# WELCOME TO OWL COUNTRY

By now, many Oakridge Owls have seen or chatted with Head of School-elect Matt Burgy. In addition to riding in the Homecoming Parade and enjoying our Winter Craft Market, he has attended other events on campus since the Board of Regents selected him to succeed Head of School Jon Kellam. Mr. Burgy will officially join Oakridge on July 1, 2022. Mr. Kellam announced last winter that he will retire June 30, 2022, concluding an extraordinary career at Oakridge that has spanned nearly three decades.

Mr. Burgy, Assistant Head for Teaching and Learning at St. Mark's Episcopal School in Houston, was tapped to lead Oakridge after a comprehensive national search that attracted a diverse pool of outstanding candidates. He has served as a Head of School, Dean of Students, Director of Admission, Head of Middle School, Head of Upper School, Athletic Director, and Mathematics Teacher for 5th grade through AP Calculus. He holds a Bachelor of Business

Administration degree from Stephen F. Austin State University and a Master of Education in Independent School Leadership from Vanderbilt University.

"I am deeply honored and humbled to accept the Board of Regents' invitation to be The Oakridge School's next Head of School. I am eager to begin our collective work with talented faculty and staff who are dedicated to knowing each child and helping them become the best version of themselves,"

Mr. Burgy said. "I am inspired to grow with a dedicated leadership team that is focused and driven to support the development of the whole child. I am elated to build new partnerships with the caring and supportive parents who give so generously to this wonderful school. In short, I could not be more excited to join the parliament of Owls and shepherd Oakridge into its next era."

Mr. Burgy and his wife Moira, a veteran educator with experience presenting at national conferences on curriculum and teacher development, have one daughter, Katie, who is a doctoral student at Tufts University.

The search was led by Board of Regents Chairman Charles Pierson and a committee of Regents and parents, in partnership with distinguished educational recruitment firm, Carney, Sandoe & Associates. The search committee reviewed nearly 60 candidates from around the globe, ultimately narrowing the number to four

finalists. Committee members were gratified to see the number of exceptional individuals with very diverse backgrounds who expressed an interest in the position, and said the superb quality of the candidates spoke to Oakridge's strong reputation and bright future.

"A thoughtful, thorough, transparent, and inclusive process by our entire Oakridge community yielded unanimous support for a highly qualified, gifted, and natural-born leader in Matt," Mr. Pierson said. "He was the favorite of all constituent groups: our Board, faculty and staff, parents, and children."

He added: "Matt's qualifications for the job are superior in every way. He has the rare and amazing combination of both a business background and teaching experience through the entire spectrum of lower, middle, and upper school. Matt brings the

administrative and operational expertise we sought in someone who has prior Head of School experience, as well as being a division head leader."

In announcing retirement plans in January 2021, Mr. Kellam said, "When I reminisce, I am particularly proud of the positive relationships we have established with thousands of students, faculty, staff, parents, alumni, and grandparents. With his remaining time, he pledged to continue leading Oakridge with his heart and soul. "Between now and June 30, 2022, our team will remain focused on delivering the mission, working toward strategic improvement, and assisting Matt Burgy with a smooth transition to The Oakridge School."

# ROBOTICS STUDENTS SET RECORD

All is quiet in the Think Tank.
Click. Hum. Rattle, clank,...Cheer!
OakDemo-3, a robot made of
plywood, pvc, electronics, and
Owl sweat, vibrates to life. It's
GAME TIME! Master roboteers,
Eshan Singhal and Matthew
Hwang, ready the machine
for eight performance trials.
OakDemo-3 must carefully
navigate around a meticulously
designed field avoiding blocks
and trees as she completes the
challenges set by the BEST
Robotics organization.

The timer starts. The machine lurches. A building is handily demolished. The remnant materials are lifted, transported and balanced on a trailer. Robotics team members and spectators watch in anticipation as Tanish Kothapalle's "Light Pole Installation Apparatus" is put to the test. "Awesome!" "It worked!" "Perfect!" Three light poles are flawlessly set around the field. Wait. "OH, NO!" A miscalculation has set the stage for the now rogue OakDemo-3 to drag a pipe bundle past the boundaries of the playing field. The test of her autonomous abilities ends with a PENALTY! Regroup. Grab the bundle, "Go!" Eight trials later and the results are an Oakridge School record beating score. (Note: Also a Martin High School beating score).

The 2021 BEST Robotics
DemoDaze Competition was
held November 6. The Oakridge
School's Robotics Team competed
in the BEST Classroom 2021
portion of the event. In this
section of the event, the team's
efforts were broadcast virtually
to the judges for scoring.



Game day brought an end to a six-week endeavor that began September 11, 2021. The kickoff event provided the rules of the competition and robot construction, as well as detailed schematics governing the layout of the playing field.

The BEST Robotics organization provides the participating teams with the materials needed to construct the robot and field. The items consist of "consumable" and "returnable" items. The consumable items included plywood, pvc pipes, pvc boards, and hardware. The returnable items included motors, servos, battery packs, cpu, and a controller. It is with these materials that the team had to build OakDemo-3.

The tasks required of the robot during the competition were the foundation of the planning process. The completion of certain tasks provided varying amounts of points. The team analyzed the point structures and developed a strategy to maximize scoring. OakDemo-3 was engineered to efficiently accomplish the higher

scoring tasks with as much consistency as possible.

In addition to the physical robot development and performance, the competition included engineering and marketing components. The entire process was memorialized and published in an Engineering Notebook. The finance, cost, application and marketing of the robot's capabilities were documented and presented to the Best Robotics Judges.

The Owls Robotics Team is composed of students from the Upper School: Greg Brown, Daivin Desai, Adeline Fields, Olivia Graham, Matthew Hwang, Sana Kholi, Tanish Kothapalle, Jason Long, Jeff Meller, Bennett Reddig, Raleigh Robinson, Eshan Singhal, Bryce Vaughn, and Timothy Zhu. Mr. Farley, Mr. Marcellus, and Mrs. Vaughn served as faculty mentors.

The Owl Robotics Team plans to compete in the 2022 BEST Robotics competition. Membership on the team is open to all Upper School students. Contact Mr. Farley or Mrs. Vaughn for more information.

# TELLING TALES








# NEW CHAPTER UNFOLDS






# EXPLORING THE WETLANDS

# FIVE QUESTIONS WITH ANDREW STEWART

It's become somewhat of a seminal moment for the Oakridge Upper School Choir: an adventure to New York City where our student singers get to perform at Carnegie Hall. That trip had to be cancelled in 2020 because of COVID-19, but plans are in the works now to take a group to the Big Apple this spring. Director of Choirs Andrew Stewart explains in this edition of Five Ouestions.

# 1. In the past, what has been the biggest thrill for choir students traveling to New York?

AS: For many, it may have been seeing iconic sights with friends while bonding over lunch from a street vendor. Some may have had their eyes opened to the beauty in our collective diversity. Others realized the power of music when standing on the stage at Carnegie Hall.

# 2. Do the students return to Oakridge differently as performers?

AS: All of our singers walk away from this trip with incredible memories, a new confidence in their growth as young adults, and a better understanding of what it means to be a musician. They bring their shared experience back to Oakridge where it helps inform the focus, musicianship, and maturity of our choir for years to come.

# 3. What's a not so fun fact of the trip?

AS: There are no current choir students who have experienced a Carnegie Hall trip with Oakridge. Our juniors and seniors, who would have normally brought that energy to this school year, had their 2020 choir trip cancelled at the beginning of the pandemic. Though it was completely out of our control, it was a painful realization that COVID-19 had in many ways fundamentally changed this and so many other activities.

### 4. What's a fun fact?

**AS:** Those of us who have chaperoned this trip many times have noticed a comical trend. Our students talk a big game about staying up late and enjoying time with friends in their hotel rooms on the trip. But after singing, sight-seeing, walking the streets of New York, and going to shows all day, most of the kids are asleep before we come around for room checks each night.

# 5. What have you learned most about yourself while leading these trips?

AS: The planning for the New York choir trip begins 18 months in advance. Not long after our plane returns to DFW, we begin looking at the calendar for the next trip. Despite the long lead time, it's still an arduous task to get budgets created, Broadway shows selected and reserved, hotel rooms filled, flights secured, money and information collected, and music learned. But over the years I have learned that I enjoy the process immensely. We get to create a once in a lifetime opportunity for our Oakridge singers and I'm honored to be able to help make that happen!






# BACK ON STAGE






# CROSS COUNTRY SUCCESS




## OAKRIDGE PARENTS' CLUB


# 2011 SPC CHAMPIONS REUNITE


