Community Foundation Names 2016 Educators of Excellence

Highest Lakota Staff Honor Goes to Caulfield, Kornau and Rouff

The Community Foundation of West Chester/Liberty led the charge in naming the 2016 recipients of the Lakota Educator of Excellence Award this week. The highest staff honor, directed by community nominations, belongs to: Todd Caulfield, sixth grade teacher at Cherokee Elementary; Tracey Kornau, physical education teacher and varsity girls volleyball coach at Lakota West High School; and Jeff Rouff, principal at Hopewell Junior.

The Community Foundation's award provides an opportunity for the community to nominate educators in the Lakota School District who demonstrate a high commitment to their students and their community.

"Every year, I am overwhelmed by the number and strength of nominations," said Erin Clemons, president and CEO for the Community Foundation. "The high quality of Lakota's educators is evident through the words of students, parents, fellow staff and even community members who have witnessed or personally benefited from their work."

The selection committee consists of both Foundation and Lakota staff reviewing the nomination letters and deliberating as a group. The award includes a \$2,000 grant for the implementation of a special project or program at the recipient's school, made possible through the generosity of private donors.

Each year, two recipients are selected to represent grades PreK-6 and 7-12, respectively. This year, the selection committee was so impressed by the portfolio of letters for Jeff Rouff that it actually added a third award, specifically to recognize a deserving administrator, without the attached monetary award.

Each recipient was honored within their school communities with a special surprise recognition. "The 'Educator of Excellence' award is a long-standing tradition at Lakota and continues to be the gold standard for teaching excellence here in our community," said Lakota Superintendent Dr. Karen Mantia.

She added, "We wanted our honorees to be surrounded by the students, parents and colleagues who have been most impacted by their influence. The three events were designed to be something very special – a moment we hope they'll remember for the remainder of their career and thereafter."

Annual Writing Contest Theme was "Reality"

A "Celebration of Writing" was held last week to honor the winners of the annual Write Challenge contest for Lakota students in grades K-12.

The competition (sponsored by the Lakota LEADS parent group) encouraged Lakota students to submit narrative essays, personal essays or poetry focused on a theme – this year's theme was "reality."

"LEADS loves the opportunity to bring the Write Challenge to our students every year," shared President Alyssa Louagie. "Lakota has extremely talented writers, and this year's winners amaze me with what they submitted for our theme, reality. They really poured a lot of creativity and imagination into every word!"

The reception included an inspiring talk from author Tracie Kleman, who is also a Lakota grad and Lakota teacher. She talked about her writing journey, and told the young writers that the writing foundation they are receiving at Lakota is second to none. Kleman told the audience that writing teaches many life lessons, among them to be a better listener, be adventurous, be original, be yourself and trust the way you see the world.

Engineering Class Launches into the Stratosphere High Altitude Balloon Flight a Success

It's quite a project when you have technical advisors from the Air Force, the National Weather Service (NWS) and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). And that's exactly the group of consultants that students in the Introduction to Engineering Design class interacted with to plan their recent high altitude balloon launch.

As part of the Butler Tech cclass offered at Lakota East Freshman Campus, the students researched, designed prototypes and built the balloon that was rated for 100,000 feet altitude, filled with helium to provide sufficient lift into the atmosphere. The balloon was fitted with a payload of HAM radio equipment and a GPS tracker that allowed students to follow the balloon's path. There was also a six-foot diameter parachute and camera.

To prepare for the launch, several advisors from Wright Patterson Air Force Base met with the students to discuss the effects of high altitude on different objects. They also provided the students with guidance during the assembly and final preparations. Another mentor from the NOAA led the students through various computer applications involved in predicting the balloon's flightpath.

According to instructor Ken Kinch, "Introduction to Engineering Design is a Project Lead the Way course that allows students to better understand the engineering design process while applying math, science and engineering standards to hands-on projects. Such projects are a combination of traditional learning methods and actual trial. The balloon launch is something the students will always remember, especially since they were the designers and the tracking crew."

The high altitude balloon launch is just one such unique project the students have been involved with this year. In addition to the recent cardboard canoe regatta (<u>click here to read more</u>), the group also recently designed frames for two types of remote-controlled drones.

The group compared similarities and differences between a tri-copter drone (with three motors and propellers) and a penta-copter they call the Dragonfly (that boasts five motors and propellers). Students created initial designs using Autodesk Inventor, and then cut out plywood frames on the laser cutter. They then installed the electronics, bench-tested the motors and control systems, and mounted components such as motors and speed controllers.





District, Township Partner on School Safety Training

May 25 Simulation at Hopewell Elementary Helps Local Responders, Schools Prepare

Lakota Local Schools and West Chester Township work collaboratively year-round in all aspects of protecting the schools in our community. Resource officers are in the schools daily, interacting with staff and students to help enforce safety policies and procedures and proactively build relationships based on respect and open dialogue, all with the goal of preventing any compromise to student safety.

On Wednesday, May 25, West Chester Township and Lakota Local Schools will collaborate for an intensive training exercise to help local responders and school staff prepare for a potential "active shooter" scenario in a school building.



"The protection of the community is the most critical service provided by West Chester Township, and the responsibility of protecting our youngest and most precious citizens is especially significant," said Township Administrator Judi Boyko. "West Chester personnel actively train for all varieties of potential circumstances and next week's training exercise will focus on one type of incident which we could face as a community."

The details of the active shooter simulation are not being disclosed for authenticity and to gain the most realistic reactions to the circumstances as they unfold. The exercise will take place at Hopewell Elementary and hundreds of volunteers will help create the sense of chaos that would most certainly result under such real circumstances.

"The safety and security of our students, staff and visitors is paramount, which is why the strong partnership we've built with both townships is so critical," said Lakota Superintendent Dr. Karen Mantia. "We maintain the highest level of trust and respect for our local responders. It takes that kind of collaboration and an exercise of this magnitude to help ensure all the key players are well-equipped and trained to handle a worst case scenario in our schools."

West Chester police and fire personnel will be deployed in response to the simulation and residents should not be alarmed by the presence of emergency response vehicles at Hopewell Elementary.

Three Lakota Staffers Honored by State Organization

Selected for Building "Child-Friendly" Nutrition Environment

The School Nutrition Association of Ohio (SNA) recently announced the selection of three Lakota employees as recipients of their annual awards.

Congratulations to Ben Brown, principal at Union Elementary for his selection as Most Valued Principal; to Chris Passarge, Lakota's Chief Operations Officer, for his selection as Most Valued Administrator; and to Chris Burkhardt, director of child nutrition and wellness, for his selection as director of the year.

The SNA is the state chapter of a national organization that promotes healthful meals and nutrition education. The organization's mission is to advance good nutrition for all students, ensuring that Ohio's students receive the fuel they need to learn in the classroom.

The most valued principal and most valued administrator awards recognize those positions within the school system who have been instrumental in building a "child-friendly" nutrition environment. According to the SNA, "Recipients of these awards are selected based on their support of nutrition services and commitment to the philosophy that children require instruction and guidance if they are to make healthful food choices."

The director of the year award recognizes school nutrition directors for the contributions they have made throughout their school nutrition career. This award is based on the person's program enhancement, staff development and school and community involvement.

The honors will be presented to Brown, Passarge and Burkhardt at the Ohio SNA's annual conference which will be held in mid-June in northern Ohio.

Lakota Schools Closed June 28 through July 8

Summer School Office at Ridge Junior Open to Help with Summer Programming

Open Enrollment Begins May 16 for New Open Enrollment Students

The Lakota Board of Education renewed the approval of Lakota's open enrollment policy for the 2016-2017 school year. Under Board Policy 5113, students residing in other Ohio school districts can apply to attend Lakota.

Current open enrollment students receive first priority, and are guaranteed to maintain their current status if they return their completed application to the Enrollment Center by May 13.

Open enrollment for new open enrollment students begins May 16 and will be considered on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications and a list of required documents will be available by May 16 on the Enrollment Center website and are due May 31.

In an effort to keep classes at their standard size, the district places a cap on the number of open enrollment students it can accept each year. New applicants may not always receive their first school of choice, depending on the school's base enrollment for students residing within its attendance zone.
