## A Message From Our Director of School Operations

#### UPDATED DOE COVID POLICIES

As a reminder provided by the DOE and NYS, **anyone who tests positive for COVID-19 must isolate.** This means the individual cannot go to school or work and should not leave their home, except to seek medical care.

**Staff, Students in K-12 Classrooms**: The isolation period for all staff and students in kindergarten and above who test positive for COVID-19 has been shortened to five days (from ten), regardless of age or vaccine/booster status. Individuals who have tested positive for COVID-19 do not need a negative COVID test to return to school or work on Day 6.

- If an individual has COVID symptoms and tests positive (on any kind of COVID test), the individual must isolate for a minimum of five days with Day 0 being the day that symptoms started. After five days the individual may return to school/work so long as they have been fever-free for 24 hours without fever-reducing medication and symptoms are improving.
- If an individual has no symptoms but tested positive (on any kind of COVID test), the individual must isolate for five days, with Day 0 being the day the test was collected. If symptoms develop within five days of testing positive, the five-day isolation count must restart, with Day 0 being the day symptoms started.
- If an individual has COVID-like symptoms and is awaiting a test result, the individual must isolate until the test result is received OR for five days, whichever comes first. If the test result is negative, the individual can end isolation. If the test result is positive, the individual must complete the five-day isolation period and may return to school/work so long as they have been fever-free for 24 hours without fever-reducing medication and symptoms are improving.

**Staff, Students in K-12 Classrooms**: All staff and students in grades Kindergarten and higher, when exposed to COVID-19 at school, do not need to quarantine and should continue to use the home test kits provided by their schools. Following an exposure at school, an individual should test that evening and test again five days later.

• If an individual is not fully vaccinated and exposed to COVID-19 outside of a school setting, the individual must quarantine for five days; this has been reduced from ten days. An unvaccinated student who is exposed in the home must continue to quarantine for an additional five days after a household member's isolation period has ended, if the household member and student are staying in the same home during that time.

Please note that if a staff or student has recovered from COVID-19 within the last three months, they do not need to quarantine or receive an at-home test kit following exposure unless they become symptomatic (new fever of 100 degrees F or higher, new cough, new sore throat, new loss of taste or smell, new shortness of breath).

#### Health & Safety Measures

In an effort to support our student and staff community, we are reaching out to families to ask for support in reinforcing our health and safety standards and structures here at Launch. To ensure that we minimize the spread of COVID-19, we ask parents to talk with students about the importance of mask wearing and being socially distanced throughout the day (in and outside of our building). Reinforcing the importance of being/staying safe and being cautious around others is a practice that we want students to embody. We will continue to support/remind students to practice safe and responsible actions and welcome the support from our parents and partners to further these conversations at home!

## A Message From Our Director of School Operations (cont'd)

#### **VEGAN FRIDAYS**

New York City public school cafeterias are going vegan on Fridays as part of a new policy from Mayor Eric Adams that starts this week. It means foods like macaroni and cheese, pizza, and mozzarella sticks will be off the menu.

"Plant-based options in schools means healthy eating and healthy living, and improving the quality of life for thousands of New York City students," said Adams, who is vegan himself. "Plant-based meals are delicious and nutritious, which is why I previously called for vegetarian and vegan options in schools. I'm thrilled to see that all students will now have access to healthy foods that will prevent debilitating health conditions."

#### **Missing Student Records & Information**

During the month of February, the Operations Team will be reaching out to families to collect the following Items: updated COVID-19 consent forms, proof of residency, handbook confirmations, immunization records and birth certificates. Students will be sent home with forms that specify what items are missing from their files. Please return the form with the associated document to the Main Office as soon as possible. #### Immunization for School Year 2021-2022

As a reminder, if you haven't already, please reach out to your medical provider to update your child's Immunizations for the 2021-2022 school year. **6th grader students must receive a Tdap shot while 7th grader students must receive their meningitis immunization from their medical provider.** If you have questions related to immunizations or other student records, please reach out to <u>SSavage@launchschool.org</u>.

#### Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) Food Benefits

The Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) is part of the U.S. government response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Through P-EBT, eligible school children receive temporary emergency nutrition benefits loaded on EBT cards that are used to purchase food. Children who would have received free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Act if their schools were not closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance for at least 5 consecutive days are eligible to receive P-EBT benefits. P-EBT also provides benefits to younger children in households participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) whose covered child care facility is closed or operating with reduced hours or attendance.

#### HEALTHY SMILES DENTAL PROGRAM

Healthy Smiles is an innovative leader in children's dental care that visits schools throughout New York State. Healthy Smiles, in collaboration with the NYC Dept. of Health and the NYC Dept. of Education, provides preventative dental care by highly trained dental staff. The services provided include a screening, gentle cleaning, fluoride treatment and sealants. Healthy Smile also provides an interactive educational workshop teaching children how to maintain proper oral hygiene. All treatments are noninvasive and done in the school under the direct supervision of the school staff. A follow up report will be sent home explaining whether the child has any cavities and if they need to visit their primary dentist for further care.

All students are welcomed to participate in the onsite dental program happening on March, 3rd and 4th. Permission slips for this service werel passed out to students on December 2nd, 2021. Please return this permission slip back by January 4th, 2022 to secure your child's spot.

#### Message from the Grade Level Chair

Our 6th graders are half-way through their first year as Launch students! **They are half-way to becoming 7th graders**. It has been thrilling to see the growth they've made so far this year. As we transition into Quarter 3, we continue to expect **MORE** from our 6th graders! More responsibility, more maturity, and more achievement! At this point, Launch 6th graders should be doing an outstanding job embodying **Launch's Habits of Heart and Mind: kindness and collaboration, integrity and stewardship, dedication and practice, and spirit and imagination**! It has been incredible to see our 6th graders step up during this month's Black History Month celebrations - with so many students presenting their poetry at our Love is Louder Slam Poetry presentation! **Shout out to Naturi, Nazdur, Crystal, Amari, and Shane B for their amazing poems**!

#### МАТН

WOW! We've learned SO MUCH already this year - and we're only halfway done! Students recently took their MAP assessment, and we saw exciting growth! Shout out to Milan who made the MOST GROWTH in 6th grade with 18 points of growth! On February 10th we took the Practice State Exam. It's been a while since students may have taken a state exam, so we want to remind them of the keys to success as we near the REAL state exam. Use your mathematician's plan! Annotate and interpret each question. Show and check your work! And as we continue to learn more and more, take time to review past work so it stays fresh! This is why we have students keep their work packets - so they can use them to study.

Please remember: Students have math homework EVERY TUESDAY AND THURSDAY and a quiz EVERY FRIDAY! Completing and preparing for these will ensure your student has an awesome grade!

#### SCIENCE

In 6th Grade Science, students will be **"taking a trip"** through Space as we explore the Solar System, planets, the Moon and the Sun. **Students have been researching a planet and will be collaborating with each other to create a project that showcases their creativity and understanding.** As we move through Space, students will learn about the phases of the Moon, reasons for the seasons and the scale of planets and distance between.

During our Black History Month celebration, we have learned about the amazing scientific contributions of Mae Jemison, Guy Bluford, Katherine Johnson, Neil Degrasse Tyson and Wangari Maathai.



#### ELA

We are so proud of our 6th graders. They finished reading Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief as well as completed a multimedia presentation. They had an opportunity to listen and give feedback to each other. The projects were awesome. We are currently in our 3rd unit and we are reading My Name is Seepeetza by Shirley Sterling. The topics that have been discussed have already motivated students to participate and share their points of view. Before we leave for the mid winter break we will have a socratic seminar. We know that the discussions will be insightful. Please ask your child about some of the topics. They will be assigned to work on a project during the break; this is the end of the unit task. They will have to write an OP ED. We will send a detailed email with more specifics. Please continue to encourage independent reading every night for at least 30 minutes.

#### SOCIAL STUDIES

Over the past month, we have been diving into Tristan Strong Punches a Hole in the Sky by Kwame Mbalia. Using this book, we have explored how African culture is portrayed in American culture and to children. Students were able to find connections to what we have learned in the novel, determine its significance in both the book and in African culture , and connect it back to our everyday lives. Over the next week, we will be focusing on the concept of a Storybox, a representation of told and untold stories of Africa. Students will be creating their own Storybox fill of stories of their choosing that connects to African culture, history, and traditions. Shout outs to Jacob Bailey, Aldrick David, and Jamel Baxter who have been knocking it out of the classroom with their inferences making and contributions to classroom discussions.

Please remember: Students should keep their work packets so they can use them to review and study. Students consistently have homework at least twice a week! Completing and preparing for these will ensure your student has an awesome grade!


#### SOCIAL STUDIES

will soon be coming to an end. For our product of learning students will write a 4-5 paragraph informational essay. Students have already been exploring different resources about their chosen constitutional case. They have been utilizing the Bill of Rights to identify which rights were not protected with those involved in their cases and what are possible solutions to prevent these specific issues from reoccurring in the future. We are looking forward to reading these amazing writing pieces.

Moving forward. Student historians will begin reading FEVER!!! Fever is a book about an epidemic that happened in Philadelphia over 200 years ago – called yellow fever.

We are all still living through COVID-19 pandemic. While pandemic means that it's happening globally or in a wide geographic area, an epidemic is a disease that is affecting a specific area or community - in this case, Philadelphia. Students will compare the detrimental spreads and learn about historical events that took place during this time.





#### MATH

7th grade mathematicians kicked off the new year by exploring how to calculate the percent of a number as well as the percent increase and decrease. This is so practical in many real-world situations such as shopping, sports, and business. Mathematicians also investigated scale drawings and even created their own! In February, we will kick-off our first geometry unit by learning about the circumference and area of a circle. This is a fun unit that allows students to investigate all kinds of circles found in our everyday lives.

#### SCIENCE

7th Grade Scientists have been working their way through our Thermal Energy Unit. Students are working to understand heating, cooling and discover that temperature change is explained by molecular movement and the facilitation of kinetic energy transfer from one thing to another. We unfortunately have had to pause our Egg Drop Experiment given the need to go virtual in the beginning of January, but we have every intention to complete the project as soon as feasible.

Superstar shout-outs to both Saniyah Barrett from 7.1 and Joshua Pabon in 7.3. They have shown a firm grasp of the unit concepts, vocabulary and have been of great assistance explaining and somewhat teaching their peers during our week of remote learning.

Chapter Quizzes for Chapter 1 - Understanding Temperature and Chapter 2 - Temperature and Energy have also taken place with an eye towards the Chapter 3 Quiz in the coming weeks.

# 8TH GRADE UPDATES

#### Message from the Grade Level Chair

As we transition into Quarter 3, we would like to **celebrate the growth our 8th graders have made this year.** In January, our students took their MAP Assessments and demonstrated their **Dedication** and **Practice**. This quarter, our students will be taking their Practice State Tests, in preparation for the New York State Exams administered in the spring. This month we engage in our **Black History Month celebration**, where we uplift and celebrate Black and Brown stories throughout the community. We had a strong kick off and it was a joy to see our students participate in events such as Dress for Your Future Career and Rep Your Culture Day.

#### МАТН


In Math, students have finished Quarter 2 with our Slope unit. This directly relates to the work they will engage in for Quarter 3, as we move into your Functions unit. Students have demonstrated their ability to identify functions and determine whether a function is linear or nonlinear. As we examine linear functions, students will solve real world problems that highlight how math content can be used in daily scenarios.

For continued success in Math, students should establish a study routine and utilize resources such as Khan Academy for additional Math explanation videos. Quizzes are given each Friday and students receive Math homework each week.

#### SCIENCE

Students have been showing advanced scientific skills in their work with microscopes! Students recently investigated microorganisms and what bacteria is living around us in our environment in a recent lab. We are currently learning about plant and animal cells. During this unit students will continue to learn about the specialized cells in our bodies and branch out to learn more in depth about the structures and functions of human anatomy.

Students will be engaged in weekly labs. A quiz is given every other Thursday. All classwork is posted and updated weekly on Google Classroom.



#### ELA

Students have hit the ground running in 2022. We finished our study of *The Omnivore's Dilemma* with a persuasive essay in which students created food rules that everyone should follow in order to be healthy and sustainable eaters. **Students conducted research on their chosen rules and explained to their audience why their rules matter and should be followed.** 

We began our study of graphic memoirs. **Students are in book** club groups that will be studying at least three graphic memoirs over the next few weeks. These texts come from a variety of places around the world, and all are centered on the experience of growing up in times of upheaval or conflict. Groups are working to self-manage-they are choosing their own texts, setting their own reading calendars, and working more independently on their classwork each day. This is to prepare students for increased independence and responsibility in high school!

On the horizon, we have our test prep unit in advance of the NYS ELA test, which will be held on March 30 and 31. In preparation, a practice state test was administered on February 9th.

#### SOCIAL STUDIES

Students have finished up this quarter with a bang by completing their Narratives for our Westward Expansion Unit. Where they were able to out themselves in the shoes of the Natives

This week we have just started our mini Unit on the Black Experience of the 19th century. We will be discussing the role of Slavery in American History. We will dive into the origins of Slavery, history of Slavery in America. We will do this by analyzing the 13th Amendment, rebellions of enslaved peoples in America, Black Authors, Activists, and abolitionists, and many other historical events that have been motivated by or effected by the enslavement of Africans in America.

We will continue to have 1-2 Homework assignments per week as well as one quiz per week.



## Message from our Restorative Practices Coordinator

We are in the second half of the school year, and want to remind our students the importance of showing up to school on time. As we lean into our Restorative practice each day, we would like to lean on our partnerships with families that have students who have been struggling to get to school on time. Our hope is to find solutions that will allow those students to make it to school on time and be productive in their first period class.

The RJ team will be hosting a Tardy room for those students who are late, to reach out to families and create the space to find solutions.

We also want to take time to celebrate our student leaders for taking the initiative to lead the work in supporting the community by engaging in Restorative practices as the Student RJ Council!!!

Ubuntu is a community principle that highlights humanity and interconnectedness for people of African descent. As counselors, we recognize the impact on our community when some members are not performing at their best.

Here are **11** signals that your child may need additional support:

- 1. Drastic Changes in behavior such as: little to no appetite, decreased interest in prior hobbies, sleeping more frequently
- 2. Increased negativity in casual conversation or comments online
- 3. Increased agitation and/or excessive worrying
- 4. Withdrawn from social interactions
- 5. Poor upkeep of personal hygiene
- 6. Increased Negative Phone Calls home
- 7. Extreme Mood Swings
- 8. Engaging in risky behaviors: substance use and exual activity etc
- 9. Harming themselves/Disregarding personal safety
- 10. Excessive Lateness or avoidance of class
- 11. Not returning phone calls




HUMANITIES Happy Black History Month, families,
