
Dear Graduates:

On April 18, we left for our long anticipated class trip to Washington, D. C. It was a week of unforgettable sights and experiences.



Then on June 17, came the day we had all worked so hard for — our graduation and the receiving of our diplomas in the First Christian Reformed Church of Cicero.


The memory of all these things will linger long in our minds.




Because of the enthusiasm of the juniors and excellent cooperation with their sponsors, they helped to make this year an enjoyable one for the whole student body.

The boys' varsity basketball team lacked height this year but overcame this handicap by their will to win.




