District, Six Schools Receive ODE's Momentum Award

Saluting Our Veterans

## *Second Year in a Row for the District, First Time for Schools*

Lakota Local Schools, including six individual schools within the district, has received the Ohio Department of Education's Momentum Award for 2017.

This annual recognition is given to districts or schools that have received A's on all Value-Added measures on the state report card. In addition, winners of the award must also have at least two Value-Added subgroups of students, including gifted, lowest 20% in achievement and students with disabilities.

This is the second consecutive year that Lakota has earned this award. Endeavor Elementary, Hopewell Elementary, Freedom Elementary, Lakota Plains Junior School, Lakota West High School, and Lakota East High School are receiving the notable award for the first time.

"Last year, the district was recognized with this honor; however, we have not had an individual school recognized...until now," said Keith Koehne, Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction for Lakota. "Receiving the Momentum Award is the direct result of the hard work and dedication of our teachers, staff and students."

As reported at the release of the 2016-2017 district report card results, Lakota's overall 'A' for progress measures the growth that all students made in the last year, based on their past performance.

In a statement announcing the 2017 Momentum Award recipients, State Board of Education President Tess Elshoff says, "The State Board of Education is proud to recognize these students, teachers, administrators and parents for their accomplishments."

Superintendent Matthew Miller is proud of the district's performance. "Lakota continues to make great strides in the education of our students. While the state report card only tells part of the story, it does show that our students continue to grow every year. I am proud of our teachers and staff who show our kids every day that a good education is student centered. They are innovative in their teaching in order to engage their

## *Schools Across the District Held Special Ceremonies*

Emotions were high as Adena Elementary closed out its Veterans Day program Nov. 10 with nearly 700 students saluting the more than 80 veterans joining them in the school cafeteria that morning.

The school's program was more robust than ever, featuring Student Council presentations to define Veterans Day and performances of 10 different songs of patriotism to honor their special guests. Music teacher Stacey Pease, fifth grade teacher Beverly Gfroerer, school counselor Amy Moorman, and sixth grade teacher Jeff Barrow and his Student Council were the leaders behind the special program.

"It was a wonderful tribute to our veterans and the heartfelt appreciation from everyone in attendance was so evident," said Adena Principal John Mattingly, noting the tears and standing ovation that sent a strong message of appreciation.

"Your program this morning exemplified the true value and meaning of the reason we serve," wrote Marine Corps veteran Rick Cruse in an email following the ceremony. "The heartfelt appreciation from everyone in attendance was evident throughout. The hard work that your students and staff put into this presentation was obvious. Everything was first rate. It is reassuring to see the commitment of everyone at Adena instilling important values and providing positive role models for our next generation."

"That was tremendous," said Dave Smith, a veteran who now serves as VFW commissioner of the Butler County Veterans Service Commission. In his role, he's helped coordinate the color guard's participation in many different patriotic tributes around Lakota. "I think it's so great to see the schools infusing lessons about our veterans into their curriculum."

All around Lakota, students and staff honored veterans. From our youngest students to our oldest, respect and admiration for those who have, and who are, serving shone through.

### VanGorden Rocks Kindness-Inspired Art Project



A school-wide art project at VanGorden Elementary challenged students and staff, alike, to practice and promote a culture of inclusiveness, positivity, and respect for one another.

The finished products - 900 rocks hand-painted with messages like "Love" and "Believe in Yourself" and others to resemble their artist's favorite things - now adorn one of the landscaping beds at the school's entrance.

"I challenged students and staff to design their rock with one purpose in mind - to make someone smile and feel welcome when coming to VanGorden," said art teacher Cathy Dorff. "A project like this unifies our school community and serves as a great conversation starter."

"It's part of our strategy to intersect lessons of kindness into the curriculum," explained VanGorden Principal Gail Allshouse. "Those lifelong skills are of critical importance to the education we provide to our students."

Dorff said the project will be a new tradition at VanGorden. In future years, incoming second-graders will add their painted rocks to the original collection.

The goal of Lakota's Parent/Family Engagement and Community Outreach efforts is to reach every part of the district. A recent "Meet the Families" Night brought 150 families and Lakota staff together to talk, enjoy a meal and share ideas on topics like building relationships and literacy. Lakota worked with Cornerstone Church and other community members to help provide this night for families. Lakota West AP Spanish students also attended to help with translation when needed.

## IKEA Gives Lakota West Media Center \$11K Makeover

*In-Kind Donation Supports Lakota's Leap into Innovation*



The Lakota West High School community, in partnership with IKEA West Chester, is celebrating a completely refurbished space inside its media center. The global retailer's in-kind donation of more than \$11,000 in mostly furniture, and some lighting and other decorative items, has transformed the space into a more contemporary learning environment for all students.

The imaginative combination of various modern work surfaces and seating accommodates individual workstations, as well as small and large group seating areas that may be used for collaboration. In addition, a new makerspace area to be used as a creative outlet for students, along with a private meeting room, have been created.

"Part of preparing our students for their future means giving them a learning environment that more closely mimics the college or career experience," said Lakota Superintendent Matthew Miller. "Today's careers demand collaboration and innovation and so much of that is fueled by our workspaces and what they allow us to do."

The new space combines both high and low seating options. Lightweight and mobile furniture also allow for more flexible seating, meaning students and staff can adapt the space to meet the demands of a project.

"Our teachers understand how something as simple as the environment around them can make or break a student's concentration or productivity or even their creative output," said Lakota West Principal Elgin Card. "IKEA's generosity is taking that factor out of the equation. Plus, it's human nature to be more productive in spaces we take pride in."



## Liberty Junior Celebrates 40 Years



In 1977, Star Wars IV: A New Hope, Smokey and the Bandit and Saturday Night Fever were hits at the box office; a gallon of gas cost 65 cents; the New York Yankees won the World Series; and Steve Martin was frequently quoted as saying, "Well, excuuuuuuuse me!" Arguably, one of the best things to happen in 1977 was Liberty Junior School opening its doors to educate students in the Lakota Local School District.

To celebrate the ruby anniversary, members of the community were invited to explore Liberty Junior as it is today and reminisce about the days of yesterday. Approximately 500 guests were greeted at the door by student ambassadors. They were treated to musical performances by several of the school's bands and a select vocal ensemble. ## West Criminal Justice Class Welcomes Hamilton County Prosecutor



If the end goal is an authentic learning experience, there's no replacement for a live expert source.

That was exactly the thought behind Lakota West teacher Diann Adams' decision to invite Hamilton County Prosecutor Joe Deters into her American Law & Criminal Justice class recently. Mr. Deters spent the first half of his hour-long visit recounting stories of his more than 30 years in public service, opening up the floor for questions throughout his presentation.

"Especially in a class like Law & Criminal Justice, there's no match for real world experience," Adams said. "Whether a student is seriously considering a career in the field or just interested in how our justice system plays out in real life, exposure to a professional is the best way to bring some perspective to what we're learning."

Students posed questions about the challenges of both Deters' job and the judicial system. They asked about the jury selection process, the technicalities of an investigation, and even opportunities to intern in his office.

"I really liked hearing about Mr. Deters' daily routine as a prosecutor. It was eye-opening to see what he does on a daily basis," shared one student.

"Getting to see the evidence he used in a recent case was interesting," noted another.

Whether it be authors, artists, lawyers, or engineers, guest teachers who are experts in their fields are just one example of an innovative teaching strategy used in Lakota classrooms.



Dustin ran the 5K course Nov. 4 at the National Trail Raceway in Hebron, Ohio, finishing the race in 15:03.4 - just .4 seconds ahead of the race's runner-up. His Thunderhawk family showered him with ticker tape during a fanfare down Main Street last week, a tradition the school has established to celebrate national champions.

Dustin also earned the top spot at the Nov. 12 NIKE Cross Midwest Regional Championship, where he competed against the top runners in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Missouri. This qualified him for the national meet on Dec. 2.
