





by Suzanne Slade (ages: 4 - 8)



by Traci Todd (ages: 5 - 8)


This is the story of little Eunice who grew up to become the acclaimed singer Nina Simone and her bold, defiant, and exultant legacy.

by Leah Henderson (ages: 5 - 9)



by Barry Wittenstein (ages: 8 - 12)




An anthology of stories from seventeen bestselling, critically acclaimed Black authors that spotlights the many ways Black boys find joy as they learn and grow in the world.

This informational picture book recounts the historical events of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre, one of the worst incidents of racial violence in United States history.




Dovey Undaunted: A Black **Woman Breaks Barriers in the** Law, the Military, and the Ministry

Tracing Dovey Johnson Roundtree's life


from her childhood in Jim Crow North Carolina through her adulthood, Tonya Bolden illuminates a little-known figure in American history who believed the law should serve the people.

by Wade Hudson (ages: 10+)



by Barack Obama (ages: 13+)


Adapted for young adults, this memoir offers a look at Barack Obama's early days, tracing the future 44th President's odyssey through family, race, and identity.

edited by Ibi Zoboi (ages: 13+)


This anthology features short stories from some of the most acclaimed, bestselling Black authors writing for teens today about what it is to be young and Black in America.



by Annette Gordon-Reed (ages: adult)


