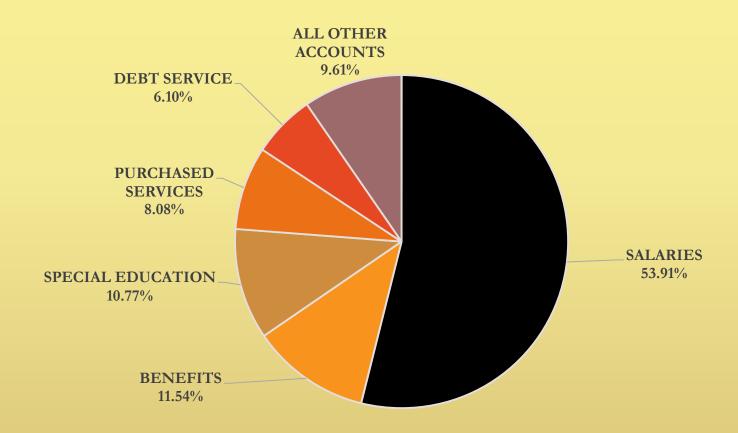

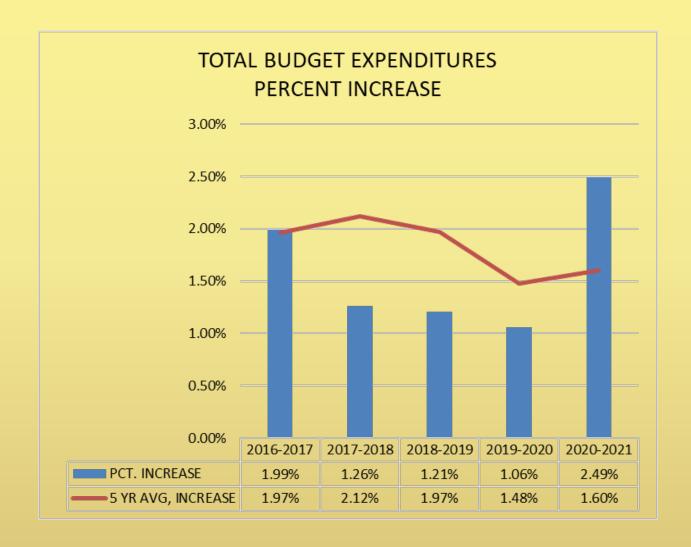


2021-2022 Budget



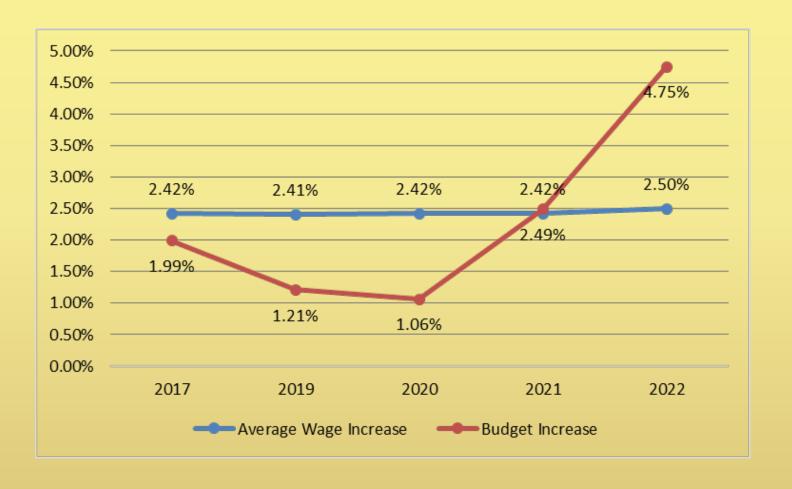


Historical Budgets
