Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee (BAC),

I am writing in response to the published Beaverton School District High School Boundary "Springboard" Proposal as well as in response to the overall redistricting process.

I am a licensed civil engineer with over a decade of experience in this region as a Project Manager for major transportation projects. I am familiar with Public Process, alternatives analysis, land use, comprehensive plans, capital improvements, developer agreements, traffic analysis, traffic signal warrants, safety projects and public funding (federal, state, local). I share all of the information above because, based on my experience, I have found several things with the set-up of the redistricting process concerning.

The technical team lacks a Land Use planner and/or a traffic engineer. As of the writing of this letter/document, the Washington County Traffic Department, City of Beaverton Traffic Department and ODOT had NOT been notified of the boundary changes (source: personal communication with all three agencies). I requested traffic information used for the proposed "springboard" map via the Boundary Adjustment Comments email address and I was told that Transportation would be discussed at an upcoming meeting and that this was very early in the process (source response email – attached). I find that hard to believe. The targeted goal for a recommendation is a few months away and the committee only meets once a month to discuss this process. The information I offer below has taken me about 15 hours to compile and write up, for just one area of concern, with my already established experience in this technical field. A proposal this large would take 9 months to a year typically to complete its process. So either there has been a lot of back analysis/work completed prior to the "springboard" map being issued, and perhaps the BAC being established, or the topic of Transportation will not be properly addressed through this process with respect to the BAC criteria of Safety, Traffic, and Proximity to School.

I request copies of all communication on all draft concepts of the redistricting maps prior to the creation of the "springboard" map, and prior to the creation of the BAC, along with the date they were created and who created them.

The following comments, analysis and questions were compiled in consultation with a Land Use Planner, formerly of Washington County, and two traffic engineers. One of the traffic engineers worked for the consultant who completed the Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA) for the new South Cooper Mountain High School. They concur that from a planning, land use and traffic perspective the "sylvan highlands/west slope/cedar mill" neighborhood would remain in the current alignment with Sunset High School (SHS).

The following comments, analysis and questions relate to the BAC Primary criteria of **Proximity to School/Neighborhood Unity /Safety** (3 of 4) as well as the secondary criteria of **Transportation Costs** and **Feeder School Alignment** (2 of 5).

The freeway serves as a neighborhood and circulation boundary. Trips from the "sylvan highlands/west slope/cedar mill" neighborhood (also otherwise known as the West TV/Cedar Mill Elementary Area), or The Area in Orange North of The Freeway on the Springboard Map, to Beaverton High School qualify as Out of Neighborhood Circulation and these trips introduce inconsistent traffic into the patterns in the City of Beaverton. Inconsistent traffic causes an increase in accidents because these are not routes regularly traveled for other needs such as shopping and errands. Additionally, there is only one north-south cross circulation route (Cedar Hills Blvd) that does not involve freeways, a major interchange or state routes. Good Practices of community planning attempt to keep trips at the appropriate road classification. Neighborhood trips should remain on collectors and arterials and not be introduced into the freeway system if possible. The "springboard" map as proposed does not follow these Good Practices.

The following is a comparison of the traffic volumes for travel between West TV/Cedar Mill and Beaverton High School vs West TV/Cedar Mill and Sunset High School*:

To BHS:

US 26 121,222 Average Daily Traffic/Trips (ADT)

OR 10 29,146 ADT

OR 8 27,485 ADT

Cedar Hills Blvd 15,000-40,000 ADT (approximate range)

To Sunset:

Cornell Road 15,000 ADT (approximate value)

Barnes Road 15,000 ADT (approximate value)

The roadways to Sunset High School, Cornell Road and Barnes Road, have traffic volumes that are half or one/tenth of the routes to Beaverton High School. They are also County arterials which would be the appropriate road classification for these types of trips.

(*ADT and traffic data obtained from ODOT publications, ODOT website, Washington County Transportation website and the City of Beaverton website. ADT is for the years 2013 or 2014, whichever was more recent.)

The following is a comparison of the accident rates for intersections encountered for travel between West TV/Cedar Mill and Beaverton High School vs West TV/Cedar Mill and Sunset High School:

To BHS using Cedar Hills Blvd:

4 intersections (beginning at Walker Road, ending at Farmington Road): 33 accidents


To BHS using Cornell Road:

3 intersections (beginning at Murray Blvd, ending at Science Park): 13 accidents

The intersections encounters for travel along Cedar Hills Blvd have 2.5 times more accidents than Cornell Road. This comparison did not include the US 26/Cedar Hills Blvd un-signalized interchange for which the dangers have been documented through several TV/news articles. Again, the route along Cornell Road is safer even when comparing it with a route to BHS that is of the same road classification.

The accident data is even more relevant to the analysis of High School Boundaries when considering the following information: In 2013 in the state of Oregon, 16.5% of all crashes involved a driver between the ages of 15-20. (source: ODOT. 2013 Oregon Motor Vehicle Traffic Crashes Quick Facts) The boundaries proposed with have students facing long bus rides, close to the maximum allowable 45 minutes each way, for the most NE corner of the West TV/Cedar Mill area and that will put pressure on families to have more student drivers on the roadway.

Personal communication with both the City of Beaverton traffic engineer as well as ODOT yields the following results for the immediate area surrounding BHS.



Simplified – all dots are bad. Purple dots are the worst of the worst. They indicate sites that are in the top 5% for the state in terms of a disproportionate amount of accidents vs traffic volumes.

Neither public agency (ODOT or City of Beaverton) has the ability to add capacity at these intersections or corridors. Beaverton intersections are already at capacity (0.98/1.0). The City of Beaverton traffic engineer shared that with an increase of traffic heading south on Cedar Hills Blvd AND traffic staying the same or increasing on Canyon/Farmington (BHS boundaries as proposed would pull the majority of its

traffic from the north and east now instead of the south) the signals will reach capacity and drivers will resort to "finding their own way" through neighborhoods to get to their destination. This creates again an unsafe condition because out of neighbor trips (the West TV/Cedar Mill neighborhood) have been introduced into neighborhood roadways that are not equipped to handle the additional volume.

For comparison, Cornell Road is not considered a "safety corridor" and does not have any warrants for safety projects like what is depicted above. (source: Washington County traffic department)

This increase in congestion and decrease in safety could be avoided, or significantly mitigated, by leaving the West TV/Cedar Mill area in the Sunset High School boundary.

From the BSD Transportation webpage:

"The Beaverton School District has the largest publically owned fleet in the state of Oregon, consisting of 315 active buses. We provide home to school service to approximately 30,000 students each day. In addition to daily routes, we also provide service for field trips, athletic events, and various after-school programs. Our buses travel over 3,000,000 miles annually."

Additionally from the BSD website:

"Approximately 15-25% of morning traffic is generated by parents driving their kids to school."

Bus traffic affects the AM commute, but also high school events (sports, concerts, plays, meetings) impact the evening commute. The TSA for the new high school showed sports are played every night of the week for the entire school year with practices and games typically between 5-7pm, which is the middle of the PM Peak traffic.

The BHS principal after the session with the "springboard" map voiced specific concerns about students traveling from the north side of US 26 while the SHS principal remarked on the improved proximity for SHS (removal of trips from the south side of US 26). Both principals are voicing, in my opinion, the same concern. The freeway serves as a significant barrier that affects the way the schools and bussing function.

The traffic impacts based on this redistricting are regional and significant, so.....

Why are other public entities, City of Beaverton, Washington County and ODOT, not being consulted when BSD is changing traffic patterns for an entire region?

Why is the BSD not conducting a Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA) to assess the impact of redistricting on the region and its facilities?

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOLS

BSD participates in the Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS) program. A Federally and State supported program dedicated to assisting communities in identifying and reducing barriers and hazards to school children, K-12, in walking and bicycling to school.

Cities and Counties pursue federal grants in support of SRTS to connect sidewalks, trail systems and bicycle paths. Redistricting of schools affect these funding partners and their project lists. Washington County just completed an asphalt path along Leahy Road. Developers are adding sidewalk to Cornell Road. The recently completed Roger Tilbury Memorial Park by THPRD adds trails. The Timberland development and new middle school site will also be conditioned as part of development approval to provide sidewalks and paths. These improvements result in a reasonable SRTS option for the entire West TV/Cedar Mill area for K-12.

The BSD SRTS webpage and handouts promote SRTS as a tool for promoting Health, **Safety**, Learning, Environment, and **Community**.

Below are some excerpts from BSD's own SRTS webpage on the benefits of safe routes to school as well as the impact school traffic has on a region:

"Ease Traffic congestion and improve air quality near the school. Improve the sense of community."

"Safety: Approximately 15-25% of morning traffic is generated by parents driving their kids to school. More traffic often means more congestion and less safe travel environments for everyone."

"Community: By walking, bicycling and rolling to school, children encounter each other (and their other neighbors) on the way to school, increasing the feeling of community and social support."

On the November 2015 updates page West Tualatin View Elementary was listed as the school with the highest participation rate (69%) in the District for the Walk/Bike/Roll to school day in October. It was raining that day too for the record.

Removal of this community, a community that just demonstrated its strong desire to support walk/bike to school programs, by the BSD from the Sunset High School boundary cuts them off from participating fully in the SRTS program from K-12 grade and all the benefits listed above. Those benefits also happen to be criteria set for the BAC (Safety, Neighborhood Unity, Proximity to School, Feeder School Alignment) in developing the new school boundaries. It also undermines the overall purpose of several recent public improvement projects that have created a reasonable SRTS option for this community from elementary, to (proposed) middle school and finally high school.

What message is BSD sending students when they are encouraged as young children from K to 8th grade to consider walking and biking options of transportation, but when they are of age to independently act on these modes of transport they are forced into a 45 minute bus ride or a car commute, contributing to congestion on a significantly less safe route?

Based on the analysis above, shifting the West TV/Cedar Mill area to BHS scores poorly, frankly almost to the point of Fatal Flaw if not at least a red flag for further in depth analysis, on 3 of the 4 main criteria and 2 of the 5 secondary criteria. Less than 50% positives.

Why does the "springboard" map even show the West TV/Cedar Mill area attending BHS?

Further, the "springboard" map shows all of the schools about 97% capacity (except the new high school) only 3 years (year 2020) after this plan is implemented. Using the typical growth models of 2%

per year for this region, the high schools will all be over capacity again in 2021. Why create all of this disruption and permanent impacts to regional traffic for a plan that is not sustainable?

By leaving both West TV Elementary and Cedar Mill Elementary fully aligned with Sunset High School the BSD has an opportunity to reduce its contribution to regional congestion, support its own SRTS program, be a good steward of public funds and a good public partner, save transportation costs, limit disruptions to the school start, limited disruptions to its own students and most importantly reduce the accident risk for its students and families.

I am happy to meet with any of the committee members if they would like to discuss this analysis further. I would also like to thank all of the committee members for volunteering to be a part of this challenging process.

Thank you for your consideration. I look forward to your response.



I have attended almost every boundary adjustment meeting and I have not heard or seen any information that demonstrates any safety metrics are being used in the boundary adjustment process. The BSD School Attendance Areas Policy, a legally binding document, lists safety as primary criteria along with availability of space, proximity to school and neighborhood unity.

So again, I offer information that perhaps could be used for that analysis.

How were the 2020 total school capacities determined? They are significantly higher than the existing "permanent" capacities and also higher than the total capacities published in both the 2010 Capital Facilities Plan and the May 2015 traffic analysis for the South Copper Mountain High School.

The 2010 Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) states that 2 new high schools are required by 2025 (or 1 new high school and 2 new option schools). The student population projection of 12,104 used in the boundary adjustment process is LOWER than the one in the CFP. The CFP estimates 12,584 students in 2020 and 13,449 by 2025 using the middle range population model. Applying a growth rate of 1.4%, as recommended by the CFP, to the projected student population for 2020 used in the boundary adjustment process still shows all the high schools will be over populated again by 2025. Most will be over capacity by 2022, just 5 years after this boundary adjustment take effect. These population projections do not take into account the needs of new PE facilities as well starting in 2017 which also lead to the need for 2 new high schools – specifically called out as one high school in the south district and one high school in the north district – in the CFP. Why are district wide disruptions being proposed when the result is not sustainable, does not fully comply with the needs listed in the Capital Facilities Plan and likely will require another high school district boundary adjustment in less than 10 years?

The clip below shows points where accidents are at a disproportionately high rate when compared to other facilities of the same classification, carrying the same traffic volumes. Yellow is bad, Pink is very bad and Purple is worst of the worst.



Beaverton High School is in the middle one of the largest clusters outside of Portland. When comparing the locations of the 6 high schools, Aloha High School is located in the spot with the second highest amount of SPIS sites in the vicinity. Note that Bethany Blvd does not have any SPIS sites. Again, quoting from my previous letters – the morning commute is approximately 20% parents and students traveling to schools for drop off and 16.5% of all accidents in the state of Oregon in 2013 involved a teenage driver. While on paper it may seem like there is available capacity at these two schools, functionality of school operations and SAFETY, may limit the actual capacity.

The City of Beaverton already has concerns about parking around Beaverton High School with the existing boundaries and student population (source: personal communication with the Public Works Director). There has been talk of the need to partner to build a parking structure to help with the existing school parking needs. Beaverton High School also has the most limited bus holding space. The CFP notes the requirement to consider "support facilities", such as parking spaces, in capacity calculations. It also notes that these "support facilities" restrict the district's flexibility to responding to overcrowding. How is this being addressed specifically in the analysis of Beaverton High School's future "availability of space" or capacity?

The following safety grades for Beaverton School District's high schools are from the school ranking website K12.niche.com. The 2016 rankings "incorporates statistics and student, alumni, and parent surveys regarding health and safety at the school".

Sunset HS

Grade of B+ for safety

Southridge HS

Grade of B for safety

Westview HS

Grade of B- for safety

Beaverton HS

Grade of C+ for safety

Aloha HS

Grade of C for safety

Overcrowding (or approaching maximum capacity) for the high schools located in the "middle" is worse than overcrowding of the northern, or southern, schools because it exasperates the existing safety issues. These are the two schools that are most affected by traffic and accidents. They are already the two schools that score the lowest on Health and Safety. They are also the two Beaverton high schools that have the lowest overall ranks based on this survey and many others. Funding that will be required to mitigate these ongoing safety issues takes away from resources that could be used to improve overall performance at the schools.

The following are my comments and concerns with the July 27, 2016 High School Boundary Adjustment Update & Next Steps Memorandum presented at the August 1, 2016 Beaverton School District Board Meeting.

Methodology for calculating cost differential between routes (focus on the West TV Boundary)

The cost differential presented does not capture all of the costs associated with the shift of West TV to BHS from SHS. The \$8,160 increase in cost is the minimum. As the traffic increases on the route that the buses will take to BHS, predicted to be 6% increase per year (source: ODOT), and with no improvements programmed for OR 217 between US 26 and OR 8/10 (source: ODOT) the delta between the cost of traveling to SHS vs BHS will continue to increase each year.

One of the buses on the West TV to SHS route continues on to service West TV Elementary in the afternoon. That bus is late regularly (we receive text messages) and the cause cited is delays from completing the high school bus route. Will a new bus need to be added to service West TV elementary school if there are already delays with the shorter distance traveled? That cost should be added to the differential outlined in the analysis. Will any of the other elementary schools/middle schools require additional bus routes as a result of the redistricting of the high schools? Those costs should be included in this boundary adjustment analysis and factored into the criteria of "transportation cost".

The cost calculations also do not factor in the indirect and cumulative costs that BSD is causing local and state agencies. By changing traffic patterns for the region, specifically for high schools with their nightly and weekend activities, BSD has a responsibility to demonstrate they are not increasing costs and demands on infrastructure.

2. Walking Routes/Proximity to School

The radius map proposed and discussion narratives do not present the full picture. The walking areas of each of the middle schools and elementary schools should also be considered. The areas north of US 26 from Sunset High School east to the new Timberland Middle School and east to the large portion of the West TV elementary school boundary do present a contiguous network of walking and biking options which are all within the recommended 2.5 mile radius. No portion of residential area for the West TV boundary is within the BHS 2.5 mile radius. You are eliminating the multimodal option completely for 10% of the proposed BHS population.

3. Student Population Projection Discussion

The following statements were made in the July 27, 2016 memorandum: "While Options schools can, and have, been helpful in alleviating overcrowding at the high school level, the District does not consider Options schools to be a capacity relief system...Finally, it isn't possible to predict what the Options programs will consist of in 2020."

These statements are inconsistent with the BSD 2002 and 2010 School Facility Plans.

Below are excerpts from the 2010 document. Issue Paper #12 Land Needs for the Facility Plan:

This paper reviews findings from Issue Paper #8 about projected enrollment and the amount of school facility capacity needed through 2025, and compares the facility needs to land already owned by the District to yield a net land need to accommodate anticipated enrollment growth.

Findings of facility needs through 2025 based on projected enrollment and desired school sizes for the 2010 Facility Plan (Issue Paper #8).

Table 1 of the document outlines that 1 or 2 new high schools will be needed by 2025 and 2 or 0 new option schools will be needed by 2025. And the Conclusion section states "In addition to sites that the District already owns...and either one new comprehensive high school site AND two new Options schools or two new comprehensive high school sites will be needed by 2025."

The statements quoted above completely conflict the analysis and methodology used for the school facility plan, which is what the bond funding was based on and is what all of the land use and comprehensive planning for the region is based on.

In conclusion, the capacity does exist for West TV elementary to remain aligned with Sunset High School. There is an unnecessary cost to BSD and the region to send those students to BHS and lost opportunities for multimodal transportation options.

Issue Paper #12: Land Needs for the Facility Plan

1. Introduction

Pursuant to the school facility planning statute, ORS 195.110, Beaverton School District must conduct an analysis to determine the land needed to implement the recommendations of the facility plan:

(b) Based on the elements described in paragraph (a) of this subsection and applicable laws and rules, the school facility plan must also include an analysis of the land required for the 10-year period covered by the plan that is suitable, as a permitted or conditional use, for school facilities inside the urban growth boundary.

This paper reviews findings from Issue Paper #8 about projected enrollment and the amount of school facility capacity needed through 2025, and compares the facility needs to land already owned by the District to yield a net land need to accommodate anticipated enrollment growth. The estimates of land needs are based on previous Committee discussions of site size ranges and characteristics (Issue Paper #7). Additionally, locations for these land needs are identified using information regarding buildable land and expected growth from the City of Beaverton and Washington County as well as earlier analysis about attendance areas with enrollment levels that currently exceed the amount of available space (Issue Paper #4A).

It is important to note that this paper estimates land needs based on the premise that needed capacity will be provided by *new schools*. It is understood that the Committee has discussed and recommended other means of providing capacity such as more efficient use of school sites, school expansions, use of portable classrooms, and boundary adjustments. In this way, the land needs estimated in this paper can serve as an approximate upper limit of land that will be needed through 2025. A true upper limit would include the amount of additional facility capacity that will be needed for Physical Education (PE) requirements due to take effect in 2017. However, those impacts are currently difficult to determine and the amount of additional facility capacity that will be needed to meet future PE requirements is unknown at this time. District staff will continue to study the potential implications of these requirements.

2. Facility Needs and Land Needs

Facility needs and land needs are summarized by school level in Table 1. The table presents the following information:

- Findings of facility needs based on projected enrollment and desired school sizes from the 2002 Facility Plan.
- Increases in capacity supply made between the 2002 Facility Plan and the 2010 update (including new schools built, school expansions, and sites purchased).

- 3. Findings of facility needs through 2025 based on projected enrollment and desired school sizes for the 2010 Facility Plan (Issue Paper #8).
- 4. The difference between projected facility needs and site supply, or the number of new sites needed.
- 5. An estimate of the land needed through 2025 for the net number of sites needed, based on site size ranges and characteristics (Issue Papers #7 and #7A). For additional analysis of minimum site size needs, please see the tables integrating District, Metro, and LEED guidelines in Issue Paper #7A.
- 6. The general location of needed sites.

The following considerations were made when estimating the location of needed facilities:

- Elementary schools Maps from Issue Paper #4A show that the Oak Hills, Barnes, and Vose schools have the highest occupancy rates in the District. These attendance areas are generally central to the District and growth that the City of Beaverton expects through infill and redevelopment in central Beaverton will add to this demand.
- Middle schools Central and northern attendance areas, particularly Meadow Park, feature the highest occupancy rates in the District. Another high occupancy concentration occurs in the Conestoga attendance area in the south District.
- **High schools** The two high schools in the north Sunset and Westview have the highest occupancy rates in the District. Potential and anticipated growth in the area of the former Teufel nursery site, the Barnes/Peterkort area, and the North Bethany area (both land inside the UGB and in newly designated Urban Reserves) will add to demand in the north.
 - Aloha and Southridge High Schools in the south are also expected to have high occupancy rates in 2010-2011 (from 95-105%). Growth is expected to continue in the Aloha area outside the City of Beaverton and there are significant areas of infill, redevelopable, and vacant land as well as Urban Reserves in the south.
- Options schools These schools are not subject to the same attendance area boundaries as are the other traditional schools. There is typically a competitive application process to attend them. Without the same attendance area restrictions, there is more flexibility in siting Options schools/programs. District-owned sites that do not fit the locational needs of the traditional schools may be potential sites for Options schools. Of the three sites that the District owns north of the Sunset Highway, for example, two may provide land for elementary schools and one for an Options school.

Ancillary Facilities

As presented in Issue Paper #6 and the presentation on ancillary facilities at Meeting #3, there is not a systematic method of evaluating the adequacy of ancillary facilities. Further, in a qualitative assessment, almost all of the facilities – administration, maintenance, and warehousing – are projected to be inadequate by 2025. Where facilities are found to be inadequate, this may correspond to a need to expand, significantly renovate, or replace the facility. The Committee has strongly recommended that the District develop a systematic way of assessing ancillary facility conditions and scaling future ancillary facility needs to growth in enrollment.

3. Conclusion

As presented in Table 1, it is estimated that an additional 42 to 90 acres would be needed for new schools in the District by 2025 (with portable classrooms) and from 56 to 130 acres (without portable classrooms). In addition to sites that the District already owns, three new elementary schools, one middle school, and either one new comprehensive high school site and two new Options schools or two new comprehensive high schools sites will be needed by 2025. There also may be land needed for new ancillary facilities but that will be determined in further study that the Committee has recommended.

The projected need to be addressed through 2025 is different from the need projected in the 2002 Facility Plan. The District's work over the last eight years building new schools, expanding capacity at existing schools, adding portables, and adjusting attendance boundaries has gone a long way towards addressing the need identified in 2002.

The District has used school expansions, portables, and boundary adjustments to increase capacity and will likely continue to use these means to some extent. However, it is acknowledged that the Committee has also recommended that the District conduct a site-by-site analysis to assess and explore if existing school sites can be used more creatively and efficiently. The findings from this analysis – as well as analysis conducted during bond program development – may reveal other ways to increase or reallocate capacity without the need to construct additional schools.

It is also understood that there are PE requirements that will be enacted in 2017 and that these requirements will have significant facility implications for some schools. However, it is not yet clear how to estimate and assess these impacts, and the District will intends to evaluate the implications of the requirements. Until then, the estimated land needs in this paper can be considered as the "approximate" upper bound of potential land needs through 2025 given the unknown facility implications of future additional PE requirements.

With these important caveats, Committee consensus is sought for using the findings in Table 1 of this paper as to the anticipated amount of land and number of sites that the District will need through 2025.

Were the objectives met?

Relieve current and projected future overcrowding (five years out) targeting capacity rates of 90%.

This was not achieved. The population projection used in the boundary analysis has significant errors that have been confirmed by the PSU demographer as well as BSD's own demographer. The errors push Westview High School over 100% capacity in the forecasted year while the other schools are underutilized and students are being transferred from existing high schools unnecessarily. Therefore the proposed boundaries do not meet the objective of optimizing the capacity rates to 90%.

Note — the initially proposed Springboard map by BSD staff, dated October 28, 2015, actually did meet this target. The preferred alternative maps proposed by the BSD community through the interactive map tool also are closer to meeting this target.

Reduce transitions for students.

This was not achieved.

See comments above. The proposed boundaries transition significantly more students than necessary because the population data used is incorrect.

Note again, the initially proposed Springboard map by BSD staff, dated October 28, 2015, actually did meet this target because the approach used to build the map started with reducing transitions as an objective. The preferred alternative maps proposed by the BSD community through the interactive map tool also meet this target.

The "Grandfathering" as proposed actually requires the majority of the current 7th grade students across the district to transition through **three schools in three years** (8th grade at the middle school level, 9th grade at one high school, 10th grade at another high school). BSD has put on several internal trainings about transient student population and the negatively effects this situation has on the learning environment, yet they are inducing that on an unnecessary level into their own district with this boundary adjustment. BSD has also not provided the support system for these students to make decisions about their curriculum paths to navigate through three different schools.

Did the Superintendent (and the BAC) apply the criteria?

This was not achieved.

The BAC very blatantly did not apply the criteria as required by the JC Policy. Stuart Hall told me personally, along with a group of other parents, that the only criteria that mattered were Capacity and Free and Reduced Lunch population (F&RL) - which I assume what the interpretation of "social economic" because FR&L is not actually a criteria. Stuart Hall also told the community at the open

house that the Aloha representatives were only interested in not increasing the F&RL population at their high school. Emails published last week online through a complaint letter filed against BSD confirm this, again very blatantly.

The BAC meetings did not involve any data analysis - particularly regarding safety and transportation costs. Both BAC members and technical committee staff told me it was very difficult for them to try to quantify the safety criteria. I asked the technical team if they could provide information regarding transportation costs, because it could be made available, but I was told that the BAC had to request the data. The one time I heard the BAC request data, walking maps and current travel routes to a certain high school, the facilitator admonished the group for asking for information and creating extra work for the technical committee.

Superintendent Rose's April 19, 2016 analysis of the how the criteria was applied to develop the recommended boundaries is poorly constructed, lacks supporting technical data and does not demonstrate that the criteria has been applied.

Availability of Space & Economical Use of Building

The forecasted space available is completely different than in any existing BSD document, particularly it's Capital Facilities Plan (which several staff involved in the Boundary Adjustment Process didn't even know existed). That determination was made by principals interpreting what they believe was usable space for each high school. That process seems subjective and has lots of liability attached. So there should be questions about the actual amount of space available to start.

The population projection used in the boundary analysis has significant errors that have been confirmed by the PSU demographer as well as BSD's own demographer. The errors push Westview High School over 100% capacity in the forecasted year while the other schools are underutilized and students are being transferred from existing high schools unnecessarily.

Conclusion: The criteria cannot be met. The data used for both the space and population components could (does) contain errors which mean the basis for the analysis is inaccurate.

Neighborhood Unity & Feeder School Alignment

The proposed boundaries do not support the factors for consideration under this criterion. I didn't read in Superintendent Rose's narrative how they were applied. There are no statements about how any of these Neighborhood Unity criteria were applied except with the inference that some elementary schools were kept together.

Residential area that are contained within major arterial and collector roads/streets or within
natural features (wetlands, streams, green spaces, topographic variations, etc)
Approximately 10% of the proposed BHS student population will be "cut off" from the
rest of its boundary by US 26. US 26 is a major FREEWAY (which supersedes arterials

and collectors). That area also has significant topographic variations related to the freeway and the West Hills. The elements above isolate areas not just with their physical presence, but with the traffic induced.

Portions of the Waterhouse population proposed to attend Aloha High School also are isolated by topographic, railroad and other natural spaces challenges.

2. Major Access Points to Neighborhoods

How was that considered? Again, in the north – the major access points would be Cornell Road and Barnes Road. Those both feed directly to Sunset High School, but students are now being sent down OR 217 and OR 8/10 instead of utilizing the neighborhood arterials as would be recommended in proper planning of a community.

3. Neighborhoods with commonly shared facilities; swimming pool, playgrounds, parks, etc.

How was that considered? This component ties into the indirect and cumulative effects of these boundary adjustments - the alignment and assignment of youth sports and facilities through THPRD. This will result in more out of network commuting (traffic) to facilities farther away from neighborhoods and the underutilization of facilities closer in.

- 4. Using backyard property line divisions, rather than opposite sides of small neighborhood streets.
- 5. Avoiding division of neighborhoods with strong historical identities.

Several neighborhoods that have never attended any other school but Beaverton High School and Sunset High School, the two oldest schools in the district, are being shifted to the south. How does this boundary comply with this factor?

Feeder School Alignment

While the number of elementary schools split on paper number the same, the School Board should look at which schools are being split now verse previously and how dramatic the change is for those schools.

Conclusion: The criterion has not been shown to be met. In fact, there are a couple of highlights above that should be considered "fatal flaws" regarding this criteria.

Proximity to School

The Superintendent's analysis for this criterion is very weak and flawed. It simply does not comply with the factors listed:

Proximity to School, with priority to children who can access safe walk routes

Attendance boundary perimeters of relative equal distance from a school

Neighborhood school concept

Fir Grove and Aloha Huber are both being bused to schools in the far south instead of walking to their existing high schools. Both of those schools fall with the Washington County and City of Beaverton areas for Safe Routes to Schools for their existing high schools.

West TV has access to a complete network of safe routes from the elementary school, to the new middle school to Sunset High School. A large portion of its area is within the 2 mile radius of Sunset High School which PSU urban planners identify actually as a more appropriate distance for commuter biking.

While the number of students within the walking distance might increase by 24%, this is a falsely utilized statistic. The students north of BHS cannot safely walk to the school because routes would require crossing OR 8 and OR 10. Both corridors have documented substandard sidewalks, intersections and crossing options. Both the City of Beaverton and ODOT are concerned with the increase of potential pedestrians on these substandard facilities. That will require BSD to add additional stops within this radius.

Any reference to optimization of routes is completely offset by the distance students will be required to travel to the new schools. The boundary tool showed that the distance traveled and the exposure to accidents was much higher with the new proposed boundaries.

Additionally, the new high schools are being referred to as the students' "Neighborhood Schools". High Schools that are over 5 miles away, farther away than 2 or 3 other high schools, cannot seriously be considered "Neighborhood Schools".

Conclusion: The criterion has absolutely not been met.

Safety

The Superintendent's analysis for this criterion again is very weak and flawed. It simply does not comply with the factors listed. See comments above under Proximity to School as well as the following comments.

County/City/ODOT staff and traffic engineer consultants, which have been hired by BSD in the past, all have safety concerns with the new proposed boundaries. Particularly around BHS. They cannot speak for the agencies and lack the enforcement capacity to weigh in on the boundary adjustment; however

their professional judgement should not be ignored. The boundaries proposed push more students onto buses and into cars. The number of motorists transporting students relative to the number of cars is not small. I know BSD is quoting one Washington County staff member when they repeat that statement, however their own website states that over 20% of commute involves student drop off/pick up. Additionally the traffic generated by the new high school was significant enough to require a traffic impact study. This is the same action. Also the indirect and cumulative traffic is being ignored. An example: aligning elementary students with little league programs farther away from their existing high school now sends more families south for practices and games 3 to 4 days a week in the middle of the PM commute with the direction of traffic.

There was lots of discussion about the increase in student population, but the associated increase in traffic over the next 5 years was never discussed. The routes proposed, particularly ones that utilize the freeway, will become more congested and increase accident exposure.

The boundary map tool created by the parenting community demonstrated that the exposure to accidents increases by more than 25% with the proposed boundaries. That was based on 2013 data. 2020 data will only increase that risk. There are very few projects proposed to increase safety along these corridors.

This map produces boundaries that directly, and indirectly, are less safe than the existing condition.

Conclusion: The criterion has absolutely not been met.

Transportation Cost

Emails obtained from BSD show that the transportation costs will increase with the proposed boundaries. Significantly. That is not addressed in Superintendent Rose's narrative. The analysis discusses the topic of transportation, but does not speak to the actual factors or the criteria itself. The proposed boundaries does not "avoid non-contiguous attendance boundaries", does not consider "neighborhood proximity" – see analysis above noting that half a dozen elementary schools are being sent to high schools that are the 2nd or 3rd farthest away from their area. Several of these areas will have distances traveled of over 5 miles. The BAC used no data or costs from the transportation division of BSD in their analysis. They didn't even request it. They didn't consider that BSD is self insured for motor vehicle coverage. They didn't ask how these increases may affect the risk profile for BSD which could result in high costs. The BSD administration diminished the impact of the busing cost because it is reimbursed 70% by the state. That's still a cost that we bare. Additionally, the increase of demand BSD is placing on facilities that already have safety and capacity issues will drive up costs for the City, County and State for projects that are not currently programmed or funded.

Conclusion: The criterion has absolutely not been met.

Student Body Composition

There is a fatal flaw with this analysis as well. Given that the population projections are not correct, again that has been confirmed by the PSU demographer and the BSD demographer, all of the percentages shown are inaccurate. Additionally, the BSD demographer said that he used historic data and applied that to future numbers. However, nobody can predict who is going to purchase a house or who will need F&RL assistance in the future. Student Body Composition also in the JC Policy was never defined as F&RL. It could have been balancing genders at the schools.

Conclusion: There is no way to state that the criteria has been met because the base data is incorrect, it requires predicting the future (which nobody can do), and the criteria was never actually defined by the School Board to mean F&RL only.

The School Board should Vote NO as to whether the boundary adjustment followed the process and as to whether criteria were met.

The high school boundary process should be completed currently with the elementary school boundary process – as BSD had initially desired. The initial proposed springboard map dated early October 2015 should be used.

Superintendent Rose in his video to the BAC stated BSD is a School District, not a District of Schools. That is not what you are creating with these boundaries. That is not the charge the BAC followed (see all of the emails released). It's hard to stop a process and start over. There is a lot of pressure to keep moving forward; however I do believe this will be a disaster to BSD financially and collaboratively.
