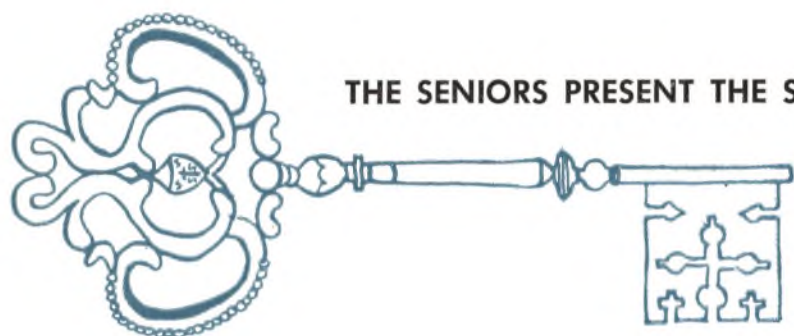

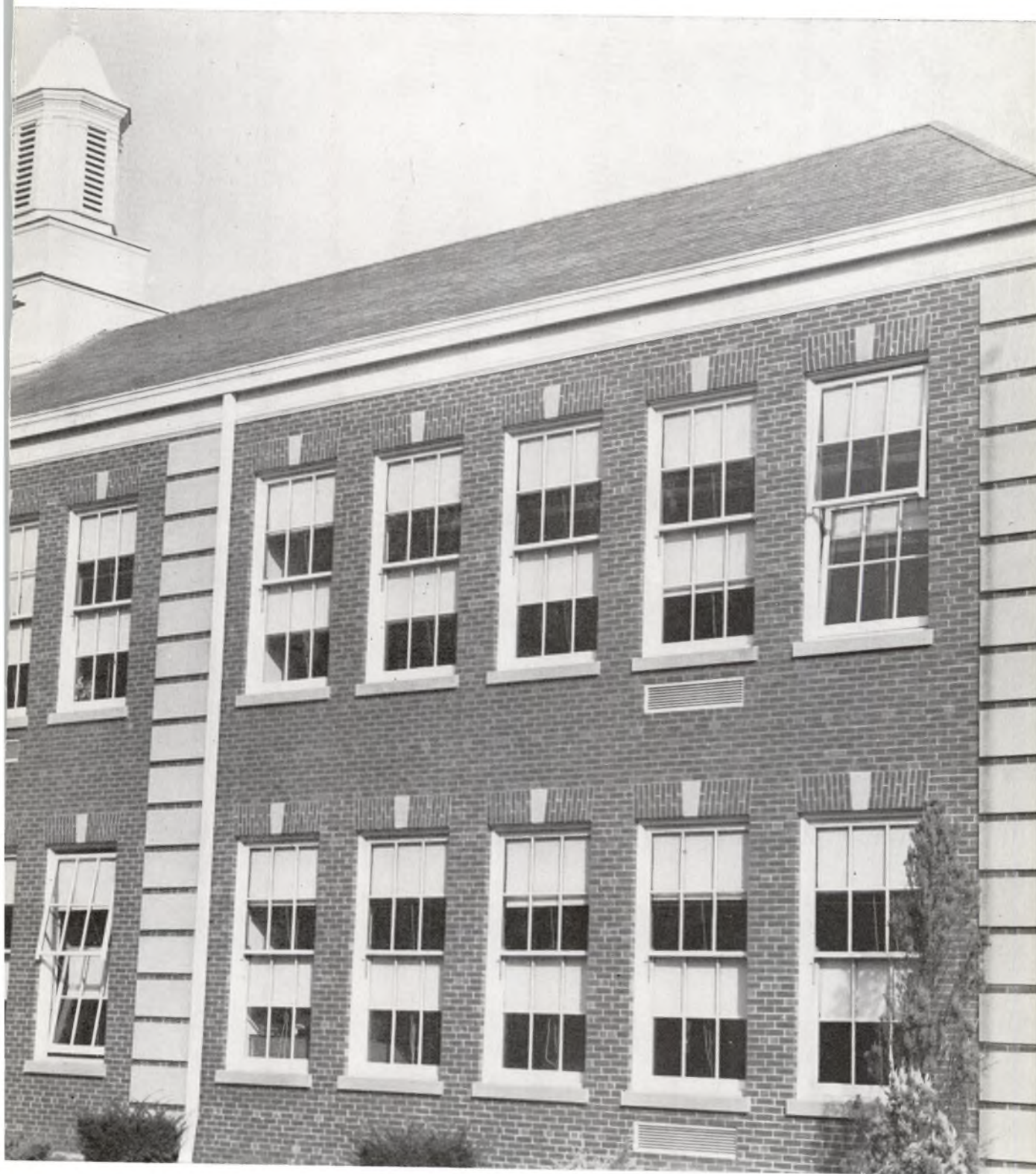

The first graduating class of Timothy in 1914 had only two pupils.

*They graduated from a
small two-room building which housed four grades.*

*This was sufficient until 1927 when the cornerstone
for the present grade school was laid.*

*The enrollment had reached 600 in 1951
and it was again time to expand.*

*During that year the cornerstone for
the 60th Court high school building was laid.*

is the new high school being constructed in Elmhurst.*

one of the leading Christian schools in the nation.*

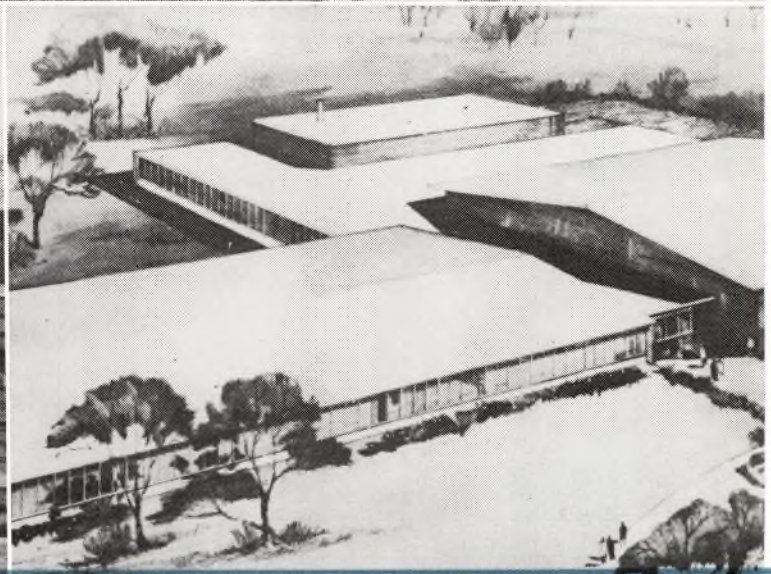

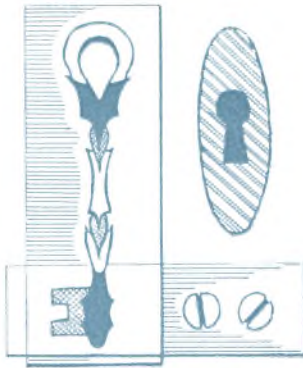

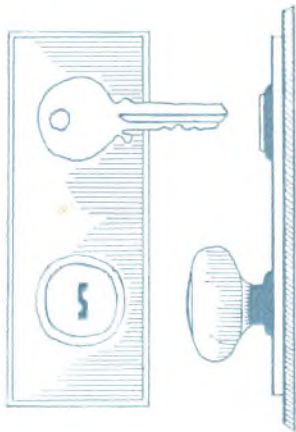
NEW SCHOOL

for us has been the foundation of all our learning. Our formal education began with our elementary school training. These years offered us the first keys to an unlimited number of doors leading to new horizons.



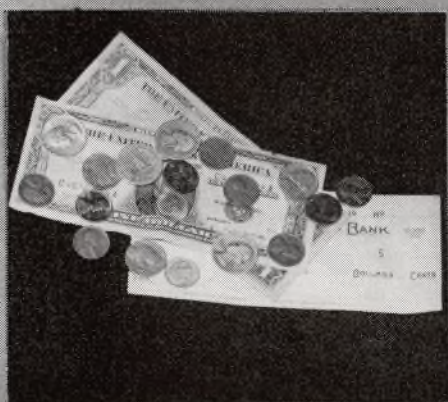
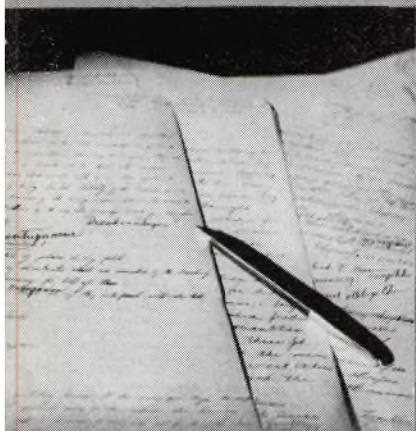
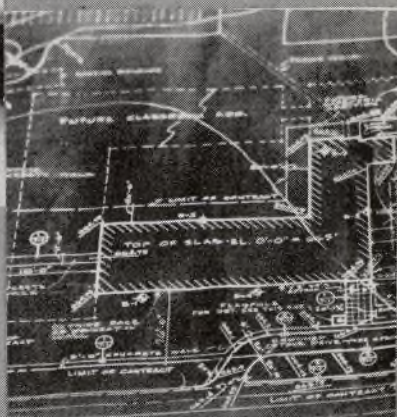
The Present

We, the seniors of 1962, have a great deal to look back on. We have passed through four memorable and joyous years of high school, and have reached an important milestone in our lives. As the final graduating class from the building on 60th Court, we forever close these doors, but we open the doors to a better school for the future.

Our junior year came to a close with the campaign for Student Council President, and the subsequent announcement of the winner, Edward De Young, at the Awards Banquet.

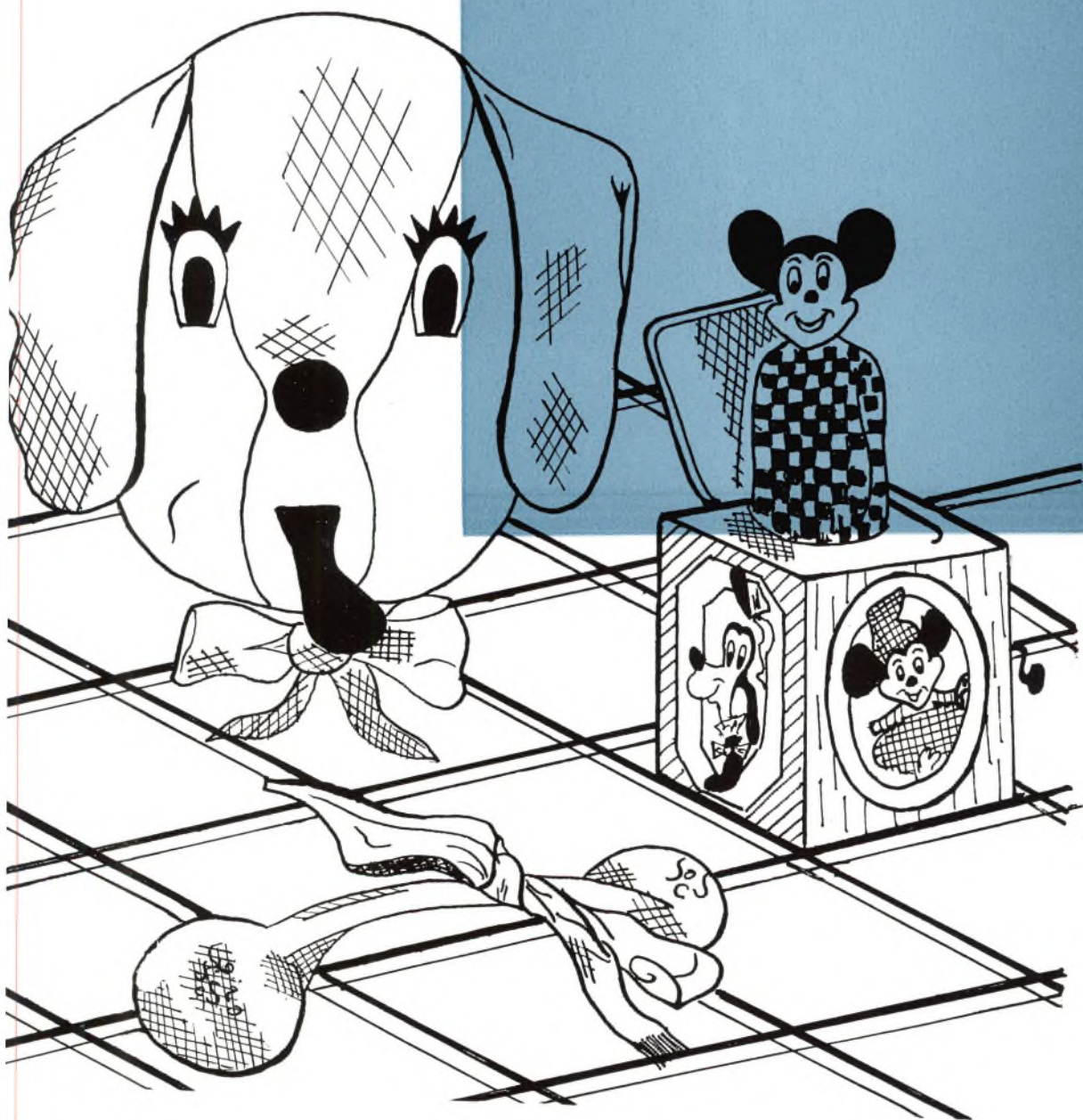

LANGUAGES

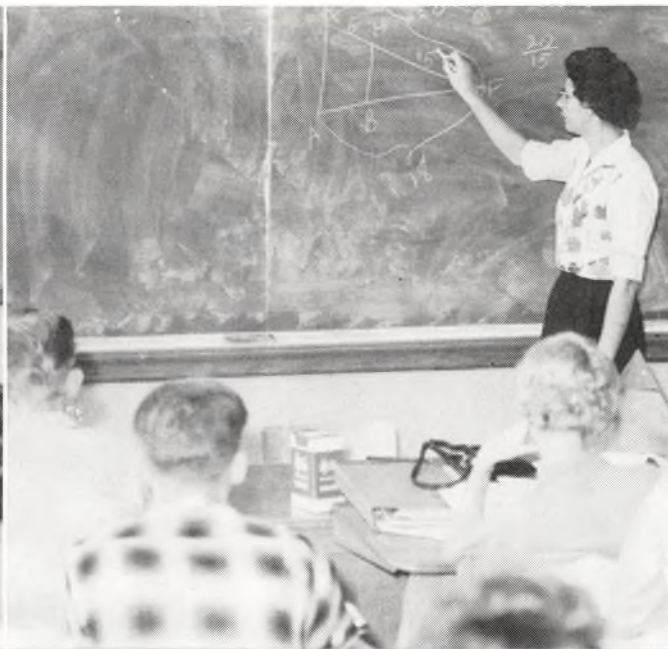

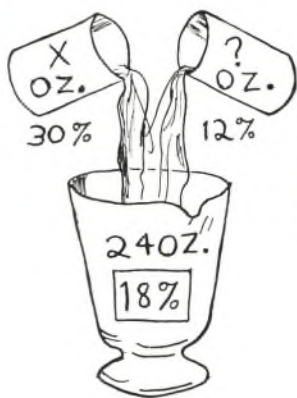




Mr. Hoving explains the area formula for a triangle in freshman Algebra.



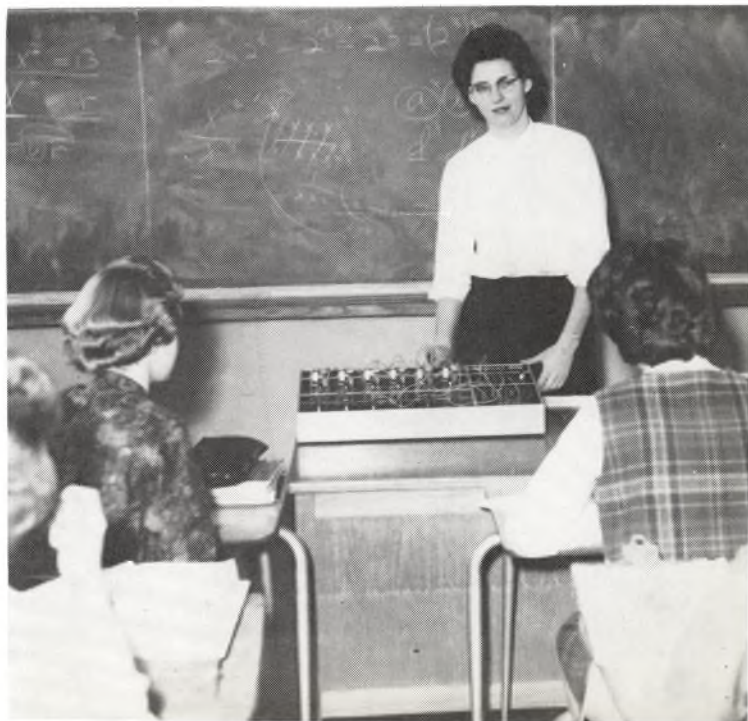
Miss Kingma talks about the relationship of sides and angles of a triangle in sophomore Geometry class.



MATHEMATICS

Cartesian co-ordinates, quadratic equations, logarithms, trigonometric functions . . . the mysteries of these terms are explained in Timothy's math courses. They cover a wide range of topics from the fundamentals of Algebra as a freshman to the intricacies of a computer in senior Trigonometry class. Through the years Timothy has built up excellent and outstanding math courses under the direction of Miss Kingma and Mr. Hoving.

GYM

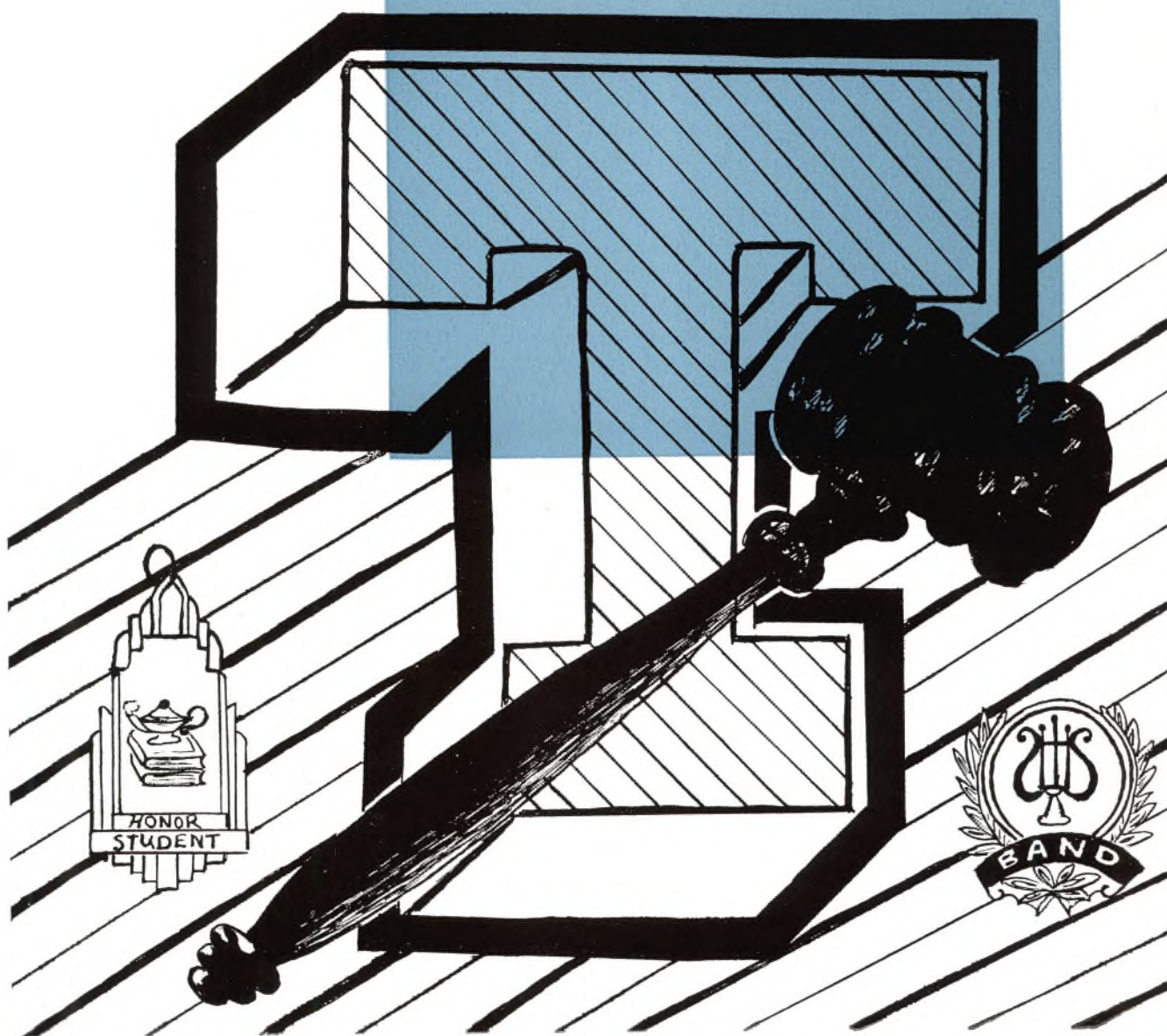

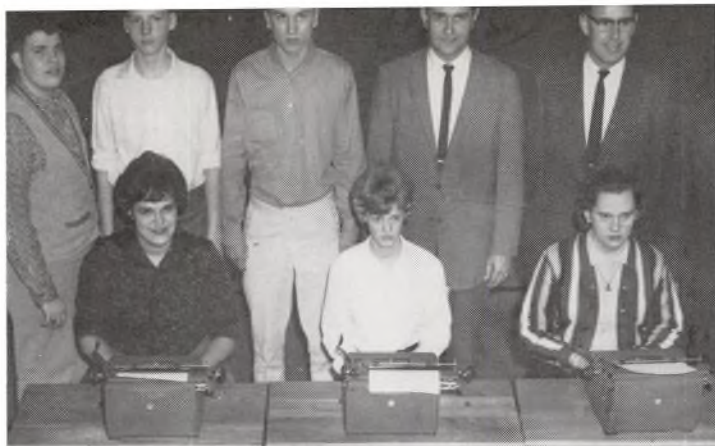

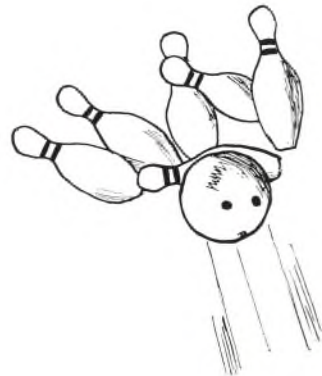
