#### **Nurse's Notes**

We have received several questions related to guidelines for keeping your child home when they are not feeling well. Below are the Guidelines for Keeping Sick Students Home from School: A student who is unable to participate in school in a meaningful way because of illness should be kept home to rest and recover until symptoms resolve. Keeping a sick student home also protects other students and school staff from contracting an illness that can be spread

- Fever: A student must remain home with a fever of 100° F and may only return after he/she has been fever free for 24 hours without fever-reducing medication such as Tylenol or Motrin.
- Diarrhea/Vomiting: A student with diarrhea and/or vomiting must stay home and may return to school only after being symptom-free for 24 hours.
- Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye): Following a diagnosis of pink eye, a student may return to school 24 hours after the first dose of prescribed medication has been administered.
- Rashes: Common infectious diseases with rashes are most contagious in the early stages. A student with a suspicious rash must stay at home, may return to school only after a healthcare provider has made a diagnosis, and authorizes the student's return to school, in writing, or symptoms have completely resolved. If you take your student to a healthcare provider for an evaluation of illness or injury, please be sure to request a letter stating when your student may return to school and any accommodations required upon his/her return.
