Bond 2017 Highlights

- Interior and exterior renovations at Buffalo Creek and Treasure Forest elementary schools, including renovated libraries with new skylights and collaboration areas.
- Cedar Brook Elementary has a newly renovated library with new skylights and group collaboration area improvements, as well as a six-classroom, music room and science lab addition.
- Hunters Creek Elementary, a school replacement project, was completed and opened in August 2021.
- **Bunker Hill Elementary** construction is underway; opening is planned for August 2022.
- Landrum Middle School, a school replacement project, was completed and opened in August 2021. Named for Spring Branch ISD's first superintendent, H.M. Landrum, the three-story structure rises behind the original school site.
- Memorial High School has completed a new tennis complex and courts, as well as a new turf play field. A four-story classroom and cafeteria addition opens in January 2022.
- Northbrook High School renovations underway include extensive progress on water detention in preparation for a new front entry and an 18-classroom addition. A new turf play field installation is complete.
- Spring Woods High School completed renovations include a student cafeteria, an extensive library renovation and a new turf play field installation.
- Stratford High School's new exterior renovations can't be missed. The auditorium replacement is near completion and a new turf play field installation is complete.

BOND 2017 Work Progresses

Great progress is being made on the district's 2017 Bond Program, approved by 80 percent of the vote in November 2017. The \$898.4 million bond program impacts every school and Every Child in SBISD. The program includes replacement of the remaining nine oldest elementary schools and one

middle school, district-wide facility improvements and renovations, enhanced safety and security, upgraded athletics, replacement of aged music instruments and uniforms, replacement of older buses and more.


As of December 2021, \$394.9 million of 2017 bond program funds have been expended for bond related projects.

Did you know...

Bond funds, approved by voters like you, finance capital improvements like new schools and are paid back over time. Bond proceeds can only be spent on what voters approve, and by law cannot be used for annual expenses like teacher and staff salaries

SBISD taxpayers aged 65 or older as well as disabled taxpayers have a vital reason to view bond programs in a positive way: Those who have an Over-65 or Disabled exemption don't see increases in their school property tax payments. SBISD "freezes" school taxes at the amount paid the year in which



the Over 65 or Disabled exemption is claimed.

Tax Rate: Lowest in more than a decade

The Spring Branch ISD Board of Trustees voted earlier this year to adopt a district tax rate of \$1.3043 per \$100 of property valuation, the lowest rate since 2007. The tax rate decreased due to passage of House Bill 3 (HB3) by the 86th Texas Legislature. HB3 has increased public school funding by about \$6 billion. It also has provided tax relief for Spring Branch taxpayers through the new school finance funding formulas, which significantly reduced SBISD's recapture*, or Robin Hood, payments to the state through local school property taxes.

While SBISD's recapture payment had fallen due to HB3, it is now on its way back up. This year, we estimate SBISD will send \$65 million

to the state of Texas – that means approximately 15 cents of every tax dollar you pay to SBISD is taken away, or recaptured, by the state. Every dollar SBISD sends to the state is a dollar that can't be used to support the education of Spring Branch ISD students. Without relief from the Texas Legislature, SBISD will continue to face significant financial duress due to excessive recapture payments. Reduced enrollment due to COVID-19 further increases SBISD's payment of recapture.

We salute individuals like Ginger Montgomery, who have given a lifetime of service to the district and its students as an employee and volunteer.

A Lifetime of Service

When Ginger Montgomery showed up for an interview at the Driscoll Hotel in Austin, none other than the first superintendent of schools in Spring Branch ISD, Dr. H.M. Landrum, was there to meet with her. She told him she already had an A in the class-yet-to-be-completed, and he accepted that. Two days later, she was hired to work as a first-grade teacher at Housman Elementary, in the 12-year-old school district that was growing by leaps and bounds. Starting annual salary? \$3,600.

Montgomery recalls with gratitude the experienced teachers at Housman were very welcoming, and they took her under their wings. She worked at Housman for three-and-a-half years before leaving to start a family. In 1968, she was hired at Hunters Creek Elementary by principal Mildred Scully. She stayed at Hunters Creek for the remainder of her career, retiring in 1996 after 32 years of service. "In all my years here, I can truly say that I was supported, listened to and given opportunities to grow professionally."

When asked what her proudest

moment was as a teacher, Montgomery said that seeing a child read for the first time or have a breakthrough with finding a place among peers were "a thrill."

After retiring, Montgomery was looking for a way to get back in a school. Through her church, Memorial Drive United Methodist Church (MDUMC), she heard about volunteering as a SpringBoard mentor, and decided, "This is a good fit for me!" In this program, mentors are trained, then matched with a student "on the brink of success."

Montgomery was matched with Lizbeth L. when the student was in third grade at Hollibrook Elementary. With encouragement from Montgomery and teachers, and a lot of self-motivation, Lizbeth made good grades and excelled. "Lizbeth is now thriving at college and having life experiences she has never had before," Montgomery said. Lizbeth plans to work towards becoming an engineer.
