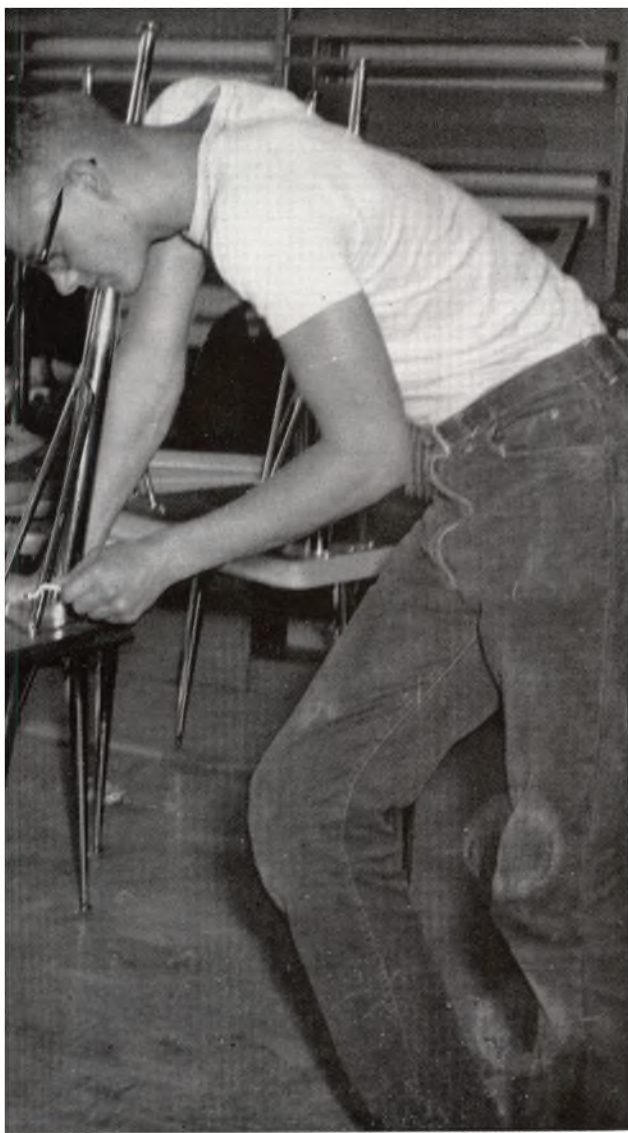

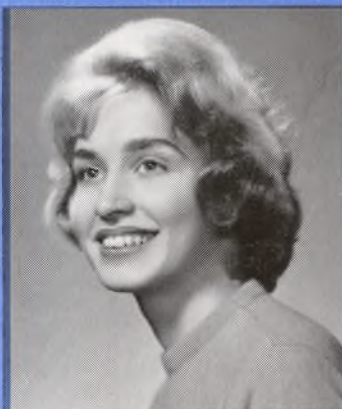

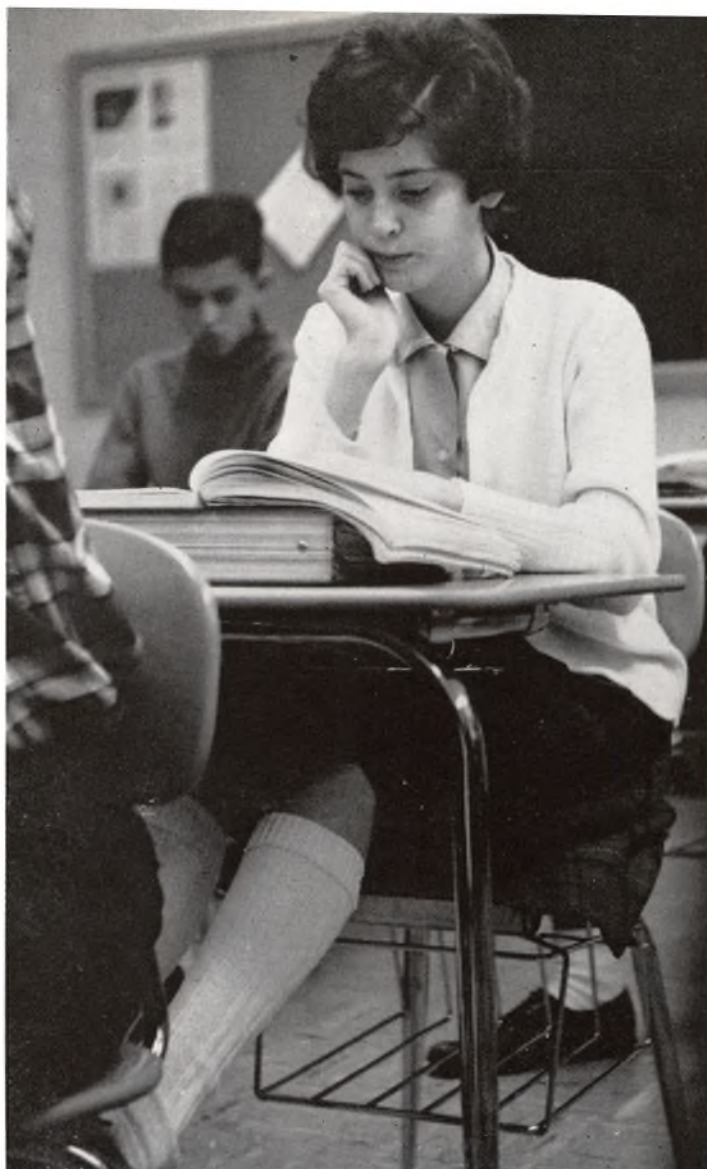

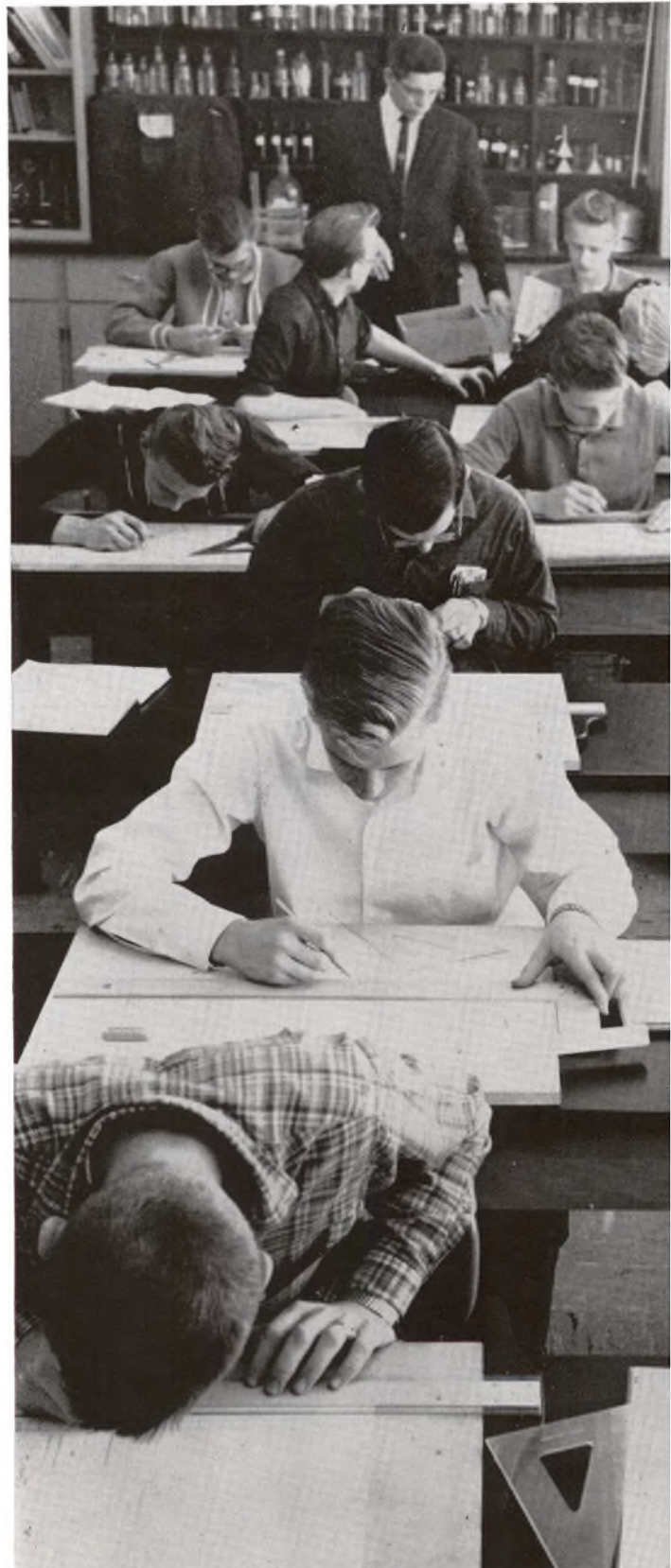

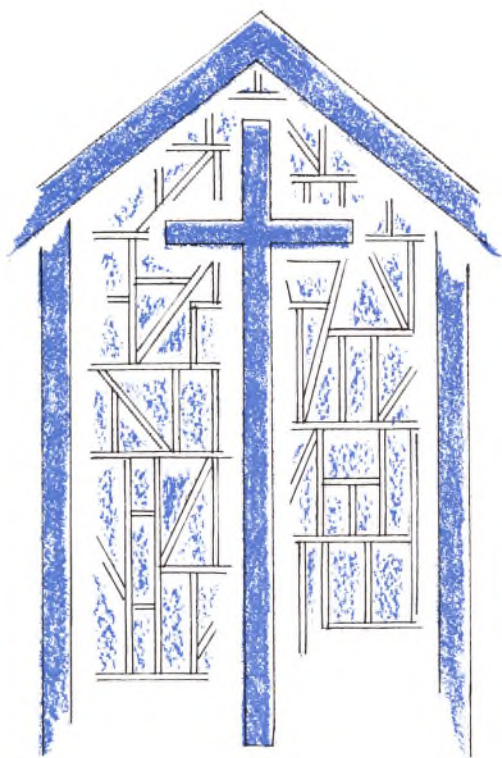

SCHOOL BOARD

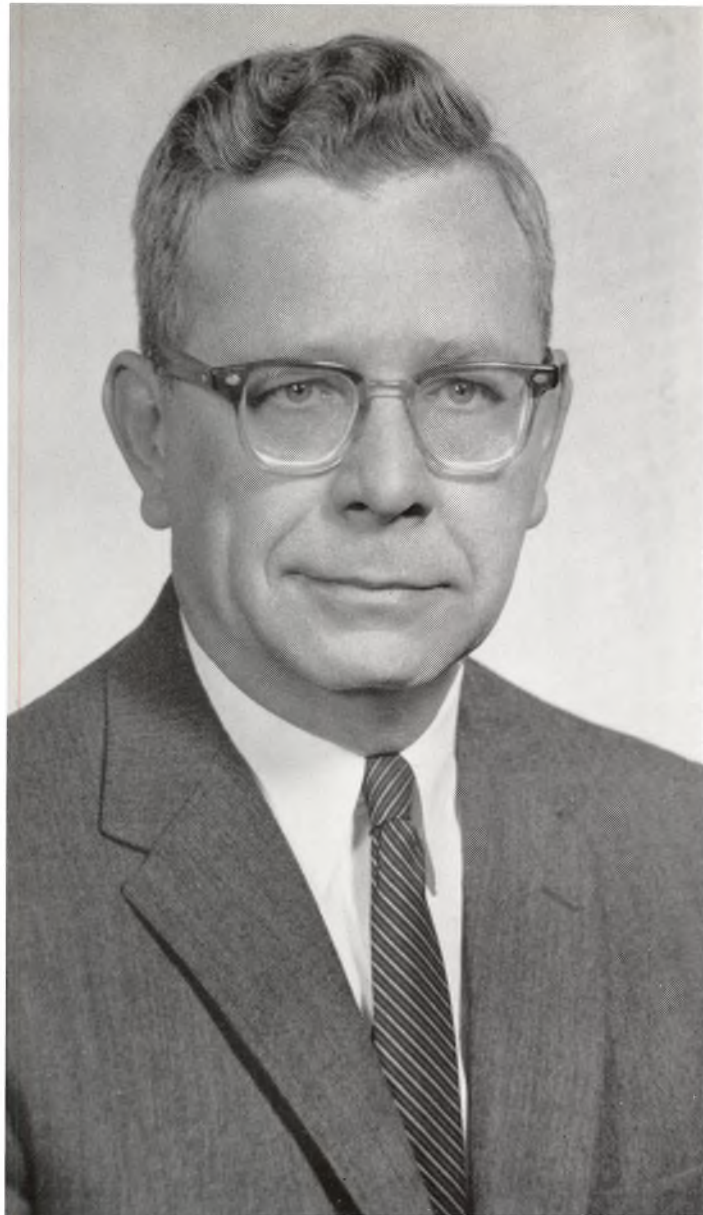

They are nominated by a committee of the Board and later chosen by ballot at an annual Society meeting. They then serve a term of three years. Official meetings are held monthly and the individual committees set up their own schedules as necessity arises.

Because of the distance between the new high school building and the homes of most of the students, the bus committee found it necessary to spend countless hours preparing bus schedules and finding drivers. Work involved in planning for the new school is handled by the expansion committee, which is made up of some members of the Board and additional men from the community.

Many things were crowded into that last semester—things we'll remember for a long time. After much planning and some frantic packing, we managed to get to Washington, D. C., for our class trip. Then there was the lovely banquet the juniors gave for us and the unforgettable experience of Senior Night. All these things made our last semester more memorable. At last, on the night of June 14, 1963, we graduated at ceremonies in the First Christian Reformed Church. Seeing our classmates in their white caps and gowns, we realized how much we had all changed. We had grown up in many ways, and we had done this together.

Thus, the class of 1963 passed its four years at Timothy and walked out of her doors to a new way of life. And even though we all went our separate ways, we'll always have our memories of Timothy—the laughter and tears we shared, the hopes and fears, the work and play.

We hope we have set the right example for those who come down the halls after us.

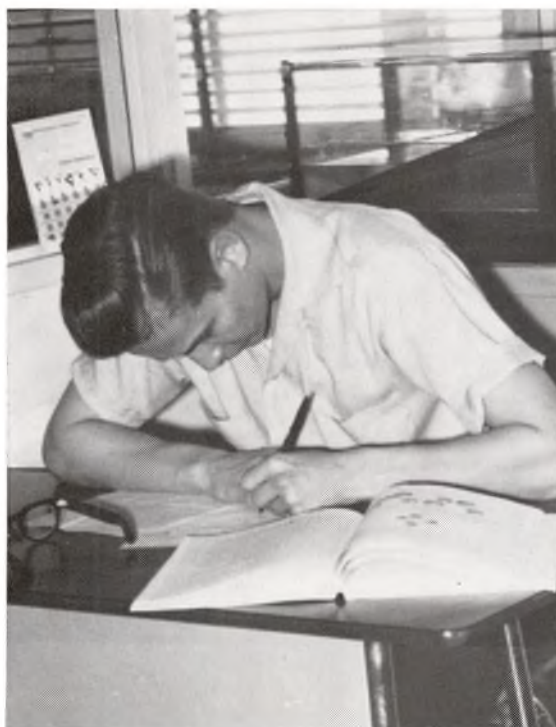


One of the greatest honors at Timothy is to be chosen student of the year. The choice is based on participation in activities, attitude toward school and fellow students, and academic record.

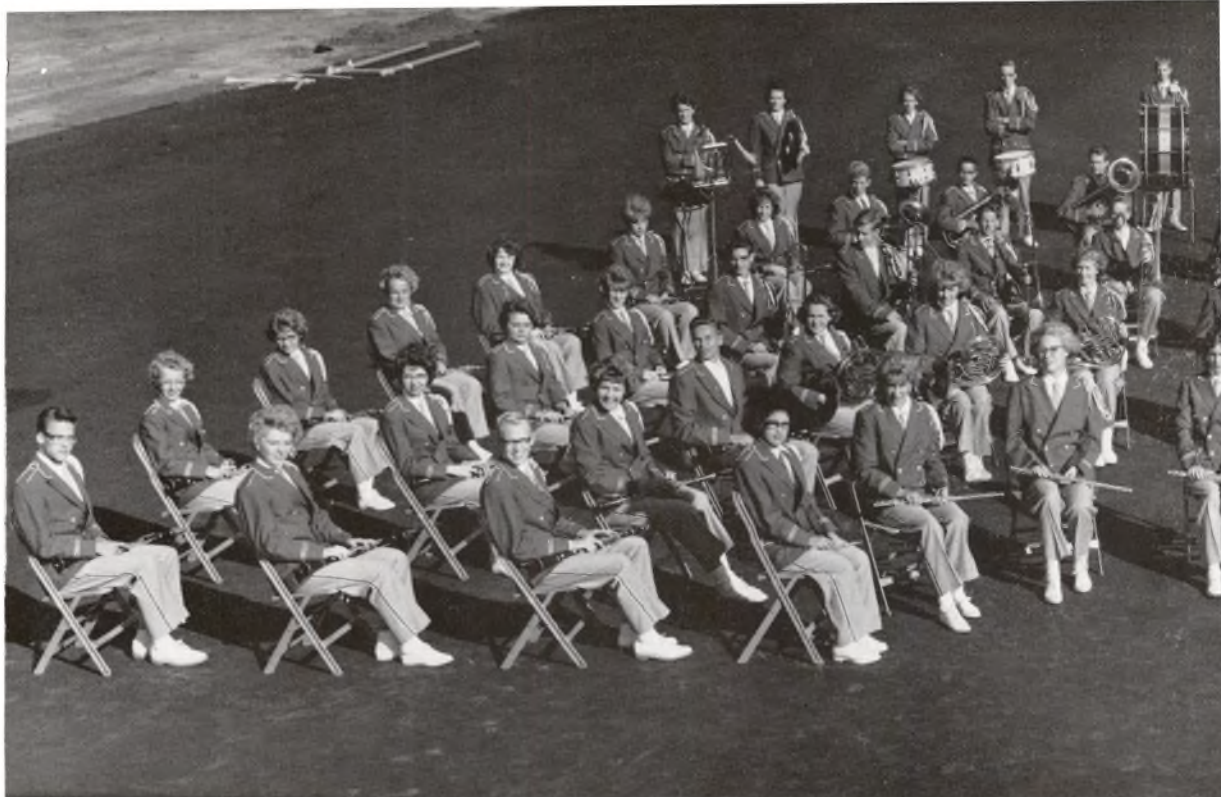

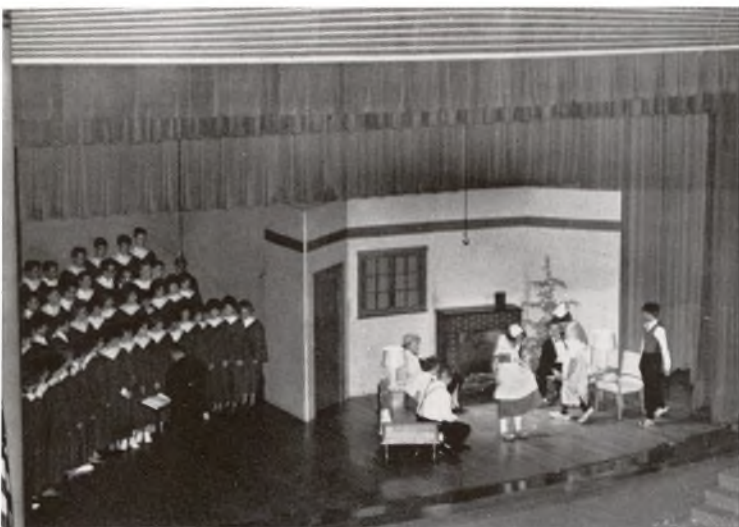

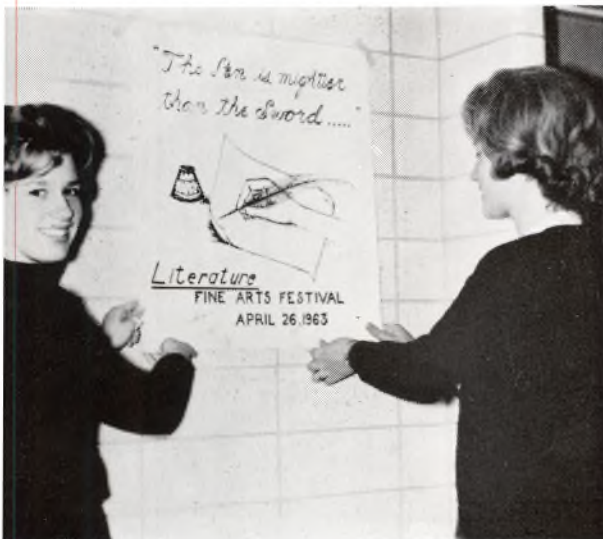
FINE ARTS FESTIVAL

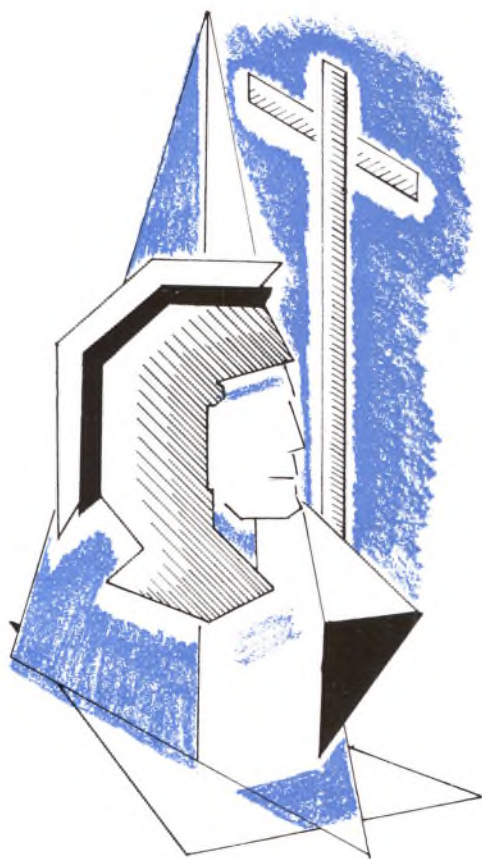

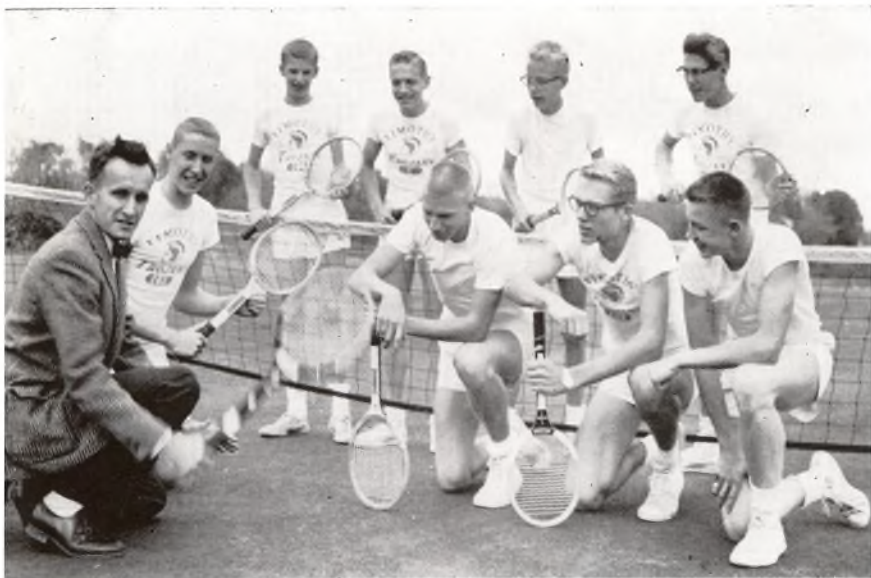
