Dear High School Boundary Adjustment Committee,

We are residents at SW Waterleaf Street, Beaverton, for the last 20 years. Our children attended Elmonica. We now have one child at college in Oregon, a middle child at Westview HS and another one ready to go to Westview in a couple of years. We appreciate your work but are greatly disturbed (after reading hundreds of pages of documents on your website) that our Waterhouse South neighborhood may be assigned to Aloha. Allow me to offer my thoughts, ideas and reasons as follow please:

- 1. Waterhouse South historically has a strong affiliation with the Stonegate and other Waterhouse communities on either side of Walker Road. On the boundary map, it looks like you are surgically removing a big toe, cutting off the SE portion of a nice and even rectangle of the current Westview HS boundary for no obvious reason.
- 2. We have been very supportive of Elmonica and Westview, and have consistently supported the school district for additional funding through tax payers and being a volunteer for school projects and field trips. We do not have any problem for the school district to get or use more tax money for some high schools that need more help. However, to reshuffle the student population through boundary adjustments (is like redistricting election districts for political reasons) to gain additional funding apparently at the federal or state level is not acceptable because asking us to deprive our children themselves of the hope and expectation to continue their education at Westview is too much to bear on our part. My youngest child said to me, "Daddy, please don't let me go to Aloha. Please do something because I want to go to Westview just like my sister." What will you say to this child who is passionate in learning and knows about the value of a nurturing environm ent?
- 3. Your proposed adjustment is going to make Aloha reach its full 100% capacity by impacting our Waterhouse South neighborhood by moving students to Aloha while Westview or Sunset are still in their 90 plus percent capacities. It does not make a lot of sense when one of your plans is to move students in and out of Westview for no net change to the student population but will affect about 300 to 400 students.
- 4. I want to repeat what others have said that Waterhouse South is closer to Westview or Sunset than to Aloha. From the transportation, climate/greenhouse, and sustainability points of view, it makes more sense to keep Waterhouse South in the Westview HS boundary. Let me strongly suggest that you keep the residential neighborhoods north of Baseline Road and west of 158th Street intact within the Westview HS boundary.
- 5. When you have existing strong and vibrant neighborhoods that provide a solid tax base for public schools, parks and recreation districts, you should at least maintain them rather than break them up in an incohesive manner and risk losing your healthy cattle for milking. Won't you agree?

Remember you have the power to recommend the best boundary but we have the power to persuade you with the best reasons. I send my best wishes to you and your committee and hope you understand what you can do and will do for the Waterhouse South community. Please do not hesitate to ask me if you need any clarification, or if there is anything I can help. Thank you for taking time to hear my input at the beginning of February. Your positive recommendation would be greatly appreciated.

Dear High School Boundary Change Committee,

Thank you for being so transparent in your effort to realign the boundaries.

The most recent map has pulled the South Waterhouse and Blue Leaf neighborhoods into the Aloha School district. However, these neighborhoods are not part of the Aloha community and are separated by open fields, the water district land, the Elmonica Max station, various businesses and TV Highway. These neighborhoods don't commune in the same locations. This boundary change does not support your criteria for neighborhood unity.

In addition, the boundaries require the kids to cross two busy train tracks and one of the most dangerous highways in the state. It will also take significantly longer to travel to Aloha as compared to the other two high schools the boundary committee suggested on previous maps. This is a result of traffic and proximity. As a result, it does not seem the committee considered proximity to school, safety and transportation in making the current map proposal.

I ask that you reconsider pulling the South Waterhouse and Blue Leaf neighborhoods into the Aloha School boundary.

Hello,

We live off Rigert and 186th (North Cooper Mountain) and have been following the progress of the new HS boundaries. We noticed the initial map had our neighborhood within South Cooper MTN HS (29 October) and those right across the street in the Aloha HS boundary. The map on 12 November had same results with more detailed breakdown of students in each area. On 3 December, there was a learning Map which showed a transition of moving a large territory back to Aloha HS (including our area) and those across the street to the new high school.

Currently students in our area attend Errol Hassell ES. We assume that will continue. It would also seem many of these same students would attend Mountain view Middle and then the new high school (or maybe a split Aloha and South Cooper MTN).

We would appreciate consideration for moving our area just west of 185th and Rigert with "20" students into the South Cooper Mountain High School boundary. This boarding area would include the area between Northridge Woods or 189th (West) to 185th (East) and from SW Kelly View Loop (North) down to Gassner road (South). We are 6 minutes from the new high school and about same drive to Aloha.



Thank you for your commitment to the High School Boundary process. We, parents residing in the Sunset High School boundary, are grateful for the time and energy you are giving to this important decision; we truly appreciate your commitment to creating high school boundaries that are most likely to ensure success of every Beaverton child for decades to come.

One deficiency within the the Preliminary Proposal Boundaries Map released on Jan 15 is the disruption of Neighborhood Unity at Sunset and Beaverton High School. The map effectively separates Beaverton HS and Sunset HS Neighborhoods by wealth. Currently, we have strong Neighborhood Unity with healthy distribution between low, middle, and high income families at each school. The new boundaries remove an estimated 350 low income families from Sunset, which currently has one of the state's best low income graduation rates. This move of low income families out of Sunset creates one of the largest equity gaps between two neighboring schools in the district, leaving Beaverton HS at 53% and Sunset HS at 11% FRL.

Research shows schools with high FRL have fewer available volunteers, diminished fundraising for sports and activities, difficulty retaining experienced teachers and less parental support for education. When Southridge opened, a similar disparity emerged at neighboring Aloha, which has yet to be remedied. We do not want to see that disparity repeated.

The new proposed Sunset High School boundaries will have an estimated median home price increase of 64%, from \$350,000 to \$570,000, leaving one of the state's best schools available to only the wealthiest families in the district. This will have long term negative impact to Student Body Configurations at both Sunset and Beaverton High Schools.

Our group, **Outstanding Education for Every Child**, has developed maps to satisfy the criteria put forth by the district's policy JC and achieve better balanced high schools. We believe these maps show improvements to the currently Preliminary Proposal Map. Benefits of each map are noted next to the maps, but some highlights include:

Small Change - Some Improvements

Moves Barnes to Sunset reducing the current wealth disparity between Sunset and Beaverton.

Small Change - Significant Improvements

Moves Barnes to Sunset and decreases split feeders.

Medium Change - Major Improvements

- Reduction of split feeders. Whitford Middle School stays at BHS, per their requests, and Oak Hills no longer splits. This creates three entire high schools- Sunset, Beaverton, and Southridge, with no split feeders, key to maintaining Neighborhood Unity.
- Improved Equity numbers at all 6 schools
- Significantly lowers transitions per high school, which helps maintain current culture and Neighborhood Unity at existing schools.

We hope you, along with the committee, will strongly consider some or all of the improvements proposed by these maps. This is our opportunity to ensure every child, regardless of their address, has access to an outstanding education. Please consider the larger Beaverton Community Unity as a whole, and the voice of every child, when weighing this important decision for their futures.

Balanced & Lower Transitions Map


Logical map w/less transitions for majority of district






The population data was extracted from the 'High School Boundary Springboard Proposal', where the numbers were listed per grid code. These values should match the BSD published boundary maps with little error.

Dear high school boundary change committee,

Thank you for serving in this capacity. The current proposal of boundary change is disadvantageous to our community in various ways and goes against six out of seven criteria/standards stated by the district for determining boundary change.

- 1. Westvew high school has 135 spots available. Currently according to the proposed plan 113 students have to go to Aloha high school when Westview has spots available for them. If this proposal goes through then Westview will be at 94% capacity and Aloha at 100% capacity. Please reconsider to move students back to Westview where there is already room for them.
- 2. Splitting students into different schools is not good socially for kids as well as for the community as a whole. Stating from personal experience, childhood friends do make a long lasting impact and especially in teen years, it's important that they are together and united with their neighbourhood kids and playing on the same teams. Please give them the opportunity to be united and bond forever.
- 3. Westview is 2.8 miles and Aloha high school is 3.4 mi. Driving back and forth besides attending school, we will have to expend more time and energy. It will add to the gasoline expense.
- 4. Kid's safety is the ultimate goal of our lives. As parents we're extremely concerned about the busy TV HWY intersection, which is rated the most dangerous intersection in the state. We are very anxious that, our kids now have to cross that to attend school.
- 5. Current change will result in 61% Aloha HS students receiving free and reduced meals; the highest in district and Sunset at 11% being the lowest. This would increase the burden on Aloha HS to fund for the additional expense.
- 6. Aloha is ranked 252nd out of 292 High School in the state and Westview is ranked 35th.

Thank you so much for your time and efforts. We request you to revaluate the current proposal from our perspective. Please consider bringing student back to West view High School and giving them an opportunity to be united with their neighbourhood kids and surely, it would make a difference in the community.

Dear members of the Beaverton High School Boundary Advisory Committee
Thank you for the many hours of work that you have put into creating the best possible map.

I am writing to bring up a couple of concerns with the latest revision of the high school boundary map. I am a resident of the Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf neighborhood (area bordered by 170th, Walker, 158th and Jenkins). The Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf neighborhood will move from Westview to Aloha under the most recent proposed plan.

Neighborhood Unity: The Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf neighborhood has Nike to the east and Max line to the south. The primary interaction for the neighborhood is with the Waterhouse (north) and Stonegate neighborhoods to the north. The proposed plan will split Elmonica students who have grown up together between Westview and Aloha. Students in Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf will now attend Aloha whereas their friends across Walker will attend Westview.

Proximity and Safety: The Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf neighborhood is closer to Westview (2.8 mi) than to Aloha (3.4 mi). Moving to Aloha which is further away will result in additional emissions, extra driving and young inexperienced drivers needing to cross a very busy 185th/T.V. Highway intersection.

Space availability: For current revision of proposal, Aloha will be at 100% capacity whereas Westview will be at 95%. Instead of moving 113 Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf students to Aloha, it makes more sense to allow them to stay with Westview or move them to Sunset.

Equity: For current revision of proposal, Aloha will have 60% F&RL students whereas Sunset will have 11% F&RL students. While perfect equity is not possible, moving the Waterhouse (south)/Blueleaf students to Sunset will result in more equitable distribution of the F&RL students (Elmonica Elementary is a Title 1 school).

Please consider keeping the neighborhood along 173rd intact as those same neighboring students today, standing at the same bus stop would be split if the boundary line were to remain on 173rd Ave. Using 170th Ave as the western boundary for ALH1 follows the intent and criteria of creating such boundaries in the following ways:

- 1) Availability of Space at Westview High would allow this small number of students to be included in the Westview HS boundary and help reduce Aloha HS's capacity from 100%.
- 2) Proximity of School to Westview High is of shorter distance than the currently proposed high school for ALH1.
- 3) Neighborhood Unity in keeping our students, who have been together for 8+ years, a unit all the way through high school. These kids have grown up together, played sports together and developed strong bonds together and would benefit greatly if they could continue that unity all the way through their high school years.
- 4) Safety is increased by having only buses from one school picking up all the students from bus stops along 173rd Ave instead of twice as many buses and twice as many stops along the same road. Increasing congestion increases safety issues.
- 5) Transportation issues range from inefficiently having two buses servicing the same road from two different directions, no easy access from 173rd Ave to the South Waterhouse neighborhood and having to cross a major north/south arterial route in 170th Ave, which is also a Safety issue.





With the new boundary changes I believe that the Waterhouse South neighborhood has become an isolated island cut off from areas that we were very close to and considered part of our extended neighborhood - Waterhouse, Stonegate, Merewood . These neighborhoods just across Walker via a pedestrian crosswalk feel very connected to us. They are not only within easy walking distance, but they also attend the same elementary school and were in the Westview boundary as we were. Now with the new boundary proposal, not only are we cut off from our neighbors to the north of Walker, but to the south are empty lots, business parks, and Elmonica station and the MAX train tracks. We are a strange little appendage to the Aloha district. If we are included in this boundary Aloha will be at 100% capacity. Thank you for seeking comments in order to determine the best possible recommendation regarding the Beaverton School District High School Boundary changes.

We live in the Waterhouse South (ALH1) neighborhood with the children in our neighborhood attending Elmonica Elementary and Westview High. I believe that there are many reasons to keep our neighborhood part of the Westview High community including proximity, commuting safety, availability, and equity.

The safety of a commute to Aloha High is especially worrisome due to the need to cross Baseline, MAX tracks, TV Highway, and railroad tracks if our children attend Aloha High. In addition, It appears that Aloha is already planned for full capacity. At this very time, new apartments are being constructed adjacent to our neighborhood that are part of our geographic area as defined in the January 15, 2016 preliminary border proposal. When these apartments are occupied, it seems that they would push Aloha to over capacity.

As far as equity, Elmonica is a Title 1 school that would bring continued diversity to Westview.

However, my biggest concern is neighborhood unity. I feel strongly the neighborhood identity drives more interest and volunteering in schools and improvements in a community quality of life. If people identify with an area, they will work to improve it. If our children go to Aloha as defined in the current map, we would lose a sense of community as related to our High School. Beaverton Advisory Committee,

We know you've been inundated with letters and feedback about the proposed boundary changes. We also ask that you seriously review the recommendations by the public who care so deeply about the proposals that impact the education, well-being and socialization of our children in the community.

We have two children in the Beaverton School District attending Ridgewood Elementary School. We live in the Cedar Hills area, near Cedar Park Middle School. When we moved last year, we were careful to stay within our elementary/middle school and high school boundaries because of the quality of education and the community engagement our children have developed over the years. Ridgewood provides a unique, forward-thinking education program because it is a PYP elementary school which feeds into an IB middle school and eventually into Sunset, an IB high school. We value this way of teaching and deliberately chose this educational path for our children. Your current map proposes that we move to BHS which is AP, not IB. This would disrupt the continuity of the IB track for Ridgewood Elementary kids. This will negatively impact the kids and our community cannot afford to do that—our futures cannot afford to do that.

Beaverton School District has an opportunity right now to make adjustments to the boundaries that both maintain the health of the district and balance capacity while minimizing transitions for students. As you know, several resourceful parents in our community have developed a mapping tool, providing parents an easy-to-see visual of the different boundary options and their respective impact on secondary criteria as outlined in District JC Policy. Many maps have been produced, but our community feels that this is the right map for the district to view.

The link to the map is below. This map is one of four maps proposed by the "Outstanding Education for Every Child" group, which has attempted to prepare maps with the entire district in mind. In addition, it takes into consideration proximity, safety, neighborhood unity and equity/better balanced student body configuration. Finally, it maintains the IB track for Ridgewood Elementary School which, for us and many families, is significant.





Thank you for sharing your concerns about the legality of the current boundary adjustment process. Supt. Jeff Rose has read your email and he asked that I respond on his behalf. I have shared your email with our District's general legal counsel and I believe that we are in fact within board policy and statute in our process.

First, the sentence you highlighted from JC is permissive and not restrictive. The sentence reads "if the student enrollment at one or more schools is outside the guideline range" - it does not read "only if" making this the only basis for a boundary adjustment. Supporting this interpretation is the sentence that follows which reads "At the outset of *any boundary adjustment process*" suggesting that there are other basis for boundary adjustment beyond the one stated in the first sentence.

Next, you suggest that ORS 332.105, Board Policy BBA, BF, and BFE support your contention that there is only one basis for boundary adjustment. Again, we would disagree. Reading JC as we and our Board does, ORS 332.105 and Policy BBA and BF are not contra to that interpretation. Policy BFE provides that where there is no specific board policy, the Board delegates to the Superintendent the power to act. In this instance, there is no current board policy specifically addressing the opening of new schools and how those schools will be populated. The only way to populate a new campus would be to create an attendance boundary for that campus. The Superintendent is empowered by BFE to create a boundary for a new school which is part of the current process. The power created in BFE coupled with the plain meaning of JC supports the current boundary adjustment process engaged in by the District.

Please consider some of the following options provided to you by concerned parents. Please see attached maps created with the boundary explorer tool. As you can see, there are other alternatives to the boundary changes that reduce transition, help to provide better balance to free & reduced lunch, and maintains some of the requests from specific schools. We have heard directly from a BAC member that Aloha specifically asked to keep some areas south of Farmington as that is where their booster parents mostly come from. Aloha also requested to not increase their free & reduced lunch numbers. While maintaining those requests, the maps have still been altered with better fairness and equality than what was proposed at the public preview. According the same BAC member, it was also stated that Westview wished to keep some of the areas around Elmonica, again maintaining some of their free & reduced lunch numbers. As you can see, in some maps these requests have been maintained while still keeping others happy.

The area of Bethany (SUN1) should stay at Westview in order to bring Sunset's free & reduced lunch numbers up. By moving the SUN1 area back to Westview, you can now bring back in West TV and some Meadow Park areas. By doing this, you bring the numbers back up to better equalize FRL across the district rather than have Sunset at 11%.


With the changes in the attached maps, you would be adhering to the safety criteria as students would not have to drive down Hwy 217 from West Haven to get to Beaverton High School. Many parents have written in with concerns about the safety of our children and how this is being completely disregarded. Safety is one of the four primary criteria and needs to be considered when making boundary adjustments. By disregarding the concerns of our students traveling on Hwy 217, you are disregarding the policy that is supposed to be driving these changes. Greetings Boundary Adjustment Committee and BSD School Board,

I am the parent of a 3rd grader at Oak Hills Elementary. I am writing to express my concerns re: Oak Hills becoming a split feeder school as the current boundary proposal would dictate. The average current class size at Oak Hills is around 100 students. With the proposed plan approx 35 students (east of Bethany) from each class would go to Sunset High School and 65 students (west of Bethany Blvd) to Westview.

I feel the proposal jeopardizes our strong sense of community at Oak Hills Elementary which follows the students as they move to Meadow Park Middle School and into high school. As the parent of a sports involved kid who already has identified himself as a Westview Wildcat, I dread a discussion trying to explain to him that while the majority of his classmates will be going to Westview, a small number, including him, will attend Sunset. The impact of this split school could manifest as early as next year with our son having to sign up for sports teams (i.e lacrosse, baseball, etc) that track to Sunset High School and not Westview -- My son would have the potential to be on sports teams with kids he does not know and not be able to be on teams with friends he goes to school with and has played with for the last 4 years.

I appreciate the complexity and the many variables that drive boundary changes. However, it seems that making Oak Hills Elem a split feeder school can and should be avoided. With the current proposed change, Westview has a remaining capacity of another 135 - enough room to absorb the 35 Oak Hills students each year proposed to attend Sunset. I urge the Committee to adopt a model that allows ALL Oak Hills Elem students to feed into the same high school. It maintains community for our kids.

As a state with a low graduation rate, we need kids to feel part of community throughout their K-12 education. Please don't dilute our kids' strong sense of community by turning Oak Hills Elem into a split feeder school.

Thank you, committee, for all the work you're doing. I know it's not easy for citizen volunteers to take time out of their lives for such an involved project.

I would like to comment on the latest proposal to include the Elmonica/Waterhouse neighborhoods in the Aloha High School boundaries. This inclusion, I think, is the antithesis of what you're trying to accomplish, in terms of balance and recognizing community. The Waterhouse area has a southern boundary of Baseline Road, train tracks and the Max line, and we find our community is very much defined by those boundaries. We do not think of ourselves as part of Aloha; in fact school and extra-curricular activities, our shopping, etc. are more connected with communities near Walker/Cornell/Tanasbourne. Westview students routinely knock on our doors for their sports and other program booster fundraising efforts and we are happy to contribute.

In addition, I am very concerned about how the various proposals would continue to impact the students of Aloha High School -- an already stressed school. Those students deserve better than to have their numbers and infrastructure further impacted. Every proposal I've seen places their capacity at 100% or more, the most of any school in the district! Also, the lack of equity between what their subsidized lunch statistics and those of, say, Sunset High's is significant and disturbing. Elmonica's students -- already a diverse group - -could help bring those SL numbers of either Westview or Sunset into greater parity, without compromising capacity of those schools to the degree you're proposing to do with Aloha.

At the committee meeting last night, members stated that it's not a "numbers game," that there is concern about the welfare of the students. Diverting a small pocket of Elmonica/Waterhouse students away from their friends and feeder schools makes no sense to me. Please reconsider including those students North of Baseline in either the Westview or Sunset High districts. Thank you.

We know the new schools are coming online in the next few years and boundaries will have to change again; it does not make sense to only change the high school boundaries at this point. Parents make major decisions on where to live based on the school attendance, and right now we're being left with several years of uncertainty. The boundary process should be comprehensive and include elementary and middle school boundaries and HS feeders simultaneously so that the impact is not stretched out over years.

As you work through the HS level, I would only ask that you adhere to the stated primary criteria of 1) proximity to school and 2) safety. Highway 26 is the single largest natural barrier to traffic in the district, and based on that alone it is clear that **students who live North of 26 should attend Westview or Sunset.** To have a boundary map which does not reflect this reality is disingenuous and insulting to the parents and students north of 26 who deal with the realities of that crossing. You are ignoring the significant impact to the children and parents in this area.

Time is the ultimate limited commodity. By forcing kids to travel longer, you are asking them to give up part of their future. Please re-assess the current proposal, and consider how much time wasted in traffic can be avoided just by keeping students at the school closer to their home. I have included an attachment with two proposals which meet the stated criteria more effectively and I am also providing a link for those who are interested to view the maps online: https://app.box.com/BSD-Map-Examples

The boundary adjustment process so far has felt closed off and ineffective. Parents have been allowed to attend meetings, but not interact with the boundary committee members. Parent letters have been posted online, but there hasn't been a public response from the committee or district to most of the concerns or questions in the letters. Additionally, the Boundary Adjustment website is not updated in a timely manner. Why does it take weeks to publish meeting minutes?

The elephant in the room is clearly the school being built in the wrong place – I hope that there is accountability for this decision as well as the continuing cost overruns with the construction of the building. Hindsight is 20/20, but if the district had actually articulated the impact of a school in the south driving change district wide and moving 70% of the district then I seriously doubt the bond would have been passed – I know I wouldn't vote for the bond seeing the impact of such a poorly planned and executed growth strategy.


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



I would like to request the Boundary Committee to produce the time schedules for the buses for these new boundaries. What time will my child be required to wait on the corner for their bus to high school? 6:45 AM? 6:30AM? What time do you have the elementary school children picked up? What sort of time cushion have you allowed to accommodate the traffic on 217 Fwy and other busy routes throughout Beaverton?

Also, what are the budget numbers for the increased transportation expenses? My child is now traveling more than twice as far to attend school. Surely this may have a budget impact. Has this been determined for your proposed scenario? For any scenario? Surely these aspects should be discussed among Board Members.

Beaverton Advisory Committee,

We have two children in the Beaverton School

District attending Ridgewood Elementary School. We live in Cedar Hills, just south of Highway 26 and west of Cedar Hills Blvd. We carefully selected this area in 2003 to enroll our future children in Ridgewood Elementary, Cedar Park Middle School, and Sunset High School.

While we have written several versions of this

letter, this is the first version we have published. We of course wish to provide the best possible education to our children, but we also feel a responsibility to ensure that does not unnecessarily burden other families within the school district. We have

taken time to meet with the committee members as well as parents from around the district to better understand the needs of each area. Darren has spent the last several weeks developing the School Boundary Explorer website together with Brad Larson in order

to understand the impact of changes to the boundaries. Through this process we have gained an appreciation for what a monumental task this is. We recognize that every change causes ripples through the map which must be accounted for.

Our personal concerns are straightforward:

- Proximity: Beaverton is 0.6 miles farther away through heavy traffic and across the notably dangerous intersection of 8 and 10.
- Neighborhood Unity: Ridgewood has strong ties to Sunset. From friends, churches, and martial arts, to grocery shopping, libraries, and medical services, we live largely north of 26.
- Equity: Moving Sunset's southern border to Beaverton converts Sunset into an elite school for the privileged (11% FRL and a median home value of \$570k, versus \$350k today) and pushes Beaverton High well above the district average to 53%, where we fear it will struggle to maintain critical parent resources.

In reviewing the maps proposed by the community

in the School Boundary Explorer, we have seen a strong preference expressed for a clockwise rotation of the boundaries. These maps result in many fewer transitions and address many of the concerns we have heard voiced from parents across the district. We feel

this tools has given parents the opportunity to better understand the process as well as aggregate their collective understanding of the needs of the various communities within the Beaverton School District, resulting in a solution that improves upon the stated

criteria in the policy JC, but also has much broader support from the families within the district.

The attached map is one of four proposed by

the "Outstanding Education for Every Child" group, which has attempted to prepare maps with the entire district in mind. We feel this map is a significant improvement over the public preview map in all the categories mentioned above for us, as well as the

criteria expressed as priorities by other areas (which vary from area to area). One possible modification to this map based on community feedback would be to restore all of Fir Grove Elementary to Beaverton High, this comes at a

cost of less balanced capacity, but it does maintain capacity at reasonable levels.

Dear Boundary Committee and School Board

We have been following the boundary process following the approval, funding, and build out of the much anticipated South Cooper Mountain High School. The Beaverton School District is uniquely challenged in the available space that is large enough, build-able, and available to suit the needs of a new high school for our growing population of students. We are grateful that we have to worry about which school our children might attend, and not if they have a quality school to attend with reasonable class sizes.

There is nobody that would dispute that enrollment/class size is the leading indicator of performance, and as such, it should be given top consideration. Secondarily, diversity and economic status are key factors to balance a community education experience. Travel distance should be considered as well as neighborhood and community. Due to the challenge of the geography and how the socio/economic/ethnic groups are spread and concentrated across the district as well as how the district is biased with an abundance of 'north' residents and schools to the south, optimizing factors is challenging. Importantly in-fill (Sunset, Beaverton, Southridge) and expansion at the edges of the district borders (Westview and SCMHS) will continue to challenge enrollment. Balancing the other factors on top is important.

Particular consideration needs to be paid to future growth, which can happen dramatically and quickly, and much faster than the boundary process, and put undue burden on the schools.

There will be significant development in and around Springville/Kaiser, in the growth boundary, Saltzman/Thompson/Bonny Slope, and Laidlaw/Saltzman, in addition to the ongoing development on and around Cooper Mountain, north by Farmington and south by Scholls. Additionally, in-fill in legacy Raleigh Hills, Aloha, Beaverton, and south beaverton (Greenway/Conestoga) neighborhoods will continue. Total enrollment targets need to be considered not only for the next few years, but should be considerate of Metro and other regional plans to continue to drive in-fill to accommodate population expansion.

Regarding the boundary definition process, no solution will satisfy everyone, and the final implemented plan is sure to upset many. Certainly many are partisan and sometimes represent selfish views, and more likely are looking at short term outcomes. The current proposed plan does not fairly consider near term growth, pushing many school's capacity at implementation. The plan additionally does not seem to consider the additional impacts of economic status for learning (as indicated by the percentage of students who qualify for FREE or REDUCED LUNCH -FRL) where possible, and how to influence. Lastly, and importantly, neighborhood centered schools minimize travel, save time and money, and build community.

We would propose that:

- The boundaries of all schools need to biased to the north to enable balanced enrollment and capacity flexibility vs. the proposed plan.
- The boundaries should secondarily try and even-out economic and ethnic diversity. This is a unique and potentially unaddressable consideration given the current layout and concentration of different economic and ethnic groups within the current boundaries.
- The boundaries should focus to have community areas, which minimize travel distance, both for individuals and

school bus services. Importantly, the boundaries need to minimize disconnected areas and keep students together where possible, working to avoid obvious 'special interest' districting (i.e. fingers of map districting).

With special thanks to BHLarson/DVHart, the boundary map utility has added a lot of transparency to everyone in this process, importantly representing and illustrating dynamic changes in total enrollment, diversity, economic status (as indicated by FRL), and travel distance. We did not optimize a map, but found several examples that can best enable a process to address our points above, all with better balance than the recent Preliminary Proposal which has several schools at 100% or near capacity, and importantly Aloha represents the highest FRL at the highest capacity. That simply does not makes sense. It is difficult to affect a change in FRL distribution across this district without a specific and expensive affirmative action effort, that should not be considered, but it is possible to provide some relative advantage across the schools while considering future growth.


We support several of the proposed alternative maps that offer at least some designed in capacity headroom, particularly for both Westview/SCMHS districts, that enable in-fill attendance at or below design targets for the other schools, and, where possible, distribute FRL across the district, or at least minimize crowding in the heavily burdened FRL schools. Plans, which are non-special interest, as written by others, share our perspective, and balance the factors of future space, FRL, transitions, where possible. We would encourage the committee and board to factor in our considerations for our communities long term benefit following the boundary lines as suggested in several of the maps below where every key factor is better than that proposed by the district.





Balanced & Lower Transitions Map



We have two children in the Beaverton School District attending Ridgewood Elementary School. We live in the Vista Hills neighborhood, just east of Highway 217, off of Walker Road.

We carefully selected this area neighborhood when we moved here 2 years ago and were deliberating between moving to Bridlemile in PPS (so that our girls would go to Lincoln) or to enroll them in the BSD where they would get the IB education promised by going to Ridgewood Elementary, Cedar Park Middle School, and then Sunset High School.

We feel grateful that many parents in our community have taken the time to develop the School Boundary Explorer website and would like you to strongly consider the benefits that Map C-6 would give to the community at large, not only our own immediate community.

Our personal concerns with the current plan for our family and the community at large are: proximity to school, neighborhood unity, and equity.

Map C-6 is one of four proposed by the "Outstanding Education for Every Child" group, which has attempted to prepare maps with the entire district in mind. We feel this map is a significant improvement over the public preview map in all the categories mentioned above for us, as well as the criteria expressed as priorities by other areas (which vary from area to area).

Dear BSD Boundary Change Committee,

I am writing this letter as:

- a former educator (I taught high school chemistry for 22 years),
- a parent of two graduates of Westview High School, in 2000, and 2003 respectively,
- a long-time resident of the Waterhouse South neighborhood (ALH1 on your map), for 23 years,
- and a business manager/partner/owner in the Beaverton for 18 years, now retired.

Though I no longer have children at home who are affected by your decision, I think I am somewhat qualified to comment on the decision that you are about the make: the repositioning of school boundaries. When I first read about the daunting task you have before you, re-defining Beaverton high school boundaries to accommodate 6 high schools instead of the previous 5 high schools, my first thought was that it was obvious that 15- 20% of our BSD students would necessarily have to be affected by the addition of a new Beaverton high school. Fair enough. I watched with passing interest as the first map appeared, and our neighborhood school was changed from Westview HS (our neighborhood's high school since 1994) to Sunset HS—yes, it appeared our students would be among those whose high school would change.

But then, I, like many of our neighbors, was caught completely off-guard when the second map revision appeared, and Waterhouse South was again changed, this time from Sunset HS to Aloha HS. This seemed unusual, to say the least. Especially given that in the latest round, it was almost impossible not to notice that our area (ALH1) had the appearance of an odd "appendix", by itself on a distant northeast corner of the Aloha High School District. I had to ask myself if this was because our neighborhood was not as vocal as other neighborhoods in other parts of Beaverton? It was then that my wife and I decided that we should attend a neighborhood meeting to learn why these changes occurred.

At that meeting, the first thing we noticed was the wide variety of neighborhood participants. We are, indeed, the type of neighborhood that Mayor Denny Doyle envisions for Beaverton's future. We are very close to Elmonica TriMet station. We have a great deal of mixed-use housing, having taken on many new apartment block developments during the past few years. Our neighborhood has a great deal of cultural diversity, from Asian-American to Asian-Indian to Hispanic to African-American. And, it is a neighborhood that "works". On any given day, you can watch many families walking in our neighborhood: people walking home from the TriMet station, people walking their children to and from Elmonica School, people walking or cycling to Fred Meyer to do their shopping. The neighborhood meeting last week at Elmonica Elementary School reflected this cultural diversity; we had a variety of ethnic groups, many of whom spoke with the accent of a first-generation American. It reflected what Beaverton is all about: equity, cultural diversity, and a mixed-use neighborhood.

As a former educator, I know the importance of neighborhood stability in the lives of our young people. In the past, the Waterhouse South area has had that kind of stability, a neighborhood that has taken a great deal of pride in being Westview Wildcats. Even after our own children graduated, we continued to attend Westview events, donate to kids going door-to-door to collect for school functions, and we even donated time to schools. Of course, staying with Westview HS would have been a good option. AND, there was plenty of room in Westview for our 113 high school students.

I also noticed at this meeting that there were a large number of other people who were blind-sided by our recent school-boundary changes from Westview HS to Sunset HS, and then from Sunset HS to Aloha HS. When the original Beaverton School District committee moved our neighborhood students from Westview to Sunset, perhaps that made sense; after all, our socio-economic levels, cultural diversity, and percentage of students with free and reduced lunches would only add to Sunset High School's diversity, in a positive way (With the most recent boundaries, Sunset HS would now have, by far, the very lowest number of students with free and reduced lunches in our school district.). The distance and travel time for our students to Sunset HS was about the same as to Westview HS, and both routes were equally safe for transportation, be it by bus, automobile, bicycle, or even walking.

But our neighborhood meeting participants were at a complete loss when the most recent boundary map came out. By all appearances, it appeared that the more vocal people in a variety of districts had won out over Waterhouse South. In addition to the odd "appendix" our neighborhood had with Aloha HS district, what sense did it make to take a neighborhood (ours) with a great deal of cultural diversity, and a fairly high free and reduced lunch population, and add it to Aloha HS (with similarly high free and reduced lunch population)? Not to mention an even longer commute to Aloha HS, both in distance, and especially in travel time. Furthermore, students would have to cross two busy highways, T-V Highway and Farmington Road, as well as the TriMet light rail line, to get to and from school. And, last, but certainly not least, our neighborhood would add 113 students to a school (Aloha HS) that is now at 100% of capacity in the most recent boundary map, compared with Westview's 94%--yes, Westview clearly does continue to have room for students (135 vacant spots) from our small contingent of students.

In conclusion, I ask you to reconsider the changes in the latest boundary revision. Either Westview HS or Sunset HS would be a better solution for our neighborhood, and in either case, these two schools would benefit from the cultural diversity and free and reduced lunch percentage of our Waterhouse South neighborhood. I hope you will give our small neighborhood a fair chance for the future.

My neighborhood, Merewood, is currently slated for a boundary adjustment from Westview HS to Sunset HS. I believe that all of our neighborhood is united in feeling that this is a feasible compromise and a better adjustment than if we were included in Aloha HS. The homes in Merewood are on the North side of Walker Rd which seems a natural boundary division. Merewood property owners have been moving to this area because of the school academics, rating and scores of Westview and have made moves to this neighborhood because of this information. My family and I recently purchased our home and one of the main factors was the assignment of Westview HS, which is rated high, as our designated HS. Sunset is similarly situated in its ranking and is geographically, via streets, actually closer to our neighborhood and so it is much preferred over Aloha. Aloha unfortunately has historically been a poor performer in the county and state and is further away from our home and involves navigating 185th or similarly crowded access streets. Anyone who drives south on 185th knows of the traffic issues that plague getting to Aloha. As a parent who regularly has to drive all three of my children to their schools due to my husband and my work schedules, the thought of driving down 185th is not appealing in the least and frankly would add stress and and additional burden to our family of 5. I know that Stonegate and Merewood has perhaps not been as vocal as other locations, like the parents in Cedar Hills, who are slated to move to Beaverton HS, however, do not mistake our acquiescence as not caring or that we are not concerned, it is just that for the most part, we are happy with the proposed boundary changes. Obviously those who are not will tend to be more organized and object more loudly in an effort t have their voices heard. 

Members of the BAC,

Ahead of tonight's meeting, I'd like to reiterate how appreciative we are of the work you are doing on behalf of the district.

I'd also like to comment on two things that have been receiving a lot of attention amongst BSD community members:

- 1) The boundary mapping tool developed by two BSD parents. I'm not sure how the BAC as a whole views this tool but I'm very much hoping that some of the maps being produced with it and sent in with comments are being considered. Several of the options that have been designed appear to improve upon the maps coming out of committee. I'm attaching the one I prefer Map C-6b. It's a creative solution that makes transitions more equitable, distributes FRL a bit more amongst the schools, and leaves room in the areas experiencing growth. I feel pretty strongly that the attendance areas with the most overcrowding, and experiencing the most growth, should bear the brunt of the of the changes, even if that means the new school is under capacity for the foreseeable future. "Share the pain", as opposed to minimizing it as much as possible, is not a defensible strategy when it comes to the students and families in our or any district.
- 2) The PPS Administrative Directive for Student Assignment Review & School Boundary Changes, particularly page 5, which discusses student transitions during boundary changes. I very much hope that the <u>number one goal</u> of the committee in drafting a transition plan is <u>minimizing change</u> for students and families. The schools and district should make all reasonable adjustments to accommodate students during this very temporary situation rather than expecting students and families to adjust.

The applicable text from page 5 of the document is exactly what should be accepted by the BAC for the BSD transition plan:

- 1. Students living in the neighborhood approved for a boundary change have the right to attend either their current school through the highest grade or the newly assigned neighborhood school. Students who remain at their current school and later want to attend the newly assigned neighborhood school have the right to do so with an on-time transfer request (4.10.051-P).
- 2. Younger siblings living in a neighborhood approved for a boundary change shall be guaranteed a space at the former neighborhood school if:
 - a) They make timely application through the annual transfer process (4.10.051-P), and
- b) An older sibling currently attends and will be attending the former neighborhood school during the upcoming school year.

One last comment re: South Cooper Mountain HS:

I hope that any requests made by students wishing to enroll in the new high school will be approved, regardless of neighborhood school assignment. Why not do a survey to see how many families would be

interested in that option? If enough students from non-SCMHS areas are interested, that might make the transition accommodations easier to manage at other high schools.

Thanks again for all your hard work and for your consideration of the above.



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



Hi.

Thank you for taking the time to read this commentary -- I appreciate the investment by the BSD, parents and teachers into this complex process.

I'm most concerned about the growing disparity between the socio-economic levels at Sunset and Beaverton High Schools. My twin boys are at Ridgewood Elementary in 1st grade, so there's plenty of time for that disparity to manifest itself over the next 12 years -- not to mention the next N years. We moved to this neighborhood 7 years ago when we gave birth so our boys could go to Ridgewood and Sunset, and so it's upsetting to see this re-districting happening.

I've heard, and it makes logical sense, that lower average socio-economic levels correlate to fewer parent volunteers for classroom assistance, events, fundraising, sports assistant coaching etc. -- as well as and perhaps most importantly lower average student achievement levels. If this disparity cannot be addressed via the boundaries, it should be addressed via class sizes or in another way. Would parents clamor to Sunset HS if Beaverton HS classes were 30% smaller? Calibration of student achievement so that more resources and smaller class sizes go towards students that need more attention and specialized programs might be considered. Disparities in funds and volunteers available for extra-curricular programs could also addressed by providing more funding and staff to schools with lower resources / volunteers. This all gets very expensive and may be more easily solved by figuring out a boundary distribution that provides similar socio-economic distribution ac ross BSD.

I appreciate your patience working through this process and hope that the additional information provided by the School Boundary Explorer has enhanced the conversation. Please do not give up on more creative solutions. The current process of exchanging grid codes will never produce the best solution for our children. The submitted letters contain many much better approaches that should be implemented.

I have included an excellent solution titled "Reduce Distance & Transitions" that significantly improves the proximity of students to school as well as reduces student transitions while meeting the capacity constraints when compared to the Public Preview proposal.

Because the school district has not shared the safety database used for bus transportation, we are now completing in the process of including the ODOT and Washington County transportation safety data into the School Boundary Explorer. I hope to provide an accident rate for the different solutions shortly. It is important to note that the safety of the routes within the school district vary significantly. Some of our schools are adjacent to very dangerous intersections according to state and county data. As a result, students can travel to a particular school with much lower risk from some locations and with much greater risk from others.


I hope this information is valuable to you. It has been very enlightening for me to accumulate and process it.







I am writing to request that Oak Hills Elementary NOT be a split feeder school. Five years ago, our community rallied to reduce the impact of the Bethany Blvd expansion splitting our community. We had modest success in our campaign (the road is narrower, with crosswalks, lights, lower speed limit,) but the experience was chilling. We had to ask ourselves what would it be like for our tight-knit neighborhood to be split apart by a road? It felt so arbitrary, and our community felt so powerless against Washington County, who didn't much care for words like "community."

And now we are facing a different kind of split: a literal split of our community of children along that same road. After bonds of friendships are formed in their nine years together in elementary school and middle school, BSD is proposing splitting them into different high schools. These children already attend a middle school which is a split feeder for the high schools. That means they already lose friends from middle school when they go to high school. Please do not do this at the elementary level as well. It is disruptive to so many areas of our children's lives. I am asking that the entire Oak Hills community remain together, whichever high school we go to.

Our neighborhood does not feel so powerless this time, because we know that BSD does care. We know that BSD is trying to achieve "neighborhood unity. Whenever possible, neighborhood areas, particularly at the elementary level, should be retained within a single attendance boundary." We know that BSD is trying to "minimize transitions for students." We know that this latest alignment does not meet BSD's own criteria.

Please correct this oversight. Please remember that these are not just numbers on a map. These are my kids and our friends, and these are our bonds of friendship and support that we have nurtured for years.

Socioeconomic

It raises transportation costs and divides communities. Hasn't there been a movement in the district to encourage kids to walk/bike to school more? What is the environmental impact of increased busing/driving?

Neighborhood unity / Feeder schools

This one is tough because we all know the elementary and middle schools are slated to adjust as well. I whole heartedly agree that we should work to align feeder schools 100%. Dear Boundary Committee Members,

I am writing to encourage you to adopt a transition policy that will not disrupt students' high school experience. The current proposal to move students after they have started their high school careers is unacceptable for many reasons. One of foremost reasons is that it will destroy relationships students have developed with teachers, counselors, coaches, administrators, and fellow students. It seems commonsensical to me that damage to these relationships will negatively affect students' performance in high school. While doing some research on this topic, I found many studies that agreed with my common sense determination about the importance of relationships and student success in high school. Here are a few highlights of what I discovered:

- A 2013 Portland Public School study on improving graduation rates states that Beaverton School District officials name three factors that keep kids in school and on track to graduate. One of those factors being "good relationships with teachers and school staff".
- A 2014 report by the State of Oregon's Quality Education Commission speaks of the importance of "connectedness to schools" and that schools need to "provide and encourage connections". This report references an Indiana University study that also emphasizes the importance of relationships. It states that "students must feel they are a part of a community and have a strong relationship with one or more adults in the school".
- -A January 29, 2016 article in the Oregonian newspaper "Grad rates up, but schools' success varies" makes numerous references to the importance of relationships with regard to high school success. The article mentions "strong relationships" as a commonality between successful schools. The article specifically profiles Sunset High School's significant improvements for Latino students and their approach of building "strong relationships with every student". Mr. Huelskamp (Sunset's principal) states that the thing that made the biggest difference for the class of 2015 was their "emphasis on relationship".

Relationships take time to develop. Under the current transition proposal, students will be moved just as these relationships are beginning to develop and strengthen. They will go through their high school experience with little or no meaningful relationships and suffer the consequences. Please do right thing for our students and adopt a policy that will not break and destroy crucial relationships. Portland Public Schools policy allows students to finish where they start and lets their siblings follow. Please adopt a policy like this and look out for the best interest of our students.

I have serious concerns with dividing up the kids at Oak Hills Elementary. I think both Sunset and Westview are good schools, my concern is not which high school my children go to, **but that the kids in elementary school will be divided.** Right now you have programs like Westview Lacrosse, Westview Cheer, Westview football, etc. If you keep the boundaries as is, my child will be in elementary school and unable to play sports with their other school friends. My child will be required to sign up for Sunset youth sports, while 80% of his/her class with be playing Westiview youth sports. On game days they will be wearing jersey's from Sunset surrounded by Westview Jerseys in their own cafeteria and on recess. This will also be an issue in middle school, at Meadow Park.

Dear Boundary Adjustment committee,

I would like to express concerns over the latest boundary map proposed with regards to the ALH1 region. This community currently has Elmonica as its elementary and Five Oaks as middle school and Westview as high school. The latest proposal moves this area to Aloha high school.

I am concerned about the neighborhood unity for the ALH1 area -

- 1. Students in Elmonica elementary are invited to participate in various clubs and sports activities like basketball camps, cheerleading camp, lacrosse etc at Westview. Similarly Five Oaks has long standing relationship with Westview for several sports activities. With this move you have isolated 100 kids from this area after nearly 8 years of involvement with Westview for various activities to move to a totally different high school Aloha. This does not sound logical and is not an acceptable proposal.
- 2. ALH1 does not have any tie up with Aloha in terms of community involvement, elementary or middle school neighborhood or even proximity. This area is separated from Aloha community by MAX lines and THPRD wetlands and parks. The feeder elementary and middle schools to Aloha are not the ones that are attended by kids in ALH1 area. Kids going into high school look for familiar faces to associate with and help alleviate the fear and tension around high school. Isn't it cruel to these 100 kids to be deprived of this comfort. While all their friends from Elmonica and Five Oaks who they have known for 8 years attend Westview, these poor set of 100 kids will be segregated and forced to attend Aloha. This is not good for the mental, social and emotional well being of these kids. It will be very hard for them.
- 3. There are several housing units, predominantly apartment complex, condos coming up near Costco/Jenkins and near the MAX line. With Aloha already at 100% capacity, this does not allow for any growth with these new units coming up. While new construction is taken into account in the North Bethany area, why is this not considered in terms of additional capacity that would be needed for Aloha. Also North Bethany has new construction of individual homes starting at 350K and hence a rich neighborhood. The condos and apartments under construction in the ALH1 area are quite cheap and range from \$500 \$900 rent. This is considered a poor neighborhood and possibly increase in FRL #'s for Aloha. Adding ALH1 to Aloha would put Aloha at more than 100% capacity and also increase the FRL %. With ALH1 areas proximity to shopping complex, MAX, bus and Hwy 26, schools and THPRD, it is a popular place to rent. So please take into consideration the population increase due to this n ew construction of 600+ apartments and condos. Adding ALH1 area to aloha would place it at 100% to start with and also allow no room for any growth. What about the superintendent's policy of less than 95% capacity. Even without ALH1 moving to Aloha, this criteria cannot be met, then why consider this move and introduce more problems of traffic safety, equity, neighborhood split etc.

Breaking neighborhood unity, increasing the distance to travel to school, introducing traffic safety concerns and mainly equity concerns make this proposal not acceptable by the community.

Please, the community kindly requests the committee to reconsider the proposal and move ALH1 back to Westview boundary. As an alternative while moving it to Sunset boundary would address equity, safety, proximity and transportation it would violate the neighborhood unity.

NEIGHBORHOOD UNITY should be a big factor in boundary proposal as this "directly" affects the social and emotional

well being of the kids. Please please reconsider the proposal and keep ALH1 part of Westview for the welfare of the students and the community.

Greetings Committee Members and School Board Members,

My name is Cyndie Pelto, and I am a parent of a 7th grader at Meadow Park Middle School, and 3rd Grader at Oak Hills Elementary. I very much appreciate your taking the time to read our comments and thoughts. I know it's not an easy task.

I have been involved in the PTO at both schools for many years, working to form a sense of community, unity, and continuity as our children travel through their education. As a former 3rd grade teacher, staying home with my children but working as a volunteer in their classrooms and schools, I have had the fortunate opportunity to witness firsthand the impact our elementary community has had on the larger community, both Middle and High School, and beyond.

Our focus over the last 8 years of my involvement: Neighborhood and School UNITY. We are Oak Hills. 60% of our school does not live in the Oak Hills Neighborhood. We are ALL Oak Hills. We play sports together, we ride our bikes to each others house, we walk and ride bikes to school together, and we grow up together. We look forward to supporting one another in Middle School, and then are relieved to see familiar faces in High School. This is what we would like to see continue for our community. Our Elementary School Community. Bethany Blvd does not divide us. We have been brought CLOSER as a result of the new safe routes to school, walking and biking groups, and the elimination of our buses. The High School boundary should not divide us.

Our children have come to us, their parents, asking for us to SAY something. To DO something. They have invested many years into their friendships, and want to be able to rely on those friendships to make the transition to high school a more fluid one.

Criteria for Boundary Changes is said to include *Neighborhood Unity*. The Superintendent Proposed Objectives for Boundary Adjustments includes *Minimizing transitions for students*. *Neither of these objectives are being met* for our students under the current Boundary Map proposal. As it stands, the students living in the Oak Hills neighborhood and the East side of Bethany Blvd. are being asked to go to a high school (Sunset) with only approx. 35 students (per grade level) that they have grown up with. That's it. They are being asked to make all new friends in high school, during a time in their lives when relying on former family friendships is of great importance.

Our school prides itself in giving back to the larger community, and supporting our former students as they work to become young adults. Our Westview high schoolers and Meadow Park middle schoolers both come back to Oak Hills Elementary, their alma mater, to mentor our young learners and volunteer at community events. Our school musical pulls professionals from the community and alumni at Westview to mentor the kids. Our little kids attend Cheer Camp at Westview High, and are comfortable seeing familiar faces from the neighborhood at the "big kid school". When houses caught fire, the entire community as one fundraised to help those in need.

Becoming a split feeder elementary school will bring in competition amongst the younger students as they now feed into competing sports programs. Families will no longer be brought together through sports, but rather separated further. My son has friends that he has played soccer with since 1st grade. These boys have many differences (academically, socially, etc), but they grew up together and support one another. I think about how differently the younger children in our school will experience our sports programs and I am saddened. We will lose our sense of community and support for one another.

We have something pretty special here at Oak Hills Elementary, and we are proud of seeing that continue to Middle and High School. I live on the West Side of Bethany, but I am a proud member of the Oak Hills Elementary community. I have served on the PTO there for 5 years, as well as organized our primary fundraiser Jog-A-Thon for the last 4 years. I also direct our neighborhood Community Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving, where we teach our children about giving back. I am always so proud to call upon our Meadow Park and Westview students to come back and volunteer at these events. It is such a powerful statement to our young kids to see the older kids giving back and appreciating where they came from. My son has played, along side his friends who live in Oak Hills, baseball, soccer and basketball. They have invested a lot of years together, identifying with the Westview sports programs, and we would like to see that continue for them. Together. As ONE community. This isn't a new community. It's an older established community with roots, all of our roots together.

We hope you will strongly consider keeping our community as ONE elementary school moving forward with the boundary proposal. Our kids grow up together, play sports together, mentor one another, and would benefit greatly if they could continue that unity through high school. This is what our KIDS are asking for. It's important to THEM.

Beaverton Advisory Committee,

We have two children currently attending Ridgewood Elementary School. Next year our eldest will be moving on to Cedar Park. As such we are very interested in the school boundary change process taking place at the high-school level.

We have two areas of concern with the current proposed boundary map and believe these are widely shared by the other Ridgewood parents we have spoken to. First, Ridgewood Elementary is a PYP school under the IB program. This IB track continues on to the MYP program at Cedar Park and then to the Sunset IB program. Moving the existing Ridgewood area into Beaverton High School boundaries deprives these children of completing the IB program after nine years of effort and learning under PYP and MYP. We are highly supportive of the IB program and believe Ridgewood students should stay within the Sunset boundary. If Ridgewood is ultimately moved to a different high school (currently Beaverton) boundary we would ask the district to commit to expanding the IB program to that high school and allowing full completion of the program for Ridgewood and Cedar Park students. A third less preferable option would be for the district to allow students in the Ridgewood area dispensation to attend Sunset and the IB program if desired.

The second concern with the current boundary as it stands is the projected free/reduced lunch numbers in the latest proposal. We applaud the boundary committee for making a real effort to address some of the inequalities between the current high school boundaries. However the latest proposal seems to be going in the wrong direction. The movement of Sunset High School's boundaries entirely north of the Sunset freeway results in a significant outlier with respect to the rest of the schools. An estimated 11% Free/Reduced Lunch at Sunset vs 61% at Aloha is outrageous and flies in the face of one of the major stated goals of this boundary change process. There are other proposals brought to our attention which reduce this differential and should be considered. One of these is these is located at the following link:

Dear High School Boundary Change Committee,

I very much appreciate your commitment to our community and for volunteering for this difficult task. I am deeply concerned that proposed high school boundaries are not equitable for the entire district. It appears the changes throughout the process have been a result of influence from the wealthier communities. Here are a few examples with the latest boundary map:

- The current map has Sunset high school at 11% free/reduced lunch. The springboard map had Sunset at 19% free/reduced lunch.
- The current map has Sunset at only 7% Hispanic. The springboard map had the Sunset student body at 14%.
- The current map draws the Sunset boundary at Hwy 26. However, there is opportunity for making Sunset's population more diverse by including neighborhoods south of Hwy 26.
- Aloha is the only school on the current map that has 100% capacity, and is also the school with significantly more students that qualify for free/reduced lunch.

Students who attend schools with a diverse population develop an understanding of the perspectives of children from different backgrounds and learn to function in a multicultural, multiethnic environment. Please create boundaries that are equitable for all our students, regardless of their background.

Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee,

I feel compelled to share my concerns with the latest boundary proposal from Jan 21st. The newest proposal would split Oak Hills Elementary into two high schools. Not only would this mean two different high schools for the kids, it would create an internal divide for all extra circular programs that are vital to helping young people develop. No longer being able to count on signing up with their friends to join Basketball, Baseball, Soccer, Cub Scouts, Girl Scout, etc will only result in lower participation and a very awkward/unnecessarily competitive environment at an age when we should be trying to teach children to support each other.

Another alarming subject is the future of Oak Hills residents when they get ready to make one of the most stressful transitions of a young adult's life. After years of being around their friends, what amounts to around 5% of the Meadow Park population would have to make the jump to high school by themselves. The BSD would essentially be putting children that live in Oak Hills on an island in limbo for three years. While they go to a school the sends 90%-95% of its student body to Beaverton and Westview, Oak Hills kids would on their own unable to establish pride or excitement for their future high school.

While I can only image the work it will take to complete this process, I fear for the additional hurdles being put in front of residents of the Oak Hills neighborhood as they progress through elementary and middle school. When final decisions are being made, please ask yourself if you'd be happy with your child in this situation. In a different sports league(not team) from his/her best friend that they sit next to in class, in a different cub scout pack then their other friend that they eat lunch with. Public relations for the BSD is geared for the student. Currently "WE" have a program called the Beaverton School District Pillars of Learning. "WE" describe the mission or vision of how this will be accomplished. I am bothered that "WE" did not put ourselves in the students place when considering boundary changes. 



Yesterday the BHS principal sent a letter to all incoming freshman families that led me to further reflect on my hope that the BSD will **allow students to finish at the high school they start at**. Meaning, if a student has already attended a particular high school that they will be allowed to continue there through graduation.

In Principal Erwin's letter, she noted that BHS is "keenly aware of the importance of a successful freshman year" and that "the transition to high school can be challenging and so we try to create a smooth and supportive transition for students and families."

So that incoming freshman and their families feel connected and engaged in their high school, there are shadow days, a Freshman Family Night Feb 18th, a Family Chat night May 18, and the school has set up Beaver Lodges that each "has a teacher who will stay with the group for four years."

Clearly, the high school and the district acknowledge the importance of students having connections, community, and continuity for all four years of high school. Yet, the way the current plans sits is that the students who will be freshman and sophomores this fall will have to change high schools. This destroys all the community-building and connections for these two years of students.

In addition, having students start at one high school and move to another is an extreme hardship for the families, like mine, who have older siblings already at a particular high school. We are already stretched thin to figure out the transportation after school for sports and clubs. With the district's current plan we would have to travel to two different high schools every day to allow our kids to participate in clubs and sports. Not to mention the unrealistic plan of being at two HS booster clubs, principal coffees, volunteering, etc.

Bottom line: let students finish where they start and let siblings stay together.



Dear High School Boundary Committee and BSD district staff,

After reviewing the most recent boundary proposal statistics from the public preview 1/21/16, we remain concerned about the likelihood of overcrowding at Westview and Sunset high schools in the near future.

- Boundaries for Westview and Sunset include high growth areas at the north end of the district, but potential students from these areas are not accounted for in these statistics.
- Findley elementary school boundary area has a high student generation rate (.97 vs. district average .44), but it seems this is not included among those to which a high generation rate is attributed in these statistics. More than a doubling of the total student generation rate seems important to include in the committee's statistics to avoid underestimating the number of students expected from this area. Are higher and lower generation rates for other areas (as described by the 2012 PSU study) addressed in these statistics?

We ask that you do not make this change for juniors, only for incoming freshman that do not have siblings that go there for the reasons that follow.

First, as a Junior, with two years in high school, you have pretty solid friend groups, know teachers that can help you out, and know your way around the school. Starting over and trying to fit into both the academic and social parts of school at the same class with higher-than-freshman classes is difficult. The problem of massively over-crowded high schools can only be addressed with the redistribution of student populations so that our district can continue to deliver a meaningful education in reasonably-sized classes in environments healthy for both students and teachers. I do hope that the district maintains a commitment of socio-economic (as well as ethnic) diversity in the re-drawing of high school attendance boundaries.

It is my observation that the negative responses to proposed new school attendance boundaries is driven mostly by fear: Fear of "others," or of the people that parents did not intend for their children to attend school with, fear of change (there is nothing more certain in our times than the inevitability of change), and, by far the most legitimate cause for fear and anger, lack of clarity about what the immediate future will bring to students and their families. In its focus on getting the necessary new attendance boundaries "right" or "the best for everyone concerned," the school district has focused so much time and attention on the architecture of those boundary lines that the root cause for student and family insecurity has gone unaddressed: a complete uncertainty of just what programs will be on offer at the high schools students will be attending next fall. No vision or plan has been offered to students addressing potential improvements in academic programming at high schools. No vision or plan has been offered to 8th grade students regarding the forecasting they are trying to do for their high school academic programs while not knowing which high school it will be that they will be attending this-coming fall. No vision or plan has been offered to explain to students active in sports or other extra-curricular activities about their chances for continuing in the activity of their preference at their newly assigned high school.

Will the district enable and facilitate changes in academic programs that will not just equalize but elevate all high schools to the same level of excellence, thereby eliminating negative perceptions of "that school"? Can all of our district's high schools be given the resources necessary to provide the most desirable academic programs? Different schools in our district have become known for their relative strengths in English Language Learning programs, vocational training, health profession certificate programs, International Baccalaureate course work, Advance Placement course work, foreign language offerings, and different extra-curricular activities. If it is not feasible to offer everything at every school, than choices need to be made available and explicit to students so that they can participate in the programs of their choice. (I would much rather see equitable offerings at all schools, rather than "magnet schools" splitting up the student populat ion, ending the diversity that makes our district strong.)

Members of the community are also looking for believable (concrete and realistic) answers to their questions about future planning on the part of the district: "When will we have to go through this again: In ten years? Twenty? Fifty years? Isn't our district's student population continuing to grow, making the necessity of more new schools inevitable? With every new school built, will we have to go through the re-drawing of attendance boundaries?" I suggest the school board let the public know sooner than later what its plans are to alleviate future over-crowding of our schools. Will the 45-acre campus be abandoned in favor of using the district's existing lands for larger buildings? Will new, taller buildings be built along side older ones so that new land does not have to be found? Will all new structures built by the district easily allow for the addition of more stories and/or build-outs? Is the district working now to buy additional land for its rese rves, to be built on in the future?

I suggest that outlines of the above visions/roadmaps that the school district hopefully already have in mind be shared with the community before the details of attendance boundaries are finalized. "Final" timelines or calendars

can be provided to students and their families once the boarders are set, but until then, everyone would appreciate knowing that there is are plans to address these reasonable concerns. Once people are assured that the district will not leave students vulnerable to last-minute changes in their academic and extra-curricular options and plans, the emotional responses to the re-drawing of attendance boarders (anger at a perceived violation of family tradition, anger at perceived or real inconveniences in transportation, sadness at the disruption of student stability) will quiet in time. Until the district offers concrete plans to alleviate concrete problems, people will continue to be very justifiable angry.

Hello, and thank you for taking time to read my comments and concerns.

I currently have a student at Beaverton HS and a student at Raleigh Hills K-8. I have been following the proposed boundary adjustments and have concerns about the affect on my neighborhood, my children's elementary/middle school and Beaverton High School. The most recent proposed boundary change appears to cause significant disruption of Neighborhood Unity at Sunset and Beaverton High Schools. The map effectively separates BHS and Sunset neighborhoods by wealth. Currently both schools have strong Neighborhood Unity with even distribution between low, medium and high income families. The new boundaries remove an estimated 350 low income families from Sunset to Beaverton HS, causing one of the largest equity gaps between two neighboring schools. Beaverton HS will end up with 53% Free/Reduced lunch students while Sunset will be at a shockingly low 11%. Research shows that high FRL schools have fewer volunteers, diminished fundraising for sports and activities, difficul ty retaining experienced teachers and less parental support for education. When Southridge opened, a similar disparity emerged at neighboring Aloha, which has yet to be remedied. I do not want to see a similar outcome from this process.

As a transportation engineer for the City of Portland, I am also very concerned about transportation issues surrounding the proposed boundary changes for Sunset and Beaverton High Schools. The current proposed boundaries show that many families living north of US 26 and east of OR-217 will now have to traverse or travel on one of those very congested freeways during the morning rush hour. Travel times are currently very unpredictable on and around these corridors due to high traffic volumes and congestion. Additionally, families that live north of Hall Blvd that are currently in the BHS boundary will now have to travel through several of the severely congested intersections along Hall Blvd to reach their newly assigned high school, Southridge. The transportation routes related to the current proposed boundaries, particularly for BHS and Sunset, seem like a risky option for the district to commit to. I hope that the district is gathering information from ODOT, Beaverton and Washington County to help determine best transportation routes and boundaries. As a transportation professional, I strongly believe that school boundaries should minimize the need for busses, families and children to travel on or across busy and congested roadways.

Outstanding Education for Every Child has developed maps to satisfy the criteria put forth by the district's policy JC and achieve better balanced high schools. I strongly support all three of the maps that this group has created and believe these maps show improvements to the current Preliminary Proposal Map. This group has done a great job balancing wealth disparity and FRL percentages, decreasing split feeders, lowering transitions at each high school and maintaining Neighborhood Unity. The last is a very important factor to the community, particularly for the RHS K-8 community which is very strong given that our children are attending one of the smallest elementary schools and/or middle schools.

I personally support the Medium Change - Major Improvements map that Outstanding Education for Children has created, but feel that better equity for all schools can be gained through any of the 3 maps this group has presented. I hope the committee will strongly consider some or all of the improvements proposed by these maps. Every child, regardless of their address, should have access to an outstanding education. Please consider the larger Beaverton Community Unity as a whole, and the voice of every child, when weighing this important decision for their futures.

Thank you for writing. Here is some additional information in response to the questions you posed:

Q: As you are adjusting high school boundaries, what is your target enrollment (desired % of capacity) for the South Cooper Mountain school? Are you trying to keep it lower than other schools in anticipation of future growth?

A: The target enrollment, generally, is about 90% for all schools, as per the Board objectives adopted in June, 2015, but there is no single target for any one school. The committee has discussed trying to retain additional capacity at schools in higher growth areas, like Sunset, Westview, and South Cooper Mt.

Q: You've calculated the Hillsboro School District land being transferred to BSD to represent about 150 students in year 2020. But since that land is not officially part of the BSD yet, are those 150 students included in your proposal, or do you need to leave room in the capacity planning for those?

A: The 150 student estimate for the portion of South Cooper Mt. to be transferred to BSD does not have a point in time, and is not included in the projection for 2020 (i.e. does not appear on the grid code cells on the map). However, the committee asked staff to provide an estimate of potential student growth in the area, in order to keep that growth potential in mind as they considered the new high school's attendance boundary and potential enrollment in 2020.

Q: What about the rest of the South Cooper Mountain development area? Washington County is planning for about 7000 new homes in total - how many of those were included in the grids of the maps you're using for this boundary adjustment process (none, an estimate of the ones that will be built by 2020, or all planned development)?

A. All portions of the South Cooper Mt. planning area which are within the BSD boundary are included in the projection. However, only those portions that have been annexed to the City of Beaverton are likely to yield any significant development in the near term. The remainder of the South Cooper Mt. planning area is either 1) located outside the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) & City of Beaverton (and still retains low-density zoning designations) and/or 2) is not within the BSD boundary. The projection used for the HS redistricting process accounted for a large residential project in the City of Beaverton (NE corner of SW 175th and Scholls Ferry Rd). As noted above, an estimate of student generation from lands to be brought into the BSD boundary from HSD have also been provided to the committee.

Q: The city of Tigard is also planning a large home development on the south side of Scholls Ferry near Roy Rogers. Do you anticipate the BSD being extended to incorporate the new Tigard development?

A: Yes, the two major projects in the City of Tigard and within the BSD boundary, River Terrace NW and River Terrace East, are included in the projection.

Q: As you adjust the attendance areas of the high schools during this process, what is your capacity planning goal (enrollment % of capacity) for the South Cooper Mountain school, so that there will be enough room remaining to accommodate future growth? It can't be too full, or we'd risk having to go through another boundary adjustment process in a few years.



We live on Cooper Mountain, it only seems natural that we would go to the new Cooper Mountain HS. In the current proposed plan, I do not see the rationale for Aloha being maxed out capacity wise, while Cooper is only at 80% capacity. Additionally, in the current plan there is an "unresolved area", that currently has the students living in that area going to Cooper Mountain. The northern-most portion of the "unresolved area" is on TV Hwy. How does it makes sense to send those students to Cooper Mountain? That is twice as far away from the school as we are...This area is much closer to Aloha & Beaverton High Schools, yet my children would go to Aloha? That makes no sense, the bus would essentially go past our house on the way to Cooper Mtn!!



Beaverton School District New High School Boundaries Map - Proposed







We know the new schools are coming online in the next few years and boundaries will have to change again; it does not make sense to only change the high school boundaries at this point. Parents make major decisions on where to live based on the school attendance, and right now we're being left with several years of uncertainty. The boundary process should be comprehensive and include elementary and middle school boundaries and HS feeders simultaneously so that the impact is not stretched out over years.

As you work through the HS level, I would only ask that you adhere to the stated primary criteria of 1) proximity to school and 2) safety. Highway 26 is the single largest natural barrier to traffic in the district, and based on that alone it is clear that **students who live North of 26 should attend Westview or Sunset.** To have a boundary map which does not reflect this reality is disingenuous and insulting to the parents and students north of 26 who deal with the realities of that crossing. You are ignoring the significant impact to the children and parents in this area.

Time is the ultimate limited commodity. By forcing kids to travel longer, you are asking them to give up part of their future. Please re-assess the current proposal, and consider how much time wasted in traffic can be avoided just by keeping students at the school closer to their home. I have included an attachment with two proposals which meet the stated criteria more effectively and I am also providing a link for those who are interested to view the maps online: https://app.box.com/BSD-Map-Examples

The boundary adjustment process so far has felt closed off and ineffective. Parents have been allowed to attend meetings, but not interact with the boundary committee members. Parent letters have been posted online, but there hasn't been a public response from the committee or district to most of the concerns or questions in the letters. Additionally, the Boundary Adjustment website is not updated in a timely manner. Why does it take weeks to publish meeting minutes?

The elephant in the room is clearly the school being built in the wrong place – I hope that there is accountability for this decision as well as the continuing cost overruns with the construction of the building. Hindsight is 20/20, but if the district had actually articulated the impact of a school in the south driving change district wide and moving 70% of the district then I seriously doubt the bond would have been passed – I know I wouldn't vote for the bond seeing the impact of such a poorly planned and executed growth strategy.
