I-3: Administrative Procedures, Specialized Programs

THE POLICY

The Salt Lake City School District Board of Education supports and offers a number of specialized programs that provide families with a variety of learning environments for their students. Such programs must meet the requirements of state and federal laws and rules, and align with the Utah Core Standards, the board's vision, mission, and strategic plan for student achievement. The district has two categories of specialized programs: optional specialized programs and district special programs.

Optional specialized programs are proposed and developed by a specific school for implementation at that site, whereas district special programs have district oversight and may be replicated throughout the district. All specialized programs will offer academic rigor, research-based instructional strategies, and assessment of student learning and achievement. Approved programs may take the form of smaller learning communities within neighborhood or comprehensive schools or may constitute a whole magnet or lab school. Proposals for a new optional specialized program, or to expand or replicate an existing optional specialized program must be approved by the district and the board prior to implementation, expansion, or replication.

The purpose of this policy is to design instructional opportunities in learning environments that are accessible and responsive to the needs of the district's or school's diverse student population.

The district has set forth its specific processes for implementing this board policy through the accompanying <u>administrative</u> <u>procedures</u>.
