

As sophomores we had passed the test and started the year with enthusiasm. In the spring we had our own sophomore party, which was really a success.



We will always remember senior night, the beautiful Junior-Senior Banquet, this time in our honor, and the Awards Banquet.








# PHY-BI-CHEM CLUB

# Trojans Total Twenty Wins






On the day after Thanksgiving the traditional games between our varsities and the alumni teams were played at Lincoln School.




