while increasing school and community engagement."

Dia de los Muertos, a holiday which originates from Mexico, is a multi-day celebration which involves family and friends coming together to pray for and remember loved ones who have passed away, helping support the spiritual journeys of the deceased.

Additional fun will be provided by guest emcee Omar Ramos of Univision Radio Chicago — who hosted last year's virtual program — along with children's book giveaways and raffles to focus on the importance of biliteracy and celebration of Hispanic culture.

"It is important the community is reminded of the District's dedication to not only culture, but promotion of literacy which honors their home language and promotion of cultural responsiveness," said Isabel Ramirez, District 99's parent outreach liaison.
