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# Crops by Kids

Good news! After a hiatus from the seed fundraiser, we are going to have the fundraiser this year.

If you have been waiting for the order form to order your seeds, it will be forthcoming SOON. So sorry that we are a little behind. **A few fun facts about veggies**: Peppers come in all shapes, sizes, flavors, and degree of hot-ness. Peppers are usually started inside several weeks before the last frost. They prefer rich soil and full sun.

Did you know chili peppers get their heat from the alkaloid compound capsaicin? According to the Whole Seed catalog, "in 1912 an American pharmacy professor, William Scoville devised a way to measure the amount of heat producing alkaloids in chili peppers. The <u>Carolina Reaper</u> retains its place at the top of the super-hot hierarchy, with a rating of 2.2 million Scoville units. The <u>Death Spiral</u> comes in at 1.3 million units". A jalapeno is rated as 10,000 units and a bell pepper is 0.

Did you know there is a black tomato? According to the Whole Seed catalog, the Black Beauty is the world's darkest tomato. It has the same antioxidants as blueberries. The description is," so dark that some tomatoes turn solid blue-black on the skin. Deep red flesh is among the best tasting of all tomatoes."

# **Understanding The Ballot When You Vote**

#### BALLOT

Shall the voters of the Barre Unified Union School District approve the school board to expend **\$53,254,319**, which is the amount the school board has determined to be necessary for the ensuing fiscal year? It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of \$16,252 **per equalized pupil**. This projected spending per equalized pupil is **5.99% higher** than spending for the current year.

**\$53,254,319** includes approximately \$6,000,000 of grant funding. This funding operates two elementary and middle schools, a high school, an alternative school, and a central office. This value provides economical and quality education for approximately 2,300 students.

Your educational taxes are **not** going up **5.99%**. 5.99% is the percentage increase in spending per student from FY 2022. Our expenses are only increasing by **1.95%**, but because of lower tax rates, **educational taxes are actually going down**, as you can see below.

When calculating spending per student, Vermont uses "equalized pupils" rather than an actual headcount. The formula gives less weight to pre-kindergarten pupils and extra weight to students in secondary schools, those from economically deprived backgrounds, and those whose first language is not English. The principle behind the weighting is that it costs more to educate students in certain categories.

# **Vote Before Vacation!**

On January 13, the Barre Unified Union School District Board approved a budget of \$53,254,319 for fiscal year 2023. This represents an increase of **1.95%** over the current year's spending plan. Approval of this budget by voters would give us the resources we need to address our children's social emotional well-being, how they will learn coming out of the pandemic, and keep and attract high-quality staff for our schools.

Please take a look to the right at how our student spending compares to our neighbors. Our budget is clearly a step in the right direction toward addressing the imbalance you see in student spending in our region.



## HOW DOES INCOME SENSITIVITY WORK?

Income sensitivity is a form of tax assistance which allows homeowners to pay property taxes based on their income, rather than the value of their home.




Approximately **66%** of Barre households make less than \$136,900 a year and meet eligibility requirements to qualify for a property tax credit. This allows them to pay their taxes based on their household income, instead of the value of their home.
