for the teaching of youth and the glory of God.





worked individually on their projects, they cooperated with each other to uphold the standards and ideals of Timothy.



at Timothy Christian High School.







SENIOR PLAY

Seniors capture the spotlight

The lights dim, the curtains open, then begins one of the most exciting and different plays that Timothy students have ever presented, Flight Into Danger. 




