Congratulations! We have successful completed the first 18 weeks of school. Last Friday the teachers spent the day preparing your student's report card consisting of marks indicating how your child is progressing in meeting grade level standards and comments.

Please feel free to contact your child's teacher anytime you have a question or a concern regarding their progress as the staff is dedicated to assisting every student to be successful and grow academically. Report cards will be sent home Friday, February 4<sup>th</sup>.

I would like to recognize our teachers who spend endless hours preparing and presenting your child with the best possible instruction. I also want to recognize our wonderful support staff who work with your child every day on the playground, in the library, cafeteria, office and on the bus supporting their needs.

In addition, thank you to all our wonderful parents. We appreciate all you are doing to support your students and flexibility and understanding this year as we continue together working to ensure we are able to offer in-person learning by encouraging your student to wear their mask whenever inside the school and on the bus. Sending your student to school daily with a fully charged Chromebook, as well as monitoring your student's usage of these devices for school only activities. Also, sending your student with a daily water bottle and a labeled coat or sweatshirt as we do go outside for recess rain or shine.

## What is Billie Spirit?

Praise and encouragement combined with effective instruction are the cornerstones of the Billie Spirit program. Although negative consequences are sometimes necessary to change inappropriate behavior, students are more likely to learn and demonstrate appropriate behavior in an encouraging and supportive learning environment.

Appropriate behavior is encouraged and reinforced formally and informally on a regular basis in all school settings throughout the day. Students not only receive praise, but can earn Billie Bucks for demonstrating Billie Spirit, by being Kind, Respectful, Responsible and Safe.

What can students do with their Billie Bucks? They can buy special privileges such as a positive phone call / email / Seesaw message home, an opportunity to brag to the boss about the cool things they are doing, a trip to the pencil machine just to name a few coupons. Classroom teachers also hold special drawings and students can earn classroom specific privileges too. This year we are holding special weekly

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drawings on Fridays for an opportunity to spin Billie's Wheel at lunch. Students can also elect to save their Billie Bucks to purchase items such as fun pens, pencils, erasers, beads, bouncy balls, etc. from the Billie Store.

Once a month, grade levels gather to celebrate the great things our students are doing both academically and behaviorally demonstrating Billie Spirit, socially distanced either inside the blue gym or outside on the blacktop. Classroom teachers recognize at least two students from their class and nominate one student to receive the Principal's Star Student award. We conclude our time together by awarding golden artifacts such as a golden shoe, drum / guitar, book, apple, lunchbox to name a few to the class who as a collective group has demonstrated Billie Spirit while at school.

## Stop-Walk-Talk / Bully Prevention Program

Parents, if you hear your students using these words, Stop-Walk-Talk or see a hand put out as if it were a stop sign; they are following the bullying prevention program at Pleasant Hill Elementary School!

Teachers and staff spend the first week of school reviewing our Bully Prevention Program, developed at the University of Oregon, with our students. Then throughout the year we review and reinforce this curriculum within the classroom and at Billie Spirit Assemblies, too.

This program teaches students how to respond if other students are being disrespectful, bullying, other students. Our staff has also been taught how to respond if students engage in disrespectful, bullying, behavior and can even be unsafe.

Students are taught bullying is disrespectful unwanted, aggressive behavior that is persistent, occurring over time, not a onetime incident, with the same student involved in being disrespectful. Examples of these persistent disrespectful, bullying, behaviors are name calling, teasing, continuously pushing or constantly poking or threatening another student. Students are also taught that it is not an accidental bump of a peer or decline to play with them. In addition, we also work with students to practice the golden rule, "If you can't say something nice to a peer, say nothing at all."




The three steps are:

1. Stop— All students are taught the "Stop" signal, putting up a flat hand, and to use a firm voice to say, "STOP."



2. Walk Away— Sometimes, even when students tell others to "stop", problem behavior will continue. When this happens, students are to "walk away" from the problem behavior.



All staff have been trained to respond to a student's request to talk. The staff member will ask the student about the problem. Then, they will ask the student if they used the "stop" signal and said "STOP" and tried walking away.

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Students will be praised for trying these steps or reminded about using these steps first before talking to an adult. Finally, the staff member will discuss the problem behavior with the student who is engaging in problem or disrespectful behavior. They will remind students what they are to do when

they are given the stop signal or told "STOP" by another student or students (i.e., immediately stop what they are doing, take a deep breath and count to 3, and continue with their day following our school rules). In addition, staff will enforce the appropriate consequence if necessary. Parents will receive notification from the school if their student continues to engage in disrespectful or unsafe behaviors.

## **Transportation**

First Student is our transportation provider. The team at First Student have been working hard this year planning and facilitating how to safely transport your student. Please take a moment to review the bus expectations with your student:

- You must have your <u>face covering on before the bus pulls up</u> to your stop. You must keep your face covering on while riding on the bus.
- When you get on the bus please go to your assigned seat, sit down and remain seated until you get to school
  or home.
- We are loading the bus from the back to the front. Siblings must sit together.
- No playing, touching, or moving around to sit with other students on the bus.
- When the bus comes to a complete stop, the driver will let you know when you can stand up to exit the bus.
- Buses are cleaned after each route. All seats and high touched areas are cleaned with a disinfectant.
- The Drivers at First Student are looking forward to being a part of keeping everyone safe and healthy this school year.

# Chromebook Updates

Just a reminder Pleasant Hill School District has GoGuardian, a Chromebook extension to all district owned computers. This program is designed to help protect students from inappropriate online material. It is to help students stay focused on their academic studies when learning online.

District computers are not designed for extra extensions, watching movies, extensive searches unrelated to student assignments. These Chromebooks basically are designed to run the programs and apps the district has selected to use this year. We are asking that you assist your student uninstalling any apps / extensions such as wallpapers, games, virtual pets, etc. so that these devices will run at their maximum capacity for school purposes.

In addition, the Chromebooks need to be restarted at least  $\underline{\text{weekly}}$ . This updates apps (and operating systems (Chrome OS) to the newest and best for the systems. (Just closing the lid does not accomplish this)

Step 1: Press and hold the Power button.

Step 2: The screen dims, and a pop-up appears. Click the Power Off button.

Step 3: Press your Chromebook's Power button to restart.

#### LATE STUDENTS MISS OUT...

During the school year, parents have the important responsibility of seeing that students establish patterns for
