I appreciate all the hard work the committee is tasked with in this endeavor. I have a couple of suggestions and requests regarding the boundaries, and specifically the quadrant where we live:

I feel the area South of Gassner Road (and continuing into it's intersection with 185th) should continue to serve as the logical Northwest boundary for the South Cooper Mtn High School. This is most logical and natural demarcation line. The areas ties nicely geographically to the new school, and as the map shows affects only a very, very small number of students (10 per the grids), that otherwise would seem out of place in the current alignment in the 1/21 proposed map.

This was the case before but the latest map shows a change. We live adjacent to Cooper Mtn Nature Park. Many households in the area are more established and without children. For those of us with children, I feel the "walkable" area/neighborhood should play a role in boundary assignments and grids. Currently, our "grid" only contains 3 students. Our grid is drawn to look large, but in reality it encompasses a great deal of uninhabitable land including the nature park/green space. The walk-able neighborhood where many of the friends our kids reside most definitely includes the neighborhood directly to the East, just off of Kemmer. Adjacent quadrants to the west of us show 4, 2, and 1 student. But again the walk-able neighborhood is deceiving, as the Wolds Drive area grid backs to the rock quarry and Jenkins Estate Park so that even though the grid is drawn large, the only realistic neighborhood in this quadrant is the existing one on Wolds Drive. T his should actually be grouped with the quadrant to the East. There is only a small portion of land available for development in this area. Likewise with the grid of 4 students- it includes a large areas that consists of the rock quarry. It would be more logical to redraw the 1 and 4 grids so that the area touching Farmington and below the rock quarry is one area (attached to Aloha perhaps?) and the area above the rock quarry and adjacent Grabhorn is attached to South Cooper Mountain.

In the end, I feel including these areas with the South Cooper Mtn boundaries is more logical and natural in the boundary alignment. It provides practical demarcation lines (Rock Quarry and Gassner/185th) and groups our current neighborhoods with the walk-able area neighborhoods adjacent to the Nature Park, ensuring better continuity and alignment for the children and their peers.

I say this as a parent who really likes and enjoys Aloha High School and has two students currently at Aloha High School who will graduate from there. However, considering our two younger children, and the neighborhood alignments, and geographic alignment and relatively very small impact on total number of anticipated high school students, I think the best alignment is that as I have proposed above.

I have been watching the boundary map develop over the months. It appears Aloha High School will likely end up with the most families needing financial assistance, which in the end means the least amount of donated dollars to help with school resources.

My more recent concern is the capacity. The latest boundary map places Aloha High School at 100% capacity. This is gives Aloha High School the least amount of resources and no room for growth, placing this school under a greatest amount of stress in the district.

According to the Portland Business Journal in 2015 the Beaverton/Aloha zip codes are ranked as the hottest neighborhoods to move into the Portland Metro area. Bethany ranked number 1, but when you combine the zip codes 97006 (ranked #7) and 97007 (ranked #2) they sold over 500 more houses than Bethany.

Starting Aloha High School at 100% capacity or even near 100% does not give much room for growth. I believe we need to look at the trend and realize that the Aloha/Beaverton area is currently the most popular place to move into at the moment and realize we need to look a few years in a future and not just what is in front of us now.

Dear Board Members,

I sincerely hope you are all taking these emails very seriously. As a parent it is extremely frustrating to have so much of our children's future on the line and to feel so powerless to do anything about it.

Our family lives in the Aloha boundaries (even on the new map, we are still just barely within the boundaries). We have lived here for years and one of our daughters recently graduated from Aloha. She had a great experience there and we are anticipating sending our other children there...unless you leave the proposed boundaries as they are. Then will have to look at other options. As it is, Aloha is at 100% capacity with the highest rate (69%) of students qualifying for free and reduced lunch. Yet Sunset has only 11 % of their students qualifying for free and reduced lunch with a lower capacity rate. This is completely unacceptable. No other school in the district is being faced with these kinds of numbers. Who is fighting for our school??? Our principal is on paid leave and it makes me wonder just who is stepping up to fight for us!

One of the goals of the Beaverton School District is to provide EQUAL education opportunities to ALL of the students in the district. This new map does **not** offer the students in the Aloha boundaries an equal opportunity for education. Our class sizes will be enormous and our budget completely strapped. Therefore, our programs will struggle and we will be the ghetto school in the district. This is completely unfair and MUST be changed! How on earth is it ok to have such a huge discrepancy between all of the schools and Aloha? The next closest schools for SES are Beaverton and now Southridge (both at about 50%), but Sunset, that sacred cow of all high schools in the district, has been LOWERED in SES students! This MUST be changed! We are social classing our students very unfairly and very poorly with such huge discrepancies like this.

So, committee, what are you going to do about it? Are you going to leave one school to carry the burden of the district and suffer both monetarily and academically for it?

Please, do the right thing here and balance these schools out more equally! Sunset and Westview and South Cooper Mountain ALL need to be brought up to a more 50/50 SES blend.

PLEASE lessen Aloha's capacity level and relieve us of some of this burden you have placed on us. It is not right and it must be changed! With each new map proposal it seems that none of you are really listening to anyone from Aloha. Will you start? What will it take for you to do the right thing and equalize this district? Yes, people from Sunset may rally and rant and rage, but at the end of the day it is up to you to provide equality for all in this district (not just one school). But, a few months ago, I was at a Halloween party with a ton of friends. The new high school boundary map had been released earlier that day. We were all looking at it and trying to figure out where we would go to high school for the last two years of our high school experience. While we were all shouting out where we would go to high school and trying to figure out where all of our other friends would go, I realized something. Within those 15-20 girls, the Beaverton School District was splitting us all apart for junior and senior year. Not just those girls either, but all of our other friends, too. I heard four names being shouted out that night: Southridge, a few Beaverton's, an occasional "new school' and even one Aloha.

Something you should know about me, is that with these boundary changes, I would now be on track to graduate in 2019 at "South Cooper Mountain High School" with a COMPLETLEY different group of kids than I started high school with. I am a resident of the school district and live in the Garden Home area at its farthest east edge. The Garden Home area is a tight knit community where families grow up together. Many kids start their education with preschool classes at the Garden Home Community center, move on to Montclair Elementary School and Whitford Middle School before starting at Beaverton High School.

Looking at the latest version of the preliminary boundary report I am happy to see that a portion of the Garden Home area is returned to Beaverton High School. However, the division where those north of Garden Home Road go to Beaverton High and those to the south go to Southridge High splits that community apart. I respectfully ask that you consider including the full Montclair Elementary School attendance area within the Beaverton High boundaries so that community may remain together during their high school years.

I would also like to ask you to consider allowing (at the very least) both juniors and seniors to remain at their current schools. For students who are involved in school activities, junior year is the time when they start to take on leadership roles within their school. For example, becoming the captain of their sports team, president of their class, or director of a play. These roles prepare students for their adulthood and to become contributing members of their communities. Making students move schools at this pivotal time could have a devastating effect on these students. We understand the boundary committee for Beaverton School District is showing a complete disregard for the nine criteria stated as the basis of the adjustment process, now focusing on a single factor, free/reduced lunch equality. We are appalled by this and would like to share our research on the mandatory busing you will be imposing on the West TV children.

Before you begin, we would like to state that in no way do we support any form of segregation and find the language in these articles to evoke sadness along with a sense of surprise due to the current political incorrectness of certain phrases. However, we ask you to read this letter substituting the words "race" with "income" or "socio-economic diversity" and skin colors with simply "students".

We also challenge you to compare the travesty of mandatory busing in the United States with the reverse discrimination you are proposing to impose on the families in the West Tualatin View Elementary area.

School Desegregation

Those who oppose busing make a variety of different points against it, although they do not necessarily oppose integration itself. Opponents claim that busing serves as a distraction from more important educational goals such as quality of instruction. Busing, they hold, too easily becomes a case of form over substance, in which the form of racial integration of education becomes of greater value than the substance of what is actually taught in schools. Critics of busing would rather focus on the environment in a school and in its classrooms than on achieving a particular number of each race in a school. Justice lewis f. powell jr. echoed these sentiments in an opinion to a school desegregation case, *Keyes v. Denver School District*, 413 U.S. 189, 93 S. Ct. 2686, 37 L. Ed. 2d 548 (1973). In *Keyes*, he wrote that in an era of declining student achievement, it is wrong to turn the attention of communities "from the paramount goal of quality in education to a perennially divisive debate over who is to be transported where."

Critics also claim that busing causes white flight—where whites move their children from integrated public schools to private and suburban schools that are largely white—which results in an even greater disparity between white and black, rich and poor. According to this scenario, busing only exacerbates the current situation, making public schools and cities even more the exclusive province of the poor.

Some noted experts on the issue of busing have concluded that although they favor a society that is racially integrated, the social costs of busing and the resulting white flight are too high. Others have sought a middle ground on the issue by arguing that judges should choose carefully the districts in which they decide to implement busing. Another prominent complaint in the antibusing opinion is that court-ordered busing programs represent an abuse of judicial power. According to this view, busing is an example of undesirable judicial activism.

Critics of busing also point out that many times, the same court that requires busing does not provide guidance as to funding it, thereby creating financial headaches for school districts. Related to this issue is the claim that busing is too costly, especially when school districts are forced to purchase new buses in order to start a busing program. In financially strapped school districts, spending on busing sometimes takes away funding for other educational priorities.

Some of those who oppose busing favor racial desegregation but do not view busing as a good way to achieve that goal. Instead, they support a gradualist approach to social reform. According to the gradualist view, it will take generations to achieve the goal of racial desegregation in education and in society as a whole. Busing only interferes with the overall goal of integration, because of the sudden and disruptive changes—including white flight—that it imposes on society.

Others oppose busing on the ground that neighborhood schools are the best way to educate children. In this camp are both those in favor of racial integration in education and those against it. Neighborhood schools, it is argued, allow parents to have a greater influence on their child's education by making it easier, for example, to visit the school and speak with a teacher. Such schools also give children a sense of identity and instill pride in their community. Busing children to a school across town, they argue, will not inspire pride in their school. Advocates of neighborhood schools also point to statistics that indicate that bused students are more alienated from their school and thus experience greater problems, including poorer academic performance and increased delinquency.

By the 1970s and later, other sociologists challenged the liberal theories that school desegregation would lead to greater racial harmony and improved academic performance by African Americans. Coleman, too, became more skeptical about busing and argued that voluntary programs were more effective than government-imposed plans in achieving school desegregation. Others went so far as to claim that integration only increases hostility and tensions between the races. African—American students who are bused, they argued, experience a decline in their educational achievement in school. Some studies have in fact shown that students who are bused grow more rather than less hostile toward the other race or races. In addition, some studies have indicated that in many schools where the desired percentages of races have been achieved through busing, students interact largely with those of their own race and thus segregation within the school prevents true desegregation.

By 2003 the anti-busing viewpoint appeared to have prevailed. During the 1990s federal courts released many school districts from supervision by declaring these districts free of the taint of state-imposed segregation. The 1999 release of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg district from court supervision was a symbolic moment, marking the end of an almost 30 year experiment in which the courts used busing to attempt the desegregation of public schools. That same year the Boston public schools, which had endured years of conflict over busing, ended race-based admissions and its busing program. Even cities such as Seattle, which voluntarily adopted a busing program in the 1970s, abandoned the practice in 1999.

Seattle Public Schools – Implemented: 1972 Terminated: 1999

Busing in Seattle: A Well-Intentioned Failure

"The district's own data showed that busing disproportionately burdened children of color, undercut academic achievement, inhibited parental involvement, contributed to so-called "white flight," and did little to reduce racial isolation in the schools. By 1999, when race-based busing finally ended in Seattle, it was widely regarded as "one of those well-intentioned social experiments that don't work" (Morrill interview)."

"But it was also clear that some white parents were taking their children out of public schools in Seattle simply because they did not want them bused out of their neighborhoods. In the first year of district-wide busing, the number of white students dropped by nearly 12 percent compared to the previous year, reducing total enrollment by 10 percent. Both the percentage of white students and the overall number of students fell steadily during the years of mandatory busing."

"The parents of white children were far more likely to manipulate the system and avoid an undesirable school assignment, or abandon the system altogether for the suburbs or for private schools. A five-year review of the Seattle Plan showed that only about half the students in mandatory assignments were showing up; the rest were either moving into options programs or moving out of the public schools."

"In a key presentation to the School Board in November 1995, Stanford said the data showed that low-income students who attended schools outside their neighborhoods scored lower on achievement tests than low-income students in neighborhood schools. Furthermore, parental involvement in the schools was lowest among bused students, who often needed it the most."

"Busing perpetuated segregation and inequity even though technically the schools were integrated," he says. "It was just a complete failure." Felder has worked as a teacher or administrator for the Seattle School District since 1972."

Boston Public Schools – Implemented 1974 Terminated 1988

The integration plan aroused fierce criticism among some Boston residents. Of the 100,000 enrolled in Boston school districts, attendance fell from 60,000 to 40,000.

Judge Garrity decided that the entire junior class from the mostly poor white South Boston High School would be bused to Roxbury High School, a black high school. [6] Half the sophomores from each school would attend the other, and seniors could decide what school to attend. [6] David Frum asserts that South Boston and Roxbury were "generally regarded as the two worst schools in Boston, and it was never clear what educational purpose was to be served by jumbling them. [6] For three years after the plan commenced, Massachusetts state troopers were stationed at South Boston High. [6] The first day of the plan. only 100 of 1,300 students came to school at South Boston. [6] Only 13 of the 550 South Boston juniors ordered to attend Roxbury showed up. [6] Parents showed up every day to protest, and football season was cancelled. [6]

"Almost in passing, Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently announced in his state of the city address that he plans to return Boston to a system of neighborhood schools [a former 'key word' among busing advocates]. The key thing is to give parents the choice where to send their child to school, [Mayor Menino] declared. 'Parents should make that decision. Not the politicians.'

"Around the country, neighborhood schools are the vogue among educators and civic leaders who hope nearby classrooms will encourage parental involvement and turn school buildings into mini-community centers. (LA Times, 02/18/99, by Elizabeth Mehren)

Charlotte-Mecklenburg School District - Implemented: 1971 Terminated: 1999

"In 1971, Charlotte became ground zero for a noble but failed social experiment forced upon the country by the U.S. Supreme Court.

"What began as an effort to remedy the grave wrongs of state-sanctioned racial segregation has turned American society -- black and white -- on its head. The neighborhood school concept, with the pride and solidarity it engenders in a community, has been badly damaged for the last three decades.

"Busing has not accomplished its goals and, in fact, has had many negative consequences.

"Years after a Kansas City court implemented busing, black students in integrated magnet schools performed no better than blacks students in neighborhood schools. San Francisco spent more than \$200 million [on busing] following a 1982 court order to end school segregation, but a 1992 study led by Harvard Professor Gary Orfield, who supports busing, found black and Hispanic students lacked ``even modest overall improvement" [as a result of intrusive court-ordered busing.] A National Institute of Education report could not even find a single study showing black kids fared appreciably better following a switch to integrated schools.

"...In fact, it is patronizing to think that minority students need to sit next to a white student in order to learn. Many black leaders, from Wisconsin State Rep. Annette Polly Williams, a Milwaukee Democrat, to Cleveland Mayor Michael White have come to that conclusion and led efforts to end busing.

"...Busing teaches our children a terrible lesson. Rather than eliminating **racial discrimination** (inequality), busing promotes it by teaching children that the government should treat them differently on the basis of their **race** (income)."

Dear Boundary Committee, Administrators, and Community Members,

I live in the SUN1 area of the revised boundary map from Dec. 17, 2015. This is an area of Bethany that belongs to the Jacob Wismer Elementary School attendance boundary and is composed of varying housing including apartments, condominiums, and single family homes. It is a very diverse area socioeconomically, culturally, racially, and by types of households. There are many single income families in this area. Many in my area feel that SUN1 is a very appropriate addition to the Sunset High School attendance area. I myself live in Arbor View, which is one of the least expensive single family home neighborhoods in the entire Bethany area.

I'd like to point out some counterpoints to the points that some of the West TV area's community members have brought up:

Some of the comments state that the SUN1 area is:

- 1. a "wealthy" area and that Westview needs more wealthy areas;
- 2. much farther from Sunset than the West TV area.
- 1. SUN1 area which includes Arbor View neighborhood is not wealthy in comparison to the new developments in Arbor Heights and on the hill behind Arbor Heights, which also feeds into Sunset and Jacob Wismer. Those single family homes start at about \$650,000-\$710,000. Houses in the West TV area start at about \$575,000, while Arbor View single family homes range from \$300,000 to \$460,000, making area add some socioeconomic diversity to the Sunset attendance area.

(The new construction north of Springville Road, which will be feeding into Westview High School, starts at a pretty steep price point, with single family homes starting at \$530,000, and small town homes priced at around \$330,000 and up, which shows that Westview is already gaining a lot of "wealthy" areas).

Also, SUN 1 includes the South Parc apartment complex and the condominiums in Bethany Village by the library, of which both complexes offer very affordable (cheap) living compared to the West TV area.

- 2. The SUN1 area including Arbor View is in fact closer to Sunset High School than the West TV area. All you have to do is Google Map search the distance from your own home to Sunset High School and compare it to the distance given from West TV Elementary School to Sunset High School: A house in Arbor View is 3.2 miles away from Sunset High School, compared to 4.0 miles, which is the distance from West TV Elementary School to Sunset High School. Some of the homes in the West Haven area are about 3.5 miles from Sunset. I don't think that the West TV commenters checked the actual distance, and their claims are simply false that SUN1 is too far from Sunset High School. One commenter wrote that West TV neighborhoods are walking distance from Sunset, but I do not see how that can be true unless a 3 or 4-mile walk to and from school (6 to 8 miles round trip) is "normal" for the average high schooler (which might be for some of us Oregon, outdoorsy fitn ess types :-)).
- 3. My last point is that the SUN 1 area which includes Arbor View is much more culturally and racially diverse than the West TV area. We live with neighbors from all over Asia, Europe, India, the Middle East, Central America and South America. Recently some families from various countries in Africa have also moved in. I love that aspect of

Arbor View and Jacob Wismer and feel that it is so positive for kids to grow up in a neighborhood that represents the real world. West TV, on the other hand, does not have the high level of cultural and ethnic diversity that our area does.

These are just a few counterarguments to West TV commenters' points. My neighbors and I hope that BSD will be forthright and direct in letting all BSD community members know what the high school boundary changes will mean for next year's elementary school boundary changes and whether or not the elementary schools will be aligning with high school attendance areas to create clean feeder schools from elementary all the way through high school.

At the end of the day, though, it must be said that BSD provides quality public education to the children in the Beaverton/Portland area and we are fortunate to have such involved teachers, administrators, volunteers, staff, and families.

Dear Committee,

As a current parent of a Sunset student, I would like to know what is going to happen to current students, and if the siblings of current students will be grandfathered in, if they choose. I think giving some agency to parents will go a long way to alleviate the stress and concern of parents. I know you have a horrible and nearly impossible job, but truly, I feel very disempowered in this process. Not by the committee, but by the process. The new high school is in a ridicuous location, and does not properly address the overcrowding in the schools in the north. Not the fault of the committee at all.

What I would like to see, though, is a consideration of families, like my own, who have current students at Sunset, and happen to live in homes of less than \$500K. The socio-economics of Sunset do not seem to be addressed in any way. I do not think this oversight is intentional, but it feels bad. It feels like discrimination. I live a mile from Sunset, but am pushed out of the boundaries. Focal tenents of making these new boundaries are transportation-which will force my children to take longer bus rides; community-we live in the area that has been historically Sunset for generations; safety-my children can no longer walk from school if necessary and if an emergency occurred, getting to Beaverton HS from my home would be a complete nightmare, as it is already a horrific commute on both Murray Blvd and Cedar Hills Blvd; and proximity to school-it seems that all homes south of Sunset Highway were summarily dismissed out of the need for a clean boundary without regard for this very important stipulation. Our family very much wants the Vista Hills neighborhood/Ridgewood Elementary School area to remain within the Sunset High School boundary to remain on the current track towards IB program that is unavailable at BHS. This requires keeping the line at Canyon Road.

Dear Superintendent Rose, Principal Huelskamp and the Boundary Adjustment Committee:

Thank you for your time and attention. Here is our rationale for wanting to remain within the Sunset boundary.

- STAFFING PATTERNS
- STUDENT BODY CONFIGURATION
- NEIGHBORHOOD UNITY

I am the product of a Texas private school education and was skeptical about my children participating in the public school system. However, my wife is an IB Diploma graduate from Tigard High School and had great success in college and graduate school. Her education biography is an excellent example of the world-class benefits of the PYP/MYP/IB programs that the public school system has to offer, which are second to none. I have become a fan and advocate of the public school system and want to remain one.

A few years ago, we bought our first home in the Vista Hills neighborhood largely because of the schools our children would attend. My wife assured me that Ridgewood Elementary's PYP program and Sunset's IB program would obviate the need to spend our time and money on private schools, and offer a more culturally diverse experience. I could not be happier with our two daughters' PYP education thus far and am disappointed (and mad) that the IB option may be removed from their plates. I can also say that PYP/IB is as much of a culture as it is a curriculum, and thus cannot be guaranteed to even take root if the seed is planted at BHS.

My wife and I are among involved parents at the school and spend time with other active parents. It is deeply disturbing to hear stories of these families, like ours, contemplating parochial and private options, and simply throwing in the towel on the public schools. This cannot have good implications for the future because many of the most active citizens/parents in the community might no longer be stakeholders advocating for public schools (future bonds, teacher development and compensation et cetera) for other than ideological reasons. It is also upsetting to think of our neighborhood's families' children going to various schools in the area instead of a unified community where your children attend school with their neighbors.

- PROXIMITY TO SCHOOL
- SAFETY
- TRANSPORTATION

Our home is near equidistant from BHS and SHS - around 3 miles; however, if you use Google Maps traffic report to

get an estimate of drive time on weekday mornings, you will see that it can take longer to get the BHS because of the stoplights and volume of traffic. This is now, and the problem could get significantly worse if more students are coming from areas further north of the school like our neighborhood. Moreover, harried students and parents fighting unusually bad traffic to get to school on time may be more likely to drive unsafely. The trip to Sunset is an easier, more natural commute that goes against the normal flow of traffic.

As the second iteration of the map is out, I am growing more and more discouraged with the process. Please hear me out. I believe the community I live in, Cedar Mill/West TV, is currently closed to further changes, and this concerns me. I see that the boundary committee has let Cedar Mill elementary back into the Sunset District, and with that, the committee perhaps thinks their work is done with the other half of our community, West TV. Our ties to Sunset are exactly as strong as those of Cedar Mill, and the transition hardships will rest with only one half of our community. Our transportation and safely concerns are exactly the same as Cedar Mill's. Our concerns about aligning with an IB school, after getting an IB education at Cedar P ark, is exactly the same as Cedar Mill's. Sports teams, band, drama, we have all the same concerns as Cedar Mill, because we are in the same community.

Since the district has stated one of their mandates is to lessen transitions for students, I propose switching Oak Hills back to Westview, and bringing West TV back into Sunset. Bethany can move to Aloha. This would reduce the transitions for more students than it affects.

The district could also take into advisement returning the high schools to a model of three years, such as was the case when I attended Sunset High School in the mid-1970s. This would immediately reduce any need for redistricting.

I am very disheartened by this process. I live in a vibrant area that supports our schools in all ways, volunteering, coaching, leading the cause for the bond measure, and I feel that we are being unfairly punished for voicing our concerns.

It makes no sense to me that Cooper Mountain will not ease the poverty level of Aloha High School. The changes need to be made to the southern part of the district. I hope this process is not over, and that we will have an opportunity to have discussion about exactly what we should do with this is wonderful gift of a new school, instead of disrupting so many childrens' lives. There is no need to fast-track this process. I feel this process has not been transparent at all, and has been guided by an notion that free/reduced lunch is the most important criteria in changing boundaries needlessly.

I am writing as a concerned parent and Cedar Mill community member. The proposed boundary changes are **NOT** in the best interest of our children and community. My son currently attends Cedar Mill Elementary and I have 3 other children who will be attending as well. We live south of Cornell which means, if the current boundary proposal passes, my kids we be going to Beaverton HS vs Sunset HS. This does not sit well with our family and community. Below are just a few of the reasons why:

- 1. **Education and Taxes:** My family and I build a new home in the area in June 2011, explicitly to attend Cedar Mill Elementary, Cedar Park Middle School and Sunset High School. I pay \$10,144.59 in yearly property taxes. I am NOT paying more than \$10k per year to send my children to Beaverton High School. I will move in a heartbeat before I let my children attend Beaverton.
- 2. **Proximity and Safety**: Sunset High School is less than 2 miles away from my home. It's nearly 5 miles to Beaverton HS. We drive our children to school each and every day. The trip to Beaverton HS is constantly plagued by traffic, bad drivers and dangerous intersections. It is much safer for my children to attend Sunset HS. Proximity and safety are priorities of the committee and they should be to us as well. I can recall a terrifying event about 1 year ago. My family and I were taking swimming lessons at the community pool next to Beaverton High School when suddenly we were told we couldn't leave the building and please do not go near the windows because we're under "lockdown" by order of the Beaverton PD because of a nearby shooting. That was an extremely terrifying 30 minutes for me and my family. Those things don't happen near Sunset High School.

Dear High School Boundary Change Committee,

Thank you for serving in this capacity. We appreciate the complexity and challenge of making these changes. They will have a significant and lasting impact on our community.

We live in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview High School boundaries. However, with the latest proposal, our area is being shifted to Aloha High School. The current plan to send our kids to Aloha HS violates six of the seven criteria, which the district stated would be used to make boundary adjustments.

- 1. Availability of space: There are 113 students in our area affected by the current proposal. According to data provided on the latest learning map, there are 135 spots available at Westview. Please move our students back. There is still room for them. This will also improve Aloha's capacity which is at 100% with the current proposal.
- 2. Proximity to school: Westview HS is 2.8 miles from our home. Aloha HS is 3.4 miles.
- 3. Neighborhood unity: Elmonica Elementary students will now be split between Aloha and Westivew High Schools. Socially, this is not good for our students nor our community as a whole. Please also consider how this will fracture the extra-curricular sports programs at Elmonica. Kids who go to school together, will no longer be able to play together on the same teams. Please keep Elmonica united!
- 4. Transportation: Traveling to Aloha HS takes more time and gas. Besides attending school daily, our boys have been involved in band, four different sports and theater. The number of times we drive to and from Westview in a day is considerable. Costs in time and gas obviously compound over a four year period and driving farther to Aloha HS will only exacerbate this.
- 5. Safety: In order for our students to attend Aloha HS, they will need to cross TV Hwy. According to Golocalpdx.com, four of the 60 most dangerous intersections in the state are located along TV Hwy. We should be reducing the number of students, especially young drivers, who need to cross this dangerous highway to get to school, not increasing the number.
- 6. Student body composition: Per the district data, the proposal will result in 61% of Aloha HS students receiving free and reduced lunches (the highest in the district). Ironically, it also reduces the number of free and reduced lunch students attending Sunset HS from 28% to 11% (by far the lowest in the district). This change simply does not fit with one of the Beaverton School District's main pillars: equity.

Please reconsider your current proposal and return our students to Westview.

Thank you for serving our community in this capacity; we understand that it is challenging to make these decisions. My husband, daughter, and I live in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview High school boundaries. This latest boundary proposal switches our neighborhood to the Aloha High school district.

I understand that there are 7 criteria that the committee is following in order to facilitate the boundary adjustments: Availability of space, Proximity to school, Neighborhood unity, staffing patterns, safety, transportation, and student body configuration. I would like to bring to your attention that the proposal to switch our neighborhood (ALH1) to the Aloha High School district violates 6 of the 7 criteria that you have stated is being followed. They are layed out as followed:

- 1. Availability of space. There are currently 113 students in our area that would be affected by the current proposal, but the data on the most recent map shows that there are 135 spots available at Westview. There is still room for them there. This also will improve Aloha's capacity which would be at 100% if the current proposal was followed.
- 2. Proximity to school. Westview HS is 2.7 miles from our home whereas Aloha HS is 3.4 miles.
- 3. Neighborhood unity. This proposal will split our Elmonica students between Aloha and Westview high schools. Not only would it fracture our social community, it is not good for extra-curricular sports programs. The students won't be able to play on the same teams. Our neighborhood deserves to be united.
- 4. Transportation. Traveling to Aloha HS takes more time and gas. It may not seem like much, but the amount of times that we will travel to and from, including extra curriculars like sports, band, or arts, make it a considerable difference.
- 5. Safety. In order for our students to attend Aloha HS, they will need to cross TV Hwy. According to Golocalpdx.com,
- 4 of the 60 most dangerous intercations in the state are along TV highway. We should be reducing the dangers that our students encounter, especially for young drivers that need to cross this road to get to school.
- 6. Student body configuration. This proposal will result in 61% of Aloha HS students receiving free and reduced lunches (highest in the district). It will also reduce the number of free and reduced lunches at Sunset from 28% to 11% (the lowest in the district). This change does not fit with one of the Beaverton School districts mail pillars: equity. All Beaverton school districts deserve the same quality and respect.

Thank you to the boundary committee for taking the time to go through this complex process. While some of the changes are welcoming, some defy all of the 7+2 criteria set forth for boundary adjustment. While the public understand that every change cannot satisfy all of the criteria, it should at the least satisfy 80-90% of the criteria. This email is being sent on behalf of the parents and students living in the elmonica neighborhood. From the start of the process, our area has been shifted several times by the committee. Initially it was shifted to Sunset, then back to Westview and now it has been shifted to Aloha HS. With this proposal you are affecting 113 students within the WaterHouse South ALH1 neighborhood with the Elmonica and Westview HS boun dary. I would like to outline how this new change defies 8 of the 9 of the criteria - (we do not have visibility into staffing patterns)

- 1. Availability of space According to the data you have provided, there are still 135 spots available at Westview. Moving these 133 students to Aloha would put Aloha at 100% capacity to start off with, with no room for growth. However even after moving the 133 students to Westview, you still have growth in Westview as it will be only at 94% capacity. So moving these 113 students back to Westview our current school is the right choice.
- 2. Proximity to School Westview is only a minimum of 1.1 to a maximum of 2.6 miles for all students within the elmonica boundary affected by this change. However the distance to Aloha HS is between 3.4 5.1 miles to this community. In terms of travel and proximity to school also this is not a viable proposal to this area. How can Aloha be considered when even the minimal distance to any member within this community to aloha is at 3.4 miles as against 1.1 miles to Westview. Clearly this does not satisfy the criteria of proximity. Please move the elmonica community back to westview.
- 3. Neighborhood Unity This is the biggest concern. Today our kids attend Elmonica and then Five Oaks. While they have been together in academic classes, sports and other curricular activities for 8 years, now disrupting that unity and only sending part of the kids to Aloha is not an acceptable solution. While the district has tried to keep the students united among the feeder schools, why this discrimination to this area? This is socially not good for the students and also for the community. There is a long standing relationship among students and community members to carpool, be on sports teams together, band programs etc.. This move will completely collapse that system and alienate a section of the community. Please keep the neighborhood intact and move the kids back to Westview.
- 4. Safety This is another big concern. With the move to Aloha you are having parents and students of the Elmonica community having to cross TVHwy several times in a day in order to pickup/drop off as well as to support other after school activities. You have not only increased the commute distance by more than 2x but also not have introduced the danger of having to cross the most notorious intersection of TVHwy several times in a day. 4 of the 60 most dangerous intersections in Oregon state are along the TVHwy and this community will be forced to use 3 out of the 4 for their daily commute to school. You are putting young teenage drivers at a great risk by introducing this change in addition to adults. Please move the elmonica community back to Westview.
- 5. Transportation We drive our kids so many times back and forth to Westview today due to kids being in different after school programs or practice sessions, club meets and other activities. While school bus addresses the daily school routine, there is also a heavy involvement in terms of after school activities that need to be considered. As already outlined in points # 2 and # 4, you have not only more than doubled the distance to travel one way to Aloha, quadrupled the danger of commute and also if you calculate over the period of 4 years, the cost of transportation in terms of \$\$ also quadruples. While we do not say that this cost is zero with Westview, it is much lower as we travel

lesser distance, and having to go several times in a day safety is of paramount concern. Daily school routine via school bus will also take much longer. Travel to Westview via bus takes us 25 minutes one way. Now this school bus ride will be close to 45 minutes given that the distance is more and the traffic heavier along this route. This puts kids at much inconvenience as they spend an 1.5 everyday in bus ride and also will have to wake up much early to be ready to catch the bus before 7am. Longer bus ride also means they will miss other activities outside of school most of which start around 3pm. If you dissect the problem in any way it does not sound logical and viable to move this community to Aloha HS. Please move this elmonica community back to Westview.

- 6. Student Body composition With this move you will put aloha at 61% receiving free meal which is the highest in the district. At the same time you have reduced the % at Sunset from 28 to 11% and Westview from 40 to 33%. This simply does not comply with equity which is one the districts main pillars.
- 7. Relieve overcrowding With the move of the this ALH1 community to Aloha, you are actually causing a 100% capacity at Aloha High school in the near future. Westview can take on an additional 135 students even to reach 94% capacity, while our community only has 113 students. This is a fairly old neighborhood community with most residents having been here for several years, not much potential for growth and so these numbers will either remain steady or be on the decline in the next couple of years. So adding the 113 students back to Westview should not cause any problems in terms of school capacity. Why discriminate only 113 students our of 1000+ students who currently go to Five Oaks MS and disrupt the unity of the neighborhood and cause a lot of anxiety to students?
- 8. Minimize transition to students Clearly the move to minimize transition to students is not achieved with this move. We have already outlined all of our concerns in sections 1 through 7 and all of those clearly indicate that this group of 113 students are targeted for no plausible reason and we kindly request the committee to reconsider its initial proposal and put this ALH1 boundary back to Westview. Fear has already set in with the current westview students who will be affected with this change, that they will have to start from ground zero to build relationships, rapport with teachers, teams etc. The the adolescent and teenage years already being very nebulous, coupled with the pressure of grades, the parents strongly feel that this change is detrimental to the students welfare and defeats the purpose of achieving a 100% graduation for which this district strives hard. You are going to set the kids on a path to failure with this change, especially the current stu dents as it adversely affects their morale and academic goals. We request the committee to keep the students welfare in mind and consider our request to put ALH1 back to the Westview boundary.

We strongly feel that we have provided enough justification to show how the current proposal for ALH1 boundary change to Aloha defeats all of the boundary conditions for this committee and kindly request to put ALH1 back to the Westview boundary. We are a small tiny jutting area in your boundary map that has been unjustly moved. I hope that you reconsider your proposal in the light of the above facts.

Hello boundary committee. Thank you for tackling a difficult task for our community.

I am a school teacher and coach in our district. I live in the Elmonica community and I have 2 children that attend schools in our district. I have lived here for over 10 years. My job puts me on the front lines with kids and families and I have heard many voices in regards to the boundary adjustments. It impacts everyone, including myself.

I have been asked by several members of my community to come forward and write an explanation why our community makes more sense attending Westview High School. I believe this is the correct location for our Elmonica community. Here is my perspective.

I know several families that have ties to Westview programs, including athletics in our community. These are not ties that are just kids playing on a team. We have coaches and generational families that have attended Westview. As a coach, we work with players, parents, and fans to build community for our institutions. There is loyalty there.

I think my first and best example of loyalty was being a teacher at Beaverton High School. BHS is Beaverton's oldest HS and has a rich tradition. Our other schools are just developing their traditions. When boundaries adjust it harms the investment in not just institutional traditions, but family traditions into programs and program athletics in particular. I know there would be a heavy resistance in this community to switch. There is already a great deal of investment in Westview HS.

- 2. What is tradition exactly? Well, it's kind of a habit that forms over time. For instance, the school colors of Elmonica and Westview are identical. The little engineers have brothers and sisters who are Wildcats. Those kids have invested and spent time watching programs from theatre, to cheer, to softball of their siblings thinking one day, "that will be me." One example is that our community is affiliated with Willow Creek Softball, which is a feeder for the Sunset and Westview High School softball programs. Many families in our community have invested countless hours to these programs and have the expectation that they will continue, and allow them to see the fruits of their labor. This helps build tradition.
- 3. Maybe the most obvious issue that people have, is that Westview is actually closer to our community. I've driven to both Aloha and Westview High Schools many times, and Westview is indeed actually closer to our house. It does not make practical sense to travel further to go to school in a school this community did not plan to attend. Here's a solution that I've discussed that could be a way to keep the peace and maintain a community.

Compromise/Solution: If we keep the border at Baseline St., this will solve the majority of issues that our community contends with. Elmonica is on the northern side of Baseline. It's a small move that would have dramatic effects for our community. I urge you to consider this as the true boundary.

I seems strange to me that Aloha will pushed to capacity with this change, while the Westview school district that we are being moved out of will be under capacity. It is also strange that we will be moved to Aloha, as Aloha is more than 20% farther away then Westview. Dear Beaverton School District High School Boundary Change Committee,

I am a resident of the Five Oaks neighboorhood located at 718 SW 171st Ave near Elmonica Elementary School. It has recently come to my attention that during the process for boundary changes that the students of this neighborhood would be assigned to the Aloha High School district instead of the current high school. This change would have a significantly negative impact to both the students of the Aloha High School district as well as the Westview High School district. In fact, based on the guidelines with which all boundary changes were to be judged against, this change is in direct conflict with at least 6 of the 7.

First and foremost, moving the boundary north of Walker between 173rd and 158th will increase the student body size of the already large Aloha High School to 100%. This leaves no room for student body growth in an area that is already seeing rapid development. Additionally, this places Westview Highschool at only 94% capacity, which is one of the lowest in the region.

Second, this change would significantly increase the distance for students in this region from their highschool. Currently most student in the proposed change neighborhood are approximatly 2.8 miles from Westview Highschool where as they would be well over 3 miles from Aloha High School. This will increase commute times which are already long to an even longer bus/car ride.

Third, this change would make transportation to and from school even more problematic for students in this neighborhood. The already long bus/car rides to and from students school will be extended even more. Not all students are drivers as well, as I my self was not in and relied on parents and school buses to get to and from school for both academic and extracurricular activities.

Fourth, this change will put those students that do drive, or use other forms of transit at more risk. Tualatin Valley Highway is a large and busy thoroughfare which is only getting busier as development continues in south Beaverton. Much as the longer commutes to school increase travel times, it also increases the risk students face when traveling to and from school.

Fifth, this change would decrease neighborhood unity. Many students who attend Elmonica Elementary will now be split between Aloha and Westview Highschools. This will split up children from both classmates as well as those who participate in extracurricular activities. This is not encouraging neighborhood unity as stated in the goals for the boundary changes...

Finally, this change would seem to carve out a high density/low income area from Westview School boundary and move it to a school which is already burdened with a large low income student body population. The proposed changes would increase the percentage of students eligible for free/reduced lunch to 61% for Aloha while leaving Westview Highschool at only 33%, one of the lowest in the region. One of the defining issues of our era is the desire to create more equitable communities which the boundary change committee acknowledged with their concern for "Student body configuration" which this change flies in the face of.

Please, reconsider the redistricting choices for the Five Oaks neighborhood. The current boundaries proposed would seem to contradict the original desire stated by this committee. Keeping the students of this neighborhood at

Westview High School is the proper choice.

Today is Martin Luther King Jr. day and therefore I want to begin with a quote from him.

"I speak not for myself but for those without voice... their right to be treated with dignity, their right to equality of opportunity, their right to be educated:"

I am writing to you because our family lives in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood and within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview high school boundaries. We DO NOT want our Elmonica students attending two different high schools. We want all our kids to continue to attend high school together at Westview. Splitting the school in half and sending some students to one school and the other to another school is neither equitable or fair.

We are deeply disturbed that the boundary lines will now send our kids to two different high schools. These children deserve to be treated with the same respect and consideration as other kids in the Beaverton district. We are a small community but these kids matter. We may not have a strong voice since not all of us speak English as our first language but we still deserve to be heard. It is my understanding that the committee has seven criteria for adjusting the boundary and in your decision to now send our students to Aloha high school you are not considering six of them.

- 1. Neighborhood unity: This is not good for our community. Our community already has language barriers and having the children and their families socialize together is very important for inclusion. Kids will no longer be participating in sports and extra curricular activities together. More than 20 languages are spoken outside the home and getting these families to become part of the Beaverton community is very important. These families also do not have a strong voice in these discussions and decisions. Just because other communities are louder, please do not consider those communities unity more important than ours.
- 2. Student Body Composition: The current proposal will result in 61% of Aloha HS students to receive free and reduced lunches. That INCREASES the rate for the school ALREADY at the highest rate. The new proposal gives a school such as Sunset less equity moving them from 28% to 11%. This is not fair or equitable.
- 3. Safety: TV Hwy is one of the most dangerous intersections for the kids to cross. Student drives will have to cross over in order to attend this school.
- 4. Availability Space: Aloha will be at full capacity while Westview, the current home school, will not be at capacity.
- 5. Transportation: Traveling to Aloha is farther, will cost more time and more gas. Mores cost for the district.
- 6. Proximity to school: Westview, our home school is closer. Sunset is closer. Aloha is farther away.

Our community wants what is equitable and fair for the children who attend Elmonica elementary. Splitting the school in half is neither fair or equitable. Please listen to the voices of this community who speak for many who can not that our Elmonica community matters. Please reconsider and allow these children to attend Westview together. Please reconsider the proposal to move Elmonica Elementary students from Westview to Aloha High School.

As long time Beaverton residents and taxpayers, we consider quality of education to be the number one criteria and think it is ill advised to move students from one of the better high schools to one of the worst rated in the state. We do not think that adding more students to the Aloha roster will help the situation in the interim, but will only lower the quality of education for more students.

While we are not parents ourselves, we certainly understand that any parent would also not want the same for their children. Would you want that for yours?

As someone who went to an overcrowded, but high quality, high school, I recognize that sheer occupancy and student-teacher ratios are not the primary factor in the quality of education, although some would simplistically wish to present it as such.

We would prefer to see our tax dollars used to move more students from Aloha into Westview, rather than the other way around. It is our view that it is more beneficial to move lower income students into better environments, rather than consolidating them all into one place. As a resident of Waterhouse (Blueleaf) neighborhood, I had a daughter who attended a BSD school. It strongly disappoints me that this boundary change will occur for the 113 students who reside in our area. I do have a point to bring up that could be a possible solution. I know my daughter transferred boundaries from westview to sunset due to westview not offering an IB program and challenging curriculum. Will these 113 children have an option to transfer from aloha to westview if they do not wish to attend?

Additionally, I would like to bring up that Aloha will be at 100% capacity or more if this proposal goes through. I always was under the impression that BSD strives for their schools to reduce class sizes and increase learning opportunities for our students. If this proposal falls through, then class sizes will increase and this may result in more teachers being needed. I am also aware that BSD's budget is strained when coming to hire new teachers, so why increase class size to where teachers get burned out and students do not get the challenging curriculum they deserve in order to gain admission to a good university.

Dear Superintendent Rose and the High School Boundary Change Committee:

Two of the most important criteria my wife and I used when choosing a house to raise our children in were sense of community and solid foundation for our children. With those priorities, we have enjoyed raising our two children for the past 15 years in our current location. We have watched our children grow up with the neighborhood children; at Elmonica school events, in Westview-based youth sports activities, and other community events.

I am glad to see that proximity to school, neighborhood unity, transportation, safety, and feeder school alignment are on your list of criteria for determining the boundaries. Those are very important to my family also. Considering those criteria in boundary selection, I find a few discrepancies in the data with the most current boundary map from 1/15/16.

I understand that we live in a neighborhood that is in somewhat close proximity to 3 high schools. We live equidistant from Westview and Sunset at 2.7 miles. Aloha is farther from our house at 3.4 miles, and involves dealing with TV highway. These are directly opposing your goals of proximity to school, transportation, and safety. In the springboard map, we were assigned to Sunset. On the map published 12/17/15, we were considerations for both Westview and Sunset. In the most recent map from 1/7/15, we were now listed as assigned to Aloha. Our desire would be for our younger daughter to graduate from the same high school as she starts at, and the WV youth sports she has been participating in since 1st grade.

Relating to your goals of neighborhood unity and feeder school alignment, the most recent map is concerning. Not only would it require our youngest daughter to start and finish at different high schools, it would separate her from many of her childhood elementary school friends in school and after-school activities during the tumultuous teen years.

Since Elmonica has been designated a Title 1 school, there are a larger percentage of families that need assistance. With the 1/15/16 map, Aloha has the highest percentage of students that are eligible for free or reduced lunch, which includes some of the Title 1 Elmonica students. Aloha is also listed at 100% capacity and there is a need for resolution of the hatched "Unresolved Area" on the eastern portion of the Aloha boundary.

It seems a plausible solution would be to keep Elmonica whole and not divide it up between two high schools, as in the prior two working maps posted by the Committee. Moving the remaining 158 Elmonica students back to Westview would free up a workable alternative to fulfilling the needs of the "Unresolved Area" and better equalize the number of students needing lunch assistance. It seems to more closely align to the criteria you have selected as your decision criteria.

Plan to keep Oak Hills together and help Sunset's diversity:

Weeks ago I submitted feedback requesting that Oak Hills Elementary be kept together and not split between Westview and Sunset High Schools. At that point I didn't care which high school we went to. My opinion has changed. Oak Hills students should be kept together at Westview. The new Preview Map splits Oak Hills Elementary students into two high schools, with the dividing line being Bethany Boulevard, which is almost right down the middle. Bethany Boulevard may appear to be a clean line on a map, but we have a strong community that is not divided by that line. There is a lot of parent support for keeping our kids together throughout their school years.

Here is a plan to keep Oak Hills together and will also help with the lack of diversity at Sunset:

According to the current Public Preview Map's capacity data, Sunset is at capacity and there is no room for the other half of Oak Hills students to fit at Sunset HS. However, the capacity data does show that Westview has room for the half of Oak Hills that is now set to be sent to Sunset. Thank you for all of your work on this, I know that this has been a difficult and challenging project.

My family lives in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview High School boundaries. However, with the latest proposal, my area is being changed to Aloha High School. This is problematic for multiple reasons, the primary of which is that students at Elmonica Elementary will now be split between Aloha and Westview High Schools. My son has a very difficult time developing friendships, and knowing that all of the effort he is going through right now only to be split from his friends in a few years is absolutely heartbreaking and terrible for our neighborhood unity. Please keep Elmonica united!

In addition, Aloha High School is significantly further from our home – AHS is 3.4 miles and across one of the accident-prone TV Highway whereas WHS is only 2.8 miles, and a very easy and safe commute for a young driver. Were we to have to allow our son to drive to AHS on a daily basis not only will it increase transportation costs significantly over four years but it will also put him daily in some of the most dangerous intersections in the state. Thank you for serving on this committee. We appreciate the complexity and challenge of your duties. They will have a significant and lasting impact on our community.

We live in the Waterhouse South neighborhood (between Walker Road and Baseline Road, and between 158th and 170th) within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview High School boundaries. We have two children attending elementary schools in the Beaverton School District (Elmonica Elementary and Arco Iris School). We have been closely following the committee's work and were shocked at the latest proposal moving our part of the neighborhood to Aloha HS.

The most recent proposal sending our kids to Aloha HS violates six of the seven criteria stated by the district to guide this process:

1. Neighborhood Unity:

As a current parent and homeowner, this is the most troubling aspect of the most recent proposal. The proposed boundary line is Walker Road and 173rd. This isolates us from our surrounding neighborhoods and splits the larger group of housing developments. Previous proposals used Baseline Road as the boundary line, and this is a more natural boundary. Waterhouse South is physically and socially tied to the Waterhouse North, Merewood, Autumn Ridge, and the neighborhoods just across 173rd between Walker and Baseline.

Further, this proposal splits Elmonica Elementary students between Aloha and Westview High Schools. Socially, this is not good for our students or the community as a whole. Kids that spend years together in class and playing sports together will be split. Please keep Elmonica united!

2. Proximity to School:

Westview HS is 2.9 miles from our house. Sunset HS is 2.4 miles. Aloha HS is 3.4 miles. Beaverton HS is also 3.4 miles from our house. Either Westview or Sunset are significantly closer and more a part of our neighborhood.

3. Transportation:

The longer distance from home to school takes more time and gas. Besides attending school daily, there are extracurricular activities and extra trips for parents looking to help at school. The extra time and gas to take students to and from school and activities over the course of the 7 years we will be involved with the high school will make an impact to our families' lives. Additionally, with our neighborhood being an island of Aloha HS with surrounding neighborhoods going to Westview, there will be additional bus expense, pollution, and noise - at least 2 different busses will be needed to go through essentially the same neighborhood.

5. Safety:

In order for our students to attend Aloha HS, they will need to cross TV Hwy and possibly Farmington Hwy. According to golocalpdx.com, four of the 60 most dangerous intersections in the state are located along TV Hwy. The intersection at 185th and TV Hwy has been highlighted by the ODOT as a dangerous intersection (http://koin.com/2015/09/03/deadly-spot-on-tv-hwy-getting-odot-redesign/). We should be reducing the number of students, especially young drivers, who need to cross these dangerous highways to get to school, not increase the

number.

6. Student Body Composition:

Per the district data, the proposal will result in 61% of Aloha HS students receiving free and reduced lunches (the highest in the district). Ironically, it also reduces the number of free and reduced lunch students attending Sunset HS from today's 28% to 11% (by far the lowest in the district). This change simply does not fit with the one of the BSD's main pillars: equity.

7. Availability of Space:

Finally, the move of Waterhouse South (the area from Baseline to Walker Roads and 158th to 173rd) to Aloha HS seems counter to the primary goal of this committee: to address overcrowding in the district's high schools. The current proposal puts Aloha at 100% capacity, the highest in the district. Further, while every other school is expected to lose students by 2020, Aloha is projected have almost no change, so it will remain at or above capacity for the years to come. Burdening Aloha with additional numbers does not meet this committee's criteria to alleviate overcrowding in our schools. There are 113 students in our area affected by the current proposal, please move these students back to Westview.

Please reconsider your current proposal and move the students from Waterhouse South back to Westview. Moving these students back to Westview meets the committee's guidelines, builds a better community, and is the best thing for our students.

Dear High School Boundary Change Committee,

I'm writing you as a concerned parent of a 7 year old and 3 year old living in the Watercrest neighborhood, located off 173rd right near Lisa Street. Our girls attend/will attend Elmonica, Five Oaks and Westview. These schools were the exact schools I attended when I was growing up. :)

However, based on the current boundary map, this would put us at Aloha when it's time for our girls to go to high school. Actually, I too, was in the Aloha HS district due to a move my parents made to the Sexton Mountain/Murrayhill area where they currently still live when I was in 8th grade (in 1993-1994). However, because we moved from the Elmonica, Five Oaks district, I was able to be "grandfathered" into Westview when it first opened. This allowed me to actually be part of the first 4 year graduating class AND I was also part of the committee to help name the "new high school" at the time...! think it was between Skyline and Westview. We know which name won. I digress, sorry...

While keeping the girls at Westview is probably more a deep sentimental preference than anything, it saddens me that our girls may have to attend Aloha instead. (I know we have awhile, but they all say it creeps up REALLY FAST!!!) After getting married, my husband and I specifically picked our house and neighborhood location to be in the Elmonica, Five Oaks and Westview school districts. Both my husband and I went to Five Oaks and Westview...and thought it would be so awesome if our girls walked the same halls we did!! (I doubt with the current real estate market, we could move to be closer to Westview.)

On another note, keeping our kids with their current classmates is super important as well. My parents found it important that I get to stay with all the friends I grew up with through elementary and middle school so they sacrificed their morning times to drive me back and forth until I was able to drive my Junior year. Why should Aloha be at 100% capacity when Westview is just at 94% capacity?

I'd also like to comment on the proposed objectives by the Superintendent:

- Relieve current and projected future overcrowding with a five-year horizon, and targeting 90% capacity or less.
- Minimize transitions for students.

If Aloha is already planned to at 100%, how will that help with overcrowding in the future? Being a planner, wouldn't you want to have a nice cushion evenly across the board so it's easier to hit that 90% capacity or less in the future?

I truly hope the committee will re-consider this boundary change and put us back at Westview. It would mean the world to us as parents who are deeply connected to that school and this part of Beaverton as a whole. Our kids are growing up here, walking the same pathways we did as kids and making friends that should grow with them through high school. (We even have started taking them to WHS football games.)

Dear Beaverton H.S. Boundary Change Committee,

I appreciate your willingness to serve the students and families of our district as you labor to sort through the myriad competing concerns of the moving of students by area to accommodate a new school.

My family, including a freshman daughter and junior son at Westview, live in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview H.S. boundaries. Within the preliminary map for adjustment, our neighborhood is set to move to Aloha H.S.

According to your criteria, this plan is at odds with six of the seven criteria that your committee has stated they will use to decide.

- 1. Availablilty of space: According to the data on the learning map, there are 135 spaces available at Westview, while our neighborhood only contains 113. So, there is still room for them and no need to move them. This would also relieve the max capacity of 100% that Aloha is at.
- 2. Proximity to school: Westview is a half mile closer to us than Aloha.
- 3. Neighborhood unity: All the students with whom my children attended elementary school and Middle School (Five Oaks) now attend Westview. What you're suggesting is that at least my daughter gets to be split off from most of those she has relationship, which has an enormous influence on a student's success. And my son will finish at Westview? Which brings me to my next point...
- 4. Transportation: Along with needing to drive my kids to 2 different schools each morning I will more than double the amount of time and fuel. On the days when my son drives, we add danger, which leads to the next point...
- 5. Safety: As you are well aware, T.V. Hwy and 185th is one of the most dangerous intersections in the state. Not only would I get to add to my risk every day, but often would subject my son to the same. One accident ends up costing me thousands of extra dollars for years to come.

Do students have any rights regarding the amount of time that is reasonable to be on a bus to get to and from school? Particularly when they are forced to attend a school that more than doubles the commute time to and from a closer school? Does the school district have a standard regarding what is reasonable and right? What does the school district regard as a hardship with transportation? Especially when there is no safe walking or biking route? Are there any standards around what is a reasonable cost to spend on increased transportation costs? Will absences be excused for students who miss the bus and cannot get themselves to school because of the lack of safe walking or biking routes to and from school?

The students in the Beaverton School District should not be forced to change horses midstream. Boundaries may need to be adjusted, but current students should not be forced to change high schools. Navigating high school is difficult enough without having to switch schools midstream. Oregon's graduation rate for 2014 was 72% for all students, 60% for economically disadvantaged, 49% for limited English proficiency, and 37% for students with disabilities. Why make it harder for these students to graduate by forcing them to change high schools. When a student is forced to switch high schools, they lose critical connections to teachers, counselors and coaches that are hard to build and harder to replace. Strong students will hold on through the transition; weaker students will start to lose their grip on graduation.

The current proposal to force sophomores and juniors to switch schools when the boundaries change is unwarranted. A simple Google search reveals that almost all boundary changes allow for current students to finish where they started. See for example the PPS policy set forth below. As soon as the boundary changes are implemented, current overcrowding will start to ease as the size of the incoming freshman class is adjusted. If the cure for overcrowding is forcing students to switch high schools, then the cure might be worse than the disease.

VII. School Assignment Following a School Boundary Change

A. After a boundary change:

- 1. Students living in the neighborhood approved for a boundary change have the right to attend either their current school through the highest grade or the newly assigned neighborhood school. Students who remain at their current school and later want to attend the newly assigned neighborhood school have the right to do so with an on-time transfer request (4.10.051-P).
- 2. Younger siblings living in a neighborhood approved for a boundary change shall

be guaranteed a space at the former neighborhood school if:

- a) They make timely application through the annual transfer process (4.10.051-P), and
- b) An older sibling currently attends and will be attending the former neighborhood school during the upcoming school year.
- 3. Transfer students attending a school subject to a boundary change may remain at their current school through the highest grade. Younger siblings of such transfer students are eligible for preference which is subject to capacity limits if they apply on-time to attend their older brother or sister's current school, as provided in 4.10.051-P.
- B. The Superintendent may recommend an exception to the approved assignment process in cases described in 4.10.051-P V.B.

In Texas, where I grew up, I had the misfortune to attend 3 different elementary schools (1 was a move by my parents, the other 2, the later ones, were school district mandated) that went to 3 different high schools. The good news: I had acquaintances all over; the bad news was that I never really felt part of a team and when I came up against my ex-classmates, it was much more personal. I'm not into sports; I entered math and industrial arts competitions which are not team sports but are still school and school spirit based. Your plan allows these children to grow together for the first 8 years and then you rip them apart and put them in competition with one another; it just doesn't make sense when there is another school closer and at less than capacity.

I apologize for taking so long on this. From the early press coverage, I assumed we might be moved, but to Sunset (ironically farther from my house than Aloha by .1 mile) and I just wasn't paying close attention as I don't at this time have children in school. But I had no idea the plan was to split the elementary, and thank goodness someone brought it to my attention. It is a big deal! Don't do it!

Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee,

I am writing to express my extreme concern that the new high school boundary process is going to solidify income inequality in the district, creating schools for those with money and those without. The current map (and all previous maps that I have seen) have created three schools: Aloha, Beaverton, and Southridge with 50% or more free and reduced lunch, and two schools: Sunset and South Cooper Mountain, with less than 25% free and reduced lunch. Sunset high school is down to 11% free and reduced lunch in the latest map while Aloha has increased to 61%.

How is this equitable? Ironically, the latest district newslette boasts "In the Beaverton School District, all new administrators engage in Leading for Equity Training to develop concrete leadership actions, explore different areas of equity leadership opportunities and identify strategies to interrupt the cycle of inequity."

Your committee has shown no leadership in reducing inequity in the district. Instead, your proposal promotes inequity. Given that the new federal education laws seem to be focusing on closing the gap for poor students, you are setting the district up to fail at that. Considerable research shows that poor children achieve more when they are in schools with students with higher incomes and higher parental education levels.

There are ways of achieving income equality in the district, but it will make some wealthy parents unhappy. I am deeply disappointed that your committee has not been able to stand up to the racist and classist demands of the families who live north of Highway 26, instead creating a high school with only 11% of the students coming from poor families.

If the district truly wants equity for all, it will not adopt this map.

As the committee's work winds down, I have three points I'd like to reiterate that are important to our family during the transition time of the boundary change as it affects current high schoolers:

- 1. It would be better if all high schoolers could have the option of staying at the school they start at. For example, my younger child will be a 9th grader at BHS the 2016/17 school year. She would want to stay at BHS for 10, 11, 12th grades.
- 2. It would be better if siblings could stay at the same school for these transition years. My younger child would be seemingly moving from BHS to Southridge 2017/18 school year -- but her brother will still be at BHS that year. This is disruptive to building community and for families (e.g., driving to the same co-ed sports they play). This is another reason to let the students who started at a particular HS stay at that HS.

To Whom It May Concern:

Respectfully and in appreciation of your commission, I am writing in regards to the tumultuous/monumentous job of redistricting the high schools in Beaverton School District. There are multifactorial levels that will affect all Beaverton high schools, neighborhoods, students, families, busing routes and traffic flows with the proposed district changes. However, one factor that gravely appears to be overlooked is the well-being of the incoming 2017/18 junior class.

As parents of 5 children, we have experienced change and find that more often than not children are resilient. However, we have experienced first-handedly one of our children transferring as a junior and the extreme stress that disrupted personal health, focus, academic performance, teacher relationships, and the entire family. This child was denied entrance to the Naval Academy due to lack of a long term relationship with a junior teacher who could write a strong letter of recommendation! Although our current middle schooler will now attend a different high school, we appreciate the fact that all four years will at least be at the same school. Our concern is for our current freshman, and all freshman, who will be required to move schools at the beginning of their pinnacle year – junior year, and the effects this will have on them.

We have experienced that junior year is a highly intensive year to focus, produce and create successes in academics, sports and extra-curricular activities. Academically, it is a very intense year with Pre-SAT, SAT/ACT testing as well as starting or continuing IB/AP programs specific to the school. It is a key year for establishing grades and solid teacher relationships for excellent recommendations to college. (Academics are not as intense the first two years of high school just for the reason of easing the students into a new environment and preparing them for the intense junior year. By junior year, the students are capable of focusing more on the academics due to familiarity and comfort in knowing the building, classmates, teams, teachers, coaches and routines.) Sports continue to be a challenge, yet some comfort is established in the fact that athletes know the school's specific coaching style, expectations and the team plays built upon the foundation of freshman/sophomore years. The junior athletes are recognized, trusted and called to be leaders by JV/Varsity teammates and coaches. Juniors have a greater understanding of which extra-curricular activities they have interest and have often already established the relationships necessary for success junior year whether that be in student leadership, clubs or specific groups formed with a staff member overseeing it. Students and athletes have strived all freshman and sophomore year to establish a healthy reputation and relationship amongst their peers, teachers and coaches. Basically, the school system is set-up to help students familiarize and find grounding before entering the upper class years where outside distractions are meant to be less and opportunities for success are in place.

Emotional support is what juniors require most. (Is it avoidable to create unnecessary extra stress that will heap on top of the already extremely stressful junior year?) How will students transfer from a prepared IB program to an AP program without a gap in scheduling plans? How will the counselors handle letters of recommendations with students just as new to them as a freshman? How will the BSD school rankings perform in Pre-SAT, SAT/ACT tests and in Merit Scholarships awarded if juniors are asked not to only perform but to do it in a new school and with all the changes a freshman experiences? What results does the School District expect with these potential chaotic additional demands being placed on the students during their critical junior year? Again, is this avoidable?

We are proposing to allow juniors in the Beaverton School District the same choice as the seniors – let the students have the option to choose to stay at their current high school or to move to the newly assigned school. This option would allow the juniors that have fully invested their first two years in preparation to reap the benefits from which they have sewn. This keeps emotional stress at bay and allows the Beaverton School District to maintain great rankings in testing and awarded scholarships. The investment of teachers, students, families, and the Beaverton School District would be protected through the option of allowing students and families to choose which school (current or newly assigned) is best for them and their future.

Dear High School Boundary Committee,

One thing that concerned me, and that I would like the committee to consider, is that the words "free/reduced lunch" and "equity" were used interchangeably during the committee's discussion. I do not think that these two words mean the same thing. Free/reduced lunch percentage is data that gives information about the financial make-up of a school. Equity is about making sure, that the quality of education that is offered to students within the Beaverton School District are equal and that all students are given the education that is needed for them to succeed. On the Beaverton School District web site Pillars of Learning under equity it says, "WE build honest, safe, and inclusive relationships with our diverse students and their families" and "WE provide needed support so that every student succeeds". I do not see any mention of free/reduced lunch in this statement. I understand that free/reduced lunch percentages help identify what schools may n eed supports to foster student success, but just increasing or decreasing these numbers in a school and moving kids from a classroom that has high free/reduced lunch numbers to a classroom that has lower free/reduced lunch numbers does not ensure equity. To me, things that ensure equity are putting programs and policies in place that overcome the barriers to learning that prevent students from being successful. I would ask you to please consider not using these words interchangeably in your future discussions.

In listening to the discussions of the boundary committee, it seems that having more equal numbers of free/reduced lunch is a VERY important goal of the boundary committee. If that is true, then that should be listed as one of the criterion instead of student body configuration, which is very vague and again it should be called free/reduced lunch percentage not equity.

When looking at the map of free/reduced lunch distributions (provided by the school district at the boundary committee meeting on 12/17/15), it is clear that it is concentrated in certain areas and absent in other areas. Specifically, it is absent in the northern parts of the Westview and Sunset attendance areas and in the area around South Cooper Mountain School. Whether we like it or not, this distribution is not going to change as our school district grows. The areas that are growing rapidly will continue to have low free/reduced lunch percentages and the higher percentages will stay in the neighborhoods where it is currently high. When I look at the map, I am not sure based on the distribution of free/reduced lunch in our community, that it is possible to equalize these percentages across our high schools. The only way to do so would be to make even more drastic changes than were already made in the Spring Board Proposal. I would of liked to see a map that sho wed equalizing free/reduced lunch at all the high schools not just 3 of them, as current maps show.

I would like to see the committee make all 6 high schools have close to equal numbers of free/reduced lunch. To do that I realize the committee will have to throw out some of it's other criterion. Since it seems that in some neighborhoods, free/reduced lunch is being given a priority for movement then it is only fair that ALL neighborhoods in the district are treated that way regardless of the other criterion.

As the parent of a student that will be moved out of the school closest to our home, from a school that has low free/reduced lunch numbers to a school with much higher free/reduced lunch numbers and that includes a switch from the IB program to the AP program which do not offer the same curriculum, I would like the committee to stop calling that equity. My family will adjust to this change if that is the ultimate decision by the district, but it would go a

long way to our adjustment if the committee and the district would stop using the positive word "equity" to justify it and really just be honest in saying that our neighborhood has to move to meet the committee and district goals for free/reduced lunch percentages.

It concerned me to read some comments in the Public Record that suggested that the parents of current Sunset students do not think that equity is important. That is not the case. I have talked to my fellow parents and it is not that we do not want equity in the Beaverton School District it just seems that the committee has been using the low free/reduced lunch percentages in our area as a way to target Sunset neighborhoods for movement and that that requires the committee to go against other criterion such as, neighborhood unity, proximity to school, transportation and safety issues when deciding the boundaries. I think equity is a very important topic for our community to consider, but just using boundary lines to make changes to the percentages of free/reduced lunch is only a small change that I am not sure will lead to making our schools more equitable and ensure that all students get what they need for success.

One suggestion that I would make to the committee, Superintendent Jeff Rose, the Beaverton School Board, and the community is that since we know that it is probably not possible to equalize the free/reduced lunch percentages at each school that we don't spend so much committee time trying to achieve this goal and focus on equity outside of free/reduced lunch percentages. One big way that could be done would be that in addition to the Title I money schools would receive, the school budget could give those schools with high percentages of free/reduced lunch more money to spend per student. This would allow things like smaller class sizes, help with closing achievement gaps, after school programs like homework help, tutoring, community services. Teachers, principles and parents in these schools with high free/reduced lunch percentages probably have even more ideas to improve equity and expand current programs, so lets get the money needed to these schools so that the b arriers to achievement can be broken and true equity can be achieved.

I would like to thank you for your consideration of the concerns and ideas that I have put forward in this letter. I hope that they can help the committee to move forward in it's task of setting the new high school boundaries with the least disruption and upset for students and families within our communities.

This said, it's the responsibility of us, as mature, supportive parents to assist our children in adapting to change. If we have a positive outlook on the great potential of each school as a component of the Beaverton community as a whole, this will serve to ease our kids' transition. Dear High School Boundary Change Committee,

Subject: Concern from ALH1 neighborhood family on the 12.17.15 proposal on school boundary change.

My family lives in the ALH1 neighborhood as shown in the Learning Map on 12.17.15 Meeting minutes. We reviewed the latest proposal on school boundary changes and have some deep concerns that we would like to bring to your attention.

Given the opportunity to change school boundaries, the proposals seem to focus only on moving students between schools and completely miss out on the opportunity to improve the schools also. The Dec 17th proposal has some schools at >100% capacity by design.

How does this help the students in the schools?

Why are the proposals even considering having schools at >100% capacity?

Coincidentally, the schools planned to overflow also have low graduation rates almost <12% compared to other schools, according to the Oregon Live reports.

Why is the School district further reducing the ability of the schools to improve by adding more burden on the teachers and management to just balance the overflowing students instead of helping the students with their education. If anything, we should reduce the boundaries area for Aloha and Beaverton HS, to support the teachers, management and students. It will also create more enthusiasm in the community if the school district also focuses on improving schools instead of just balancing student count. The dec 3rd 2015 proposal seemed to have a more balanced approach to the schools distribution that will not overwhelm the schools and allow room for development.

Other concerns grouped into the same categories the district has suggested:

Availability of space:

The latest proposal from Dec 17th completely breaks the Superintendent's proposal to keep school capacity to 90% or less. Also, it shows a highly unbalanced distribution, with Cooper Mountain HS at 63%, barlely over half filled whereas the Sunset High School and Aloha HS at 114% and 104% respectively, basically over crowded to start with and no room for growth. Making schools overcrowded to start with beats the whole purpose of this boundary remapping and does not meet the primary objective to keep the target capacity 90% of less for each school allowing room for growth. A more balanced approach to capacity distribution should be considered.

Neighborhood unity:

Our children attending Elmonica Elementary school and Five Oaks Middle school will now be split between Westview and Aloha high school. Transition to high school has its own challenges, and if the kids do not have their support system of friends only creates additional challenges and increases stress in the kids.

Proximity to School and Transportation:

Aloha HS is farther by more than 0.6 miles from our home when compared to Westview HS increasing the travel time on a daily basis. The roads the kids will travel between 185th and TV highway, have a very high rate of congestion as per ODOT reports http://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/HWY/REGION1/TV185th/OR8_RSA_Report_small.pdf Stretching the school boundary disproportionately does not help the congestion nor the kids. Adding more young kids to the congestion only increases wasted time on traffic jams, increased stress and cost of travel. The proposal should also consider maintaining or reducing students time on the road every day.

Safety:

According to Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) 185th-TV highway intersection has a very high crash rate almost 70 crashes in the last 5 years compared to <5 crashes in average among the other interections. Please refer to ODOT reports at: http://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/HWy/REGION1/Pages/tv185th.aspx and http://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/HWY/REGION1/TV185th/OR8_RSA_Report_small.pdf
Along with increased time to travel every day, the young drivers will need to cross the Freight rail road near TV highway and 185th intersection. Crossing rail roads is added risk and Freight rails add additional risk to young highschool drivers. Having young drivers drive several times on this intersection is risky and highly concerning as a parent.

Student Body composition:

The proposal significantly increases disproportion among the schools, in the number of students eligible for free/reduced lunch. It adds more segregation of the students instead of creating an inclusive environment.

Based on the information provided so far, having the kids from ALH1 neighborhood to Westview best helps resolve the issues I have stated so far.

Please reconsider your proposal and feel free to let me know if I can help in any other ways to improve the proposal.
