To whom it may concern,

I attended the public preview meeting on January 21st and submitted a comment card regarding the new high school boundaries. I am also submitting my proposed boundary map that was created using the bsdmaps application on the web. This may not be the correct place for me to submit but did not see an e-mail address included on the instruction sheet I picked up at the meeting. I also tried the "comments" e-mail address on the district website, but that bounced back to me. I am hoping this will work and that it will find its way to the committee members.

My solution may not be perfect and is sure to upset some people, but truly believe it makes more sense than the proposal provided at the meeting. As I have stated previously, I do not understand how students that live along TV Hwy and that are much closer in proximity to Aloha HS would be sent to S. Cooper Mtn, while my children would go to Aloha. We are a little less than 3 miles from the new high school. I also do not understand why, with the current plan being proposed by the committee, Aloha is at capacity and Cooper Mtn would be at only 80% capacity.

There were two main components I considered while constructing this solution, proximity to the school and school capacity. I did not consider current elementary school boundaries as I have been told that they will be adjusted as well. I also did not consider existing high school boundaries. While I understand that some parents may get upset about the number of transitions, I believe that giving too much weight or consideration to the amount of transitions is ultimately short sighted. The current revision to the HS boundaries should be focused on 5 to 10 years from now after all of the current high school age students have graduated. The new boundaries need to be set so that they make sense for the long term. To help with the transition phase of this implementation, short term, I would suggest allowing more transfers letting sophomores and juniors finish out their HS careers where they started. Again taking capacity and proximity into consideration for the transfers.

Anyway, I truly believe my boundary map is a good starting point. More than anything it geographically makes sense and balances capacity more evenly. None of the high schools are over 98% capacity, and Cooper Mtn. is more utilized, but still has room to grow.

Please review and consider this as a legitimate solution for the long term.

I attended the public forum last week regarding the new high school boundaries. I have taken the time to complete my own boundary map and would like to submit it to the committee for consideration. I do not see a method for attaching a file to this e-mail application. Can you provide me with an e-mail address or a file share where I can submit my proposal?

I live on the very edge of the Aloha HS & Cooper Mtn HS boundary and cannot make sense of how or why my children are slated to attend Aloha. We live on Cooper Mountain, it only seems natural that we would go to the new Cooper Mountain HS. In the current proposed plan, I do not see the rationale for Aloha being maxed out capacity wise, while Cooper is only at 80% capacity. Additionally, in the current plan there is an "unresolved area", that currently has the students living in that area going to Cooper Mountain. The northern-most portion of the "unresolved area" is on TV Hwy. How does it makes sense to send those students to Cooper Mountain? That is twice as far away from the school as we are...This area is much closer to Aloha & Beaverton High Schools, yet my children would go to Aloha? That makes no sense, the bus would essentially go past our house on the way to Cooper Mtn!!





Beaverton School District New High School Boundaries Map - Proposed







Dear Committee,

Thank you for taking on the daunting task of negotiating the boundaries of the new high school. I have watched and listened to much of the feedback from our community regarding these ideas.

One thing that strongly sticks out to me, is that there are areas & school communities who are literally asking for them to either be included in the boundaries, or not. My family is in the Hazeldale Elementary community, which belongs with the first group. We are asking to be included in the boundaries. In the latest map, areas much further north of the school, which must be a bigger transportation expense, are being included, and I'm trying to understand why these two areas cannot be switched? Why would you include an area all the way up to TV Hwy and Murray, and not our Miller Hill Rd/Gassner Rd area that is logistically MUCH closer to the school? It does not make any sense.

Rumors are being spread that politics are playing a role in the decision making process. Hazeldale Elementary does have a very active and supportive community, and it is rumored that Aloha HS does not want to lose it as a feeder school. However, as a parent in that community, that is NOT a legitimate reason to impact the education of our children and property values of homeowners in such a manner. Aloha HS has always had a very active community supporting it. The school and their football team will be just fine, without the feeding of students from Hazeldale Elementary. It makes FAR MORE sense to include the area south of Farmington Rd and 209th Ave. in the new boundaries, than to include that area all the way to TV Hwy and Murray.

As a realtor, I can tell you that homeowners and property values are going to be impacted by this decision. Homes that are located closer in, near Murray & TV Hwy, already have an added value because of location and convenience. The new high school will add value as well. Families located much further out, that are not being included in the boundaries, are actually losing further value by your choices to not include them. These areas, that have less convenience, could really use the help of being in the new boundaries to offset that negative.

I know that there are many factors to consider in this decision making process, I just hope that common sense wins. Again, thank you for your time and effort in this process and I appreciate the opportunity to voice my perspective.

Dear Esteemed Scholars,

I begin this with a heartfelt thanks and appreciation to all that are involved. I feel like the process is appropriate and flexible, allowing for all to have a voice.

As a teacher at Aloha, I love my job: the students, my colleagues, the community. However, maintaining a consistent 60+% of FARL, it is no mystery that Warrior students have so many needs, and one of those needs is a nice, clean, architecturally-updated building. Our building has many problems:

- 1) Small classrooms (which make it difficult to group and team--two principles that AVID and new reading and writing workshop models don't coincide with)
- 2) Thin walls--allowing for noise to penetrate other classrooms
- 3) Lack of daylight. One study in Denmark shows that students learn 21% better with daylight than others. (Power of Aesthetics to Improve Student Learning. http://www.designshare.com/index.php/articles/aesthetics-and-learning/)
- 4) Lack of electrical outlets and wiring problems--many electrical shorts happening due to copy machines and other high-voltage needs.
- 5) A 2nd Gym--with over 2,000 students, and 500 participating in sports each year, the facilities need updating to accommodate those needs
- 6) Updated bleachers that don't wobble and shake during assemblies, August Inservice meetings, games, etc.
- 7) Wireless/technology updating.
- 8) Asbestos and other potentially harmful agents.
- 9) Inconsistent heating/cooling throughout the building.
- 10) Need for a instruction/conference room that seats 50+
- 11) Basic facility stuff updates.

And the list goes on. We are in the trenches! It saddens my heart to see that our students come from nothing and show up to learn with nothing!

As a proposal for this, honoring our EQUITY pillar with the utmost respect, I suggest allowing Aloha students to attend the new high school for a year, while our current building is renovated.


Thank you for the open forum Thursday night and the opportunity to speak candidly to several committee members. As a parent in the Hazeldale Elem area, I came away with the message from several committee members that a primary reason to include Hazeldale into Aloha and not into Cooper Mountain (as preliminary maps had shown) is that Hazeldale is a significant fundraising area for Aloha and its football team. While I understand the importance of athletic programs in the schools, this should not be a deciding factor. I believe that all will find sufficient fundraising where ever the lines are drawn as communities are always willing to rally and support their school where their kids, neighbors, and friends attend.

Further, when myself or others have tried to use the online mapping tool, I find no way to better balance the economic disparity between schools than to move Hazeldale into Cooper Mountain and shift Aloha's boundaries northward. It is only in these scenarios that you can actually get Aloha to dip below 60% on the Free/reduced lunch mix and move some other schools above 20-25%. Myself and several of my neighbors are of consensus that we want Hazeldale to be included in the boundary for Cooper Mountain--it simply makes sense from a proximity and from a total district balance in economic and community diversity.



North Bethany to Aloha 6







Here is the third of several alternative maps that the committee should consider.

Springville and Stoller overcrowding committees have overwhelmingly recommended that new construction be bused to schools with space rather than displacing existing students. The district said that their legal staff indicated they could not do this without a boundary adjustment. Lucky for us, this is a boundary adjustment!

This map moves the growth area in North Bethany to Aloha. Much of the projected population does in that area does not exist yet, so this would not be a surprise or a transition for those students. When the district constructs a North Bethany high school, or 2 option schools, this change can reverse with minimal impact to the rest of the students in the district.

This map also has the advantage of having NO high schools over 50% free and reduced lunch, and it leaves room in both Westview and South Cooper Mountain for additional growth.

BOUNDARY CONCERNS:

Garden Home neighborhood being changed from Beaverton HS to Southridge HS.

WHO WE ARE:

Parents that work in Beaverton and who commute in Beaverton traffic daily, living in Garden Home. We have a child that will be a freshman in the 2016-17 school year, with a sibling 2 years behind. We were originally going to Beaverton HS, and have been moved into the Southridge boundary. Below we express our concerns over the boundary changes for our Garden Home neighborhood:

ENHANCEMENT OF TRAFFIC CONGESTION:

As we have all experienced, traffic in Beaverton south of Allen, on Scholls Ferry, and in the Murray/Scholls/Jenkins area has increased dramatically. Beaverton does not have the infrastructure to support this traffic growth. What is being proposed for those students in the Garden Home area is that they commute through this daily traffic in order to get to Southridge HS, adding to a growing traffic problem.

We live very close to Beaverton HS, and drive the route past the school daily. We purposely avoid any roads south of Allen due to the massive congestion. Having our kids attend Beaverton HS would be a much more convenient option for our family and would prevent us from adding to existing traffic infrastructure problems.

Questions:

- 1. Was a traffic impact study conducted prior to adjusting the school boundaries?
- 2. Did Beaverton School District have a traffic impact study done?
- 3. Did Beaverton School District request the impact statement from Washington County?
- 4. If not, why?
- 5. What is the weighting on traffic importance?
- 6. Why are students being moved without consideration to how close the schools are (e.g. Beaverton HS is 10 minutes away, Southridge is 30 minutes)

COMMUNITY IMPACT

- Parents are considering moving so that their kids can stay at Beaverton HS.
- Beaverton is getting known as an area to not move into due to the traffic.
- For those who chose to live in Southeast Beaverton / Garden Home where we frequent Old Town Beaverton small businesses, and have a tight knit community are now being segmented and asked to put our kids into a suburban setting.
- Lives are built around Old Town Beaverton (Dr's, Dentists, etc...). With the boundary changes, it will cause our kids to miss more

school since we will have a good one hour commute just to go through traffic, pick up the kids, and then turn around and come all the way back to Old Town Beaverton.

Question:

1. Has there been an economic study on the community impact, specifically for families in the Southeast Beaverton/Garden Home neighborhoods?

FAMILY INCONVENIENCE

With family that lives in the Beaverton area, that support and spend time with our kids, they will no longer be able to spend time with the kids after school. Our family is not able to drive through all of the traffic – as it takes twice as long to get to Southridge as it does to get to Beaverton HS. Additionally, getting to downtown will take twice as long as we would have to trudge through traffic, make it all the way to Southridge, turn around, go back through traffic, just to get headed to downtown Portland. This proposed change will have a significant negative impact on our daily lives.

Requiring next year freshman, while heading into their sophomore year to switch schools when they already have classes identified and know what program they want to go into will be greatly affected. The programs are not equal or the same at both schools.

Since Kindergarten my child thought she would be attending BHS, and has already shadowed and determined classes she wants to take. Southridge does not offer some of the classes that she is planning to take.

ASK OF THE SCHOOL BOARD:

We ask that there is re-evaluation of the boundary for those of us in the Garden Home area. What is being proposed creates significant hardship on our family, would add to the traffic problem, and fractures our extended family's relationship with our kids. Let's be part of making Beaverton great and not adding to an existing problem.

I am asking you to funnel all our Raleigh Hill K-8 students into Beaverton High school.

As an upcoming freshman that originally planned on going to Beaverton HS since kindergarten, I have my own concerns about the boundary changes:

Going to Beaverton HS has been my motive since kindergarten. My parents moved into the Beaverton HS district because they think it is phenomenal school that has great opportunities. Southridge is a great school, but not the right fit for me and many other students at my school RHS. Raleigh Hills is an outstanding K-8 that thrives on technology. BHS gives kids from RHS opportunities to a more prominent education then Southridge does. When I went on a tour of the Southridge HS, the teachers there were surprised to suddenly get all these RHS students wanting to see how Southridge operates. When I asked them why, they explained that they didn't get very many RHS students.

Second, because I live so close to the Beaverton HS, about 10 minutes away, it is easier on my family if I go to Beaverton. I know a lot of families are going through this too because of where the RHS community lives (or a good portion). Being transferred to Southridge would not be an easy change for my family for business, health, sports, etc. Going to Southridge would mean a good 30 minutes of the day is spent on driving to the school and another 30 minutes again on the way back home.

Third, I live close to one of my best friends whose whole family is built on BHS. Because of the border changes, they are contemplating on moving closer to the school so they don't have to go to any other school but Beaverton.

As a Sunset HS family, I want the committee to know that we understand the difficulties the committee is facing and trust you are doing the right thing for our district and our community. I also appreciate that you are considering all inputs and I am so thankful that I live in a community of very smart and involved parents that want to offer their solutions in very innovative and thoughtful ways.

My family happens to live in an interesting cross-over area. My kids attended Raleigh Park but feed into Cedar Park and Sunset High. I am one of those people that bought a house because these were "Excellent and Sought-After Schools" I didn't realize, however, that we would form allegiances with families at Raleigh Park that continued through Middle School. In the end, we were faced with a choice of going to Sunset or open enrolling into Beaverton to re-connect with the community we never really left due to sports and very close relationships with our BHS friends and families.



Thank you so very much for all of your hard work and diligence. The more I learn, the more complex the school boundary issues seem!

I am relieved that the most current version of the boundary map has the entire Cedar Mill Elementary school back within Sunset. Like other parents, we have been concerned about the travel issues to Beaverton High School and the possibility of splitting Cedar Mill students.

I would also like to point out a specific issue concerning the Eastern end of Sunset's Southern boundary. A deep ravine runs along that boundary from about 107th all the way to the East (please see bright green circle on the most recent map below). This boundary was put in place originally because this ravine physically cuts houses such as mine (the bright green X) off from their Southern neighbors. If the boundary moves back up North to Cornell (as in previous versions in this process), the students in this strip would attend Beaverton High School but be isolated from the Beaverton High community. Students cannot cross the ravine like they can a street.



Please continue to honor this physical barrier if further Sunset boundary changes are necessary.

Dear Beaverton School District Representatives,

Families in the West Tualatin View Elementary (West TV) community are asking for your support in favor of keeping homes north of Highway 26 in the Sunset High School boundary. The proposed plan does not align with Beaverton School District Criteria for Boundary Adjustments.

1. Negative Impact on Safety, Transportation, and Proximity to School

Under the proposed plan, students in the West TV community would have to commute further through highly trafficked and dangerous areas during peak rush hour times via Cedar Hills Blvd or Route 217. It would increase transportation costs, as additional busses would be needed to compensate for the extra trips outside their typical boundaries. Additional time for drivers would have to be allotted due to bus transfers, safe transportation, and traffic delays. Furthermore, our children would have significantly less time to participate in extra-curricular activities, complete their homework, and get sufficient sleep. Sunset HS is closer, more accessible, and much quicker to travel to and from the West TV neighborhood than Beaverton HS.

2. Minimizing transitions/Impact on the Continuity in Coursework

Many families move into the West TV community because of the strong community bond with the schools. Our families have donated our time, money, and resources to support Sunset High School for generations. Our children have siblings that go to Sunset High. They play for Sunset Youth teams. They attend Sunset High Athletic events. The proposed boundary change would sever the long- standing bond with Sunset HS.

Children are taught through the PYP program at West TV, and they continue their academic work through the MYP program at Cedar Park. Sunset HS further continues this academic path with its IB program. Beaverton HS does not have an IB program. Since the educational objectives differ significantly between IB and AP programs, the students' education would be significantly disrupted.

3. Negative Impact on Neighborhood Unity

The proposed plan divides our neighborhood in two. Cedar Mill includes the area north of the Sunset Highway which includes the West TV community. The proposal moves the part of Cedar Mill south of Cornell Road to Beaverton HS, cutting the neighborhood in

half. We are part of the Cedar Mill Community. We support it's local economy. Cedar Mill is where we shop, go to the library, farmer's market, and post office.

4. Negative Financial Impacts

These changes would likely have a financial impact on families in the West Tualatin View Elementary community. Many families decide where they buy a home based on the school they want their kids to attend. Beaverton HS is a fine school, but it is not what families intended when they chose to move to the West Tualatin View neighborhood. Families may decide to leave this community so their kids can attend their preferred school resulting in a decline in real estate values.

Given all these negative impacts, we request that you vote to keep feeding the West TV community into Sunset HS and move the new boundary south of Highway 26.

Good Afternoon,

I just had a very nice meeting with Principle Huelskamp, thank you John, and he asked I share with you the materials that I have shown him. This includes the information below as well as the map attached. The attached map is one that is similar to the one that I sent last week with the exception it addresses some of the area of concerns I have heard from the committee members and others. I urge you to take a close look as it allows for 700 students in the northern area of the school district to not be impacted while allowing for <u>all</u> schools to be at a capacity of between 95 and 98% capacity based on my hand calculation of the numbers. Granted they are hand calculations and will need to be vetted through your system but with a lttle tweaking it would save the trauma of transition for hundreds. Just so you know I deal with corporate planning and patient care throughout our 5 state region so this type of project planning is something I do on a regular basis, often times on a much larger scale, so I am not just pulling things out of thin air.

In addition I have included a couple of requests for consideration as you start to look at transitioning criteria with an eye on keeping the impact to students and families as low as possible.

If this proposal were to take effect the Superintendent, School Board members and the Westview and Sunset principles would have to be willing to state...

 - o o 356 from Bethany Westview area (394 was the number given for this area in some of the meetings but in hand calculating, twice, it only comes to 356.
- Numbers in other affected areas in this proposal
 - o o 292 students from Baseline to Bethany

Solution:

- Keep Meadow Park in Sunset
- Keep West TV at Sunset
- Keep Bethany at Westview
- Move area from Baseline to Walker to Aloha
- Move South Cooper's North boundary north to just below Hazeldale

Result

- Over 700 Students north of Hwy 26 do not have to change school
- Aloha gets to keep Hazeldale, students do not move
- Undetermined area gets split between Beaverton, close proximity, and South Cooper
- South Cooper gets better utilized with added area to the north of current proposal, 96% capacity roughly
- 292 kids get moved to Aloha. Helps unite most, if not all, of the Elmonica area already directed to Aloha
- ALL high schools in the district will be between 95% and 98% capacity.

Transition Asks:

- Grant all current high school students and their siblings the right to stay in their current school if desired.

 - § Students having to make a change during their junior year which would affect athletic and other possible scholarship opportunities and the trauma of being shifted away from lifelong friends.
 - § Allowing siblings would allow the families not to be a split household that would result in difficulties getting to and from to different schools and school


related activities. It would also solve the multiple issues of younger siblings not attending the school already embedded in the home way of life.

To the Members of the High School Boundary Advisory Committee:

First of all, my sincere thanks for the countless hours you are putting into this work. I attended the most recent public meeting at Five Oaks Middle School and spoke with several committee members. I was impressed by your sincerity and genuine desire to create the best boundary map possible.

I am writing to you today as both a veteran classroom teacher as well as the mother of two young children. I am very concerned that the boundary revisions as outlined on the Preliminary Proposal map violate one of our district's key pillars: equity.

I understand that based on Board Policy, you have four primary criteria to consider: availability of space, proximity to school, safety, and neighborhood unity. I also understand that student body composition should also be considered in the decision making process.

By making certain critical adjustments to the Preliminary Proposal, you can not only respect the four primary criteria, but also bring much needed balance with respect to economic and cultural diversity.

The area of the map that troubles me most involves the large gap in free and reduced lunch numbers between students in the proposed Sunset area (11%) and students in the proposed Aloha area (61%). I am a reasonable person and as such I understand that we cannot get all schools to perfectly reflect our district average of 39%, however, I do believe we can do better. Let's keep working on this issue.

I would like to propose one solution to help restore some balance to Sunset High School's demographics. As part of the Springboard Proposal, Sunset's boundaries reached across Highway 26. This was both bold and visionary. Although some groups may not like to hear it, this has to happen in order to change school demographics, since the wealthiest zip codes are north of the highway.

In order to provide balance and diversity, both economically and culturally, Sunset High School needs to include students living south of the highway. Possible feeder schools include: William Walker, Barnes, Elmonica, and McKinley. Due to its proximity to Beaverton High School, William Walker is a natural fit. Also, students from Barnes Elementary, with its exemplary two-way immersion program, will benefit from being able to continue their dual immersion education through grade 12 at BHS. McKinley would be a potential area to consider, however, McKinley students are from the western edge of the district, making proximity an issue.

Fortunately, there is one elementary community that can help to restore balance to Sunset's numbers: Elmonica.

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As a Title 1 elementary school, Elmonica will help to bring Sunset's proposed free and reduced lunch numbers to a more reasonable range. In addition, Elmonica students would enhance Sunset with a rich cultural diversity that is not currently reflected in Sunset's projected numbers. Finally, as a Primary Years Programme school, Elmonica is a perfect fit. Students would have the opportunity to complete their PYP education at a high quality IB high school.

As a committee, you have the chance to bring about lasting change. My family, and the community as a whole, are grateful for your dedication. Let's give all students access to the highest quality educational experience possible. Please consider keeping equity at the forefront of the decision making process.

Our West TV neighbors seem to agree that this is an improvement they can live with.
- 3. Barnes and Walker families in our neighborhood have, according to research, as a whole less access to organization, less resources, etc. and THEIR VOICES MUST BE CONSIDERED AS MUCH, if not MORE than populations who, by means of higher income and resources, are able to organize and voice their opinions with regard to this process.
- 4. Every Beaverton kid deserves an excellent education, and balancing schools for diversity is proven to produce higher outcomes for ALL schools.

I am writing to express my concern over moving the boundary so that the neighborhood North of Walker Road and West of Murray Blvd is moved out of SHS to BHS. When I look at the primary criteria used in making this decision several stand out. The first is proximity to school. SHS is only a short drive from our house, we can even hear the school on nights when outdoor events are going on there. To get to BHS at the times of day that we'd have to travel, it can take anywhere from 15 minutes(on a good traffic day) to 30 minutes, or longer, depending on traffic. That route is super unpredictable. Clearly our neighborhood is closest to Sunset. The second is safety. My biggest concern about safety revolves around students driving across town. There really is no 'easy' way to get to BHS from this neighborhood, plus the added distance gives a bigger chance to have problems. Along with that is the fact that students will be driving from the North side of the Nike campus to the South side. The traffic in this area is very hectic at that time of day and nerve wracking for new drivers. Last is the neighborhood unity. While the immediate neighborhood would all be going to the same school, all the surrounding areas will be at different schools. The space between our neighborhood and BHS includes the Nature Park, Nike campus, Tektronix campus, and shopping malls. There are no real neighborhoods to the south of this area, until you reach the HS. This makes BHS feel disconnected from this area, where at SHS, we can hear events happening and drive past it when out and about. The identity in the neighborhood is really based more in Cedar Mill than South Beaverton because of proximity. Another thought is that of students with jobs outside school. I encourage my kids to have jobs close t home, it makes it easier. If they went to BHS, it would be difficult to know where to have a job. Close to school so they can work after school hours, or close to home where they would be more comfortable. Finally, I wonder, when fundraising with sponsors how much of that will apply for us. I don't see travelling across town to patronize a business that sponsors the school activities. It just seems like it will feel disconnected.

While I understand that change is hard, at best, and necessary, I hope you will consider keeping our small corner in the SHS boundary. I think it's what's best for the kids and community.

Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee

We reside in the West Tualatin View elementary school area and also have three grandchildren who attend that school. Our adult children attended Beaverton High School in the late 80's and early 90's so we know from experience that BHS is a great school.

We understand how emotional the boundary changes are for parents. And, we also know that you are not going to be able to make everyone happy. Our primary concern continues to be for the safety of the children who attend West TV. There is strong evidence that transporting them on buses to BHS will put them at significantly more safety risk than if they attended Sunset High School. Whether the bus routes take them on 217 or Cedar Hills Blvd, the safety risk will be much greater than if they are transported on Cornell Rd. Your current proposed map would put West TV students and their families on unfamiliar roads – no other elementary school is being asked to do that.

I have read all of the posted comments and find that many are concerned about neighborhood unity, which we know is also very important. However, safety of our children should certainly take priority. The November 24, 2015 letter written by Jean Singer which outlines all of the safety and transportation issues the West TV children and their families will be faced with was extremely informative. Her letter made a strong case for not putting West TV children at risk on buses to BHS. I encourage all of you to review her publicly posted letter again.

Since the elementary school boundaries adjustment is scheduled to commence at the completion of the high school boundary change decision (March 2016) and be completed by December 2016, and then the middle school boundaries will follow, it would be difficult to make a strong case for keeping feeder schools intact. In fact, Anne Erwin, principal at BHS, mentioned at their January 19th community meeting that it is going to be impossible for our district to have clean feeder schools (a middle school in which all students from that school feed into the same high school).

For your convenience, I have attached two proposed boundary maps that not only eliminate the need to transport students on 217 but also create more equitable results with regard to Student Body Configuration, Safety, Transportation, Proximity to School, and Availability of space.

With the "Safer Transportation" proposal, five of our six high schools would be at 97-98% capacity – with the new high school at 83% which is the committee's expressed objective of letting it grow naturally along with the growth of its community. All five of

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our existing high schools would have to transition approximately the same number of students - 800 to 900 students each.

So an equal transition burden for all. And, the free and reduced lunch percentages would be much more balanced making for a better socio-economic mix of students. Also, most students and their families would be transported to and from school on roads they are already using on a regular basis.

With the "Safety & Elementary Boundaries" proposal, based on existing elementary school boundaries, the outcome is not quite as favorable but still far better than the currently proposed boundary map. Four of our six high schools would be at 97-98% capacity – with the new high school at 85% which is the committee's expressed objective of letting it grow naturally along with the growth of its community. Four of five of our existing high schools would have to transition between 900 and 1100 students. And, the free and reduced lunch percentages would be much more balanced making for a better socio-economic mix of students.

I am told that the Boundary Adjustment Committee did not have access to the computer mapping we can now all access online. They were relegated to using white boards with their decisions then being loaded into the mapping program to be viewed at the next meeting. If this is the case, then they did not have the ability to see in real time the results of their decisions. Now that the mapping program is available to all, I hope the BAC will go back to the drawing board and take advantage of getting real time results.

With what we know today, West TV Elementary students should remain aligned with Sunset High School to reduce safety risks to our children. Transporting West TV students on buses to BHS is an unnecessary risk that the district does not need to subject our children to. The most compelling argument for leaving West TV in the Sunset High School boundary is SAFETY & TRANSPORTATION. And, since the Safety & Transportation risks are quantifiable, we are concerned that the district is also exposing itself at financial risk by proposing to transport West TV students to BHS.

Thank you to all of the committee members for volunteering to be part of this process.



Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee,

I would like to say thank you to the committee members for your hard work and dedication during this process. I know this is not an easy task, but one that must be completed. With that being said, I do not feel the criteria set forth by School Board Policy JC or the objectives approved by Superintendent Rose and the School Board are being fully considered in this process.

We moved into the West TV area 3 years ago. We moved out of the Beaverton High School boundaries, as we were not happy with the schools. We looked into private school and decided rather than pay for private school, we should buy a new house in an area with excellent schools. We found that area in West TV/Cedar Park/Sunset. To attest to how wonderful this area is, many of the homeowners on our little street are second and third generation owners. They grew up in this area and came back to raise their own families here. My son's grandmother went to West TV and Sunset. She was in Sunset's graduating class of 1969. West TV has been a part of Sunset High School since it opened in 1959.

Community unity is one of the primary criteria. The West TV area has been a part of Cedar Mill since the 1850s when the Leahys settled in this area. Leahy Rd is their family's namesake and West TV sits on Leahy Rd. Cedar Mill is our community. It is where we shop, where we dine, where our doctors and dentists are, where our businesses are and where we do business. West TV is embedded in Cedar Mill's history. Cedar Mill is our community. West TV should remain a part of Sunset and continue to be a part of the Cedar Mill community.

As one of the primary criteria, safety should be mentioned by every single committee member as they discuss boundary changes, since I would think the safety of our students would be of the utmost importance. Unfortunately, it has not been mentioned once. By sending West TV students to Beaverton, you would be requiring our students to travel on highly congested roads and unsafe freeways. What other area has to travel on a freeway to get to their high school? None. Not one other school in the Beaverton School District and we shouldn't have to either. We have our local high school right down the road from us. We can currently get there in a safe route with a minimal amount of risk. You are proposing our students travel through an area with 2.5 to 16 times more accidents than their current route to school. Why remove us from our safe route to school? The school board said completing a traffic study is not something they are required to do, so therefore

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they will not be doing it. For the safety of our children, this should be reconsidered. Beaverton School District has a responsibility to families, communities, and students to provide the safest options for students' routes to school. Shifting West TV to Beaverton High School does not uphold that responsibility.

School Board Policy JC states the district is committed to boundary adjustment processes that are transparent, collaborative and inclusive. I do not think the district has been transparent, collaborative or inclusive. We are allowed to write in letters, but no discussion comes of those letters, and none of our questions are answered. Many parents and concerned members of the community have expressed concern and frustration about not being heard. The first time the public has been able to verbally share their questions and concerns with the BAC members was at the public preview on January 21st, which was extremely chaotic and unorganized. To say this was our first, and potentially only, chance to speak with members of the BAC is really disappointing. This does not genuinely invite community engagement or allow for us to be heard. The public preview came nearly three months after the Springboard Proposal was released, with only two months left in the high school boundary adjustment process. After three months of frustration, expressing concern, and asking many guestions, none of which have been validated or answered, we were allowed two hours of chaos to try to speak with someone directly. Based on comments directly from a BAC member, the map is nearly finished and the next steps are to discuss transition, which will begin at the next meeting, potentially disregarding comments and concerns that were expressed on January 21st. Following the public preview, the BAC should be taking the public's question and concerns into consideration and continue to revise the map until the best map meeting the stated criteria from School Board Policy JC is achieved. Again, the community is not being heard, not able to express our concerns in an effective manner, and not getting our questions answered. This does not promote your policy of transparency, collaboration, or inclusion.

Thankfully, some extremely concerned BSD parents created an interactive School Boundary Explorer, allowing parents to see for themselves some different versions of maps that better meet the stated criteria from School Board Policy JC.

According to the High School Boundary Adjustment Process webpage (https://www.beaverton.k12.or.us/depts/facilities/boundary/Pages/High-School-Adjustment-Process.aspx), School Board Policy JC serves as the guide for the boundary adjustment process, providing specific criteria that the BAC will use to develop a recommendation to Superintendent Rose. Those criteria include:

- Primary Criteria:
 - Availability of space
 - Proximity to school
 - Safety
 - Neighborhood unity
- Additional criteria:
 - Transportation costs
 - Student body composition
 - Staffing patterns
 - Feeder school alignment
 - Efficient and economical utilization of the buildings

In addition, the Superintendent proposed the following objectives:

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- Relieve current and projected future overcrowding with a five-year horizon, and targeting 90% capacity or less.
- Minimize transitions for students.


The School Boundary Explorer addresses availability of space, proximity to school, transition for students, and also includes a criteria the BAC has been using (and seems to be driving the Springboard Proposal and learning maps), free and reduced lunch. Several maps have been created by parents that meet the criteria much better than what has been proposed in the public preview map. I strongly urge you to take a look at these and see for yourself that better alternatives exist. I have attached one version that was created with little disruption to the elementary schools, reduces transition, better evenly distributes free and reduced lunch, addresses capacity, and maintains safety (no one has to drive on a freeway to get to their high school). With the map that I have created, only four elementary schools are split. (*Please publish the photos of the map along with this letter on the comments page*.)



Thank you for the time and effort the entire committee is putting into the high school boundary adjustment process. I am a partner at a large law firm in Oregon. My particular focus is negotiating contracts to sell renewable energy with utilities and large commercial and industrial users across the country. I understand the difficulties and trade-offs in complex, multi-stage negotiations, so I appreciate the difficult job you have all undertaken. In addition, I am currently on the PTC at Ridgewood Elementary. Moreover, I have four children, two of which are students at Ridgewood Elementary (4th grade and 1st grade) and two or which will be students at Ridgewood (a 4 year old and 1 year old).

I am concerned about the changes proposed in the Public Preview Map previewed on January 21, 2016 and how that proposal will affect my children and other children at Ridgewood. Specifically, the proposed map switches students at Ridgewood from Sunset High School to Beaverton High School.

Ridgewood is a PYP, Primary Years Program school, which is part of the IB program. Cedar Park and Sunset HS also offer IB programs. When we moved to this neighborhood, the quality of the schools was a primary concern, particularly because we were moving out of the Ainsworth, West Sylvan, Lincoln Portland public schools. The IB program and the continuity through high school were primary in our consideration to purchase our home in this neighborhood. We are firm supporters of this method of instruction and feel that students that have spent their formative years exposed to it should be allowed to continue in the program. We are seriously concerned that this switch will affect the value of our home.

Whenever new families at my firm tell me about their home search process, I have historically told them all about my neighborhood and how fantastic the school is. I am a strong supporter of BSD. Nevertheless, I am concerned that families will opt out of BSD schools and compromise the support available to the schools in an effort to avoid this disruption.

In addition, the proposed map does not adequately address equity across high schools. FRL percentages and the impact on the boundary lines need to be a higher priority in the process. The proposed map appears to actually increase FRL at Beaverton H.S. and reduce it at Sunset.

Parents have created an interactive mapping tool and I support the changes in the attached map created by other parents as an alternative to the Public Preview Map. We strongly believe that the attached map is superior to the proposed map in terms of meeting the redistricting need while considering the criteria set forth by BSD for any adjustment.

My name is Jay Rundle. I live with my wife and 3 children at 260 NW Torreryview Dr. We moved to our present location in July 2014 for the specific purpose of having our kids attend Sunset High School. This was a decision we made that considered many factors including but not limited to safety and time of commuting, nexus to our social connections, school curriculum, and proximity to Sunset Athletic Club located across the street where all of our kids participate in competitive tennis and swimming. The news we received recently of the proposed boundary change whereby our kids would now be bussed in a completely irrational solution across Hwy 26 through a more time consuming and less safe route or alternatively via Hwy 217, an even more dangerous prospect, was quite a shock. I am sure you on the boundary committee have heard your fill of similar testimonials and I am sure one more story of a family's expectations and plans for their kids being ripped apart by your decisions is not likely to make any difference in the final outcome. My purpose here is to document my protest for the record and to ask you to consider what such a boundary change means for our kids and hundreds of others in our neighborhood. Sending our kids to Beaverton High School means a LESS safe commute for our kids. I don't say that lightly. That commute through the already snarled morning and afternoon traffic via Cedar Hills Blvd or the similarly snarled and dangerous route via Hwy 217 is unnecessary. The only justification presented for this boundary change has been the excuse to pull more students from north of Hwy 26 in order to compensate for Beaverton High School giving up students to the south. There are other options available to the district that would make this ridiculous boundary change unnecessary. My understanding is that the Cedar Mill area was returned to the Sunset High School boundary so the committee has shown it recognizes implicitly the illogic of sending kids north of Hwy 26 south to Beaverton High School.

The Boundary Committee has a responsibility to construct boundaries that are rational with respect to the surrounding geography, provide safe commuting options for students and parents, and minimize any negative impact on as many families as possible who have already made life and financial commitments based on pre-existing boundaries. The current boundary changes affecting the Torreyview neighborhood serve absolutely none of these responsibilities. I urge the committee to reconsider and to leave the pre-existing boundary intact for Torreyview as it decided to do for Cedar Mill. Changing our boundary at this point would be a massive blow to all the plans and commitments we have made to this point and if this change goes into effect as planned it would probably mean that we would have to move yet again.

Thank you for your hard work and dedication at this crucial time in our school district history. We are all very fortunate to live in a community who supports our schools as much as we do. With that said, I will echo countless number of families who urge you to move West TV back to Sunset. I must say I find it a rather interesting when the name WEST TV is mentioned no-one really knew who we were let alone where we are located. Our community has clearly and respectfully questioned the integrity of the decisions being made and has implored the School District to use the criterion they have set forth to make their decisions whereas, outside communities have seemed to focus on what their perception of our community is believing in a Robin Hood scenario "take from the rich and give to the poor" mentality. This couldn't be further from the truth.

Our school with its 130 year history in the Beaverton School District & 50 year history attending Sunset High School resides in unincorporated Washington County. We are not a part of Beaverton proper and therefore do not receive services (Beaverton Police) who patrol our neighborhoods. We are serviced by Washington County Sheriff. Our direct impact of 60 students per year attending Sunset High School is a minuet number and certainly can't be the "make it or break it" number for any High School. Looking at numbers we are too small to make a dent either way other than providing additional bodies to a school. So let's take a different approach to this. What is unknown to many of the voters in our area is the island you will create around our community and elementary school. The businesses surrounding our school, where we live and shop will support Sunset High School. We will still shop at these businesses because they are convenient to our homes. Our f amily will still purchase our fireworks at the stand in the Bales Parking lot and support Sunset High School Marching Band as we've done for years. Unfortunately additional funds coming into Beaverton High School from this neighborhood will not happen because our communities are too far apart. Then there is the issue of support, our school historically has called upon Sunset High School students to assist us with our annual Back to School Picnic's and Carnival's. How many Beaverton High School students will be willing to make the trek to West TV to support a community that feels as foreign to them as we do?

We have 3 children and the thought of us swimming in money, as put in some letters to the district is ludicrous, but I digress, our oldest currently a sophomore at Sunset will continue and graduate. Our middle daughter, who would be entering her freshman year, will not be entering as a general ed student. She is our blessing and will be enrolled in your ALC program, who this will affect is our 9 yr old daughter and a current 3rd grader at West TV. Granted this will not affect her for 6 years, of which I'm sure at that point she will be uprooted once again when the Middle School (Timberland) is fully operational. The amount of displacement of the younger children becomes apparent when you look at the bigger picture and we ask that you consider all of this in your decisions. My husband and myself have read all the public comment letters and have attended the boundary meetings, most recently the meeting at Five Oaks where he was told the committee only receives 2 hr s every two weeks and they do not have access to the tools for modeling outside of those 2 hrs, therefore we feel the committee does not have the appropriate time or sufficient resources to vet a quality recommendation to the superintendent. We believe the district should restructure the process

to allow for proper time and resources so that the committee members can make a more informed decision.

Furthermore we believe the Beaverton School District has a unique opportunity to be a leader among schools across the nation should they take a different approach. It appears we lack the ability to meet the educational needs for our students because for decades, high schools have offered students more or less the same traditional selection of choices: this class or that class, a higher-level course or a lower-level course, an academic program or a technical program. All of these learning choices combine to become a particular student's pathway to a high school diploma. Yet because high schools tend to offer only a narrow range of potential pathways, student learning has largely been limited to the handful of educational options provided by the school. But should learning be limited to a small selection of predetermined options or a ninety-minute class? Or should learning be customized to individual needs, interests, and aspirations of students?

By creating an option High School students can personalize their learning pathways and empower themselves to pursue their passions while encouraging them to take more responsibility for their education. Students work with their teachers to blend a variety of educational experiences that satisfy graduation requirements and meet state-required standards, including career and-technical, college-level, and online courses, in addition to internships, apprenticeships, and volunteer opportunities that are intentionally designed to integrate with a student's academic learning. Due to the proximity to down-town Beaverton, Southridge fits this bill. If you take Southridge's community and move them to the new S. Copper Mountain HS, calling it Southridge, the students and families of that community will receive a brand new HS named Southridge and the former building would then become an option high school providing students the ability to pursue their passions.

In summary, we urge that you not undermine our communities with forced busing to improve academic achievement, but instead focus on creating an independent space required for innovation.

Dear Boundary Adjustment Committee,

My husband and I have lived in the Elmonica Elementary School boundaries since 2000. We have 3 children—our oldest attended all 6 years of elementary at Elmonica, and our younger two are currently students there. We love our community.

Elmonica is a Title 1 school with students from 30 countries who speak 32 languages. These demographics offer many advantages, however they also present challenges in building community. I spend a lot of time volunteering in the school—in classrooms and wherever needed. I am also a PTO Treasurer. I know the Elmonica school community well.

In the current high school boundary proposal, a small portion of the Elmonica community including my home was carved out and assigned to Aloha High School. This separation is alarming, because the **Elmonica community needs unity**. The community would benefit most from Elmonica students feeding into the same high school.

Elmonica students are invited to participate in programs sponsored by the assigned high school (Westview currently)—sports teams, cheerleading, and other school programs. Our community bonds through participation in and shared support for the same high school. One of my children played football for the past 2 years through Westview Youth Football. Through this program we met and became friends with Elmonica families we may not have connected with otherwise. We enjoy these associations. I saw a Westview Lacrosse sign in front of Elmonica and thought sadly, "What if my children and others at Elmonica would be excluded from this opportunity?" The proposed high school boundaries create a segregated group of students and families at Elmonica.

I am also concerned that the Elmonica families who have been assigned to Aloha will have to travel almost 1 mile further than we are currently traveling to Westview. I'm writing to strongly encourage you to allow this neighborhood to continue feeding into Westview rather than Aloha.

From the information provided, we are extremely unimpressed with Aloha as an education facility and feel that it would be a poor environment for our children. Our son is excelling in his current middle school and it's vital that he continues on to a school that has the atmosphere and commitment for him to continue.

We believe that it's not anyone's best interest for this neighborhood to be reassigned:

- Based on the information given, Aloha's capacity will be maxed-out while Westview still has room.

We live in the Waterhouse South neighborhood within Westview High School Boundaries. We've come to know that the latest proposal is changing our school area to Aloha High. The proposed change to send our children to Aloha violates quite a few criteria when making boundary adjustments.

- 1) Availability of space: We have 113 students in our area to be affected by this proposal. However, we see that there are 135 spots available at Westview High. There is still room for our students. Please do not more them.
- 2) Proximity: Westview is 2.4 miles from our Aloha is 4 miles.

- 5) Safety: To attend Aloha High, our kids will have to cross the TV Highway. It is four of the 60 most intersections in the state. Increasing the number of young kids and drivers will make the matter worse and subject our kids to further danger.
- 6) Student Body Composition: Per the district data, the proposal will result in 61% of Aloha HS students receiving free and reduced lunches the highest in the district. This change does not fit with the main principle of equity.

Please reconsider your current proposal and return our kids to Westview.

WV_Proposal_4 -- Quite similar in characteristics to WV_Proposal_3, only exception being Raleigh Hills ES now has a tiny portion going to Southridge and the majority going to Beaverton

WV_Proposal_5 -- equal proximity from all grid codes to opted high school, capacity well under limit, allows for growth, maintains elementary neighborhood unity with only a small area of Raleigh Hills ES going to Southridge. However this can be put back and still will work well.

This is a question about the quoted 212 students in the Springville area (area on the top of the map). The committee members indicated that for every 10 hours 1 high school student has been counted. Are you telling us that there are 2000 houses in that area? It is impossible. Even if I say you have counted 2 students per 10 houses, having 1000 houses in that close to rectangular area is not a possibility. The numbers are highly inflated. Besides realistically, families that move into that area typically are relatively young and mostly have early or late elementary school kids.

What the community feels is the extra projected 125 students in the North Bethany area as a growth, is already accounted for within the 212 students and even with this inclusion Westview will have a remaining capacity of 135 students, which means ALH1 that is currently slated to move to Aloha can still be with Westview boundary.

Well what does this give us? Keep students from Elmonica together and also by putting ALH1 area back to Westview boundary you will alleast not violate 6 out of the 7 guidelines by which this process was formulated. You will keep the community together.

Besides ALH1 is a mature community and no increase in numbers are expected in the near future. With the inclusion of ALH1 Westview will still have 22 seats left.

Community is not adverse to changes, as long as the projected #'s are realistic and the process keeps in mind the interest of the students and works within the guidelines originally stipulated by the committee. Moving ALH1 to Aloha, violates all these guidelines and this move was considered only because the projected #'s in the springville area are incorrect and false by all means. Today several members drove around the springville area and there is absolutely no way to have 1000 houses within that area. The proposed boundary change of the area that includes: SW Walker, SW 173rd, SW Baseline, SW 158th, should not take place. This area should remain part of Westview High School.

I understand with building a new high school come challenges on adjusting boundaries to fulfill an even distribution of students to schools. However, I do not agree with the proposed boundaries. I feel very strongly that elementary school boundaries should feed into the same upper school boundaries (middle and high school). One of the most basic human needs is a sense of belonging, a sense of community, a sense of acceptance. Children must be afforded the opportunity to stay with their friends from elementary to middle school to high school. Academic success is rooted on a strong support network. The new boundary proposal does not take into consideration this need for our children.

The foundation of my success in life was built upon a strong community of classmates, teachers and counselors that watched me grow from kindergarten through high school graduation. This support network fostered my escape from growing up in poverty, a divided household, and a strong family history of alcoholism. I was privileged to attend high school and middle school with the same classmates I attended elementary school with. I have to thank my teachers, classmates and the school board for ensuring I stuck with the same group of children throughout my public education experience.

Our daughter is in third grade. This is her first year at Elmonica Elementary school. We moved her from private school to public school so that she could have the same opportunity for strong bonds of friendship that we were able to bond as children. We wanted her to go to elementary school with the same friends that she would attend middle school and high school with. The proposed boundary change will divide the children. She will not attend high school with her best friend that lives two tenths of a mile away. She will not attend high school with her friends that live one tenth of a mile away. Our daughter was with us at the boundary meeting last night, she saw the map, and asked if her best friend & she would still be able to get to go to the same high school. My answer was: I will try to make sure you do.

My husband purchased our home 7 years ago because of the high quality school district and the high school. He chose to pay a little extra to be in a district in which our children would attend Westview High School. With the proposed boundary changes, our children will attend Aloha High School, our realtor has advised that our home value will likely drop significantly. We are very seriously considering selling our home if the boundary does indeed change. Our home is tucked in a quiet neighborhood in Beaverton, not Aloha, North of Baseline. With the proposed boundary changes, may daughter would Aloha High School with less than 1/2 of her class from Elmonica Elementary. She would be forced into a school of 1,900 children where she would be one of some 100 outsiders. She would have to start over again with making new friends during one of the most vulnerable eras in her childhood years where she would be most susceptible to bullying. No school board in the country should ag ree to this type of boundary change.

Currently, there are 5 high schools, with a 6th opening in fall of 2017. The High School capacity is at 93.3% in the 2015/2016 school year (Aloha 94.6%, Beaverton 80.9%, Southridge 90.1%, Sunset 94.2%, Westview 104.7%). The proposed boundary adjustments would result in the High School capacity at 80.1% in the 2017/2018 school year (Aloha 90.3%, Beaverton 80.1%, South Cooper Mountain 51.2%, Southridge 84%, Sunset 89.5%, Westview 85.6%). I am going to present the facts why ALH1 area should be moved back to Westview boundary from Aloha. The following will show how the move violates all the conditions set forth by the committee.

- 1. Proximity The farthest point in ALH1 to Westview is the intersection of Baseline and 158th. Still this is only 2.8 miles to Westview. Now the farthest in ALH1 to Aloha is the intersection of Walker and 173rd. This measures at 3.4 miles to Aloha. Yes, it is an additional 2.4 miles everyday given that parents do 2 round trips for pick up and drop off. So this move does not clearly take proximity into consideration.
- 2. Transportation Based on additional distance to Aloha HS, the \$\$ cost in gas compounds over the 4 year period. Let us say the students take the school bus both ways. Given that today to travel 1.3 miles to Westview via bus takes 28 minutes, students will be forced to leave prior to 7AM to catch the bus to Aloha as the distance is longer. Calculate this over a 4 year period and you will notice that the cost and travel time more than doubles.
- 3. Safety Safety is of paramount concern. In order for ALH1 area students to travel to Aloha, they will have to cross the TV Highway. According to golocalpdx.com, 4 of the 60 of the most dangerous intersections in the state are located along the TV Hwy. Out of the four, 2 of the intersections are right where we need to cross to get to Aloha HS. We should be "reducing" the number of students, especially young drivers who need to cross this dangerous intersection to get to school and not increasing the number. Please have some concern for the safety of our future generation!
- 4. Neighborhood unity Students in ALH1 go to Elmonica and Five Oaks. 8 years the community students have been together inside the classroom and in other extra curricular activities like sports, teams, band, music etc.. With the move of the ALH1 area, kids will now be split between Westview and Aloha with only Now take 113 of these kids, pry them apart from the community and throw them into a different school. So you send 80% of Elmonica to Westview and take 20% and put them to Aloha. Socially this is not good for our students or community as a whole. All the relationships built by the students and community over a period of 8 years will collapse. Please keep Elmonica united and move ALH1 back to Westview.
- 5. Student body configuration Aloha which is already at a very high % for free and reduced lunches today becomes worser with the boundary adjustment and reaches 61% which is the highest in the district. However Westview will be at 33% and adding ALH1 back to Westview does not change the % for Westview. This change does not fit within the BSD's main pillars equity. So it is only fair that ALH1 be added back to Westview boundary.
- 6. Physical location Having a small chunk of area like ALH1 cut off from the natural boundary line (Baseline and 158th) and moved to Aloha boundary does not make sense. There is no high concentration of students like in the Bethany area to even justify this move in terms of numbers. If you consider Walker and 158th as a natural boundary line then you will have to move an additional

300 students to Aloha which is already at 100% capacity. In the proposed boundary map baseline and 158th are kept as a natural boundary for Westview with the exception of just the ALH1 section. Why this discrimination? In every perspective keeping ALH1 attached to Westview is the right choice.

- 7. Availability of space There are two cases that I am going to present and show why the numbers provided by the district are inaccurate and do not reflect reality. Finally I will also show how adding ALH1 back to Westview boundary is not going to impact the projected numbers. Let us do some simple calculations -
- (a) Current Westview capacity Today Westview has 2651 students. The district claims that Westview is currently at 106% of its capacity. So 2651 = 106%. This includes the 113 in ALH1 + 174 from the Beaver Acres + 44 from the small chicken leg area left of 185th and south of baseline. Also the 212 students in the current proposal near the springville area is already accounted in todays All high school boundary map on the BSD website. The proposal shows only reduction of 113 students from Westview boundary. However closer inspection reveals that the 174 from beaver acres and 44 from south of baseline are also moved to different school boundaries. Now take away areas that are moved out of Westview, which means 2651 (113 + 174 + 44) = 2320. Allowable student capacity for Westview = 2421. So we will be 101 students less at status quo. Since it is logical to move the 44 + 174 student areas, after move it will bring Westview capacity to 2445 or $\sim 100\%$.
- (b) Westview Capacity + projected growth At the public review meeting, it was indicated that growth is calculated as 1 student per 10 houses. If you look at the existing boundary map and the new proposal, the number 212 indicates that there will be close to 2000 houses in that area, which is an impossibility. That area simply cannot have 2000 houses and would violate all regulations of the city. So a more appropriate # would be 130. The district projects another 125 student growth north of springville. Again this indicates that you will have \sim 1200 new homes by 2020 in that area, which is again not feasible and highly questionable. A more reasonable increase would be 60. So 130 + 50 = 180. So 212 180 = 32 extra students already accounted within current westview capacity. So 2651 32 = 2619. Now let us remove 174 + 44 already mentioned in (a) . So 2619 (174 + 44) = 2401, which brings us to allow 20 more students to be enrolled to make it 100%. Please note we still have 20 student deficity even with including ALH1. In this case why segregate ALH1 as it does not impact Westview current + projected capacity.

So considering all the points 1 to 7 outlined so far, it only makes perfect sense to move ALH1 back to the Westview boundary. We sincerely request the committee to review the details, reconsider their current proposal and return ALH1 area students back to Westview.

There was a high turnout of families from this neighborhood at the meeting today. Some have their kids in elementary, some have kids that have already graduated and some have kids in middle and high school. However everyone in the community feels strongly that this area has been treated unjustly (yes, it was moved 3 times during this boundary adjustment process, first to sunset, then back to westview and currently to aloha, what next?). The unity of the neighborhood was displayed in the show of #'s and voicing of their opinion. Please reconsider your proposal and put ALH1 back to Westview boundary where it belongs!

Dear BSD High School Boundary Change Committee,

Thank you for your commitment to serving our community and taking on the complex challenge of updating the school boundaries to accommodate the exciting changes in our district. It is a difficult task that will have a tremendous impact on our community for years to come.

I am a mother of 3 young children that will graduate in the classes of 2029, 2031, and 2034. We live in the Blue Leaf / Waterhouse South neighborhood that is currently in the boundary of Elmonica Elementary and Westview High School. In most recently released proposal, our area is being moved to Aloha High School. This is a major concern for our family and our neighborhood for many reasons including proximity to school, neighborhood unity, availability of space, and safety.

First, Westview and Sunset are the closest high schools to our home. When we bought our house, proximity to our neighborhood schools was of the upmost importance. We love that our children will be able to walk to their elementary school and ride their bikes to their middle school. We hope that our children will be able to spend less time commuting to and from school and more time focusing on their school work, extracurricular activities and hobbies. Westview and Sunset High School are both 2.6 miles from our house. Aloha is 3.4 miles from our house. That is almost 40% further away. That means 40% more travel time and 40% more fuel costs for students, parents, volunteers, and bus drivers

Second, this boundary change would divide the student body of the Elmonica Elementary community between 2 high schools, Westview and Aloha. This has a huge impact on the unity of our school and community. Many extracurricular activity leagues are based on the high school boundary, and the division means that our children may not get to play on the same team as their classmates.

Third, in the recent proposal the capacity of Aloha will be at 100% and Westview will be at 94%. That is extremely concerning. It does not make sense to move a community to a school that will be at capacity from a school that still has room for our children.

Finally, as a parent, the safety of my children is my highest priority. In order to get to Aloha High School, my family will have to cross over Tualatin Valley Highway multiple times a day. TV highway is a notoriously dangerous road with 4 of the state's most dangerous intersections located on it. I do not want my young drivers to be faced with such a treacherous journey just to get to and from school.

Please take a closer look at the Blue Leaf / Waterhouse South community in your proposal and find a way to return our students to Westview in order to keep our community united and our children safe.

Please consider moving the west boundary line of ALH1 to 170th Ave instead of the currently proposed 173rd Ave. Six years ago, the Washington County transportation department connected SW 173rd Ave to 170th Ave, calling it a major north/south arterial route from Cornell in north Beaverton to 175th Ave in south Beaverton and beyond. 170th Ave that once ended at Elmonica School now is used as a main north/south route for those traveling through that area. From the current map, the western boundary of the ALH1 neighborhood is located on 173rd Ave, which looks like a natural boundary line on the map, but 173rd Ave is no longer a through street south of Walker Rd. In fact, 173rd Ave is now a side street/neighborhood route, serving mainly the neighborhood of f of 173rd Ave. What the map doesn't show is that 170th Ave is now the natural east/west divider through that area, not 173rd Ave. With the current ALH1 proposal, and using 173rd Ave as the western boundary, we would have two different buses from two different schools essentially picking up students from the same locations along 173rd Ave. and going two different directions. There's also the challenge of finding any one intersection that could be used anywhere along 170th Ave that a bus could safely and effectively cross the busy north/south major arterial road of 170th Ave. Please consider keeping the neighborhood along 173rd intact as those same neighboring students today, standing at the same bus stop would be split if the boundary line were to remain on 173rd Ave. Using 170th Ave as the western boundary for ALH1 follows the intent and criteria of creating such boundaries in the following ways: Availability of Space at Westview High would allow this small nu mber of students to be included in the Westview HS boundary. Proxi ity of School to Westview High is of shorter distance than the currently proposed high school for ALH1. Neighborhood Unity in keeping our students, who have been together for 8+ years, a unit all the way through high school. These kids have grown up together, played sports together and developed strong bonds together and would benefit greatly if they could continue that unity all the way through their high school years. Safety is increased by having only buses from one school picking up all the students from bus stops along 173rd Ave instead of twice as many buses and twice as many stops along the same road. Increasing congestion increases safety issues. Transportation issues range from inefficiently having two buses servicing the same road from two different directions, no easy access from 173rd Ave to the South Waterhouse neighborhood and having to cross a major north/south arterial route in 170th Ave, which is also a Safety issue. Given the fact that 173rd Ave is no I onger a through street and 170th Ave is a major north/south arterial route, 170th Ave would make to most logical western boundary border to the ALH1 proposed area.

Respected High school committee,

Appreciate all the work that you have done so far in redefining the high school boundary. In the several iterations over the last 2 months, it is unfortunate that the guidelines set by the district and the superintendent have been neglected and some of the decisions have been totally unfair and has raised concern among the community members.

I live in the ALH1 area, which has been a bone of contention. In the springboard proposal this was moved to Sunset. Then per 12/17 proposal it was moved back to Westview and then again in 1/7 it has been moved to Aloha. What next? Is it going to be moved to BHS? Why such radical changes within a span of 2 months? How does the district plan to justify 3 moves of a small area like ALH1?

I would like to address concerns regarding safety with the move of ALH1 to Aloha -

SAFETY:

- Students from ALH1 area will now travel longer distance, hence longer travel time in order to reach Aloha. Aloha HS is farther away than Westview or Sunset from this area.
- Students will have to cross MAX lines, several school bus intercepts, dangerous intersections of TV Hwy in order to reach Aloha. This is much more dangerous than crossing Hwy 26 or going on 185th to reach Sunset or Westview.
- Roads leading to Aloha HS are plagued by traffic during busy hours especially the morning and evening commute. Also this is slow moving traffic with several major cross roads for MAX lines, and school bus stops. Commuting several times a day back and forth from ALH1 to Aloha HS would become a major concern of safety. We want to keep our young drivers especially safe and exposing them to horrible traffic in their early years of driving is not only dangerous but also puts a concerns on safety for other travelers using these roadways.

Proximity and Safety are some of the key guidelines adopted by BSD in the boundary change process and the move of ALH1 to Aloha violates both of these guidelines. It is not practical and puts the lives of the students at risk by having them traverse dangerous roads everyday. The district needs to minimize hazardous roads and travel as much as possible.

Please consider keeping our children SAFE. We want them to travel safely everyday. We also would like to reduce traffic to an already congested TV Hwy by not having to travel from ALH1 to Aloha.

We sincerely hope the district would consider SAFETY a PRIORITY for its students and move ALH1 back to Westview boundary.

This map is provocative, but much less so than the balanced equity map from the springboard presentation, and it has every school between 30-45% FRL.

Given the current demographics, the only way to start to reduce the economic disadvantage that the Southridge and Westview boundary adjustments inflicted on Aloha is to move the Aloha boundary north into higher income areas. At least this map doesn't just send one or 2 schools from Bethany to Aloha. It makes Aloha almost a Westview South, and would increase equity for the whole Aloha area. And with 2 schools to absorb the growth in North Bethany, there is more flexibility in case the projections are low.

This map moves the south part of Aloha to the new school, and then splits Aloha and Westview vertically. It leaves most of the rest of the district untouched, minimizing transitions. The worst commutes, in the Westview area, change from 3.5 miles to 7.7 miles, but it keeps the changes where the growth is, and when the process needs to unwind after the district provides the next high school space, it will minimize change then. It also drops Aloha economically disadvantaged numbers to 36%! Beaverton, Southridge, and Cooper Mountain are all fairly distributed at 45%, and Sunset and Westview are both over 30%.



I live in one of the communities that would be impacted significantly and negatively by this proposed Beaverton School District Boundary Chang plan.

I live in Waterhouse South/Blue Leaf community (ALH1) within the Elmonica Elementary and Westview High School boundary. New school boundary that Beaverton district is proposing will send children in my community from Westview High School to Aloha High School.

It is hard to believe this new proposal considering the criteria that the district said that they would use to make the boundary adjustments. This new plan that affects ALH1 area does not meet several criteria, especially community unity, safety, proximity to school, student body composition.

- 1. Community Unity: Children in this community are coming Elmonica Elementary and Five Oaks. These children are attending the same extra-curricular programs, including sports, music, volunteer, and several other club programs. They have strong community sense by attending the same school and participating team sport programs, and community volunteer program with the classmates and friends. Splitting these children will not meet Community Unity. Please keep Elmonica united!
- 2. Proximity to School and Safe of children: Westview HS is less than 2.5 miles away while Aloha HS is close to 3.5 miles away. - middles school groups remain together



Subject: Concern from ALH1 neighborhood family on the 12.17.15 proposal on school boundary change.

I want to thank you for arranging the public preview meeting. It was good that we are able to talk to members directly and understand the challenges that they are going over for making these boundary adjustments.

My family lives in Blue Leaf community/Waterhouse South. It is marked as ALH1 neighborhood as shown in the Learning Map on 12/17/2015 Meeting minutes. We reviewed the latest proposal on school boundary changes and have some deep concerns that we would like to bring to your attention. We have noticed that this realignment puts our neighborhood in Aloha high school. It would be best to keep this neighborhood in Westview high school. This neighborhood has only limited number of houses.

In that way, the many current students will be happy and families will be happy too.

I am also stating the concerns grouped under the same criteria the district considers to make boundary adjustments.

Availability of space:

The latest proposal from Dec 17th completely breaks the Superintendent's proposal to keep school capacity to 90% or less. Also, it shows a highly unbalanced distribution, with Cooper Mountain HS at 63%, barely over half filled whereas the Sunset High School and Aloha HS at 114% and 104% respectively, basically over crowded to start with and no room for growth. Making schools overcrowded to start with beats the whole purpose of this boundary re-mapping and does not meet the primary objective to keep the target capacity 90% of less for each school allowing room for growth. A more balanced approach to capacity distribution should be considered.

Neighborhood unity:

Our children attending Elmonica Elementary school and Five Oaks Middle school will now be split between Westview and Aloha high school. Transition to high school has its own challenges, and if the kids do not have their support system of friends only creates additional challenges and increases stress in the kids.

Proximity to School and Transportation:

Aloha HS is farther by more than 0.6 miles from our home when compared to Westview HS increasing the travel time on a daily basis. The roads the kids will travel between 185th and TV highway, have a very high rate of congestion as per ODOT reports http://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/HWY/REGION1/TV185th/OR8_RSA_Report_small.pdf

Stretching the school boundary disproportionately does not help the congestion nor the kids. Adding more young kids to the

congestion only increases wasted time on traffic jams, increased stress and cost of travel. The proposal should also consider maintaining or reducing students time on the road every day.

Safety:

According to Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) 185th-TV highway intersection has a very high crash rate almost 70 crashes in the last 5 years compared to

Along with increased time to travel every day, the young drivers will need to cross the Freight rail road near TV highway and 185th intersection. Crossing rail roads is added risk and Freight rails add additional risk to young highschool drivers. Having young drivers drive several times on this intersection is risky and highly concerning as a parent.

Student Body composition:

The proposal significantly increases disproportion among the schools, in the number of students eligible for free/reduced lunch. It adds more segregation of the students instead of creating an inclusive environment.

Based on the information provided so far, having the kids from ALH1 neighborhood to Westview best helps kids and families and also resolves the concerns I have stated so far.

Please reconsider your proposal and make the changes to minimize the impacts in every family and kids present and future schooling status. Please feel free to let me know if I can help in any way to improve the proposal.

Hello,

I would like to ask that BSD grandfather the class of 2019 to Westview high school. My understanding is that BSD prides themselves on moving towards evidence based practices, and yet I could not find one article that was in favor of moving high school students, especially in their latter years. How is it evidenced based to uproot children in the middle of their high school years?

As a mental health professional who uses evidence based practice in my daily treatment, moving these kids in their high school years can be devastating and not in their best interest.

There are many reasons I'm requesting this, but first I would like to read a little from an article taken from PsychInfo by Marie Harter-Walker, Eh.D.

The article states: "The conventional wisdom about moving kids in high-school is "don't." She also states that moving teens during the latter part of high school can have serious academic, social, and psychological consequences that should be taken in to consideration. Unlike younger children, teens are at a stage of life where they are beginning to separate from family toward independence. A move from high school can affect development."

My concern is that this will affect so many things for our child. Junior year is a big year of planning, PSATs, SATs, ACTs, choosing colleges. Not to mention that these grades will go on their transcripts. Also, kids are allowed to begin AP courses, which my child is on track to do. It makes no sense to switch kids in AP class to IB their junior year.

My child is currently a 4.0 student. If she maintains that through graduation, her choices in the futures will increase. But even as important to grades and test results is her social world that these teens live in. Sport team placements they worked so hard for, debate teams they've been on since freshman year...all clubs and activities will be affected, which again will affect self-esteem and increase anxiety. Junior and Senior year are crucial to success of these kids. Not to mention that at Westview she has a chance to letter in her sports, one being cross country. Sunset is national champions...you would be taking her chance to letter in a sport that she's been doing since middle school away from her and several of her teammates. It's about the joy of being on the team, having a chance to do your best, letter for your college application, and have healthy latter years.

What I'm asking for is just to be grandfathered in. These kids were already split in Middle school between Sunset and Westview. It was crushing for them. What I'm asking is that you not do it again, especially at this age.

I would like to share a personal professional story about a boy who was one of my first clients at Washington County Community

Corrections Center. He was only 17, tried and treated as an adult. He was moved in his sophomore year to BSD. He never adjusted to life at his new school. He no longer played on the soccer team, he had a hard time making new friends, and he started failing his classes.

He didn't graduate because he dropped out. He got a job, met new people, tried meth and ended up in the treatment dorm after being arrested. I know that is extreme, but it's true, and one of the first things he said that led him down this path was that he was fine until he moved, he didn't make the soccer team, he didn't have any new friends, and he had no motivation to be there.

Please don't move our kids in their latter years of high school. Please allow them to finish at Westview. Evidence base practice research shows us that this could affect academic success and psychological development Please consider this, especially since allowing them to stay will not affect the growth percentage at WV.

Oak Hills Elementary--Two reasons to keep together

I live on the west side of Bethany Boulevard and I have four children who attend Oak Hills, Meadow Park, and Westview. At the Public Preview Meeting on January 21, I spoke with a Committee Member from Sunset HS who told me that I shouldn't worry about the dividing of Oak Hills Elementary into two high schools (Westview & Sunset) because soon the Elementary School boundaries would be realigned and the westside of Oak Hills would be sent off to Bethany Elementary. This won't happen. Our neighborhood walks to Oak Hills Elementary. At the school district's insistence, the county just put in a big, expensive intersection at Bethany Boulevard and Oak Hills Drive which eliminated three buses and allows almost all of the westside Oak Hills kids to walk to school. Why would the future Elementary Boundary Committee move us to a school where all of us would have to be bused? They won't! This would leave us as a divided elementary, which for so many rea sons would be bad for our school.

But the most important reason not to separate us is for the sake of the kids who would be moved. If you move the east side of Oak Hills Elementary out of Westview and into Sunset's boundaries, you will be taking approximately 25 kids per year and sending them to Sunset, while all the rest of their elementary school peers (75 kids) go off to Westview. Any new friends that they made while at Meadow Park will also go to Westview (all of Bethany Elementary) or Beaverton HS (the rest of Meadow Park students appear to be moving to to Beaverton HS). That is cruel to those 25 kids--sending them off to one high school while all the friends they have made their entire lives go to Westview.

Please keep Oak Hills Elementary together at Westview High School--for the unity of our elementary community and for the sake of the children who live on the east side of Bethany Boulevard. Dividing the high school boundary along Bethany Boulevard may make sense farther north, but it does not make sense within the Oak Hills Elementary boundaries.

Dear High School Boundary change committee,

I will take this opportunity to thank you for giving us an opportunity to provide our inputs in the process. The community understands that the boundary change is a complex process. However what concerns us is that BSD set forth some objectives and conditions to abide by and the proposal actually shows that BSD has given no concern for its own guidelines upon which this change should be based.

In specific reference is the change of ALH1 area multiple times in the process. This area has been treated like a ping pong ball. As per the spring board proposal it was slated to move to Sunset. Then as of the 12/17 revision, it was put back to Westview. Again on 1/7 it was moved to Aloha. On what basis were these moves considered? No explanation has been given so far for any of our queries and it is indeed frustrating to see the cold approach given by the committee regarding this move. Moving ALH1 to Aloha violates 6 of the 7 conditions stipulated by BSD. I am going to touch upon one such criteria in detail as it not only affects ALH1 but BSD policy in general.

EQUITY

One of the foremost pillars of BSD has been equity and providing equal educational opportunities to all children. Moving 113 students in ALH1 puts Aloha having FRL students at 61%, reduces Sunset to 11% and Westview to 33%. How is this called equity? This clearly shows social class discrimination. Why such big difference amongst the schools? We are not arguing that every school should have the exact same % of FRL. However it should be within a 5% difference level. This move of ALH1 will put further stress on Aloha HS, which is already struggling with high % of FRL in the district.

High % of FRL also means that these kids come from poor neighborhoods, need more attention both during and after school to perform reasonably well. The teachers and volunteers in Aloha have a higher burden to cater to the needs of these students. Keeping this need of students and the higher burden on teachers in mind, BSD should actually consider keeping Aloha at a max of 90%. However this is the only school in the district that is slated for a 100% used capacity by 2020. How is this called equity? It highlights the fact that BSD does not care for the poor students and feels that they can be neglected. This is a moral issue.

Ultimately the goal for any move should be to provide better education for the students. Moving ALH1 to Aloha does not address this need. With Aloha being at 100% capacity, class sizes will be big. Also due to high % of FRL students the need for individual attention for each student also increases and hence the standard of education also comes down as demand is more than supply of teachers. Granted the school receives federal aid due to FRL students, but >50% of student population being under the FRL category is not healthy for the students and the school.

Please move ALH1 area back to Westview and help reduce the burden on Aloha. With this recent proposal you have just made Aloha at 100% capacity and increased the % of FRL to the highest in the state and also higher than most schools across the nation. Make the schools more comparable in terms of equity and do not discriminate based on social and income levels. I hope BSD will live up to the "Standard of Excellence" that it boasts of and will reconsider the proposal.

Moving ALH1 back to Westview is the right thing to do, and will certainly reduce the strain on Aloha and will also address equity to some extent. It will reduce Aloha's capacity and % of FRL and give it a relief and help meet the

needs of the students.

This is a question regarding grandfathering the existing high school students - more specifically the juniors

- 1. When schools like springville and Bonny slope were introduced, it started off with 1 grade in a year and slowly in a matter of 5 years reached the full capacity. Why can't this process be adopted for high school also? Start off with 9th grade in 2017, 9th and 10th grade in 2018 etc... This will allow the school to have all teachers and programs to be established and grow over the years. Stoller summa also adopted this model. It was pretty successful and worked well. So by the year 2020, the estimates presented would still remain close as the existing students affected including 2016 freshmen would graduate by 2020. This proposal makes the most sense and would be a win-win situation for both the district and the students.
- 2. Why moving the incoming juniors in 2017 is a bad move. Here are the several reasons -
- (a) Junior year is the most stressful year of high school. ACT, SAT and PSAT to be given that year along with several AP or IB courses to be taken to up the GPA and make the college application attractive. So trying to form social circles and trying to start anew and build relationship with teachers and counselor is an added unwanted stress to students.
- (b) Students already plan the 4 years of high school choices of courses while entering as a freshman. Changing the choices drastically not because the student wants to but because the district is forcing them to due to boundary changes will only cause the student to fail.
- (c) Students are well established in varsity teams, clubs, team competitions etc. Now trying to fit into varsity teams and teams for competitions like science bowl etc in a new school is stressful and would put the transition students at a disadvantage. Junior year is supposed to showcase the student at their best. So any change to their already established routine/path spells disaster to the students. There are other compelling reasons also to not move the juniors -

Dear High School Boundary Adjustment Committee,

I would like to share my concerns with the high school boundary adjustment process and the Beaverton School Board Policy JC, School Attendance Areas, directing this process. In several draft versions of this letter I included a wide variety of research around the impact of school poverty levels on student achievement. I ultimately decided that any hope for change would not come from laying out the data to convince you of something I can assume you already know. My argument for change is better served by an appeal to the integrity of our organization, both our efforts to meet our moral and stated obligations and the need for consistency between our words and actions. Hence, I ask you to consider the following points.

We all understand that affluence, like poverty, is generally compartmentalized. Those of similar levels of wealth tend to live together, creating the diverse neighborhoods within a community. We also understand that communities have significant influence on the culture of their neighborhood school. Neighborhoods of lower socioeconomic status tend to have lower expectations for academic performance, including fewer demands for their children to enroll in rigorous course work, and lower parent involvement in terms of volunteering in the school, attending school functions, and being attentive to homework completion to name a few. These, and others, contribute to the undeniable and historical connection between a school's socioeconomic status level and academic performance levels. Simply put, as the level of poverty within a school increases so do the number of obstacles for all students within that school to succeed.

Our families in poverty place a great deal of trust in their neighborhood school, much more than a family of greater means and greater access to opportunities outside of the school. How does a boundary process that perpetuates extreme differences in school poverty levels honor this trust and reflect the stated values of the district in equity and excellence? Making things worse, we know that once these school boundaries are established the differences between schools almost always grows wider. Affluent families, whether moving into our community or those already here, will seek out the school attendance areas where success is the dominant culture.

We are an organization committed to offering all of our students a fair, equal, and impartial education. How does a policy around school attendance areas, which places the maintenance of neighborhoods above the needs of our largest underperforming population, stack up against our commitment to equity?

Some, recognizing the inherently unfair system we create and maintain, argue that we can overcome the obstacles produced by socioeconomic status by spending more money on our poor schools. This line of thinking ignores both the role of culture in a school of poverty and the long history of minimal success associated with these efforts.

If we can create two schools, each with 35% of their students eligible for free and reduced meals, knowing that more will

experience academic success than if we create one school with 15% and one school with 55%, how can we morally fight for anything less? The opportunity to make such a significant difference in the trajectory of so many of our students does not come along often. I urge all of us with the privilege and responsibility to influence our high school boundary adjustment process to place equity over proximity to school, the needs of our students over transportation costs, and excellence for all over neighborhood unity.











I would ask the committee, before any more map changes are made, to please stop and consider the transitions you will offer to students. How will you help the students you are shuffling and splitting to adjust to such big changes? Perhaps by considering those things, you can create a better map, that truly considers the students that will be in high school when these changes take place.

Socially and emotionally speaking, there are so many factors that need to be considered to really support students. If you force students to start at one school then switch to another mid high school career, are you prepared to offer more than just freshmen orientations? Are you prepared to train more leadership students, peer counselors and guidance counselors to help mentor underclassman as they try and assimilate into new communities? Do you have the budget to create structures in the school day that allow for smaller group situations so that students can get to know each other as they enter a new school community without their friends? For example, our students go to Raleigh Hills, if you split this very small middle school program you would be sending thirty or less students (depending on how you draw the map) into a large high school. Already they go into Beaverton as a class of only sixty. How would you help a small group of students integrate into a large school community?

Academically speaking, does BSD have the budget to hire more guidance counselors to help students transition from one school track such as IB to another like AP? Are their plans for what to do with students that are on specialized tracks like the marketing program at BHS, if no such program exists at their new schools? Can you ensure that every student will graduate on time, and equipped to handle college if such large transitions are taking place?

Will the clubs and sports be financially supported during transition? As those activities lose parent boosters, and students, will the school district be able to fund them as they rebuild, until they can gain more participation and support?

Will you provide training for teachers to help students transition? Is that in the budget?

To the High School Boundary Advisory Committee, and to Beaverton School District staff,

I wish to voice my strong concern about the negative effects the proposed boundary changes would have on socio-economic and ethnic balance within BSD. Given the geography of the district, I don't believe this is necessary: we have an opportunity to build stronger and more diverse schools within BSD, but unless we change course quickly, we are going to do the exact opposite: more segregation based on wealth and ethnicity. The Beaverton School District is better than that!

My comments will focus on the proposed changes to free-and-reduced-lunch (FRL) percentages, which are a widely accepted proxy for parent wealth. Unfortunately, racial and ethnic identity strongly correlates with household wealth, so segregation by FRL has the indirect but real effect of also segregating by race and ethnicity.

I have followed the boundary and transfer policies of neighboring Portland Public Schools (PPS) for several years, both for personal reasons (relatives and friends with kids in Portland) and because, frankly, PPS offers multiple examples of how NOT to operate a healthy, equitable school system!

PPS:

- 1) Allows individual schools to raise money for additional staff at the schools raising the money. This has the morally indefensible effect of allocating teacher-student ratios (universally accepted to have a strong effect on student success) according to parental income. To my knowledge, no other area district allows this, even high income districts like Lake Oswego.
- 2) Creates school boundaries based on "community unity", in other words, segregating schools by race and class
- 3) Until recently, used an open enrollment policy to favor the choices of white and privileged families over minorities and the less fortunate. This has created the perverse and bizarre situation where, for instance, NE Portland schools are more segregated than the area in which the schools are located. To its credit, PPS recently reformed the most destructive and unfair features of this policy.
- 4) Has allowed enrollment differences between comprehensive high schools to reach ridiculous levels. Before Jefferson became an option school, it had an enrollment of about a third of that of more populous schools like Grant! The detrimental effects on elective offerings, which are key to providing high quality education, are not hard to imagine.
- 5) Imposes multiple barriers to low-income participation in option and specialty schools: for instance, not providing free bus service to middle school students, and giving enrollment preference to siblings (lower income families tend to be more mobile, and hence less able to take advantage of sibling preference).

6) Switched many of its schools to a K-8 format, then grossly underfunded them, especially for higher grade level electives. Of course, the worst situations somehow ended up being in minority and low income areas!

Whether or not the above policies were intentionally designed to harm minorities and the less fortunate, the result has been a district which is a de facto two-tier system, one for haves and the other for have-nots.

Why does this matter for Beaverton schools? **Because, for every single one of the above regressive and unfair policies, Beaverton has done the exact opposite, choosing the path of fairness and decency**. We provide free busing for options schools, we don't allow sibling preferences, we properly fund our K-8s, and on and on. This is one of the reasons I have always been proud to send my children to BSD schools.

And that is also why I am very concerned that the proposed new boundaries will erode this sense of fairness and respect, where diverse schools are viewed as an asset, not a problem. If our schools are insufficiently diverse, it will help foster an us-vs-them attitude, where, for instance, efforts to hoard resources at higher income schools might flourish. Again, that is not the way we do things in Beaverton.

I examined the changes in FRL percentages predicted by the most recent boundary proposal. Right now, the average difference (positive or negative) of a school's FRL percentage, relative to the district average of 39%, is 12%. With the proposed changes, this increases to 16%! This is a large increase. Much of the change is due to the huge decrease in diversity at Sunset (where my children attend or will probably attend). Aloha, the highest poverty school, stays essentially unchanged with a percentage in the low 60s.

I sincerely believe that a better distribution is possible, with no more disruption than the current proposal (and possible less). For instance, kids in Cedar Hills and its surrounding neighborhoods (such as the Barnes School feeder area) have been attending Sunset literally for generations. These are low- to middle-income areas. Why are these areas being moved to Beaverton High? The idea that the freeway presents a barrier is not credible. These are areas which would require busing whether or not the Sunset Highway existed.

Very generally, income distributions in our area roughly fall into east-west bands. For instance, the area north of Hwy 26 is generally higher income.

With that insight, the starting point for the boundary adjustments should logically be to align school boundaries along north-south lines.

I'm very proud to live in, and send my children to, a school district that values the education of ALL its students, not just an elite few. With the boundary adjustment process, we have an opportunity to make the District even better: more diverse, more compassionate, and more fair.

Is it really possible that student athlete fundraising is a primary deciding factor in where boundary lines are drawn for this particular school-especially when such a decision then impacts every other high school boundary in the district???

I certainly hope that boundary adjustment decisions are not being made on fundraising for sports. The primary goal of the Beaverton School District is to educate the children in our community. Boundary Adjustments need to be made in alignment with the JC Policy and for the greater health of the district.

As you are adjusting high school boundaries, what is your target enrollment (desired % of capacity) for the South Cooper Mountain school? Are you trying to keep it lower than other schools in anticipation of future growth?

You've calculated the Hillsboro School District land being transferred to BSD to represent about 150 students in year 2020. But since that land is not officially part of the BSD yet, are those 150 students included in your proposal, or do you need to leave room in the capacity planning for those? What about the rest of the South Cooper Mountain development area? Washington County is planning for about 7000 new homes in total - how many of those were included in the grids of the maps you're using for this boundary adjustment process (none, an estimate of the ones that will be built by 2020, or all planned development)? The city of Tigard is also planning a large home development on the south side of Scholls Ferry near Roy Rogers. Do you anticipate the BSD being extended to incorporate the new Tigard development?

As you adjust the attendance areas of the high schools during this process, what is your capacity planning goal (enrollment % of capacity) for the South Cooper Mountain school, so that there will be enough room remaining to accommodate future growth? It can't be too full, or we'd risk having to go through another boundary adjustment process in a few years.

Balancing the schools to have equitable poverty rates is a noble goal, but not practical if you want them to be considered neighborhood schools. The location of the poverty areas, as shown in the Free & Reduced Lunch distribution map, makes it impossible to draw the boundary lines for "equity" and also satisfy the goals for proximity, neighborhood unity, and the multiple transportation factors. Drawing the boundary lines for equitable poverty percentages would increase travel distance and raise traffic issues for every school in the district, and make the attendance areas disjointed.

High school students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities such as clubs and athletics. These activity groups generally meet after school, and since the district does not offer activity buses the students are required to find their own transportation home after the meeting, practice, or game. Changing the boundaries to increase the travel distance would affect all students, but might actually impact the high poverty students the most, as they are less likely to have their own cars. A student may not be able to participate in extracurricular activities if they live too far away to walk and cannot arrange transportation home.

If we cannot balance the schools for equity without increasing the travel distances, then perhaps we have to be more creative in finding another way to compensate the high poverty schools. Is it possible for the school district to manage a portion of the funding based on each school's free & reduced lunch percentage? If the district's overall F&R lunch average is 39%, could each school be allocated a set of funds based on their school's percentage above or below the district average? For example, if Sunset was 20% F&R lunch, and Aloha was 60%, could Sunset be given less funding (based on their percentage below the district average)?

I don't believe reducing the student enrollment (to less than 90% capacity) at a high poverty school is the answer. It is my understanding that a school runs most efficiently, financially, when it operates close to full capacity, in that they receive the maximum allocation of funds (points per student) and maximum teaching staff FTE allocation for full student enrollment, and their base operating expenses (electricity, heat, etc.) remain the same, regardless of capacity.

Reducing the student-to-teacher ratio isn't the only way to help high poverty students, and the schools already receive some provisions for increasing staff. Those schools also need money, and there isn't currently a system in place for that. Some high poverty students struggle with basic needs, can't pay course-specific fees, and come to school without school supplies. High poverty schools need to provide extra services beyond academics and counseling - they need to operate food pantries, cover for unpaid fees, and provide school supplies, athletic scholarships, band instrument supplies, etc.

My son attends Aloha High School. I would love to see their F&R lunch percentage drop, but after studying the F&R distribution map, I don't see how it's possible to draw the boundaries for a more favorable percentage without sacrificing all the other boundary adjustment criteria. Maybe the school district can help high poverty schools through funding if it's not practical to achieve equity based on attendance areas.

One of the goals of the boundary adjustment process is to minimize transitions. There are some areas, however, that should be moved now that there will be a high school to serve the southwest portion of the school district. The current boundaries split the Cooper Mountain area between 3 high schools, fracturing the communities. It would be ideal if properties that consider themselves Cooper Mountain could all be in the attendance area for the new Cooper Mountain school, and not have the neighborhood next to them go to a different high school.

There may be differences of opinion as to what's considered "Cooper Mountain", but if you draw a horizontal line (east/west) on the map at Rigert Rd, everything south of Rigert Rd. (at least) is considered Cooper Mountain. Rigert is on the north side of the mountain, a half mile or more from the top. Murray Road makes a good north/south dividing line between the schools, but neighborhoods right along Murray, close to other schools, could be pulled over to the other schools if necessary for capacity or equity balancing.

It's been announced that the elementary school boundaries will be adjusted as well, after the high school boundary adjustment process is finished. Therefore, for the Cooper Mountain area, I don't think the existing elementary school boundaries should be used as a basis for making the high school boundary changes. I think the elementary school boundaries for Cooper Mountain should be changed as well.

It never made sense that the community south of Gassner Rd. was assigned to Hazeldale Elementary. It looks fine on a flat street map, but not when you consider the topography and neighborhood unity. Gassner Rd. is right about the top of the mountain, with the properties south of that facing the south side of the mountain, towards where the new high school will be. Those neighborhoods have more in common with the neighborhoods to their east than they do on the other side of the mountain to the north.

I live south of Gassner Rd. (on Stonecreek Dr., the very border of the school district), and we are currently in the attendance area for Hazeldale Elementary. But my son did not go to Hazeldale. He attended a different elementary school, via Open Enrollment, that was a better fit for our transportation routes and daycare situation. Hazeldale did not feel like a "neighborhood school" for us - it is not part of our community and we didn't know anyone there. None of our direct neighbors sent their kids to Hazeldale either - they chose other schools for the elementary years.

My neighborhood is relatively new, so there is no history of generations of families attending Aloha. For future students, the best fit for the area south of Gassner Road would be the Cooper Mountain high school attendance area, finally bringing some (school) unity to the area. With some unity, perhaps more families would consider public school instead of private school, which most of my neighbors have chosen up to this point. My son is currently a freshman at Aloha High School. He wants to finish high school at Aloha rather than switch to a new school in his junior year - so I'm not proposing the boundary change for my personal











The following excerpt is from your guidelines:

In planning and developing an adjustment of attendance area boundaries, the superintendent first shall consider the following primary criteria: availability of space, proximity to school, safety, and neighborhood unity. Whenever possible, meighborhood areas, particularly at the elementary level, should be retained within a single attendance boundary.

With attention to the final sentence, your committee has made an effort to keep schools like Cedar Mill and Jacob Wismer intact....why not Oak Hills? This is not ok. Oak Hills once attended Aloha High School, then Sunset, then Westview. Let's quit the see-saw back and forth, make a decision, and then proceed as a whole.

Yesterdays (1/28/16) article in the Oregonian newspaper titled 'Finally, Oregon graduation rate rises' highlighted the best and worst graduation rates for low-income students in Portland and the surrounding areas. Sunset had one of the best graduation rates for low-income students (80%) and Beaverton and Aloha had some of the worst graduation rates for low-income students (61% and 68%). This correlates with the research I have studied and I believe that the Boundary Committee has an obligation to improve the rates of poverty in our schools by making them more equal rather than worse as protrayed in the maps. I know this work is difficult but don't dismiss 'difficult' for the future health of our district. I want to see all schools in BSD do well versus 'good/bad' school performances.

Socioeconomics clearly play a role in school success. I attended the Budget and Listening Session recently and someone in the audience asked how does the district distribute resources to high-poverty schools. The BSD presenter or Jeff Rose gave the example at William Walker, a high poverty school, one of the ways BSD was helping the school was providing an assistant principal and two extra teachers to meet the school needs. That is good but only part of a solution, the other is to equalize socioeconomics/FRL. Research shows high proverty schools have higher mobility, lower attendance, fewer available volunteers, diminished fundraising for sports/activities, more inexperienced teachers, and less parental support for education. Let's start talking the "we" as parents in the district versus the "I". We are capable of creating all successful schools in Beaverton.

BSD needs to find a way to allow juniors to stay at their current schools. Forcing a junior to transfer to a new school in the middle of high school is extremely disruptive. BSD should either allow all juniors to elect, on an individual basis, whether to stay at their current school or transfer to the new school, or it should simply grandfather all juniors.

Juniors are already completely embedded in their schools. Their whole life revolves around their school: their friends, activities, and sports are all at their schools. Forcing juniors to give up the most important parts of their life is not appropriate. Juniors should not be separated from their friends, teams, and schools.

Many people are being hurt by the boundary adjustment. BSD has the opportunity to not hurt juniors. It can let them finish high school as they began it. Juniors should be concentrating on getting good grades and preparing to attend college. They should not be dealing with the emotional strife of losing their friends, teams, and schools. This has the potential of derailing kids off of their path at a very important time in their life.

I'd like to thank the committee for the time they have spent on this process. I have a transition comment. Beaverton School District should not force juniors to change schools. BSD should do one of the following:

- (1) Grandfather juniors (like it is already grandfathering seniors). This has the advantage of keeping the entire class together. It allows them to retain their peer group and social network. Juniors will continue to thrive at their current school without any negative disruptions due to the boundary change. Although, according to the Enrollment & Transition Estimate, South Cooper Mtn will have lower enrollment, this will only be for one year. The following year there will be another incoming freshman class, and enrollment will increase.
- (2) Allow all juniors to choose whether to stay at their current school or move to their new school. Some will choose to stay and some will choose to move. The enrollment numbers at each school might work out just fine. And this will only affect the numbers for two years. Another option is to say that if a junior chooses to stay at his or her current school, he or she has to provide his or her own transportation. This could reduce the cost for the district.

Choosing one of these options would go a long way towards alleviating the distress that the boundary change is causing. It will show that the District is listening to the public comments and cares about these kids. It will show that the District is willing to make decisions for the benefit of the kids. It will show that when the District has the power to help families, it does so.

The District must change the boundaries because of the new school. Some families will be hurt by this process. That is inevitable. The District cannot make everyone happy with the boundary changes. But the District can choose an option that allows juniors to stay at their current school. The District has the power to do that. The District does not have to hurt juniors.

The possibility that the District could force juniors to change schools is causing intense stress and anxiety. Getting kicked out of your community is a terrible feeling. Most adults would feel that way, and these are kids. The high schools do a wonderful job of promoting school unity and pride. There is a tremendous sense of belonging as a kid walks down the halls, attends football and basketball games, and participates in clubs and sports. Kids identify with their school. They love their friends, teachers, coaches, and teammates. They love their school. Juniors should not be forced to lose their community.

I understand that this is a difficult process. But the needs of these kids should come first. Please choose an option that allows juniors to stay at their current school.

Please review it and discuss as a group. I do believe that we are all on the same team and this is a better alternative.









I would like to express my support for the process by which you have been determining the boundary adjustments. I see an outstanding level of thought and consideration going into this process.

I am currently in the Sunset catchment area and will likely be transferred to Beaverton. I am content with that and trust that Beaverton will be a great school for my kids. I feel that the focus that you have put on equity of the schools is excellent and very important for the well being of the whole district. Currently, Aloha school has suffered from low fundraising ability. I feel that the distinct difference of Sunset in the most recently proposed boundaries map, in having such a comparatively low ratio of children on free and reduced lunch, is also a concern. I would like to see how the ratio would change if the area around Meadow Park Middle School (this is not our location) was to be included into Sunset rather than Beaverton. For those who are concerned about student traveling distance, this seems to be a clear choice. I also have concern for those students around Chehalem Elementary School if they have to travel to the Cooper Mountain School. Perhaps if so me of Meadow Park could go to Sunset, then some of the area Southwest of TV Highway and Murray Blvd could go to Beaverton.

The current projected map indicates that Sunset HS will be at an 11% free and reduced lunch eligibility, while Aloha HS will be at 65% eligibility. I think that this is an unacceptable discrepancy. I think that, in essence, this will create a "rich school" and a "poor school".

I encourage you to make equity in our school district a much higher priority that this proposal demonstrates.

Studies show that access to a high quality public education is the number one way to overcome poverty and generational poverty specifically. What if you proposed a HS boundary adjustment plan that was truly equitable for every family in our district? What if every HS did not exceed the district average of free and reduced lunch eligibility, which is 39%? If that is not possible, what if you made an effort to at least bring these numbers closer together?

You have a unique opportunity to back up the language of "equity" that our school district promises with concrete action. You have an opportunity to either choose to perpetuate the legacy of classicism, racism, and inequity in our public institutions OR to make a change for the better.

My son started kindergarten this year at Hazeldale Elementary. I am a teacher with an advanced degree and my husband has a college degree as well. We also have a two year old daughter. If you create an Aloha HS with 65% of the population in poverty, I would probably not send my children there. My family's support and resources would be removed from this population. I have some comments on the transition process. (I am a BHS parent, but this applies to all HS)

I deeply hope that high schoolers who are caught in these painful transition years could be given the option to stay at the school where they started.

For example, my daughter, who will be in 10th grade in 2017, will seemingly have one year at one high school and then move to another. I have no problem with either school – but I would want her to either be 100% at just one for her high school years. This is particularly poignant for the families, like mine, who have older siblings already at a particular high school.

As a family, we already make difficult adjustments (parent work schedule) to allow our kids to participate in sports, clubs, and study groups. If I have one child at BHS and the other at Southridge, I literally cannot pick them both up from their sports or attend both their meets. I would not be able to pick them each up from speech, Key club, etc., or drive them from both high schools to speech meets (there is NEVER buses for speech events, parents have to drive to Hillsboro, etc.). I couldn't attend both Booster clubs, participate in both school's principal coffees, and so on if the district forces my two high schoolers to attend different high schools.

I have been very involved in their schools (on board of PTO for past 5 years, etc.) and if this transition issue is not addressed in a pro-family way, BSD will unnecessarily destroy community building that has been on such a positive roll and uptick as we recovered from the huge budget cuts from a few years back. It feels so unnecessary and, frankly, an insult to engaged families who are investing in the district. Please let siblings stay together.

It has come to my attention that the Beaverton School District already has the following as their policy: "At schools impacted by redrawn attendance boundaries, where and when possible, the superintendent may allow students to remain at their current school for one or more years to complete the highest grade level or levels offered."

I hope that the committee and school district takes this, their own policy, to heart and allows all students who start attending a high school to finish at that high school. Otherwise there will be several years of students who feel like short-timers at one school then are moved to another school where they feel like outsiders.

Next, I have some specific issues to my kids. My Summa 8th grader will be jumping into AP classes right away at BHS and since she's had Spanish all her years at Summa is switching to Japanese. She has already started attending the Japanese club at BHS. Southridge has neither AP nor Japanese. Again, it feels not very pro-student to take these away from an invested, dedicated student.

I would like to begin by thinking the committee who I believe is working hard to make decisions that are transparent, fair, and in the best interest of all. I am writing as a parent, even though I am a District employee.

On the current planning map, my own children will move from Westview to Sunset HS. Frankly, my children will be fine wherever they move to because they have a lot of family support and we will portray the attitude that whatever school they go to is a great school to help with developing their attitudes. I believe all of our high schools are excellent in our District.

I believe it is a moral imperative to think about what is best for all of our students in the District 5 years from now, 10 years from now, 20 years from now. I believe that leaving Aloha HS at 61% FRL and Sunset HS at 11% is harmful to children. If equity really is one of our core pillars in the District's strategic plan, it is the actions taken next that will reveal that is truly a central value and belief.

While I do not understand all the complexities that go into these decisions, I do believe that it is possible to move toward a more equitable outcome for all of the students across our District. This would benefit our entire community. As the District average is 39% for FRL, if we could consider setting a cap that none of our high schools exceed 45% FRL, perhaps that would set everyone up for more success.

Students can overcome changing friendships, changing sports teams, a little longer of a ride to school. If my child were currently slated to go to Aloha HS as it stands now, I would be deeply concerned despite my 100% commitment to public schools.

I began my career teaching in Portland at the lowest performing elementary school in the state of Oregon at the time—Humboldt. This school fed into Jefferson. I remember being deeply struck with the disparity between Lincoln and Jefferson being in the same district. We can do something to prevent that level of disparity in opportunity and outcomes for our students in the Beaverton School District. Dear Superintendent Rose,

One thing that has concerned me during the boundary committee discussion/process is that the words "free/reduced lunch" and "equity" have been used interchangeably during the committee's discussion. I do not think that these two words mean the same thing. Free/reduced lunch percentage is data that gives

information about the financial make-up of a school. Equity is about making sure, that the quality of education that is offered to students within the Beaverton School District are equal and that all students are given the education that is needed for them to succeed. On the Beaverton School District web site Pillars of Learning under equity it says, "WE build honest, safe, and inclusive relationships with our diverse students and their families" and "WE provide needed support so that every student succeeds". I do not see any mention of free/reduced lunch in this statement. I understand that free/reduced lunch percentages help identify what schools may need supports to foster student success, but just increasing or decreasing these numbers in a school and moving kids from a classroom that has high free/reduced lunch numbers to a classroom that has lower free/reduced lunch numbers does not ensure equity. To me, things that ensure equity are putting programs and policies in place that overcome the barriers to learning that prevent students from being successful. I would ask that these words not be used interchangeably in your future.

In listening to the discussions of the boundary committee, it seems that having more equal numbers of free/reduced lunch is a VERY important goal of the boundary committee. If that is true, then that should be listed as one of the criterion instead of student body configuration, which is very vague and again it should be called free/reduced lunch percentage not equity.

When looking at the map of free/reduced lunch distributions (provided by the school district at the boundary committee meeting on 12/17/15), it is clear that it is concentrated in certain areas and absent in other areas. Specifically, it is absent in the northern parts of the Westview and Sunset attendance areas and in the area around South Cooper Mountain School. Whether we like it or not, this distribution is not going to change as our school district grows. The areas that are growing rapidly will continue to have low free/reduced lunch percentages and the higher percentages will stay in the neighborhoods where it is currently high. When I look at the map, I am not sure based on the distribution of free/reduced lunch in our community, that it is possible to equalize these percentages across our high schools. The only way to do so would be to make even more drastic changes than were already made in the Spring Board Proposal. I would of liked to see a map that showed equalizing free/reduced lunch at all the high schools not just 3 of them, as current maps show.

I would like to see the committee make all 6 high schools have close to equal numbers of free/reduced lunch. To do that I realize the committee will have to throw out some of it's other criterion. Since it seems that in some neighborhoods, free/reduced lunch is being given a priority for movement then it is only fair that ALL neighborhoods in the district are treated that way regardless of the other criterion.

As the parent of a student that will be moved out of the school closest to our home, from a school that has low free/reduced lunch numbers to a school with much higher free/reduced lunch numbers and that includes a switch from the IB program to the AP program which do not offer the same curriculum, I would like the committee to stop calling that equity. My family will adjust to this change if that is the ultimate decision by the district, but it would go a long way to our adjustment if the committee and the district would stop using the positive word "equity" to justify it and really just be honest in saying that our neighborhood has to move to meet the committee and district goals for free/reduced lunch percentages.

It concerned me to read some comments in the Public Record that suggested that the parents of current Sunset students do not think that equity is important. That is not the case. I have talked to my fellow parents and it is not that we do not want equity in the Beaverton School District it just seems that the committee has been using the low free/reduced lunch percentages in our area as a way to target Sunset neighborhoods for movement and that that requires the committee to go against other criterion such as, neighborhood unity, proximity to school, transportation and safety issues when deciding the boundaries. I think equity is a very important topic for our community to consider, but just using boundary lines to make changes to the percentages of free/reduced lunch is only a small change that I am not sure will lead to making our schools more equitable and ensure that all students get what they need for success.

One suggestion that I would make to you, the Beaverton School Board, and the community is that since we know that it is probably not possible to equalize the free/reduced lunch percentages at each school that we don't spend so much committee time trying to achieve this goal and focus on equity outside of free/reduced lunch percentages. One big way that could be done would be that in addition to the Title I money schools would receive, the school budget could give those schools with high percentages of free/reduced lunch more money to spend per student. This would allow things like smaller class sizes, help with closing achievement gaps, after school programs like homework help, tutoring, community services. Teachers, principles and parents in these schools with high free/reduced lunch percentages probably have even more ideas to improve equity and expand current programs, so lets get the money needed to these schools so that the barriers to achievement can be broken and true equity can be achieved.

I would like to thank you for your consideration of the concerns and ideas that I have put forward in this letter. I hope that they can help the task of setting the new high school boundaries with the least disruption and upset for students and families within our communities.

My family currently resides in the West TV area that is being proposed to move to Beaverton High rather than continuing the over a half century relationship if has had with Sunset. We moved into our neighborhood specifically for West TV and Sunset High before we had children. Since we have had children I have been very active in the community serving on the Local School Committee for West TV, including being on the committee to realign elementary boundaries a number of years ago, coaching Little league for the last 10 years for Cedar Mill and coaching, as well as serving as Vice President of, Sunset Youth Football for the last 8 years. We have lived in this area for 19 years and have a current freshman at Sunset and a 6th grader at Cedar Park. Both as you can see from their ages will be devastatingly affected by the change. I would ask the committee, before any more map changes are made, to please stop and consider the transitions you will offer to students. How will you help the students you are shuffling and splitting to adjust to such big changes? Perhaps by considering those things, you can create a better map, that truly considers the students that will be in high school when these changes take place.

Socially and emotionally speaking, there are so many factors that need to be considered to really support students. If you force students to start at one school then switch to another mid high school career, are you prepared to offer more than just freshmen orientations? Are you prepared to train more leadership students, peer counselors and guidance counselors to help mentor underclassman as they try and assimilate into new communities? Do you have the budget to create structures in the school day that allow for smaller group situations so that students can get to know each other as they enter a new school community without their friends? For example, our students go to Raleigh Hills, if you split this very small middle school program you would be sending thirty or less students (depending on how you draw the map) into a large high school. Already they go into Beaverton as a class of only sixty. How would you help a small group of students integrate into a large school community?

Academically speaking, does BSD have the budget to hire more guidance counselors to help students transition from one school track such as IB to another like AP? Are their plans for what to do with students that are on specialized tracks like the marketing program at BHS, if no such program exists at their new schools? Can you ensure that every student will graduate on time, and equipped to handle college if such large transitions are taking place?

Will the clubs and sports be financially supported during transition? As those activities lose parent boosters, and students, will the school district be able to fund them as they rebuild, until they can gain more participation and support?

Will you provide training for teachers to help students transition? Is that in the budget?

I attended the public forum last week regarding the new high school boundaries. I have taken the time to complete my own boundary map and would like to submit it to the committee for consideration. I do not see a method for attaching a file to this e-mail application. Can you provide me with an e-mail address or a file share where I can submit my proposal?

I live on the very edge of the Aloha HS & Cooper Mtn HS boundary and cannot make sense of how or why my children are slated to attend Aloha. We live on Cooper Mountain, it only seems natural that we would go to the new Cooper Mountain HS. In the current proposed plan, I do not see the rationale for Aloha being maxed out capacity wise, while Cooper is only at 80% capacity. Additionally, in the current plan there is an "unresolved area", that currently has the students living in that area going to Cooper Mountain. The northern-most portion of the "unresolved area" is on TV Hwy. How does it makes sense to send those students to Cooper Mountain? That is twice as far away from the school as we are...This area is much closer to Aloha & Beaverton High Schools, yet my children would go to Aloha? That makes no sense, the bus would essentially go past our house on the way to Cooper Mtn!!

My version of the HS boundaries is fairly even regarding capacity and makes more sense geographically. The biggest considerations were proximity and capacity. I did not take into consideration existing elementary boundaries. I think that view is short-sighted as the elementary boundaries are also being re-vamped once the HS boundaries are set.
