Lakota Celebrates Board Appreciation Month through Students' Eyes

The Jan. 23 school board meeting featured a unique display of appreciation for the service of Lakota's five Board of Education members – through the eyes of five Lakota students.

To help recognize January as National School Board Appreciation Month, three sixth grade language arts classes at Adena, Hopewell and Union elementary schools put in writing their appreciation for Lakota's school board. With the guidance of their teachers – Kate Chaney, Krista Hoctor and Kelly Law – they found a real application for recent units and then presented their work to the board.

Hopewell students, for example, participated in a research project overlapping with business letter writing. Students investigated the roles of elected officials, including school board members. Following a rubric for business letter writing, they composed their own letters to Lakota's school board.

Hopewell student **Hadyn Revell**'s letter was selected among her classmates to be read aloud at the school board meeting. It referenced the personal value of such opportunities as afterschool programs and advanced classes.

The class at Union made the exercise an extension of their recent lesson in argumentative writing to simulate writing a formal letter of request to an elected official. **Tyler Linam**'s argument supporting increased time in academic specials won out among his peers.

The class at Adena made it a group exercise that practiced the skills of letter writing and public speaking. Sixth-graders **Zara Silvis**, **Kristina Amundson** and **Lucy Enneking** represented their class at the podium during the board meeting.

One note of thanks from their letter: "One specific thing we want to thank you all for is the addition of STEAM to the curriculum. It teaches us to problem solve, be creative, and work with our peers more directly."

West's Peer Mentoring Group 'A Safe Place to Share'

Group Supports Cultural Inclusiveness, Community Engagement

According to Lakota West senior Jada **Dunn**, the best aspect of participating in the school's peer mentoring group is that "We get to talk about what's bugging us and to get others' perspective. We can share anything as it's a safe environment and we know there will be encouragement from the others."

Dunn, who has been

involved with the group since the beginning of this year, says she "appreciates the affirmation I

get by coming here. It helps to share and hold each other accountable."

According to Principal Elgin Card, that's the purpose of the club: to provide a network of support for African-American students that allows them to share frustrations, challenges and opportunities.

"Many students didn't know each other previously, so they have become a cohort, a group that holds one another responsible for their grades, behavior and decisions. They truly mentor each other, helping them work out and address issues."

According to Dr. Monique C. Johnson, who's one of the co-coordinators of Lakota's "Champions for Change" cultural inclusion program, "The group is a great opportunity for students to share their feelings and to encourage one another. Research has shown that African American students who attend schools where they are in the minority experience feelings of isolation and alienation at times. Social support systems like this group are a great way to support, retain, and help students adjust as well as excel."

The desire to help every student feel welcome and accepted is the foundation of the "Champions for Change" cultural proficiency training program for Lakota staff. At its core is building a stronger culture of inclusiveness and understanding that supports high achievement for students of all different backgrounds. The program acknowledges a demographic trend at Lakota defined by steady changes in the cultural, racial, socioeconomic and even cognitive make-up of the district's students and families.

Alternative High School Experience a New Option for Lakota Students

Lakota's new Career Readiness Academy is the definition of personalized education – and one example of Lakota's commitment to providing a range of options to set students up for success.

The alternative high school program, introduced as an option to both Lakota East and West students this school year, offers students the opportunity to earn their high school diploma in a smaller, more flexible environment. Students facing different circumstances in their lives or struggling with the traditional high school format can work at their own pace with the benefits of a curriculum that combines online instruction with one-on-one support from the Academy's academic staff.

"The model allows students to work entirely at their own pace," said Nicole Isaacs, the leader of the district's new high school alternative program open to both Lakota East and West ninth- through twelfth-graders. "Every student who walks through our doors has the same goal – to graduate on time and formulate a plan for what happens after that. But how they get there can look very different."

During its pilot year, the Academy is situated in a space right off the cafeteria of Lakota West's main campus. Students reap the benefits of all that main campus has to offer, like guidance counselor support, athletics and extracurricular programs, while enjoying a more flexible, alternative format.

The Academy has big plans to increase its capacity next school year in a new location that will be more central to students from both sides of the district. During the current registration season for the 2017-2018 school year, students might consider what the Career Readiness Academy has to offer.

The course registration process is now underway for high school students, with Lakota offering a full range of educational paths and classes to students to prepare them for their future. But recent graduates of Dave Honhart's speech class think students should seriously consider working an elective speech class into their schedules.

Honhart had 10 alumni volunteers come back and share their experiences during Lakota East's Elective Showcase – and one even developed a <u>video</u> to promote taking speech. "All of these students, and many, many more who have kept in touch with me, believe that the class had a tremendous positive impact on their lives and it was one of the most

powerful courses they took in high school. The content and nature of class itself just lends itself to making an immediate impact on students."

Honhart can easily talk at length about the value of taking a speech class, but hearing recent graduates talk about the class is what really hit home with current students. During the Showcase, alumni had the opportunity to talk one-on-one with current students, sharing how the class increased their overall confidence, strengthened their leadership skills, gave them an edge in college or the workforce, and more.

Speech is offered at both high school campuses. Registration for rising sophomores, juniors and seniors began Jan. 27 and closes on Feb. 6.

School Board Narrows Superintendent Search to Two

Finalists Receive Top Rankings from Both Board and Community



In its search to find the district's next superintendent, the Lakota Local Schools Board of Education has narrowed its superintendent search to two candidates: Dr. Keith Kline and Mr. Matthew Miller.

"During the first round of interviews, we were fortunate for the opportunity to meet a solid pool of candidates, all with prior superintendent experience in districts both locally and regionally," said Lakota Board President Ben Dibble. "While we appreciate all of their interest in Lakota, Dr. Kline and Mr. Miller most closely embodied the skills, values and overall experience that will help our district continue making progress for the benefit of all our students."

Both candidates have been invited to participate in a final round interview with the board next Thursday, February 9. This will allow the district to expedite their original timeline and make a final decision earlier than planned

The board conducted first round interviews with eight candidates selected from the original pool of 17. Keeping with its commitment to involve the community at critical points throughout the process, the board also invited a cross-section of staff, parents, business leaders and residents to ask questions of the candidates and provide feedback.

"Part of our decision involved reviewing the community input collected earlier in this process, as well as the feedback given by the 24 community members who participated in the recent meet and greet," Dibble said. "It was reassuring to see that this group's feedback aligned with that of the board's."
