COVID Impacts - Local Composite Index and Enrollment/ADM Loss

Local and state budgets have been severely impacted by COVID-19. It is critical that our state government continue to support school divisions. How did COVID-19 impact you, your student, or your community? Consider customizing this letter by sharing your personal story.

Example - Local Composite Index

SUBJECT: Support Local Composite Index Hold Harmless for School Divisions

Dear Delegate/Senator LAST NAME,

As a <u>student/parent/teacher/etc. (in/of)</u> Richmond Public Schools, I am deeply concerned about potential funding decreases because of the Local Composite Index (LCI) formula. School divisions are still recovering from the impacts of COVID-19. Now, Richmond Public Schools will be playing catch up again because of the broken LCI formula that is causing RPS to lose about \$7 million in state education funding next year.

Please support Budget Amendment Item 137 #4s from Senator McClellan to hold the school divisions most impacted by COVID harmless from LCI changes. In Richmond, hold harmless funding would help the division mitigate the impact of the LCI change and possibly help prevent layoffs and help pay for proposed teacher compensation increases. This funding is critical to helping our division continue to meet the needs of our students and adequately compensate our staff.

It is imperative that we continue to invest in our students, schools, and families. More than ever we look to you, our representatives, for support in these unprecedented times.

EL Teacher Ratios

Another significant priority is implementation of a new, more equitable approach to English Learner student to teacher ratios. The current flat ratio of 1 teacher to 50 students does not adequately serve their needs. The Board of Education recommended changing the ratios to a proficiency-based scale, where less English proficient students would have a ratio of 1:25 and more proficient students would have ratios ranging from 25-50 students per teacher. This policy would equitably distribute EL teachers to the EL students who need the most support.

	SUBJECT: English Learner Teacher Funding
	Dear Delegate/Senator LAST NAME,
	My name is and I am a <u>student/parent/teacher/etc.</u> in Richmond Public Schools. I would like to express my support for SB156 (Hashmi) which provides support to our English Learner (EL) students by amending the staffing requirements for EL teachers.
	Currently, more than 1 in 8 Virginia students are current EL or former EL students and Virginia ranks 6th worst in the nation for EL graduation rates, and 3rd worst on the 8th grade National Assessment for Educational Progress test.
	Currently, there is only one teacher per 50 EL students. We can do better. Amending the staffing requirements to be based on student proficiency level, instead of a flat ratio, would more equitably support the needs of our EL students across the Commonwealth. EL students in Virginia have faced unique challenges during the pandemic and have had the most significant drop in state achievement scores of any student groups measured for state reading, math, and science tests.
	This proficiency-based proposal in SB156 was recommended to you by the Virginia Board of Education. The VA BOE identified how to address equity and I hope you can see why it is a necessity in a system where many young people do not have the same starting line. I am looking forward to seeing a more inclusive learning environment which celebrates diversity, and the changing demographics of Virginia. Please encourage your colleagues to advance and fund this proposal.

Equity Based Funding

The biggest legislative priority for RPS is to continue investing in equity based funding so that school divisions that have high concentrations of poverty, like Richmond, receive more funding to support their high-need students.

One proposal under consideration is the Equity Fund. This new fund would combine existing state funds for the At-Risk Add-On program with another pool of funds called Prevention, Intervention, and Remediation funds. The Virginia Board of Education proposed creating this fund and investing additional funding in the state budget. School divisions would be required to spend these funds in schools with the greatest concentrations of poverty. This new fund would begin to modernize our education funding formulas by recognizing that each child and school within a division do not have the same level of needs, and state funding should equitably reflect that reality.

This issue will ultimately be decided by the <u>House Appropriations Committee</u> and <u>Senate</u> <u>Finance and Appropriations Committee</u> as they craft the state budget. While you should always contact your own legislators to express your views on legislation you can also contact all the members of those money committees.

This proposal and the advancement of equity-based funding models is critical to the success of students from disadvantaged communities, both rural and urban. There has always been a lack of equitable funding, but now COVID-19 has deepened the disparities between high-poverty and wealthier communities. Now is the time to invest in our students and create the Equity Fund and advance other equity-based funding for our schools. Please encourage your colleagues on Committee to advance and fund HB1135 and SB490.

Example - Equity-Based Funding
SUBJECT: Support the Equity Fund - HB1135 & SB490
Dear Delegate/Senator LAST NAME,
My name is and I am a <u>student/parent/teacher/etc.</u> in Richmond Public Schools. As the General Assembly advances education legislation and decides on how to fund our schools I ask you to create the Equity Fund proposed by the Board of Education. Current funding formulas do not account for poverty and the socioeconomic status of our students. Research shows that Virginia's high-poverty school divisions are spending \$6,600 less than what is needed to meet the national average on standardized tests. Investing in our students is critical to fix this financial gap and give our school divisions the tools they need to help our students be successful. It is time for Virginia to make equity-based funding a reality. Please encourage your colleagues to advance and fund HB1135 and SB490.
