From the principal's desk

Dear Parents and Guardians:

Each new year is marked by resolutions and opportunities for a fresh start for students, parents, teachers and administrators. At PHS, students will quickly be reacquainted with their curricular opportunities as our course registration process begins as soon as we return in January. This month each student's 2022-2023 educational program will be created through various meetings with teachers, counselors, parents, and administrators.

Parkland High School offers a rigorous and standards aligned curriculum for students of all ability levels. For the 2022-2023 school year our students will receive a course offerings menu unparalleled in its diversity and quality. Students currently in grades 9, 10 and 11 will receive their course registration books along with live virtual instruction to walk them through the course registration process during an extended homeroom period on Monday, January 3, 2022. A link to a virtual presentation with specific information from administration, counseling and academic departments regarding the course registration process will be emailed to parents of these students on **Tuesday, January 4**.

Similar to years past, PHS utilizes online registration. Students will use Home Access Center to see teacher recommendations and choose their courses for next year. Instructions will be sent via SchoolMessenger to all parents prior to the new year.

Students should complete their initial course registration selections by Friday, January 7. Throughout the months of January and February counselors will meet with your child during English classes to finalize the course selection process.

The high school and middle schools use a team approach to provide course registration information to our current 8th grade students and parents. Activities involving career inventories will take place at the middle schools in early January to aid our students in selecting a career pathway. Course registration books will be provided to all Parkland 8th grade students during a presentation at Parkland High School on Wednesday, January 5, 2022. All parents of 8th grade students at Orefield and Springhouse are invited to and should attend a "Parent Meeting for Course Registration for the Class of 2026" on Thursday, January 6, 2022 at 7 PM in the Parkland High School Auditorium.

All 8th grade students must submit their 2022-2023 course requests online through Home Access Center by Friday, February 4, 2022. New to these parents and students will be the selection from various elective programs which are available at the high school. Parents will also receive directions to support them through this course selection process. Throughout the months of January and February, teachers, counselors, and administration will assist your child with the course selection process.

Just a reminder for parents: Students who did not yet demonstrate proficiency on Keystone Exams will be retested on January 4 and 5 (Literature), January 6 and 7 (Algebra), and January 11 and 12 (Biology). Just a reminder that we are not administering midterm exams during the third week of January. Wednesday, January 19 and Thursday, January 20 will be full days of school. On Friday, January 21, we will have a 1 PM dismissal.

Our winter sports teams are off to an outstanding start to their seasons. It may be the off-season for some sports, but you would be impressed with the dedication our athletes show while training to always improve. The gymnasiums and weight rooms are used every night in preparation for next season's goals. If you didn't hear about this yet, our wrestling team, led by PHS Science Teacher Mr. Jon Trenge, is currently undefeated with a record of 8-0. The basketball and swimming teams are off to successful starts as well and look forward to excelling in 2022.

Congratulations to our music program on their wonderful winter concert performances this past month. Having live performances and audiences was such a great reminder of why we value the arts here in Parkland. The exceptional quality of their concerts showcases the talents of our students, their incredible work ethic, and the passion shared by our music educators and students.

Course Registration

The registration and scheduling process for the 2022-2023 school year begins at Parkland High School during the month of January. Throughout the next few months, students will be selecting courses that best meet their academic goals, administrators will be calculating student enrollments, staffing assignments will be prepared, and a master schedule will be created for next school year.

To begin the registration process, all students, eighth through eleventh grade, will receive a copy of the 2022-2023 Parkland High School Course Study Guide. This is a valuable resource and reference guide for students and parents selecting a program of study for the next school year.

Several informational meetings will be held for parents and students throughout the month of January to highlight new course offerings, review graduation requirements and provide guidelines for selecting appropriate course levels. Parkland High School will once again have students register via the Online Course Registration process.

Students will receive instruction on how to enter their courses on January 3.

Students will then have until **June 7 at 3 PM** to enter their courses.

From Monday, January 10 through Friday, January 14, students and parents can review course selections and teacher recommendations, and make necessary changes.

More detailed information regarding the online course registration process will follow. Planning your child's program of study is one of the most important tasks completed each school year. Counselors, faculty, and administrators will work closely together to guide your child through this important process.







Juniors: College Admissions Testing

SAT

Juniors interested in taking the SAT should select and register for a March, May, June and/or August test.

Registration for the SAT is now available online at www.sat.org/register. Juniors should carefully plan their spring testing schedule and follow the registration procedures required by the College Board.

ACT

Juniors may also want to consider the ACT as a college admission test option. The ACT is offered in February, April, June and July in the Lehigh Valley.

Students can register for the ACT at www.act.org/student.

All colleges and universities will accept the SAT and/or the ACT for admission purposes. Please feel free to consult your counselor if you have any questions.





Spring Sports Physicals are free of charge. No student can participate in a spring sport without a full PIAA physical. Recertification forms may be used for spring if athletes had full physicals for a fall or winter sport. The Parkland Athletic Department understands that it may not be convenient to come to our scheduled free physical event. However, those who miss must get a PIAA physical on their own prior to March 1, 2022. Paperwork for it is on the PHS website under Forms. All Parkland athletes must get an ImPACT test once during their four years at PHS and before participation.



Flu season complicated by the pandemic

The flu season continues to be in full swing through April and again this season it is complicated by the pandemic. It is recommended that your student receive their flu vaccine at this time. Please check with your doctor to have a flu vaccine scheduled.

Stay home when sick





Utilize the <u>Health Screening Tool</u> on the District Website to assist you in determining if your child should attend school.

To help stay healthy and decrease the spread of illness in the school, we are encouraging all families to adhere to the following guidelines for sending your child to school.

Please keep your child home from school (even if they have a test or sporting event) if he/she is experiencing any of the following symptoms:

- Fever of 100 degrees or more
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Severe head cold
- Persistent cough
- Severe sore throat

These are the same criteria the Health Room uses as guidelines when sending students home ill from school.

Students should not return to school until they are fever free for twenty-four hours without the use of fever-reducing medications.

All eleventh grade students should return their physicals to the Health Room as soon as possible.






Immunization Requirement

The meningitis vaccine is required on or after your student's 16th birthday. Students in grade 11 will be required to have this immunization on the first day of their senior year. Tips for Driving in the Snow

Stav home

Only go out if necessary. Even if you can drive well in bad weather, it is better to avoid taking unnecessary risks by venturing out.

Drive slowly.

Always adjust your speed down to account for lower traction when driving on snow or ice.

Accelerate and decelerate slowly.

Apply the gas slowly to regain traction and avoid skids. Do not try to get moving in a hurry and take time to slow down for stoplights. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.

Increase your following distance to five to six seconds.

This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.

Know your brakes.

Whether you have antilock brakes or not, keep the heel of your foot on the floor and use the ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.

Don't stop if you can avoid it.

There is a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.

Don't power up hills.


Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads will just make your wheels spin. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed downhill slowly.

Don't stop going up a hill.

There is nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.







Driver's Education Theory Course Certificate of Completion

If you have the Driver's Education Theory Course during the first semester, Marking Periods 1 and 2, all students receiving a passing score will be issued a Certificate of Completion. Parents, please ask your child for it and file it with your automobile insurance policy. This is important for the following two reasons:

- A copy must be submitted to the CLIU-21 if your child is interested in completing the Behind-the-Wheel Driving course. For complete information go to www.cliu.org; click on Departments, scroll down to the 'key' icon for Driver's Education. Specific questions should be directed to 610-769-4111, ext. 1299.
- 2. Most insurance companies offer a driver's education discount. Submit a copy to your insurance company when you add your child to your policy.





Peak Performance Program for Students and Peak Performance Program for Coaches and Parents of Athletes

There are approximately 7.6 million high school athletes in the United States. The competitive dynamic has increased and performance anxiety for student athletes, as well as a willingness to do whatever it takes to gain a competitive edge.

To address this challenge, Caron's Education Department developed the Peak Performance Program, a program for student athletes, and the Peak Performance Program for Coaches and Parents of Athletes.

This free, one-hour program includes the following topics:

- * Explanation of the unique risk factors that make athletes more vulnerable to substance abuse than non-athletes.
- Scope of substance abuse for athletes.
- * The impact of commonly abused substances on athletes and the effect on performance.
- * Ways to maintain peak performance without the use of substances




